Adlai Stevenson Dies in London Ambassador to U.N. Is Taken Suddenly

LONDON (UPI) - Adlai E. Stevenson, twice Democratic candidate for president, collapsed today in a Loudon street and died of an apparent heart attack. He was 65.

We believe that freedom is a gift from God and not a political grant from government. Freedom is neither license nor anarchy. It is control and sovereignty of oneself no more, no less. It is thus consistent with the Human Relations Commandments, the Golden Rule and the Declaration of Independence.




