Youths, Resort Areas Settle

By United Press International Resort areas in four states rocked by youthful Fourth of July weekend rioting and vandalism settled back to normal

Throughout Monday thousands of teen - age and college - age youths headed for their homes, leaving in several areas mute reminders of the weekend dis-

The major trouble spots were Lake George, N.Y.; Rockaway Beach, Mo.; Arnolds Park, Iowa and Geneva-On-The-Lake, and

Russels Point, Ohio. A number of youths were arrested in other areas, such as Newport, R.I., Portsmouth, N.H. and Hyannis, Mass.

Police in seven states counted nearly 1,300 arrests during the three day weekend.

Of an estimated 50,000 persons who spent the weekend near the tiny mountain village of Lake George, 350 unruly youths were arrested, chiefly on alcoholic beverages violations and disorderly conduct charges.

In two nights of drunken brawling Arnolds Park, Iowa, about 100 persons, mostly

city council banned alcoholic beverages and Gov. Harold E. Hughes called out National Guardsmen for "standby alert" at nearby Estherville, Iowa.

The rioting was stopped by local police, firemen and state highway patrolmen using tear

The disorders erupted again early Monday when a mob threw firecrackers and burning garbage at police and passersby. Another 25 were arrested.



Reservations Difficult By mid-week it had become difficult here to obtain confirmed reservations for the weekend, and the problem of finding a set of wheels was further compounded here by the taxicab strike.

Jack Howe, manager at the Roosevelt Shopping Center beadquarters for Avis in populous Long Island, said there were about 3,300 cars in his area, and the company had stopped taking reservations by Wednesday before the weekend. Part of this, he said, was due to the arrival of summer visifors taking cars on a "package" plan by the week.


Car rental demand is high in all major metropolitan areas during holiday periods, but industry sources say that the demand in New York and Los Angeles is probably at a loftier level than in other cities

If he does not choose to rent garage, parking is a constant bugaboo. On-the-street parking, in the areas where it is available, leaves the car open to the possibility of damage by passing vehicles, to stripping or destruction by vandals.



Police Search For Pretty Teen's Strangler

GARDNER, Mass (UPI)-Police theorized today the strangler of a pretty 17-year-old girl had lain in ambush for his victim along a secluded woodland path, calmly drinking beer.

A wide search was on for the killer of Patricia M. Joyce, a tall brunette who was taking a shortcut through the woods on her way to work Monday when she was strangled with her own nylon stocking.

Police Chief Joseph L. Renes said three "good suspects" were being sought for questioning in connection with the slaying. We also said he would like to question the girl's boyfriend a! soldier stationed at Fort Dix, N.J. The unidentified boyfriend wasn't considered a suspect in the slaying, Renes said. The soldier visited the girl over the weekend and reportedly left for

The girl's body was found fully-clothed in a white nurse's uniform.

Dr. Joseph P. Marnane, medical examiner, said the girl had not been sexually molested. Her pocketbook, which had been emptied, was found a few feet from her body.

Chief Renes said several recently discarded beer cans were found about 30 feet from the girl's body, in a packed - down patch of tall grass.

He_theorized that the girl's assailant drank beer while waiting for the girl to walk down the path.

Dr. Marnane said there were no marks on the girl's body except for the stocking tightly knotted around her throat. He said her assailant was "big and

New Algerian Boss Setting His Government

ALGIERS (UPI) - Col. Houari Boumedienne, 'Algeria's revolutionary chief tried today t complete formation of a civilian government and end the crisis caused by the ouster of President Ahmed Ben Bella.

It was not known when the new government would be announced, but officials said a communique was expected

In a nationwide broadcast Monday, Boumedienne said he was planning:

- A constitutional revision splitting the offices of president and prime minister. Ben Bella held both positions.

- A special congress of the ruling National Liberation Front (FLN). Algeria's only political party, to adopt a new constitution for the party more in keeping with present-day conditions.

- A reform of Algeria's legal system to prevent arbitrary arrests. These were common under the Ben Bella regime. Boumedienne announced that 1,318 political prisoners of the Ben Bella regime already have been released.

Luci Welcomed By All Catholics

VATICAN CITY (UPI) -The baptism of Luci Baines Johnson, President Johnson's daughter, into the Roman Catholic Church has had a "regrettable" effect on the Christian unity movement, a spokesman for the Vatican's secretariat for promoting Christian unity said

Father Thomas Stransky of Milwaukee, Wis., a member of the important secretariat headed by Augustin Cardinal Bea, emphasized that the problem centered on Miss Johnson's baptism "and certainly not on her conversion.'

He said her conversion to catholicism "is a personal matter that she decided, and since she converted she is welcomed into the church by all Catho-

They could be sentenced to five years in prison upon con-







The Saturn-5 first stage that is now undergoing static tests concrete and steel embrace of its firing stand for months of NBO ground experiments:

A second Saturn-3 booster with two hydrogen-fueled upper stages bolted to it will be mounted in a huge tower now nearing completion for an exhausting series of "shake" tests to make sure the 364-foot vehicle is strong enough to stand the stresses of launch.

"We are very gratified with the way the testing is coming along." Von Braun said in an interview. "So far, it's moving so smoothly, it's dull."

New Proving Ground The Saturn-3 boosters to be used for lunar launches will be assembled in New Orleans, They will be tested at a new completion 38 miles north of New Orleans in Hancock County. Miss.

The first of the Saturn-4 second stages will be completed this fall with the first test firing scheduled for next January. The first booster will be tested at the center in the summer of CBS 1966.

After being test-fired, the Saturn second stage will be shipped by barge to Cape Kennedy. The first stage will bebarged back to New Orleans to be refurbished and then shipped to the launch site by a ship traveling through the Panama Canal.







\$100 Million Is Wasted In Defense

Washington Corresponden WASHINGTON (NEA) - Here are nine simple steps by which Defense Secretary McNamara could increase military readiness and save taxpayers \$100 million a year.

1. Eliminate overproduction of data. Ten Army depots alone have overspent \$365,000 a year in processing cost information with unnecessary frequency. Officials seemingly are entranced by the amount of data computers can turn out.



guess the most romantic thing I have seen on television in recent years was that commercial where the boy and girl go dancing down Park Avenue at night because the girl is happy she is a blonde, or something like that, maybe. I don't guarantee the facts about the commercial, but the notion that people go dancing down New York streets at night was splendid romanticism.

What I am getting around to is that what television entertainment really needs badly is solid romantic stories, about real people doing real - or near-real - things, or at least doing acceptably real things with some charm. And that is why Monday night's CBS - TV "Summer Playhouse" attraction, a half - hour test film for a projected series called "Sam and Sally" that never made the network schedule, seemed worth tuning in on the basis of the advance summary: "A romantic comedy about two young people who meet and fall in love on a lively New York weekend.

Think of it! - no witches, robots, hillbilly servicemen or other assorted way - out, unreal - or at least unrepresentative - types. Well, I won't bother you with the details except to say that the romance resulted after Sam (Gary Lockwood) pretended to be a cousin of Sally's (Cynthia Pepper's) roommate, who was out of n:uch of a show - but the idea for such a series wasn't entirely a bad one, better than now on. think there's much doubt that one of the reasons for the popularity of many old movies on tclevision is that they deal more often with fairly real peo-

One of the problems with Hollywood - and New York-based networks - is that it usually takes quite a while for new at titudes to get through. For ex-"Sam and Sally" not cnly recalled the basic format of""The Moon is Blue" and "The voice of the Turtle" - one amtable girl-chaser plus one virtuous girl in the big, big town -but also seemed to be date tack to the years of those productions. Not missing a trick, the show even tossed in an Eve Arden-type, wisecracking, mancrazy roommate for the girl. That isn't so bad either, of course. CBS-TV might put the whole idea away until people get ready to see real people again, if that thought strikes you as pleasant.
