that Delmar Fadden, 23-year-old "thrill climber" may have reached the summit of Mt. Rainier before death overtook him in an avalanche was disclosed today by his father, Harry D. Fadden. The father said a film negative found on the frozen body of his son showed what apparently was a scene of the extinct volcano's crater at the summit, 14,408 feet high. Young Fadden perished in a se-cret attempt to scale the mountain last month, a feat never before accomplished in January. Five other

men risked their lives last week to recover his body at the 13,000-foot level.


