Nurse Tells of Capture, Stay With Congolese

Missionary Survives Massacres

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congolese (UPI) — Margaret Hayes, a 41-year-old British missionary nurse, told today how she gave herself up to the Congolese rebels on Christmas eve because they threatened to kill everyone in the village sheltering her.

Miss Hayes, the survivor of two massacres, was one of 19 Europeans including 15 nuns and two small children rescued by mercenaries Saturday in the dense jungle around Buta in the northern Congo. They were flown to Leopoldville Sunday night.

She said one village already had been burned to the ground and two persons killed and eight wounded in her defense. She said because of this she gave herself up on the morning of Christmas eve, believing it to be her last day on earth. "If you want, kill me," she told her captors. "But spare the innocent people."

The rebels, their hate some what abated, told her instead, "We don't want to kill you. We want you to work for us. You are the only doctor between here and Stanleyville."

She escaped the Nov. 25 massacre at Banalia because four days earlier the villagers had demanded and won her release so she could continue nursing them. Two British missionary couples and their five children, American missionary Mary Elizabeth Baker, a New Zealand woman missionary, four Belgian nuns and a Belgian father were all murdered on that day.

The death of Miss Baker, a representative of the Unvanquished Fields Mission, Easton Pa. was first reported from Leopoldville some months ago. Miss Hayes confirmed her death.

Later, at the end of May, Miss Hayes was a captive in a filthy room at Buta when the rebels massacred 31 Dutch and Belgian priests.

Thirty-one fathers, 15 nuns, and two Negro children and their mother (Mrs. Nadine Legros of Belgium) and I were perched in a small room with out beds or chairs," she said.

"They emptied our pockets, stripped us naked and inspected us individually. They took the rings off the nuns, their Crucifixes, glasses, everything."

"They did this several times. The fathers had to strip in front of us and the next day they came with sticks and beat the fathers from 11 in the morning to 4 in the afternoon."

"Then we heard the order being given to tie the fathers' arms and legs. They were beaten again, then led in single file to the river, slashed with big knives and thrown into the river. Some of them were still alive. A Simba (rebel) stood at (See NURSE, Page 3)

U.S. Jets Bomb Viet With Leaflets

SAIGON (UPI) — U.S. Air Force jets filled the skies over five Communist North Vietnamese cities today with an estimated 2.7 million leaflets accusing the Hanoi regime of bartering rice for Chinese Communist guns.

In the south, American B27 jet bombers hit a Viet Cong staging area 210 miles south-east of Saigon and killed an estimated 100 Viet Cong. The attack with 500- and 750-pound bombs destroyed 116 buildings, pilots reported.

Despite the air attacks the Communists broadened their monsoon offensive, attacking the Nha Trang naval training station 200 miles northeast of Saigon with mortar fire and bombing the district capital of Nghia Hanh near Da Nang.

Princess Beatrix, Nazi to Wed

THE HAGUE (UPI)—Queen Juliana of the Netherlands, expressing "great joy," today announced the engagement of Crown Princess Beatrix to Claus von Amsberg, a West German diplomat with a Nazi past.

In a nationwide radio and television broadcast, the Queen made mention of Von Amsberg's service in a Nazi Panzer division during World War II.

"We are very happy she made a choice, which was also the choice of her heart. We think it humanly speaking, an excellent choice."

In referring to Von Amsberg's Nazi war record, the Queen said:

"Claus and his family have opposed the Nazi regime. Both young people, like we, were conscious of the doubts and even the resistance their engagement might cause."

"Still we felt these objections did not balance their love."

"We have, as parents, real confidence that the union of these two people will be happy in every respect."

Both Beatrix and Von Amsberg held a news conference before the Queen's announcement and spoke frankly of the opposition to their marriage.

"We did foresee the problem," Beatrix said, "and we realize there are people who have genuine rights to be unhappy about our engagement."

U.S. planes struck back at Nghia Khanh with bombs, machinegun fire and cannon, inflicting what a spokesman called "heavy losses" on the Reds. Two American military advisers were wounded. During the action the Viet Cong wounded four Vietnamese in an attack six miles to the west.

U.S. casualties in the war continued to mount. A spokesman reported two Americans dead in the mystery crash of a transport plane Sunday night near Saigon. Two enlisted men of the 173rd Airborne Brigade were killed at the Bien Hoa Air Base 15 miles northeast of Saigon by the accidental discharge of a shotgun by another American.

The transport plane crashed into a Roman Catholic refugee village killing at least three villagers. The plane — not even identified as an Air Force plane — appeared to be carrying long range fuel tanks. Sixteen other unidentified bodies were reported in the wreckage. Who they were no one would say.

The Air Force announced the arrival of a new tactical jet fighter squadron at Bien Hoa with 30 officers and 250 airmen of the 367th Tactical Squadron — the second new squadron within a week. The new unit which flies F100 Supersabres is (See JETS, Page 3)

Pickets on Job At Space Port

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — Wildcat picketing today turned away hundreds of construction workers at America's No. 1 space center, hindering spaceport building for the third straight work day.

About 60 striking copy machine workers picketed all entrances to the vast space center despite pleas by the President's missile sites labor commission to return to work.

It was the seventh major labor dispute to hit the center's multi-million dollar construction program in 17 months. The earlier tie-ups accounted for more than two weeks of work lost.

The strikers, members of the International Alliance of Theatrical and Stage Employees Union (IATSEU), threw up their picket lines last Thursday in a wage dispute with McGregor-Werner, Inc., a firm that reproduces documents for the federal space agency.

The strike, which is not sanctioned by the IATSEU's international headquarters, involved only the 60 union members employed by McGregor-Werner.

The pickets continued over the weekend, despite warnings that McGregor-Werner would hire replacements for the strikers, who are seeking pay increases ranging from 79 cents to \$1.29 hourly.

Gotham Cabbies, Mechanics Strike For Unionization

NEW YORK (UPI)—Several thousand New York City taxi drivers and mechanics went on strike today, seeking union recognition from fleet owners.

Police, fearing a recurrence of the violence and destruction that marked recent unionization attempts, patrolled cab stands and garages across the city.

The strike directly affected thousands of commuters who were forced to ride already crowded subways and buses. With the absence of most taxis, however, rush hour traffic flowed freely.

Almost immediately after a strike vote was taken early today, picket lines were thrown up at fleet garages in Manhattan, the Bronx, Queens and Brooklyn.

About 5,500 of the city's 12,000 drivers shouted approval of the walkout at a midnight mass rally in a ballroom in midtown Manhattan.

In Chicago, a strike of 6,000 cab drivers and mechanics entered its third day. Only one fifth of the city's 4,600 taxis were on the streets in the walkout, also for union recognition.

Harry Van Arsdale, president of the New York City Labor Council, which has spearheaded the drive to unionize the city's cabbies, told the strikers to be sure they turned in their outstanding receipts along with their cabs before walking off the job.

The strike affects all of New York City with the exception of Staten Island. The walkout will not affect the city's 7,000 privately owned cabs.

In compliance with the strike vote, cabbies began turning in their automobiles at various garages throughout the city during the early morning. Picket lines were set up outside the garages, manned by cabbies carrying make shift placards.

Attorney Harry Friedlander, a spokesman for 36 of the fleet-owners, called the walkout "an attempt to secure union recognition by force."

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Republican National Chairman Ray C. Bliss said today the GOP would never be a strong, united party again if splinter groups continued to compete with the national committee in raising funds.

"It is for this single reason that I view with some concern the creation of separate organizations which solicit funds from Republicans, whether these organizations be liberal, moderate, or conservative," he said.

"My first responsibility is to finance the operation of the Republican National Committee. Until that operation is fully financed — and we are far from that position at this moment — I must attempt at least to discourage the creation of organizations which will compete with us in the soliciting of Re-

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Road Accidents Kill 12 During Weekend

By United Press International A comparatively small number of highway fatalities was credited today with keeping weekend fatalities in Texas low.

A United Press International survey from 6 p.m. Friday to midnight Sunday showed a total of 20 violent deaths, including 12 on the highways.

One of the most recent deaths reported was that of Paul Ramirez, 48, of San Antonio. He tried to swim to the middle of Lake McQueeney in Guadalupe county last night and failed to make it.

Two residents of the Dallas suburb of Irving were killed in a two car head-on collision Sunday on State Highway 356. They were David Henry Strathee, 27, and Richard Anthony Fahey, 36. Their small foreign car was hit by a car travelling in the wrong lane.

Another double fatality wreck occurred Saturday near Weatherford. Lowell Williams, 37, of Dallas and Lloyd Ray Green, 25, of Weatherford, were killed. Joe H. McQuarters, 69, former president of the Wax-

Decision on Afro-Asian Talks Prevented Dispute

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI) — The postponement of the second Afro-Asian conference, a bitter blow to Communist China, almost caused an open split between so-called "moderates," and a pro-Peking block, informed sources said today.

They said that a face-saving agreement to hold the conference next Nov. 5 with a surface show of unanimity prevented a real showdown.

Those lined up with China in taking a hard line included Algeria, Indonesia, Syria, Ghana, Guinea, Pakistan and Cambodia.

The so-called "moderates," the sources said, headed by Japan, included the Philippines, India, Thailand and Turkey. They also counted some of the British Commonwealth African members and Iran, Tunisia and Morocco.

AFS Students Leave for N.Y.

Thirty-five American Field Service students had a delayed departure from Pampa this morning when a chartered bus en route to Pampa broke down at White Deer.

Scheduled to leave at 8:30 a.m., the students didn't get off until about 10 a.m. Another bus had to be secured from Amarillo for the trip to New York.

The group is made up of foreign exchange students from 10 different nations who have spent the year attending school at 35 towns over the southwest.

The bus will take the students to New York where they will be greeted by President Johnson before departure back to their respective countries and homes.

Yesterday, the students were guests for an "old fashion" barbecue held on the Coronado Inn-lawn.

In addition to the barbecue, the students spent the day touring Pampa and surrounding areas and joined together for a swimming party yesterday afternoon.

The boys and girls were guests in homes of Pampans for two and one-half day stay in Pampa.

Highlight of the barbecue yesterday was a cow-calling contest, won by Pampa's foreign student Peter Kaddoum of Brazil.

The final bus tours are set up for 2,892 students from 59 countries who concluded a year of studies in the U.S. to introduce them to communities and regions of the country other than where they attended school.

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MEXICAN CREW HELD FOR QUESTIONING

Cause of Actor's Death Still Unknown

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala (UPI) — Police today investigated the mysterious death of actor Steve Cochran whose partially decomposed body was found aboard his yacht "Rogue," drifting off Guatemala with two teen-aged Mexican girls and a Mexican woman.

One of the girls, a 14 year old, told authorities the 46-year-old film star lay ill for 10 days aboard the drifting pleasure craft before he died. They said he paid them 70 pesos a day to keep house for him aboard ship.

Cochran's body was discovered Saturday by a Guatemalan coast guard vessel which found the yacht drifting off the port city of Chaperico. It was flown here Sunday aboard a Guatemalan air force plane.

Held For Questioning The three Mexicans were held for questioning. An autopsy was performed but pathologists said it would be several days before the cause of Cochran's death could be determined.

Authorities said the actor, who specialized in "B" movie tough guy roles, apparently had been dead since June 13. He had been on an extensive cruise vacation to scout movie locations for his own company, Robert Alexander Productions, named for his father.

Car Victim's Rites Scheduled Tuesday

Funeral services are scheduled for 2 p.m. tomorrow in the First Baptist Church for Alvin R. Driggers, 46, of 452 Pitts, who died early today in Amarillo's Veteran Hospital of injuries received in an automobile accident June 18.

The Rev. E. Douglas Carver will officiate at the services and will be assisted by Rev. J. R. Manning, associate pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery, under the direction of Duenkel Funeral Home.

Trapped Campers in Palo Duro Canyon Due Rescue

CANYON, Tex. (UPI)—About 150 campers who spent the weekend staring at flood waters that trapped them in Palo Duro Canyon were expected to get out by noon today.

The campers were marooned in the upper end of the canyon by heavy rains that caused flooding up to 12 feet deep in the five water crossings below them.

Park Supt. E. J. Boehm said the water has dropped to about 16 inches and is continuing to drop about an inch an hour. He said the campers could be rescued when the water gets below a foot deep.

"We had a little bit of rain on the watershed near Canyon about 10 p.m., and it may send the water back up some. But we're hoping to get the campers out today—by noon or before," Boehm said.

He said the last time campers were trapped in the canyon was in 1962, about this time of year.

Most of the campers have been in Palo Duro Canyon since Friday night.

Winds Playing Havoc With Fogging Machine

High winds have been playing havoc with the effectiveness of Pampa's mosquito fogging machine.

The winds blow the exterminator mist high into the air and reduce its lethal power on members of the Culicidae family.

Mosquitoes moved in on Pampa during the past 10 days after heavy rains. They came in from the wheat fields when stirred out of their habitat there. The high winds have helped blow them into the city, officials said.

The city manager said the fogging machine is working 16-hour shifts on rounds of the city. A complete coverage of the entire city requires three days.

Church Entered, Nothing Taker.

Thieves broke into the Hobart Street Baptist Church sometime late Saturday night, but left apparently empty-handed.

Rev. A. G. Purvis told police that the building was entered sometime between noon Friday and 8 a.m. Sunday.

The building was ransacked. Purvis said, but the burglars left without finding any loot.

Residents Reminded Of Fireworks Law

Pampa Police Chief Jim Conner reminded residents today of the city ordinance outlawing the shooting of fireworks within the city limits.

Conner said the police department has been deluged with complaints about fireworks being shot in the city and stated the department will be forced to file charges against violators unless it is stopped.

Vietnamese troops airlifted into action by U.S. helicopter crews killed six high-ranking Viet Cong officials in a highly successful search and destroy operation 40 miles southwest of Saigon. The victims include the Communist chief of Dinh Thuong Province.

All told, 39 guerrillas were killed and 29 captured.

A total of 64 American planes flew a series of bombing missions against North Viet Nam Sunday, hitting bridges, highways and ferry barges south of Hanoi, the Communist capital.

Other U.S. planes blasted Viet Cong targets in South Viet Nam, including the district capital of Tu Marong, about 300 miles north of Saigon.

More than 1,000 guerrillas captured Tu Marong Friday night with a human wave assault signaled by a bugler—a tactic used by the Communists in the Korean War.

Tu Marong remained in Communist hands today, a spokesman said. Bad weather hampered ground operations in the area.

The Americans wounded in today's attack on Nghia Hanh were two U.S. Army enlisted men who were struck by flying mortar fragments, one in the back and the other in the neck. Both were airlifted to the U.S. Marine base at Chu Lai, 25 miles north of Nghia An.

Two U.S. Air Force B57 bombers participated in the counter-attack. Pilots dropped five tons of bombs on the Viet Cong mortar positions and strafed the area with machinegun fire and 20 millimeter cannon.

The air attack halted the mortar bombardment, but enough guerrillas remained hidden by jungle cover to throw intense ground fire at reconnaissance planes trying to assess the damage.

The airplane downed near Saigon was a C123 transport which plunged into a village for Roman Catholic refugees not far from Long Binh Tan. Three villagers were reported killed when the wreckage fell on thatched roof houses.

In confirming the two American dead, spokesmen would not say specifically whether the plane belonged to the U.S. Air Force.

The plane was on the way back to Ton Son Nhut Airport in Saigon when, according to witnesses, it was hit and exploded.

No identifying markings were visible on any part of the scattered wreckage but the wings were mounted with what appeared to be long-range fuel tanks.

HEAT HITS ITALY

ROME (UPI)—Italy sweltered in record heat Sunday. Rome was the hottest city with a high of 99. Officials at Lido Beach in Venice said it was 135 degrees in the sun.

Activities of the new public relations group, Top O' Texans Club, were reported by Floyd Watson and publicity chairman Bill Power presented the directors with the new city maps.

The directors endorsed sponsorship of a proposed St. Joseph Band contest to be held in Pampa sometime in February. Warren Hasse explained that 30 to 40 high school bands would be invited to participate.

Klan Frightening Off Witnesses

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congressional investigators looking into the activities of the Ku Klux Klan have found that potential witnesses are being frightened off by threats of violence or of economic and social reprisals.

Sources reported during the weekend that investigators for the House Committee on Un-American Activities were finding it difficult to persuade prospective witnesses to appear either at the closed or the public hearings on the KKK planned for this summer.

Committee staff members are operating in a number of southern states, quietly interviewing dissident Klansmen, victims of Klan violence and law enforcement officials who have dealt with the hooded nightriders.

Company Moving District Office To Pampa Soon

Labor Lawyers In Special Session

WASHINGTON (UPI)—AFL-CIO attorneys were called to a special conference here this week to assess the impact of two Supreme Court decisions limiting the antitrust immunity of labor unions.

J. Albert Wolf, AFL-CIO general counsel, arranged the meeting of labor lawyers to discuss the probable impact of the rulings and the steps unions can take to protect themselves.

The decisions provide that unions lose their traditional exemption from antitrust prosecution — or civil triple - damage suits — if they make an agreement with one employer to impose uniform wage standards on competitors.

They were handed down in cases involving the United Mine Workers and a small Tennessee coal company, and the Meat Cutters' Union and the Jewel Tea Co. grocery stores in Chicago.

The lawyers who fought the cases for the unions decided against filing petitions for reconsideration or rehearing. As for getting legislation through Congress to override the high court, most labor officials doubt that it would stand much chance of passage.

The main hope of AFL-CIO leaders is that the Supreme Court will modify the new doctrine in future cases involving the antitrust theme.

Prison Escape Ends in Failure

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—Three convicts armed with zip-guns and homemade bombs took two guards hostage Sunday night and made an "extremely stupid" attempt to shoot their way out of Western State Penitentiary.

The attempt failed. It ended 90 minutes after it started when state policemen threw down a barrage of tear-gas and the convicts came out with their hands up.

The guards were released unharmed. One of the prisoners sustained a severe hand cut when a homemade bomb exploded as he prepared to throw it toward advancing troopers.

More than 1,000 other convicts remained in their cells and made no attempt to join the escape attempt.

Advisory Group To Meet Tuesday

Pampa's study committee delving into city water problems will meet again at 7 p.m. Tuesday in City Hall.

City Manager Jim White said today the study group's principal business will be to look into a contract between the city and Canadian River Municipal Water Authority and the Authority's contract with the federal government.

Members of the 10-man committee have asked to familiarize themselves with the terms of the contracts in order to attempt a solution to Pampa's commitments to the CRMWA.

When water is ready to be delivered to Pampa from the Canadian River Reservoir at Sanford, Pampa will be obligated for an annual payment of approximately \$200,000. The first payment would come due in 1967.

The city also must decide what to do about a treatment plant for the water. Estimated cost of the plant is \$750,000 to \$1,000,000.

Confusion—Thou Art A Jewel

Rep. Clyde Hosmer of California is advising his constituents, in the latest of his highly educational bulletins from the National Capital, that Washington is in the "District of Confusion." As evidence, he cites a long list of items of which the following should be adequate to prove his point:

"Congress has lowered income taxes in the name of giving Americans more of their own money to spend. It is also raising taxes on their incomes in the name of Social Security. "The country is fighting a war in Vietnam and simultaneously repealing 'wartime' excise taxes because we are not at war. "Our prosperity is the highest in the history and we are embarking on a massive anti-poverty campaign. "We face a 'long hot summer' of discontent and violence on the streets of our cities and a gigantic domestic 'Peace Corps' is being formed. "The Administration wants to spend \$3 billion for foreign aid in the name of friendship while Uncle Sam is badgered by over 100 nations at the UN and Yankee Go Home signs are posted and complete disarmament. "The Pentagon spends \$50 billion a year for an Army, Navy, and Air Force and the US Arms Control and Disarmament Agency clamors for total

complete disarmament. "LBJ cuts duty-free tourist allowances to save \$50 million in gold outflow and Governor Pat Brown of California seeks authority to spend almost half that amount abroad on equipment for the State's Feather River Water Project. "In order to maintain a 'sound dollar' we are no longer minting them. "Togetherness and 'interdependence' with Communist countries is being urged at the State Department while Russia expels our diplomats and we expel hers. "The California Congressman says these examples (of which we have quoted only a few) 'may seem confusing to the average person, and the reason it seems confusing is because it is.' "But Mr. Hosmer is no prophet of doom. He assures us in fact, that "There is no reason for alarm or despair." If the thrust of our Government confuses us then, as he says: "It confuses—our enemies, too. They have no idea what we are up to either. Therefore, they cannot possibly devise countermeasures to thwart us." "Which reminds us that a bill has been introduced in the Ohio legislature to require green tail lamps on all vehicles. Doubtless the same philosophy that there's nothing ahead to fear.

Employment Law Poses Problems

Employers who enjoy wrestling with personnel problems can have a ball with the new Federal Fair Employment Practices law.

That's the law aimed at eliminating employment discrimination not only in terms of race or color, but of sex.

A man asked us at a luncheon last Friday how the newspaper was handling classified ads dealing with male and female help since men and women now are to be treated exactly the same.

After thinking about it for a while there arises the possibility that the boss in any business can make a real fun game out of such puzzlers as:

Case One: The curly blonde on the reception desk is a smash with customers and clients. But a big, burly guy in the shipping room has answered an ad and

applied for the receptionist's job and his aptitude tests show he could handle it. Does he get it?

Case Two: You are running a barbershop. The cute little manicurist is a barrel of fun. But you know in your heart that a middle-aged porter who wants the manicurist's job could wield the nail file and scissors just as well as the gal and could also talk baseball and golf with the customers. What do you do?

Case Three: You are head of a young ladies' college. A former big-time football star applies for the job of house mother at one of the dormitories. His reputation and prestige are great and the young ladies are not complaining. Is the job his?

There is at least one decision still easy for the employer. He doesn't have to give a male employee time off to have a baby. But is it really fair not to?

'Disease Can't Happen to Me'

Medical people have found that one of the biggest obstacles to getting people to take preventive health measures is the apparently natural feeling that "It can't happen to me."

And the more serious the disease and the greater the belief that it is incurable, the stronger this feeling seems to be.

This was the most important fact to come out of an 18-month survey conducted by the University of Michigan School of Public Health.

In the study, 1,500 adults across the country, selected as a typical cross-section, were asked about their attitudes to three diseases of varying severity: tooth decay, tuberculosis and cancer.

In each case, the majority felt that other people were more

likely to contract the diseases than they themselves. But with the most serious of the three, "the thought of contracting cancer would seem to be . . . so painful that almost a third of the people . . . could not admit it at all."

With such an attitude, it is no surprise that 90 per cent of the interviews had not had a cancer test during the previous 10 years.

The researchers recommend that health educators place less emphasis on the seriousness of cancer and TB and start stressing sciences growing ability to detect and cure these diseases in their early stages, even before any symptoms are evident.

NEW YORK (NEA) — In a rather neatly reasoned argument, we explained here the other week how the federal government could not possibly win the War on Poverty under the present program.

As we explained at the time, poverty is a very complex word. A poor person is somebody who has less than you. But how much less? Can he have a television set and still be poor?

And what if he does not want what you have? Or what if he wants it and is not willing to work for it? By any reasonable standards, we concluded, the only possible definition of poverty is somebody who wants what you have, works very hard for it, but has nothing to show for his effort.

In that event, the War on Poverty can be quite effective. However, the name of the program will have to be changed to the War on the Middle Class. And we would like to complete our argument by proving conclusively that the Middle Class is, in fact, this nation's deserving poor.

1. The Middle Class is obligated to maintain the country's standard of living, no matter what the cost.

The Middle Class must prevent crabgrass, dandruff, pain, offensive body odors, coughs due to colds, irregularity cavities, receding gum, receding hair, tattletale gray, tensions that build in the night, and wax build-up on floors and scalp.

2. The Middle Class is obligated to maintain the country's moral fiber, no matter what the cost.

The Middle Class must support the churches of its denomination, the college of its choice, the wife of its youth, the political party of its father, the downtown business center, Little League baseball, and organized charities (not exceeding 10 per cent of the amount on line 5 page 1).

3. The Middle Class is obligated to maintain the nation's cultural heritage, no matter what the cost.

The Middle Class must have creative toys for its infants, college for all its youngsters, a complete set of books, stereo, color television, a dinner jacket, a telephone in color of course, air conditioning, and an electric toothbrush.

4. The Middle Class is obligated to maintain the nation's intellectual freedom, no matter what the cost.

5. The Middle Class is obligated to maintain the country's hope of the future, no matter what the cost.

The Middle Class must watch its weight, its neighbors, the news, the weather, the Russians, the traffic, the schedules, the race for space, the race for the pennant, the new fashions, the latest styles, the prices, the ballot box, the time, the checking account, the closing quotation of the property values and Ed Sullivan.

6. And on top of it all, the Middle Class is obligated to look out for itself without depending on assistance or emoluments of any kind.

IRS Checking Some Klan Officials' Tax Returns: House Committee To Reveal Wholesale Weapons Deal

WASHINGTON—The tax returns of Ku Klux Klan officials in four Southern states are under close scrutiny by the Internal Revenue Service.

This unannounced development is a direct outgrowth of the sweeping investigation of the Klan the House Committee on Un-American Activities has been quietly conducting for several months—in preparation for holding public hearings, now slated for around the middle of July.

Under authority granted by President Johnson, committee agents compared Klan officials' tax returns with information from other sources. The resulting disclosures, turned over to the Revenue Service, led to its launching a probe of its own.

Illustrative of the nature of the committee's evidence is the following:

One Klan official made a statement to the Veterans Administration that he had no income other than a World War II pension. The House investigators obtained records revealing this klansman was doing a thriving business selling Klan attire and paraphernalia.

Other significant committee findings due to be aired at the public hearings are:

—A Louisiana klansman, at the instigation of officials of the organization, became a licensed gun dealer for the purpose of providing klansmen with weapons at wholesale prices. Records show he purchased some 600 rifles, shotguns and pistols, virtually all sold to klansmen in four Southern states. Committee agents are on the trail of other reputed instances of klansmen becoming licensed gun dealers for this purpose.

—A number of negro shootings in the past two years have been directly linked to klansmen. However, while all of these cases of terror tactics by individual Klan elements have been carefully documented, the House investigators have uncovered no ties between them and Klan officials. In no instance was the deed perpetrated at the behest of a Klan officer.

—Most Klan officials are school drop-outs. They average less than a fifth grade education. NEGRO "KLUXERS"—Representative Edwin Willis, D-La., chairman, is discussing with other committee members widening the investigation to include the "Deacons for Defense and Justice."

This is a Negro organization with the avowed purpose of safeguarding members of that race and civil rights workers and demonstrators.

Launched last summer in northern Louisiana, the DDJ reportedly now has some 40 chapters in that state, Mississippi and Alabama. Estimated membership is around 10,000 approximately half that of the Klan. Ernest Thomas, Jonesboro, La. is chief organizer.

of them fired at anti-civil rights partisans in Louisiana earlier this year the organization has been under surveillance by the FBI.

One significant FBI discovery is an apparent growing close relationship between the Deacons and the Congress for Racial Equality (CORE). In a re-where CORE is particularly active, notably in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama, Deacons units spring up and seem to thrive.

HOLDING BACK — Attorney General Katzenbach is balking at the committee's request for evidence linking Klan officials with the activities of terror squads of the Klan.

Similarly, he has turned down Chairman Willis' request that FBI and other government informants be permitted to testify at the committee's public hearings next month. Katzenbach contends these sources are too valuable to "surface" at this time.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, testifying before a House Appropriations Subcommittee in March, revealed the FBI had infiltrated Klan and "hate-type" organizations. Said Hoover:

"We have penetrated these Klan and hate-type organizations with highly qualified sources consisting of not only rank-and-file members but also individuals who are in a position to have access to plans and policies. These sources furnish valuable information on a continuing basis."

A major target of the committee's hearings is Klan units known as "KBI"—Klan Bureau of Investigation. Their avowed function is to "safeguard the internal security" of the Klan, particularly against infiltration by state and federal agents.

In Hoover's testimony, he also disclosed the FBI is investigating 14 Klan-type organizations.

"The largest and dominant Klan group," he said, "is the United Klans of America, Inc., Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, with headquarters in Tuscaloosa, Ala. This group is active in eight states, has an estimated membership of 4,600 individuals, and is led by Imperial Wizard Robert Shelton."

"Another prominent Klan group is the White Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of Mississippi which was organized in February 1964, and operates solely in Mississippi. Its membership is estimated at 2,000 persons and is led by Imperial Wizard Samuel Bowers."

"In Louisiana, the Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan is active. Its headquarters are in Jonesboro, La., and its membership is estimated to be 1,500. The leader of this organization is Roy E. Davis. Another Klan group is the United Florida Ku Klux Klan which operates in Florida. It has an estimated membership of 900, and is led by Jason C. Kersey, with headquarters in Samsula, Fla."

CONTROVERSIAL PATRIOTISM

A few years ago patriotism could not possibly be labeled controversial. People of great prominence, lesser lights and anti-patriots have succeeded in making patriotic fervor a subject of wide discussion and even derision.

Patriotism is not so proudly displayed by many of our citizens as it once was by all. This change of attitude did not just happen overnight. It is the product of years of skillful propaganda aimed at weakening the resolve of the American people by causing them to forget the greatness of America.

If patriotism had been maintained as a profitable attitude its decline in popularity would not have happened. Patriotism lost popularity in connection with a crusade of sophistication.

Parents have gone to Court to get their children in school excused from reciting the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. Faculty members and students have refused to sign simple oaths of loyalty to the United States and were not kidded into acceptance of proper values.

Comedians specializing in "jokes" jokes make distasteful jokes about patriotism, and slick magazines specialize in lambasting patriotic organizations. Public officials recently found pressures compelling them to denounce good citizens as supporters of patriots, extremists or members of the "lunatic fringe."

Games in sports once began only after the playing of the National Anthem. Now, in many places the National Anthem is no longer played before the starting of the game.

A correction in the right direction would be to again cause freedom to be fashionable and patriotism profitable by steadfastly and joyously commending these virtues.

Everyone affected would soon feel more certain freedom shall endure. HLH

EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

It's Okay for Women To Work; Holy Writ Says So

To work or not to work, that is the question.

Not with us male breadwinners, it isn't. We have to work or bum off the taxpayers. But with married women, should they work or shouldn't they?

By the term "work" I do not refer to mere physical exertion such as dabbling with diapers or whipping up a pot of coffee for the mid-morning klatsch. Rather I mean remunerative employment—cash—in the piggy bank, so to speak.

Change Of View Formerly I believed that women ought not to labor in the marketplace and I pontificated on that point to my energetic wife. More recently, I shifted to the view that work was permissive for the help meet. By gradual degrees, I now have arrived at the conclusion that work is the mark of virtue; in other words, it's practically mandatory for women as well as for men.

The reason for the latest shift of mental gears is a passage I read in the 31st chapter of Proverbs. Now if you're a modern Methodist or a 1967-model Presbyterian, perhaps I should hasten to explain that to some the Scriptures, taken in context, are the perfect guide both as to belief and as to practice.

Proverbs 31 So I take this Proverbs 31 verbatim. I figure the author, a king named Lemuel, means exactly what he says, and he says:

"Who can find a virtuous woman? for her price is far above rubies. . . She seeketh wool and flax and worketh willingly with her hands. She is like the merchants' ship; she bringeth her food from afar. She riseth also while it is yet night, and giveth meat to her household. . . She considereth a field and buyeth it; with the fruit of her hands she planteth that it may bring forth a good tree; her candle goeth not out by night. She maketh fine linen, and selleth it; and delivereth girdles unto the merchant. . . She looketh well to the ways of her household, and eateth not the bread of idleness. Her children arise up, and call her blessed; her husband also, and he prayeth for her."

There, from Holy Writ, you have a picture of a hard working woman who looks after her children and husband, deals in

real estate, manufactures textiles, and bargains with merchants.

Of course, it would have been physically impossible for her to have done all these things at all times. When her children were young, she probably stuck closer to the house—maybe gardened a little.

But as the offspring matured, she ventured far for good buys. Although continuing to manage her household, she gave attention to business, bought a parcel of ground and planted it with her own hands. Then she perceived what merchandise is good, made it, and sold it.

She kept busy, in other words, and her family had the good sense not to resent the fact that she was helping to provide for them. Her husband had the decency to praise her for a tremendous contribution that she was making to the household economy.

In short, business and women do mix.

Today, there is no reason for us to be headed for a depression. There is no reason for us to be in a position where we must fear loss of gold. There is no reason for there to be a silver coin shortage.

Yet, these things do exist. Why? Because some Americans realize the causes—or because of the causes themselves?

Ever since Ludwig von Mises uncovered the inevitable link between inflation and depression, there has been no justification for today's policies. His predictions were manifested in the 1929 depression. Instead of heeding them, however, power-hungry politicians and bureaucrats have repeated the mistakes of the twenties.

The government, through the Federal Reserve System, has embarked upon a program of planned inflation, creating fictitious dollar bills and bank deposits that are not backed by gold or silver. As these fictitious forms of purchasing power have been fed into society, they have created distortions that eventually must be liquidated.

The "Business Cycle" Inflation always leads to recession. If the money managers keep the inflationary boom going long enough, all confidence in the value of the currency is destroyed and runaway inflation results. This must be followed by a depression to clear all the unreality from the economy.

Government then aggravates the readjustment process by trying to keep wages and prices up—instead of letting them drop to the point where men can be profitably hired and unsold merchandise becomes attractive enough to buy.

Yes, we are repeating the tragic mistakes of the twenties. And those who call attention to the truth are not instigators of depressions. They are merely trying to alleviate the burden of the inevitable depression by ending the causes as soon as possible.

The money managers in Washington have caused a gold drain by issuing too much currency. They have created a coin shortage by destroying confidence in paper money. They have deprived their own citizens of the opportunity to own gold. Their actions will produce fearful consequences, and no amount of wishing will change that.

It's true, the emperor is naked. And no amount of artificial confidence in an unreal policy will put clothes upon him.

There is nothing in a free-enterprise economy that guarantees a profit. All it guarantees is an opportunity to gain or fail depending on the success of the enterpriser.

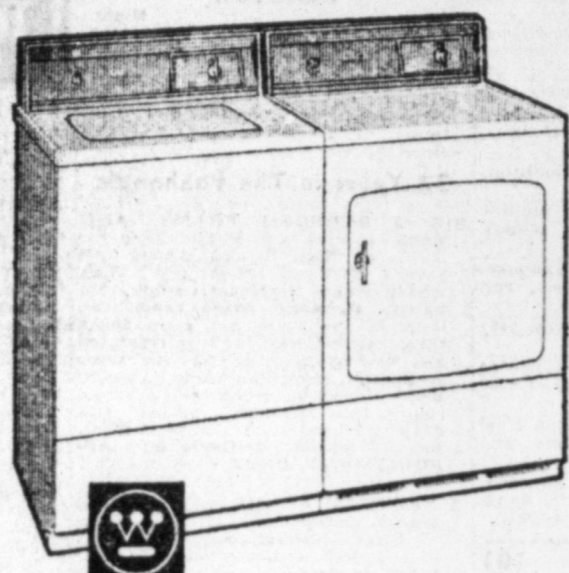
