



FEDERAL JUDGES "CREATE" LAW

One of the boldest and most revealing statements about the actual role of judges in our federal courts today came recently from a Congressman from New York City. "A federal judge," he said, "should not just accept the law. He should mold it, develop it, create it."

This has been the actual philosophy of the most influential federal judges, particularly these on the Supreme Court for those on the Supreme Court, for a generation. Rarely have they 15 spelled it out in so many words. The Congressman, unversed in the subtleties of legal language, blurted out the real truth.

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
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
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
