# Sukarno Is In Custody: United States Blamed

By R. E. STANNARD, JR.

TOKYO (UPI) — A revolutionary council led by an officer of President Sukarno's palace guard has seized power in Indonesia, Radio Jagarta announced today. Sukarno was reported in custody.

The broadcasts from the Indonesian capital of Jakarta said the government had been taken over by a new 45-man council.

The radio said the reason for the coup was to forestall a revolt planned for next Tuesday by several Indonesian generals! supported by the U. S. Central Intelligence Agency (CIA).
