Emmy awards Sunday night. The young stars shared top billing with Alfred Lunt, Lynn Fontanne and conductor Leonard Bernstein who also won for outstanding individual achievements in entertainment. They were the only performers to receive the gold statuettes among the 33 Emmys presented on the nationally

telecast program. Each of the winner's shows also took honors for outstanding achievement under the revamped Emmy format that limited nominees to four catch-

all categories. The winning shows were: "My Name Is Barbra," "The Dick Van Dyke Show," Bernstein's "What Is Sonata Form?" from his New York Philharmonic Young Peoples Concert series, and "The Magnificent Yankee" in which Lunt and Fontanne starred in a segment of "Hallmark Hall of Fame."

A breathless Miss Streisand said: "This is too fantastic. When I was a kid my favorite shows were the Oscars and Emmys!




