Ten Amendments To Be Presented Voters Nov. 2

Gray County voters in common with voters over the state will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 2, to adopt or reject ten proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution

County Clerk Charlie Thut said today there will be no other issues or election of any candidates on the ballot. Voters simply will be asked to

scratch or mark out the FOR or AGAINST sections of each of the ten proposed amendments. Directions on the ballot read like this: "scratch or mark out one statement so that the one remaining shall indicate the

way you wish to vote. The ten proposed constitutional amendments to be presented to Texas voters follow:

Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 17 thereof, providing a method of payment for the acquiring, constructing and equipping buildings and other permanent improvements at certain state institutions of higher learning.

Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000.00; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940 and March 31, 1955; such funds to

be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law. No. 3

Constitution a l Amendment providing for assistance to andor medical care for the: (1) needy aged; (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind; and (4) needy children and the caretakers of such children; authorizing the Legislature to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and-or medical care on behalf of such needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and

individuals attain or retain capability for independence or selfcare, and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes, and to make appropriations out of State funds for the purpose of providing assistance to and - or medical care and rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds on behalf of such needy persons; providing that the amounts expended out of State funds to and-or on behalf of individuals shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of Federal funds; providing that the total amount of such assistance payments and - or medical assistance payments out of

State funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and - or medical care for or on behalf of needy per-

sons; and providing further that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of State funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled. Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000). Providing that nothing in the Amendment shall be construed to amend, modify, or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of Constitution. No. 4

Constitution a l Amendments providing a four - year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General. Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution. No. 5

Constitution a l Amendment amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 48b relating to the Teacher Retirement Fund and the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investment of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to (See AMENDMENTS, Page 3)

The books showed \$95 if an insurance representative examined them, but \$50 for legitimate accounting and tax purposes.

Several garages in an eastern city had a sure-fire method of increasing profits, according to the NAII. They used wreckers, sledge hammers and other tools to add further damage to cars involved in accidents and thus run up the bill. Another trick was to pick up a car similar to the one to be repaired, but which had been more seriously amaged. When the adjuster visited the garage, he was shown the more severely battered vehicle, and unwittingly okayed a





Having just developed my first cold of the season, 1 dropped by to see what was new in the field. It was there that I made the acquaintance of Edward Butler, a Point Pleasant, N.J., druggist, who recently won a pharmaceutical contest sponsored by a maker of cold tablets.

I'm not sure what the contest was about, but I doubt that it involved selling cold tablets. Butler, I discovered, can make a cold sufferer feel better without medication.

Favorite Remedy "When I started working for a pharmacist about 50 years ago," he said, "the favorite cold remedy was chamomile We still get some flower tea.

"Another popular treatment was a mixture of flaxseed, wild cherries and onions. We still sell ground flaxseed but now they use it for leaking radia-

'Gum camphor and asafetida also were supposed to be good for colds. Now fishermen put it in bags and drag it behind their boats. It makes an oil slick on

"We used to sell a lot o goose grease, too. And parents sometimes gave their children a lump of sugar soaked in kerosene, but we never sold that."

I put my hardkerchief back in my pocket and I haven't used it since. Just the thought of goose grease is enough to stop my shiffles.







By RICK DU BROW HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - The first national television ratings of the season, which an overanxious industry has convinced itself are all-important, were issued Monday, listing the following as the top 10 shows: .

"Bonanza." "Bewitched." "Gomer Pyle." The Dick Van Dyke series. "Hogan's Heroes," a new situation comedy set in German prisoner-of-war camp in World War II: "The Lucy Show." The Andy Griffith series and "Green Acres" (tie), the latter a new situation comedy with Eddie Albert and Eva Gabor as a city couple who move to the country. "A man Called Shenandoah," a new Robert Horton western. And "F Troop," a new western spoof with Forrest Tucker heading a fouled-up cavalry troop.

Normally, the networks do not consider the twice-monthly national ratings reports definitive until at least the third or fourth one is isued. But this season, though many observers feel the networks are displaying a Billie Burke kind of giddiness, video executives believe that the early premieres and daily spot ratings combine with Monday's national statistics to produce a certain sort of numerical credibility.

It is interesting to note that if such fast cancellation setups were made in the past years, "Bonanza" and the Van Dyke series might not be around, for both were slow starters. 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
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
