Viet Cong Executes U.S. Prisoners

UN Truce Teams Patrol Frontier as Ceasefire Deteriorates

Both Countries Report New Fighting Sunday

NEW DELHI (UPI) — United Nations truce teams today patrolled the frontier between India and Pakistan in an attempt to enforce what was officially described as a deteriorating ceasefire.

Both sides reported sharp fighting Sunday and each blamed the other for violating the agreement to stop shooting as the first step toward settling the long dispute over Kashmir. Early reports today said skirmishing had died down, but both nations made it clear they were prepared to strike again if attacked. And neither showed any signs of withdrawing from territory occupied during the conflict which was supposed to have ended last Thursday.

Pakistan Minister, Rusk Meet

NEW YORK (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk conferred today with Pakistan Foreign Minister Z.A. Bhutto on the Kashmir conflict.

Their meeting came against a background of sporadic fighting between India and Pakistan in the Lahore area which imperiled the shaky truce arranged only last week by the United Nations.

Bhutto was understood to be seeking U.S. moral and material support for his country in its argument with India over the future of Kashmir. Rusk had indicated, however, that he would reaffirm U.S. neutrality and support for any solution decided upon by the U.N.

Bhutto was accompanied on his call at the U.S. delegation headquarters across the street from the U.N. by Pakistan ambassador to the U.N. Amjad Ali and Pakistan's ambassador to Washington, Aziz Ahmed.

The U.S. position, as outlined by Rusk to his associates, is that there must be a major reexamination of the whole situation in the wake of the Kashmir war, and some assurance that the precarious truce will hold, before the United States can even consider resuming military shipments or making new economic commitments.

The United States is backing neither side in the political argument over who should have Kashmir.

It will endorse any U.N. settlement acceptable to India and Pakistan.

There were new reports of bloodshed in Kashmir itself. The clandestine voice of Kashmir Radio reported that so-called Kashmiri "freedom fighters" killed 200 Indian soldiers Sunday and blew up several bridges in the disputed state.

Indian Foreign Minister Swaran Singh will leave Tuesday for the U.N. General Assembly in New York via Moscow, it was announced today. Singh will hold talks with Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin on his "good offices" offer in the Indian-Pakistani dispute.

Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri has accepted Kosygin's invitation for a summit meeting on Soviet soil with Pakistani President Mohammad Ayub Khan. Ayub accepted "in principle" but withheld a final decision pending U.N. efforts to re-

U.S.S.R. Powerful Group In Conclave

MOSCOW (UPI) — The powerful Central Committee of the Communist party today opened a secret meeting which may bring sweeping reforms in Soviet industrial policies.

The Soviet news agency Tass reported that Premier Alexei Kosygin delivered a report to the 330-member committee on "improving the management of industry, perfecting planning and strengthening economic incentives of industrial production."

The agency also said Communist party chief Leonid Brezhnev would deliver a report on the question of convocation of the 23rd congress of the Soviet Communist party.

The meeting got underway at committee headquarters in downtown Moscow. As in the past, the Soviets made no prior announcement of the meeting would be held.

Western newsmen outside the dreary, gray headquarters building knew the meeting had convened because of the procession of limousines which drew

Reprisal Action Called Murder by US Official

SAIGON (UPI) — The Communist Viet Cong announced today they had executed two American prisoners of war. A U. S. Embassy spokesman denounced the action as "murder" and said Communist North Viet Nam would be held responsible for the "clear violation of every civilized principle."

The clandestine Viet Cong "liberation radio" broadcast identified the Americans as Capt. Albert Rusk Joseph and Sgt. Kenneth Moarabeth. A later Communist North Viet Nam news agency dispatch identified them as Capt. Humbert R. Versace and Sgt. Kenneth M. Koraback.

The Reds were known to be holding Capt. Humbert R. Versace of Baltimore, Md., and Sgt. Kenneth Koraback of Fayetteville, N.C.

Reprisal Execution... The Viet Cong broadcast said the American soldiers were executed at 10 a.m. Sunday "by order of the South Viet Nam Liberation (Viet Cong) armed forces command."

Roraback, an Army special forces non-com, was captured almost two years ago. His wife, Veronica, was last listed as living in Chester, W. Va.

The executions apparently were in reprisal for the death sentence carried out last week in Da Nang of three Viet Cong agents. The broadcast mentioned the three today as "patriots."

Prime Minister Nguyen Cao Ky indicated tonight the South Vietnamese might halt public executions of Viet Cong agents in light of the reprisal killings of war prisoners.

In other developments: — A 500-man Communist force launched an attack on

Dispatch Fleet Units To Aden

ADEN (UPI) — British authorities today lifted a dusk to dawn curfew on two oil refinery towns outside this tense Arabian port city following demonstrations by school children shouting anti-British slogans.

But the 6 p.m. to 5 a.m. curfew remained elsewhere, including Aden city, scene of grenade, bombing and shooting incidents which brought about a suspension on Saturday of the state constitution by Queen Elizabeth.

(In London, it was announced the British aircraft carrier HMS Eagle, the frigate Lowestoft and two fleet auxiliaries are on the way to Aden. A spokesman said the navy ships will be at the disposal of Lt. Gen. Sir Charles Harrington, commander-in-chief of the Middle East station.)

Schoolboys and girls at Cratertown marched out of their classes this morning and paraded through the streets screaming anti-British slogans, demanding the lifting of the curfew and the end of security measures.

Police managed to keep the children under control, herding them into a schoolyard and releasing them in small batches.

All was reported quiet in Aden port and elsewhere throughout the south Arabian state.

But the atmosphere was tense.

On Saturday, Turnbull dismissed Chief Minister Abdul Kawi Mackwawee and his cabinet and assumed direct control of Aden, one of the states in the South Arabian Federation.

Britain has promised the South Arabian states independence by 1968, but nationalist groups, backed by terrorists and with the support of the United Arab Republic, are demanding immediate freedom.

The 'It' Girl Silent Screen Star Clara Bow Dies at 60

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Clara Bow, the sensuous "It Girl" of the silent screen, died Sunday night while watching a late television movie. She was 60.

The red-haired star of the Flapper era zoomed to success in the 1920s as the embodiment of sex. But in the decade that followed, her light of popularity flickered and the torch was carried on by succeeding screen beauties.

Among them were platinum-haired Jean Harlow, "oomph girl" Ann Sheridan, Marie "the body" McDonald, and blonde glamour queen Marilyn Monroe.

Miss Bow had been in failing health for several years and until recently was under treatment for extreme insomnia at a rest home where she maintained an apartment and was free to come and go. Friends said she kept a radio under her pillow at night for the soothing effect of music.

Weather Cuts Down Traffic Toll

By United Press International Generally rainy weather kept many Texans off the roads this first fall weekend, and helped lessen the usual high number of traffic deaths on the streets and highways of the state. But traffic still claimed the biggest share of violent deaths.

Weather Cuts Down Traffic Toll

A United Press International survey for the period running from 6 p.m. Friday until midnight Sunday showed 19 violent deaths — 10 of them in traffic. Shootings and knifings accounted for four lives, two men burned to death and miscellaneous causes accounted for three lives.

The worst accident reported was a one-car crash Sunday near San Antonio that killed a young Dallas mother and her three-year-old daughter. Killed were Josephina Pena, 24 and her daughter, Monica.

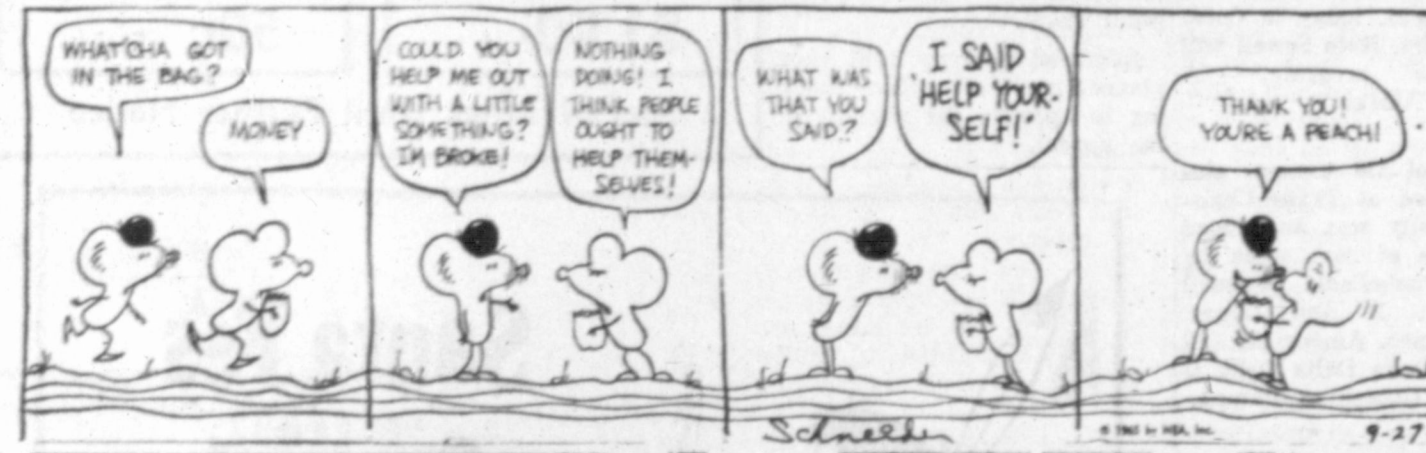

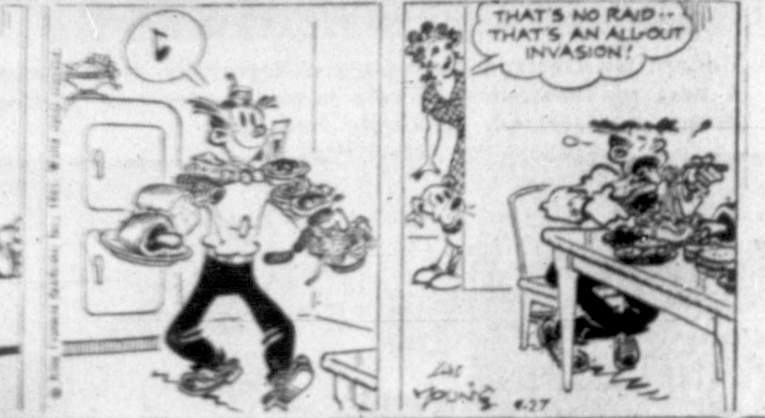
