NATION GOES TO POLLS

GOP Tries Comeback From '64 LBJ Landslide

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Grand Old Party, nearly buried by the Johnson landslide a year ago, gets its first chance to show how far it has traveled along the comeback road at Tuesday's off-year state and city elections.

The most significant contests occur in the East, where Republican hopefuls have been fighting an uphill battle to wrest from the Democrats the presidential prize of the White House.

Football Hero Goes On Trial for Slayings

LINCOLN, Neb. (UPI) — With his life at stake, Wayne Earl Pope goes on trial today for the \$1,500 bank robbery in which three persons were slain and a fourth wounded.

The government contends the former college football hero should be hanged on a gallows because he called the bloody bank robbery in modern times. The defense says Pope's mental condition at the time makes him blameless.

UF Drive Off To Good Start

Some \$11,311.50 was the Pampa Lefors United Fund total at close of the first full week of solicitation by all three divisions of the 1965-66 campaign.

Communists On Trial Again For Not Registering

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The U.S. Communist Party went on trial today for the second time in three years on a charge of failing to register with the government as an agent of the Kremlin.

Gus Hall, general secretary of the party, was on hand for the trial at federal district court. He told newsmen he wanted to "see how it goes" because he has been charged separately as an individual for failure to register.

"The fundamental issue at stake is the right of Americans to join a party not branded with either the LBJ or GOP branding iron," Hall said. "The issue of whether public and open dissent will be permitted."

A conviction from the first trial three years ago was reversed by an appeals court which held that the government had failed to prove a willing, volunteer was available to register the party.

Wiretapping Is Told by Former Secret Agent

NEW YORK (UPI) — A former Army intelligence agent said Sunday night his agency eavesdropped on the private conversations of many prominent people who came through Chicago during 1943, including Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt and scientists working on the atom bomb project.

The agent, identified as Willis Adams, disclosed during a television news special on wiretapping ("The Big Ear"—NBC) that Army intelligence crews "did a tremendous amount of wiretapping" during "the latter part of 1943."

SWBT Communication Expert To Address Pampa Rotarians

Using punch cards, handwriting machines, electrocardiograms and associated electronics equipment, Glenn Scott, Southwestern Bell public information supervisor, will show how the "information explosion" is being harnessed by modern communications in a demonstration before the Rotary Club here Wednesday.

Titled "Information on the Move," Scott's program will describe the growing volume of man's total knowledge, and methods used to store, select and communicate it effectively.

Freedom Group Purchases Five More Newspapers

R. C. Hoiles, president of Freedom Newspaper, Inc., today announced the purchase of the Turlock, California, Daily Journal from Stanley T. Wilson and Lowell E. Jessen. The purchase also included four California weekly papers which The Journal owns. They are: Ceres Courier, Hughson Chronicle, Modesto Journal and the Empire News.

Lowell E. Jessen, a longtime California newspaperman, will remain as publisher of The Journal and the four weekly newspapers. There are no plans to change operation of the newspapers purchased.

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Congress Set To Begin Third Week Of Klan Probe

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Violence and terror attributed to the Ku Klux Klan were expected to come under increasing scrutiny this week from congressional investigators.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities planned to kick off its third week of public hearings into the Klan's "invisible empire" with testimony from Georgia members of the United Klans of America, Inc., the nation's biggest.

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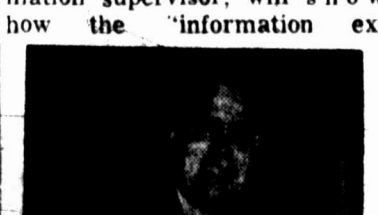

Collecting Takes a 'Goulish' Turn

NEW YORK (NEA) — This decade may well be known as the era when collecting went haywire.

The fuzzy-checked youth, it seems, has put away his butterfly net (if he ever had one), let his hair down (to the shoulders) and turned to "monsters." He is not alone.

What manufacturers thought was a fad demand for the off-beat now appears settled into long-range salesable. According to Robert Sklar, executive of a doll company (Uneda) founded by his family in 1917, youngsters and adults are buying anything "away from the norm; anything that's crazy or kooky."

Folks now collect monster-type dolls inspired by television shows such as The Munsters and The Addams Family. The current rage to collect weirdos and uglies doesn't stop with dolls. So-called spoof items appear in wildly divergent forms from greeting cards to bubble bath containers.

Sklar says he can't explain the public's desire for weirdos, including his own product, the Wishnik, a troll-like item in vinyl with sheepskin fur hair.

"When we introduced the item in 1963 buyers said it would be dead in 90 days," he revealed. "Now it is a staple. The company that produces clothes and accessories for these doll items probably makes \$1 million a year on these alone."

He points out the collecting phenomenon led the firm to put out the creatures with 10 different hair colors. These items are especially strong among teenagers, but Sklar says they are beginning to replace the rabbit's foot, a good luck charm.

"We got a report on a woman at Pimlico track," he said. "She clutched her \$84,000 winnings in one hand and a Wishnik in the other. She claims it was responsible." To this he added, "One of our salesmen had one 'Wishnik' in his car when the transmission fell out."

The endearment of obsession for grotesque toys touches a large group, hence the greeting cards, ash trays and adult-oriented collections of bottled figures depicting anxiety, claustrophobia, gluttony, greed, extroversion and vanity.

The art world is not without its invasion of the monstrous, with Pop art the catalyst. Dr. Benjamin Lerner of New York, a clinical psychologist, says the public's interest in the grotesque represents a release of "some primitive emo-

"The adult interest in monster shows is an unconscious throwback to one's earlier fears which were expressed then (as a child) through nightmares and aggressive behavior."

Cartoonist Charles Addams, whose specialty is ghouls and assorted uglies, agrees with the doctor about letting out aggressions through monster toys, games or shows. He feels that people see something of themselves in such characters. He doesn't feel interest in them "is just a passing fancy. These monsters will always be around in some form or other."

The Doctor Says

Q — How does a doctor diagnose cirrhosis of the liver? What are the symptoms? Is there a cure?

A — The diagnosis is based on a history of chronic malnutrition, alcoholism or hepatitis; feeling the liver and finding it of a harder than normal consistency; and a series of laboratory tests which show loss of normal liver function in the early stages the victim has a loss of appetite and easy fatigability. Later there is a loss of weight, a collection of fluid in the abdomen, jaundice and bleeding from the stomach or esophagus.

This is a serious disease but skillful treatment in the early stages may result in a cure. Every effort must be made to get the victim to put on weight. Vitamin supplements may be needed. Alcohol must be completely renounced. A salt-poor diet and water pills (diuretics) help to relieve the fluid accumulation in the tissues.

Q — My son, 18, had an operation in January to remove a pterygium from both eyes. Now they are growing back again. Is there any way to prevent such a recurrence?

A — A pterygium is a membrane that grows out, usually from the inner corner of the eye, onto the cornea. Surgical removal is the only treatment. The removal must be complete followed by scraping or cautery of the involved area to prevent recurrence but even this is not a guarantee.

Q — What is succinate and what is it given for?

A — A succinate is a salt of succinic acid. Many succinates are used in medicine — decapryl succinate, diethyl sodium sulfosuccinate, hydrocortisone sodium succinate, hydroxydione sodium succinate to name but a few. Each of these has its own special use.
