MONTHS OF SECRET WORK

Investigators Believe Klan Expose Ready

WASHINGTON (UPI) — After six months of top secret work, House investigators are confidently they have the facts to expose the Ku Klux Klan as "possibly the greatest ally of communism in the United States."

The House Committee on Un-American Activities is scheduled to begin public hearings on the so-called "invisible empire" Tuesday. It has held closed hearings since late July.

Rep. John Ashbrook of Ohio, a Conservative Republican on the committee, said the hearings would show that Klan violence followed a definite pattern and was not the result of isolated instances. "It would take a pretty warped mind to admire the Klan after the record has been made public," he said.

Ashbrook attended many of the committee's secret hearings. He said he found the Klan "possibly the greatest ally of communism in the United States. . . . That is because the Klan spreads hatred, suspicion, lies and racism — all of which make up the soil on which communism thrives."

He denied the Klan was the patriotic society it claims to be. "Its so-called 'attacks' on communism are nothing more than a smoke screen for demagogues, and so tend to discredit those who are truly anti-Communist," he said.

It was expected that it would take the committee at least 13 weeks to achieve its goal of spotlighting the Klan's tactics, objectives, leaders and members.

Text of Highway Study Group Recommendation

EDITOR'S NOTE — The Pampa News publishes here with the full report of the Highway Improvement Advisory committee, named by Mayor Jim Nation to study Pampa's highway needs and file recommendations with the city commission. Complete text of the report filed today follows:

Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Commission City of Pampa, Texas: Gentlemen: As requested by your appointment of this committee, members of the Highway Study Committee take pleasure in presenting this report. Included in this report is an engineering report prepared by Merriman & Barber, which we shall refer to as the engineer's report, and also a copy of the right-of-way map showing the present right-of-way and the necessary right-of-way to construct the proposed facilities. As our specific recommendations will show later in this report, the Highway Committee has directed its efforts on U.S. Highway 60 and State Highways 152 and 273 which, in our opinion, are the most critical areas.

However, before going into the recommendations, there are several problems to be discussed which clarify the recommendations. First, a highway improvement program must be the coordinated efforts between the City and the State Highway Department. Secondly, a street must already be designated as a State Highway or the proposed improvements must be acceptable to the State Highway Department and a need for the facility must be justified before the State Highway Department will participate in the construction of a new highway network. The minimum requirements for a particular highway improvement program must be approved by the State Highway Department. These requirements establish the obligation of the City in its participation in the project.

Before construction may begin on such a project the financing must be made available. It is the City's obligation to furnish and have available right-of-way for the proposed improvements project. Secondly, the City must have its share of the funds available to pay the cost of curb and gutter, drainage and right-of-way. At this stage the City may request the Highway Department to participate in the construction of an improved facility. However, the State Highway Department, through the Texas Highway Commission, must schedule the work and wait for the appropriation of State funds for their share of the project. This procedure makes it difficult to establish a priority for either of the projects and still be assured that the improvements will be

done as quickly as possible. Therefore, each of the projects should be done as quickly as the City is in a position to meet its obligations on any one of the particular proposed improvements, and when the State Highway Department has money available for their share of the construction costs.

It is quite probable that the work proposed in this report can not be finished in a short term project. It will perhaps take five years to complete all three projects, but they should all be planned at the same time in order that a continuous program may be developed and that each stage of the project will be ready immediately after the completion of the preceding improvements.

For the sake of continuity, we shall discuss in this report each of the highway systems in the order in which they appear in Table 10 of the engineer's report.

State Highway 152, which is Alcock Street from Hobart west to the City Limit line, is perhaps one of the most critical traffic areas in the City's highway system. You will note on Table 10 the total cost for improving this system, and bringing it to the minimum standards as required by the State Highway Department, is \$230,000.00. This includes an estimate of \$124,000.00 right-of-way. This program would include the acquisition of right-of-way so that the City would own 100 feet of right-of-way with a paved section of 84 feet.

U.S. Highway 60 is also designed in a 100 foot right-of-way with an 84 foot paved section. Also, Table 10 divides this highway improvement program into East and West projects. Scheme B, which is the engineer's drawing of this area, shows the two projects to be connected together. The engineers reviewed the cost of improvements for U.S. Highway 60, with special consideration being given to the drainage problems of this area. The engineers explored the difference in the cost in draining the west part of Highway 60 down South Cuyler Street, and leaving U.S. 60 East to be drained from Cuyler east to the lake and recreation area. However, the difference in the cost of the two projects is negligible and should not be a deciding factor in which method should be used. You will note on Table 10 that the proposed improvements for U.S. Highway 60, East and West total \$545,100.00, including the right-of-way cost.

State Highway 273 is designed for an 80 foot right-of-way with a 64 foot paved width. It should be pointed out here that the State Highway Department does not consider South Barnes, from the McCullough cut off north through Cuyler and to Highway 60, as a State Highway. However, they have indicated that with the improvements as they are proposed in the engineer's report, this would be approved as a part of the highway network. You will note on Table 10 that the cost for State Highway 273 is estimated at \$369,200.00, including right-of-way cost. The total cost for all three proposed highway improvements as shown on Table 10, is \$1,144,300.00, including all right-of-way cost.

Table 8 introduces some special problems which we feel should be called to the attention of the City Commission. Improvements are suggested at the lake, which includes placement of rip-rap below the old spillway, at a cost of \$18,250.00 and the construction of a glory-hole spillway at a cost of \$7,750.00. The Highway Improvements Committee feels that this is not a part of the highway improvements program and should be referred to the Parks and Recreation Committee for its study and recommendation. Also, Table 8 suggests channel excavation at a cost of \$27,300.00 which will take care of the drainage system for South Cuyler. Although this improvement will be necessary, we feel that the City might be able to do some of this work with force account labor between the approval of the highway improvements project and the time the work is finished. Therefore, the City should take a careful look at this expenditure.

Having reviewed the engineer's report thoroughly and evaluating the cost estimates as they are presented, this committee is confident that the City will have to provide a means of financing these programs other than annual budget funds. As a conclusion to this report, the Highway Committee makes the following recommendations:

1. We feel all three projects are necessary improvements for the City of Pampa and a bond election should be submitted to the voters of Pampa to support the construction of these projects.

2. The highway projects should be separated into three separate issues and allow the citizens to vote on any or all issues that they feel are necessary for this community.

3. The committee feels that it is quite difficult to properly evaluate the cost of right-of-way without actually negotiating the cost with the property owners. Therefore, we recommend that the City Commission meet with the various property owners prior to the bond election. Many of the property owners will have their property improved more than the value of the excess right-of-way and such instances should be pointed out to the property owner. Such a meeting will give the Commission a more adequate estimate of the right-of-way cost.

4. The improvements for State Highway 273 include channel improvements, and it is recommended by this committee that the property owners of this channel be contacted and requested to dedicate the low lying, flooding area to the City as a park area and that the City, through its Park and Recreation Committee, consider the development of a park. We feel this will enhance the property abutting this drainage area and, at the same time, provide a recreational area for the neighborhood.

We sincerely hope this report meets with your approval and unless we are notified to the contrary, we shall consider this committee dissolved.

Officer Kills Violator

SAN ANGELO, Tex. (UPI)—A rookie policeman stopped a San Angelo man for a traffic violation Monday night, then shot him to death when he reached into a hip pocket, apparently for a knife.

Noe Rodriguez, 30, was dead at the scene. Policeman Joe Arzate said Rodriguez ran a traffic light and finally pulled to the curb after an eight-block chase. When he did, Rodriguez got out of the car and started toward him with his hand in a rear pocket, Arzate said.

"I said to him, 'Noe, I'll shoot you if you don't halt.' He didn't stop and I had to shoot him," Arzate said. Rodriguez died from a single bullet in his chest.

As attendants were picking up his body, a knife fell from his hip pocket.

It was from the teen-age boys whose football struck Lady Churchill.

Needs Stamina

Take it from Randy Matson the Aggies could be something else, with or without him and the World's Champion Putter of The Shot isn't taking a thing for granted. "I don't know if I can even make the team," the 6'6 1/2 former Harvester stated, adding, "My legs are not in basketball shape and I don't have the stamina it takes for basketball. I haven't done much running in the last couple of years."

Matson isn't conceding himself a thing saying, "I know I'm going to have to work hard to make the traveling squad. We have three or four real good boys who can play the low post, and they've been playing the last couple of years."

Randy was referring to the fact that Aggie coach Shelby Metcalf had said last week he planned on using the now 244-pound sophomore as a low post and 6'9 John Beasley as high post.

"We've been practicing for four days now and it's been tough," Matson went on, "I've really been tired, but I think I'm beginning to come around and get in shape."

Matson said he'd taken off 10 pounds in two days and planned to keep his weight around the 244-245 mark to play basketball.

What prompted this Super-man type shot-putter to decide to try the cage ranks this season?

Olympics Out of the Way

"I had been thinking about it ever since coming up here and after two straight years of nothing but track decided I wanted a change," Matson said, adding, "Also coach Metcalf talked to me a couple of times, he didn't pressure me or anything like that, but he's a wonderful person and coach and I like the way he coaches."

"The reason I didn't go out before was that I wanted to go to the Olympics and knew I'd have to train and train."

"How much of the track season will he miss because of basketball?"

"Not much really," he allowed, "Just the indoor season and the Border Olympics and a couple of dual meets."

Does he think that going for basketball will hurt his shotputting abilities?

Matson answered, "Yes, I am sure it will hurt me a little bit, for one thing I'll be getting a late start and won't be in shape like I usually am. I really don't expect to do too well in track this season."

Does he think fans will be yelling for a basket every time he shoots like they yell for a 70 foot heave every time he throws the shot?

"Oh, I really don't think so, I don't think there will be too much pressure on me, but I guess I'll just have to wait and see, Matson said.

What does he think will give him the most trouble in starting his basketball career?

"Mainly just getting back in shape. I hope I can so I won't get hurt. I'm afraid I might injure a leg or something if I can't get back in good enough shape," the sophomore stated.

To review a bit Matson is Pampa's second ranking all-time scorer in Harvester history and a better rebounder has never been on a Pampa basketball team.

His sophomore year Randy averaged 11.2 points a game, 17.2 his junior year and 12.5 for 16 games his senior year. His rebounding average nearly doubles his scoring average for all three years.

Basketball is just starting, but when the track season gets underway you can look for the former Harvester great to be out among 'em tossing the iron ball better than anybody else and going at it full time this season with the discus, also.

Following his usual practice of rewarding the Ponies when they win, Fry treated the SMU squad to milkshakes

Monday. He sent the Mustangs through a light one-hour loosening-up drill.

Baylor, idle last week, worked out in the rain Monday and coach John Bridgers had two men drilling at quarterback in an effort to perk up the Bear offense. Mike Marshall and Kenny Stockdale will alternate at calling signals against Texas A&M Saturday, Bridgers said.

Bears Hurt
Bridgers said the Bears still were a badly crippled team, despite the return of previously injured ends Ramsey Muniz and Tommy Smith.

Definitely out for the Aggie tilt are Willie Walker, Terry Southall, Paul Becton and Charles Wilson.

It rained at College Station, also, forcing the Texas Aggies indoors. Coach Gene Stallings said several of his players were also in poor condition, because of injuries in the 17-9 loss to Texas Christian.

Texas Christian, the only other team besides Arkansas straying from league warfare this week, reviewed films of its journey to Clemson, leader of the Atlantic Coast Conference. Horned Frog coach Abe Martin praised the running of halfback Steve Landon and also lauded the play last week of his four interior linemen.

TRAGEDY STRIKES AGAIN

Two Vol Coaches Die in Accident

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Tragedy struck the University of Tennessee Athletic Department Monday for the second time in two years when Bill Majors and Bob Jones, members of the football coaching staff, were killed at a railroad crossing.

Charlie Rash, a third member of the coaching staff, remained unconscious and in critical condition early today in a local hospital after undergoing six and one-half hours surgery to remove a blood clot from his brain.

Hospital officials said his condition was "very bad. There is no way we can predict the outcome."

The accident happened shortly after Rash, who owned and was driving the car, stopped to pick up Majors. Friends said the three men normally rode to work together.

They were en route to their usual early Monday work session to hear scouting reports on this week's opponent and review film of Saturday's Tennessee-Alabama game.

There was some question as to whether this Saturday's scheduled game with Houston would be played. Bob Woodruff, athletic director, said a decision would be made later.

"This tragedy is unparalleled by anything I've ever experienced," Woodruff said. "On this longest day of my memory, I'm at a loss to express properly my feeling of grief and shock."

Head Coach Doug Dickey could only say "oh no, it can't be true" when informed of the tragedy.

Majors was a member of a famous Tennessee football family. He was varsity tailback for the old single-wing Vols in 1958-60. He had been a coach at UT since 1962. He was the father of two sons.

His father, Shirley Majors, is now head football coach at the University of the South at Sevensville, Jones, Tenn., and the father of three children, coached for a time at the Air Force Academy and Baylor before coming to Tennessee this spring to replace Bill Anderson as end and flanker coach.

Rash, 28, is the father of two sons. He played football at the University of Missouri and was named to the all-Big 8 team in 1957 and 1958.

Three Oiler Players Fined \$375

HOUSTON (UPI)—Houston Oilers coach Bones Taylor has cracked down on discipline on his American Football League club, meting out three fines totaling \$375 for actions occurring in last Sunday's 28-17 loss to Denver.

Jim Norton was fined \$250 for deciding to run on a punt play that led to a Denver touchdown; linebacker Johnny Baker was fined \$100 for refusing to

leave the field when a substitute was sent in for him, and rookie fullback Bob Jackson was fined \$25 for failing to go on the field with the punting unit.

"When we give orders, we expect them (players) to follow them," Taylor said. "These three players were not solely to blame for our loss, but these were contributing factors."

Anderson Leads SWC In Just About Everything

DALLAS (UPI) — Texas Tech's Donny Anderson, the Southwest Conference's most versatile offensive player, has taken over the league's pass receiving, scoring and kickoff return leadership while still ranking high in rushing and punting.

Anderson caught seven passes for 91 yards, set up Tech's winning touchdown in the 17-14 victory over Oklahoma State and scored one himself with a 100 yard kickoff return to vie with Arkansas' Bobby Crockett as the week's hero.

Anderson now has scored 26 points, caught 31 passes for 390 yards and returned 13 kickoffs 397 yards — all tops for the conference. He ranks sixth in rushing with 244 yards and fifth in punting with a 37.4-yard average.

Tech's Tom Wilson neared the 1,000-yard mark as he stayed far ahead of the field in passing and total offense. Wilson has hit 77 of 129 passes for 997 yards and nine touchdowns. Texas A&M's Harry Ledbetter is second with 45 completions for 530 yards.

Cornutt Named Top Harvester

Doc Cornutt, 205-pound Harvester senior, has been selected as the Harvester-of-the-Week by Pampa High School coaches.

Doc, 6'2", is one of the players coach Eural Ramsey is counting on to help build the Harvesters next season.

The defensive standout has started several games for the Harvesters, going both ways, and has been a stickout offensively also.

Cornutt is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Cornutt, 1330 Duncan.

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Soviet Tells Own Soldiers Red China Is Enemy

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (NEA) — Russian soldiers are now warned by the Kremlin that their "main enemy" is Red China and not just the West. According to diplomats from Communist East Europe, a revised edition of the Red Army's standard propaganda book entitled "Know Your Enemy" is currently being distributed to Soviet garrisons stationed on Russia's 4,000-mile-long frontier with Red China.

The former edition of the book contained the statement that Western imperialists and American capitalists were the "only enemies" against whom the Russian soldier must be ready to fight in order to defend Russia and world communism. But in the revised edition, the enemies of the "Fatherland" to be fought include the new category of "non-friendly Communists."

Since the demise of former Premier Nikita Khrushchev [the Kremlin's new rulers have

carefully avoided any direct reference to Mao Tsetung or Red China. Thus, the new edition of "Know Your Enemy" does not state that "nonfriendly Communists" means Red China.

But it's hardly a coincidence — in the view of the East European diplomats — that several million copies of the book were first distributed among Russian troops on the Soviet-Chinese border.

LADY BIRD
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson took time out from her husband's hospital bedside Monday to rehearse for an hour-long television show to be broadcast on Thanksgiving, Nov. 25.

The program, titled "A Visit to Washington with Mrs. Johnson on Behalf of a More Beautiful America," is being produced by John Secondari and his wife Helen Rogers for the American Broadcasting Co. (ABC).

Nor is it a coincidence that Moscow's latest propaganda urges the Red Army to stand ready to fight for the "Fatherland" and not for the victory of world communism.

A similar appeal was made by Stalin after Hitler attacked Russia in 1941. Aware that the ordinary Russian would fight for "Holy Mother Russia" but not for the Marxist-Leninist creed, Stalin declared that the conflict with Nazi Germany

was, in effect, a "great patriotic war." He even invoked the aid of the persecuted Eastern Orthodox Church. History is clearly repeating itself in Russia. There is little doubt that it is fear of Red China that forced Moscow to join the United States in seeking a peaceful solution to the

GERMANS ESCAPE
MUNICH, Germany (UPI) — Six East Germans fled across Communist barbed-wire barriers to Bavaria in West Germany during the weekend, the Bavarian Interior Ministry reported Monday.

WAR CRIMES
BOCHUM, Germany (UPI) — Sixteen former Nazi Gestapo men went on trial Monday, charged with the wartime deaths of more than 17,200 Poles. The group is accused of taking part in mass executions of Jews in the Krakow Ghetto and shipping thousands more to the gas chambers.

conflict between India and Pakistan over Kashmir. Communist party chief Leonid Brezhnev said as much when he expressed the Soviet government's "anxiety" over the fact that it took place in "a region immediately adjacent to the frontiers of the Soviet Union."

Brezhnev also hinted that Red China is determined, sooner or later, to attack India. The East European diplomats

believe that any action at all by Russia would be in support of India. This could bring Red Russia into a direct armed conflict with Red China. Under the circumstances, there is little Moscow can do except to try to isolate China from the rest of the Communist world and back the United States and the United Nations in their efforts to settle the Kashmir problem.

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
