Draft Pool Eligibles Due for Army Uniforms

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- Most of the eligible young men now in the draft pool will be in uniform by next summer, according to Defense Department and Selective Service plans.

The blueprint, based power requirements for the South Viet Nam war, calls for 35,000 inductions a month, from October

through June. This would absorb 315,000, or a little less than half of the present pool.

Defense manpower experts believe, however, that with draft boards breathing down their necks, many of the eligibles will choose to enlist, perhaps at a rate of two for every three inductions

In addition, only 150,000 of

those in the 1-A pool have been examined and found acceptable. Hence, a loss of a third of the remaining -500,000 through rejections is in sight.

The Defense Department beneves that a steady draft at the rate set by President Johnson, coupled with stepped-up recruiting drives, will add 325,000 men to the strength of the armed riod. This would bring them close to 3 million. There are now 2.660,000 men in uniform.

The Army hopes to increase its strength by 225,000. Additiens totaling 100,000 are expected in the Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force:

Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara is expected to outline these plans next Wednesday when he goes before the Senate military appropriations subcommittee, headed by Sen. John C. Stennis, D-Miss.

According to official sources, McNamara will not need to ask for more funds for the manpower expansion because this can be financed from deficency appropriations.

Officials said the average age of the draft, now 21, is certain to go down. Some changes in policy may still prove necessary, they said, to prevent the available pool from shrinking below a safe operating level.





unknown casue. Heredity appears to play a role. Alcohol and barbiturates may trigger an attack in persons who are susceptible to this disease. The liver of these persons produces an excess of porphyrin, a purle pigment necessary in the formation of hemoglobin.

The disease is manifested by repeated attacks of severe abdominal cramps, constipation and weakness. The victims are overly sensitive to sunlight which may cause severe blistering. The urine, which appears normal at first may turn a burgundy red on exposure to sunlight.

While there is no simple cure victims are benefited by avoiding alcohol and exposure to the sun. If an operation must be performed, it is important to tell both the surgeon and the anesthetist about the condition so they will not give any barbiturates.

Several other drugs have recently been added to the list to be avoided. These include diemone), griseofulvin (a drug to control ringworm), meprobamate and chlordiazepoxide (tranquilizers) and several anticonvulsants.

lowed in school these days. To whom should I protest? A lot of harm has been done already and it will happen again only over my dead body! -Mother Up in Arms

Answer: Simmer down, mother. I doubt that your son has suffered any permanent damage, either physically or emotionally. At this point he is probably enjoying your reaction to the incident.

If you wish to know the policy of your school regarding corporal punishment, call the principal. Unless it's specifically forbidden, you probably have no grounds for complaint. Most school systems take the position that the teacher stands in loco parentis," which gives him the green light for administering any reasonable punishment a parent might use. Since you feel so strongly about rodsparing, however, it might be wise to let the teacher know your sentiments. Teachers do not like to upset parents and generally respect their requests. Surprisingly enough, many parents approve of spankings at school, at feast as a last resort. "Don't hesitate to swat him if he needs it" is a farily common remark. Assault and battery cases against teachers, on the other hand, seem to be on the upswing. Consequently, most teachers are almost overly

Personally, as a parent, I felt as you do and expressed myself as avidly. As a teacher, however, I've changed my tune at least where obstreperous boys are concerned.
