

State to Feel Bite of Reduction in Air Bases

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara's cuts in military bases affected 12 installations in Texas. A UPI survey shows that in some cases the losses were more than offset by increases in personnel coming in from other states.

Other areas reported very little decrease in personnel or loss of payroll.

Both Abilene and Austin will lose two Nike-Hercules sites each, but both will show other increases.

In Abilene, the 516th troop

carrier wing will be built up, and the annual payroll will increase by \$2.6 million.

In Austin, an additional 1,100 persons will be brought to the Bergstrom Air Force Base tactical air command from Waco.

At El Paso, the 95th bomb wing of the Strategic Air Command at Biggs Air Force Base will be inactivated by July 1966.

City officials said El Paso will lose about \$3.5 million a year when the 2,300 military and 300 civilian personnel leave. But this will partially be offset.

set. El Paso will gain the Army's East Coast branch of the Defense Language Institute, the Pentagon said.

A total of 956 military and 319 civilian personnel, including resident students, will be affected. The transfer will be completed by December, 1967. The school will take over part of the present Biggs Air Force Base.

The Army also will move a portion of its aviation materiel laboratories from Fort Eustis, Va., to El Paso. A total of 120 military and 230 civilian per-

sonnel will be affected by that transfer, also to be completed by December, 1967.

A third transfer will send the Air Force Language Training School, now at Lackland AFB, San Antonio, to El Paso. It will be completed by December, 1967, and 544 military and 181 civilian personnel will be affected by the transfer.

In Houston, the 924th and 926th carrier air reserve groups will be inactivated and the Civil Air Patrol headquarters will be relocated. Ellington Air Force Base said 263 military

and 609 civilian jobs would go, but that career Air Force personnel would be aided in finding jobs in the Houston area.

Officers at Ellington said they do not expect the changes to have much effect on Houston's economy.

City officials in Big Spring and Beaumont shared that economic viewpoint.

The 331st fighter, interceptor squadron at Webb Air Force base near Big Spring will be inactivated by October, 1967, and the Navy and Marine Corps reserve training center

in Beaumont will be relocated by June 1970.

Other areas affected by Wednesday's new cutback were:

Bellville—The Naval reserve training facility will be inactivated by June 1966.

Huntsville—The Naval Reserve training facility will be inactivated and the facility declared excess by June 1966.

Port Arthur—Company D, 1st battalion, 23rd Marine Corps Reserve will be relocated to Beaumont by October 1966.

San Antonio—The USAF language training school now located at Lackland Air Force Base will be relocated to Biggs Air Force Base, El Paso.

Wichita Falls—Battery G, 2nd battalion 14th Marine Corps reserve will be relocated and consolidated with battery H, 2nd battalion 12th Marine Corps reserve, Fort Worth, by October 1966.

Waco—the 12th Air Force headquarters will be relocated to Bergstrom Air Force Base at Austin.

Edmondson Reports PESO is Progressing

Jack Edmondson, superintendent of schools, reported to school board members today that organization of the Panhandle Educational Services Organization is progressing satisfactorily.

Pampa schools are in Unit 3 of PESO along with Canadian, Shamrock, Wheeler, Kelton, Alison and Briscoe.

Edmondson said one organization meeting has been held among Unit 3 superintendents and stated that submitted findings of their respective needs for federal school aid.

That report, the Pampa superintendent said, has been

submitted to PESO headquarters at Canyon and will go to Austin for approval on Monday.

PESO is the Panhandle Agency formed to administer federal funds for educationally deprived pupils in the various school districts.

Pampa has been allotted approximately \$100,000 from the federal government.

Edmondson said the local program will have its major interest in remedial reading. The project is expected to swing into action shortly after the first of the year with the beginning of the new semester.

School board members agreed today to take up a summary report of the local schools recommendations made last summer by committee of educators headed by Dr. Emmett Smith of West Texas State University.

In other business today the board voted unanimously to express its pride to Mrs. Elaine Ledbetter, high school science teacher, for being selected Texas Teacher of the Year and one of the finalists in the national competition for Teacher of the Year, sponsored by the National Educational Agency, and (See PESO, Page 3)

Gemini 7 Astronauts Eagerly Await Company; Launch Will Go Early

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI)—Gemini 7 Astronauts Frank Borman and James Lovell streaked past the two-million-mile mark in space today a little warm and uncomfortable but in good shape and eager for a rendezvous Sunday with Gemini 6.

The cabin temperature soared as high as 78 degrees and Borman in his 16-pound space suit was feeling the temperature more than Lovell, who was flying in his longjohns under wear for the third straight day. Nevertheless, Borman resisted a suggestion from the Space Center at Houston that he strip down to his longjohns while Lovell put his suit back on.

"If we have to keep one suit on, I would prefer to leave mine on," Borman said. For safety reasons, Gemini control

has ruled only one man at a time out of the life-supporting orbit around the Earth at 8:34 a.m. CST.

The astronauts had traveled a million miles at 8:57 a.m. CST heading into the fifth day of their 14-day space marathon.

Gemini 7 entered its 73rd orbit around the Earth at 8:34 a.m. CST.

Attorneys Ask Ruby Appeal be Dropped by Court

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Attorneys for Jack Ruby, the former Dallas nightclub owner sentenced to death for the murder of President Kennedy's assassin—Lee Harvey Oswald—asked the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals to drop his appeal to the court.

The motion, filed by four of Ruby's lawyers, said the significant reasons for filing the appeal have been remedied through state action and what the appeal sought was moot.

Dismissal of the appeal would not affect his right to appeal his death sentence to Texas courts.

The motion was filed by Sam Houston Clinton Jr. of Austin, Tex., Sol Dann of Detroit, Elmer Gertz of Chicago and William M. Kunstler of New York. Ruby's fifth attorney is Phil Burleson of Dallas.

The lawyers said Ruby now has the defense staff he wants and his sanity hearing has been removed from Judge Joe B. Brown's jurisdiction.

"There is no reason for continuation of the present federal appeal," the motion said.

Podgorny to Get Job As New Soviet Chief

MOSCOW (UPI)—Anastas I. Mikoyan has retired as president of the Soviet Union because of age and ill health, the Kremlin announced today. He will be succeeded by Communist party leader Nikolai Podgorny.

Mikoyan, 70, became president on July 15, 1964, succeeding Leonid I. Brezhnev who took over full powers as leader of the Communist party. Mikoyan was one of the Bolsheviks who helped bring the party to power.

Podgorny, 62, a Ukrainian, had long been regarded as one of the rising stars of the Soviet hierarchy. On May 5, 1960, he became a full member of the party Presidium which runs the nation.

Mikoyan submitted his resignation during the final moments of a session of the Supreme Soviet, Russia's parliament. It was accepted immediately.

Brezhnev had high praise for Mikoyan who has thus become a Soviet "elder statesman."

Mikoyan long had been considered Russia's No. 2 man behind former Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev. A trouble-shooting diplomat, he was especially active during the Cuba missile crisis.

Shortly before the announcement of Mikoyan's resignation the Soviets disclosed that Deputy Premier Alexander Shelepin had been relieved of his post and also of his job as

head of the party's "watchdog agency."

In spite of the apparent demotion there was speculation Shelepin's star still may be rising since it was announced he now will devote his time to affairs of the Communist party, the real seat of power in the Soviet Union.

Mikoyan, a stoop-shouldered Armenian, told the hushed gallery of 1,500 delegates that because of health and age he could no longer carry on in office.

"It has become more and more difficult to carry on the strenuous tasks," he said. "That is why I appealed to the Central Committee and asked them to relieve me of my position."

"Not everybody knows, he added, "that about three years ago I was operated on and I was seriously ill. It was reflected in my work... this (See MIKOYAN, Page 3)

Britain Asks Russian Appeal For Viet Peace

LONDON (UPI)—Britain formally asked Russia today to join in an appeal to Communist North Viet Nam to enter into negotiations for a settlement of the "present tragic conflict."

The Foreign Office released the text of a draft message asking the Soviet Union, as co-chairman with Britain of the 1954 Geneva Indochina Conference, to approve the message and to circulate it to the members of the Geneva Conference.

At the same time, Britain rejected a proposed Soviet message earlier this week to the members of the Geneva Conference condemning the "aggression of the United States against Viet Nam," the Foreign Office announced.

Power Failure Sends Stock of Candles Soaring

NEW YORK (UPI)—The 30 million persons who were caught off guard in the massive power failure a month ago, will probably fare better in the event of a repeat performance.

Like the famed blizzard of '88, the "night the lights went out" has become the subject of lore and reminiscence. It also is causing an economic boomlet in industries ranging from

orange juice to diesel generators.

Sales are up—fantastically—in candles, flashlights, batteries, transistor radios, generators and just about anything people think they might need to survive another session of life without lights or power.

One New York housewife, for instance, gaily tossed out her old-fashioned, hand-operated

can opener last Christmas when her husband bought an electric can opener. The day after the blackout, she rushed to a hardware store and purchased an old-style opener.

She had plenty of canned food on hand when the lights went out. But she had to make her way—candle in hand—to a neighbor's apartment to borrow an opener.

The transistor radio—up to Nov. 9—was known chiefly as an appendage of teen-agers. Some seemed to have them permanently growing out of one ear.

When kilowatts went every whichway, however, Mom and Dad found the only way to keep posted was to wrench the transistor from Junior, tune out the rock 'n roll music and

switch on the news. Major stations, using emergency generating equipment, were on the air throughout the emergency.

Candles were for Christmas, religious observances and intimate dinners for two. Now, in huge, gleaming apartment houses as in farm houses of old, they're tucked away in

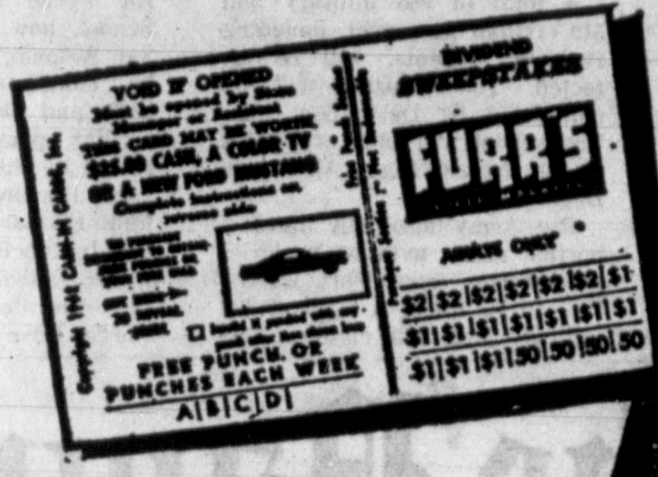

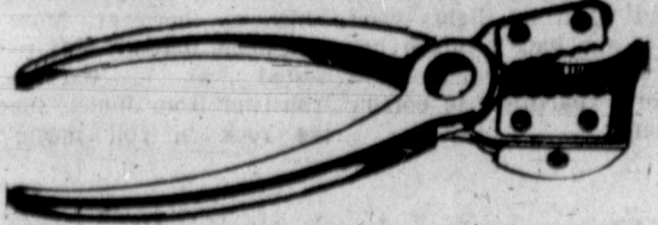

drawers, ready in case the power takes another powder. At the height of the blackout, the tremendous complex of buildings at Bellevue Hospital were without light until police and fire department units rolled up with portable generators and floodlights.

About 500 student nurses scurried through the moonlight night to more than a dozen Roman Catholic churches in the area to round up votive candles. They brought them back by the thousands.

Department stores almost immediately sold out stocks of multi-colored candles, on hand for the approaching Christmas season.

Candlemakers are working long hours now to replenish diminished stocks, and to meet the demand for those who would stockpile.

One New York candlemaker, Anthony Ciesko Jr., president of the Acme Candle Co. said normal sales volume was \$500 to \$1,000 a day. Now, daily production is up to \$2,000 to \$3,000, or approximately 75,000 pounds of wax per week.

Said Ciesko: "Demand has been so great that we can not produce fast enough. A lot of new customers are sending their trucks to pick up as many candles as possible and we're just giving them a portion of what they would like. We're still behind in delivery."

A major New York sporting goods store has sold about 5,000 batteries and 1,500 lanterns and flashlights since the blackout.

A discount store with branches throughout the East Coast, E. J. Korvette, reported it has had tremendous demand

Podgorny then told the Supreme Soviet, "Comrades, I am grateful to you and I shall devote all my strength to justify the confidence you have shown in me."

It was the first major shakeup in the Kremlin hierarchy since Khrushchev was ousted Oct. 15, 1964, and was succeeded by Brezhnev as party chief and Alexei Kosygin as premier.

Mikoyan, long arrayed against Americans in the field of world politics, nevertheless appeared popular with them. He has a sharp sense of humor and a keen mind and his personality clicked whenever he visited the United States.

For many years in the tangle of Soviet politics Mikoyan seemed cannily able to guess which side to support.

He had given all appearances of being one of Khrushchev's closest collaborators, but when Khrushchev fell from power he remained on as president—one of the few old Bolsheviks neither dead nor banished.

His survival through the years was attributed to his many talents and the greatest of these was his ability in running the economic side of the Soviet state.

In 1918, American soldiers attached to the 3rd Army crossed the Rhine River at Coblenz, Germany.

awaited the "go" for a liftoff at 8:50 a.m. CST Sunday, a day ahead of schedule. A mock launch Wednesday was "completely successful."

Borman and Lovell managed to get the temperature in their cramped cabin down slightly. But it remained warm.

Lovell reported that he donned a lightweight "orbital flight suit" over his underwear last night, "but it was just too hot, so I removed it."

Borman said he was feeling discomfort from the oxygen-filled atmosphere. His nose felt dry and flight surgeons recommended using an ointment put aboard for the purpose.

While the miles slipped by at the rate of five every second, the space twins slept quietly through their fifth night in the sky before beginning a busy day that could include an attempt to talk with earth with the aid of a handheld "ray gun."

Gemini 7 began its 70th trip around the world at 3:44 a.m., CST.

Far below, the men who controlled the spectacular show hoped to decide by noon today whether to send the Gemini 6 astronauts Walter Schirra and Thomas Stafford — on Sunday,

or whether to wait until Monday as originally planned.

Once in space, Gemini 6 hopefully will fly to within one to two feet of its sister ship to pull off the world's first "true rendezvous" in space.

But the records would begin falling long before then as Gemini 7, passing the 2,000,000-mile mark at 8:57 a.m., CST today, continued its flawless flight.

First on the list of marks to be surpassed by Gemini 7 was the 119 hours, 6 minutes flown by Soviet cosmonaut Valery Bykovsky in June of 1963. They were to surpass this mark at 12:37 p.m., CST.

By the time they finish their two-week, 206-orbit voyage on Dec. 18, the Borman and Lovell team will have nearly doubled the mark set by Gemini 5 astronauts Gordon Cooper and Pete Conrad when they flew for just short of eight days in August.

The astronauts began their 68th orbit at 12:33 a.m. CST. At Cape Kennedy, ground crews hurried back ahead of schedule in their efforts to get Gemini 6 set for its chase through the heavens. A computer that went awry was reprogrammed and replaced in the space craft.

1 cup cranberry juice cocktail, chilled
1 cup apple juice, chilled
1/4 cup honey
2 cup frozen undiluted limeade.

Beat all ingredients until smooth and well-blended. Chill several hours until icy cold. Garnish with a slice of peeled apple or a slice of lime.

CRANBERRY DUCKLING

(Makes 4 to 6 servings)
2 cups fresh cranberries
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1-3 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 cups seasoned bread stuffing mix
1/4 teaspoon thyme
Dash of pepper
1 cup sliced apples
1 4-to 5-pound duck
2 tablespoons orange juice
Combine cranberries, sugar and water. Bring to a boil; cook until cranberries begin to pop. Strain, reserving cranberry syrup and pulp.
Melt butter and add onion and celery. Sauté until vegetables are tender. Add the cranberry pulp, stuffing mix, salt, thyme, pepper and apple. Toss lightly with fork to blend. Stuff and truss duck. Prick skin to allow fat to drain off. Roast in a slow oven (325 degrees) for about 45 minutes per pound, or until skin is crisp and meat is tender.

This is the season when a sudden urge to make cookies seizes a vast section of our female population. They feel that homemade cookies are a particularly personal way of wishing friends and neighbors, relatives and family a Merry Christmas. The combination of fine cookie recipes and personal involvement in the making does seem to symbolize the true spirit of an old-fashioned Christmas.

FILLED POCKETBOOK COOKIES

(Makes 32 Cookies)
3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
2-3 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
2 large hard-cooked egg yolks
1 1/4 cups butter or margarine
1 large raw egg yolk, beaten
1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
Pocketbook filling
1 large egg white
Sift together first 4 ingredients. Put egg yolks through a sieve and add to flour mixture. With a pastry blender, or 2

knives, blend in butter or margarine until mixture is of coarse crumb consistency. Mix in raw egg yolk and pure vanilla extract to form dough. Refrigerate until stiff enough to handle. Roll half the dough at a time into a rectangle 1/4-inch thick. Cut into 3-inch squares. Place 2 teaspoons pocketbook filling on each square. Bring corners of squares to top of filling and press together or fold into triangles. Place on ungreased cookie sheets. Brush with egg white, beaten until foamy. Bake in a preheated slow oven (325 degrees) 30 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove to wire racks to cool. Store airtight.

Foreign Commentary

Last September, at the peak of the Indian-Pakistan fighting, Red China suddenly entered the picture with a charge that the Indians had built military outposts inside Communist-controlled Tibet.

An ultimatum threatened India with "grave consequences" unless the outposts were dismantled immediately and unless the Indians returned four Tibetans, 800 sheep and 59 yaks allegedly kidnaped from Tibet.

Then, just as suddenly, the Chinese announced the Indians had dismantled the structures and the threat of "grave consequences" evaporated.

The impression gained from all this was that the supposed military structures had in fact never existed, and that the Red Chinese simply had erected their own straw man only to knock him down.

To Encourage Pakistan
Presumably the Chinese strategy was to encourage Pakistan to continue its fight with India and to divert India with the threat of military intervention from the north.

Heavy snows lie across the Himalaya Mountain border between India and Red China, now but the Chinese have continued their harassing tactics, both puzzling and worrying the Indians.

India has informed the United States, Britain, France and the Soviet Union that Red Chinese forces have been moving up to the "line of actual control" all along the way from the northeast frontier agency in the east to Ladakh and Sikkim in the west.

Intruding, 10-man Chinese patrols have increased in size to 50 or 60.

It seems unlikely that the Chinese would plan a major military action now.

Reacting to Visits
What seems more likely is that the Chinese are reacting to the fact that both Indian Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri and Pakistan President Mohammed Ayub Khan have visits to President Johnson scheduled soon.

Moreover, both Shastri and Ayub Khan have accepted an invitation from Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin to meet in

Soviet Tashkent in an attempt to settle their difficulties. That meeting is expected to take place in January.

While it is unlikely that the Tashkent meeting can produce any real agreement, especially on the question of Kashmir, it does strengthen the Soviet claim that the Soviets have an important role to play in Asia. The questions President Johnson will put to the two men already have been made clear.

Aid at Stake
First the President will want to know what the two countries are doing to improve their relations with each other. Involved in their answers will be the future of American aid. He also will ask Shastri what India is doing to increase her own food production. Relations of both with Red China also will be explored.

Red China, blocked in Viet Nam, disappointed by failure of the Red-led revolt in Indonesia and frustrated in Africa, may be looking for new avenues for muscle flexing. She also may seek to convince Ayub Khan that he can get more help from Red China against India than he ever can from the United States.

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This Week In Business

NEW YORK (UPI)—Christmas shopping got off to an early and brisk start this week in most of the country although bad weather kept retail trade down in scattered parts of New England and the Midwest.

Merchants in the South Atlantic states found their cash registers ringing up sales 13 to 17 per cent above a year ago and, for the country as a whole, Dun & Bradstreet reported retail trade on the week up 4 to 8 per cent from the start of the 1964 Christmas season.

As for autos, the Big Three—Ford, General Motors and Chrysler—sold 773,000 cars in November, well above the industry's previous record for the month of 640,000 set in 1963. Auto output this week, however, will be down about 2 per cent from last week to 216,000 cars because of the Fisher Body strike at Flint, Mich. Production for December is scheduled at 920,000 cars, which will be a record for the month if achieved.

Unemployment was disclosed by the Labor Department to have dropped in mid-November to 4.2 per cent of the working force, the lowest mark since August, 1957.

The consumer price index climbed in October to a record 110.4 per cent of the 1957-59 average and the Commerce Department said rising domestic prices are hurting U.S. sales abroad.

The Census Bureau said imports surged 29 per cent in October while exports advanced only 6 per cent. However, it was explained that the import jump was caused in part by a hangover from the maritime strike. Goods that should have cleared customs late in the summer were delayed weeks in unloading and were caught in snarls of paperwork to swell the October figure.

President Johnson said at the "Texas White House" that the U.S. economy will surge to new highs in 1966 and although figures released by the White House indicated the possibility of a deficit as high as \$10.5 billion because of the war in Viet Nam, Johnson said plainly he did not fear inflation now.

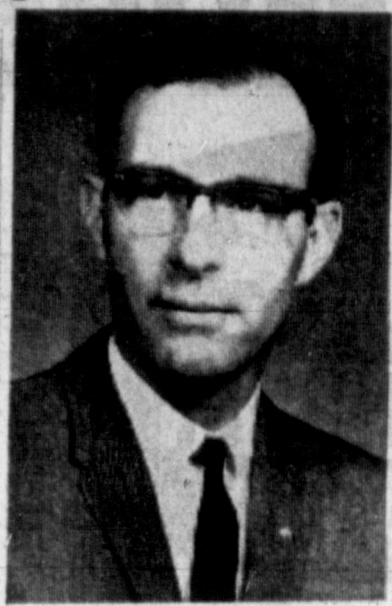

32 Killed In Crash of Plane

SANTA CRUZ DE TENERIFE, Canary Islands (UPI)—All 32 persons aboard were killed when a Spanish airliner crashed into a hillside during a rain-storm minutes after taking off from this winter resort island.

Most of the 28 passengers were vacationers from Norway, Sweden and Denmark. The four crew members were Spanish.

The twin-engine DC3, owned by the independent Spantax Airlines, was making a 30-minute hop from Los Rodeos Airport to Las Palmas on Grand Canary Island.

It suddenly lost altitude, veered out of control and crashed into a hill about six miles from the airport.

One witness, Dr. Juan Miranda, said he saw the plane begin to disintegrate in the air with a loud noise that sounded like an explosion. The craft plunged to earth, sheared off the roof of a farmhouse and plowed into the hillside. Two farmers were slightly injured.

Rescue workers at the scene of Tuesday night's crash said the plane disintegrated on impact. There was little fire. Some bodies were found several hundred yards from the wreckage.
