# Reforms Take Place in India

BOMBAY (AP)—Mother India is acting today like a Puritan. Although pessimists say you can't change human nature with law books on this old continent, the trend is toward national prohibition and the abatement of prostitution.

Alcohol and legalized vice are now ranked as public enemies by the highest statesman of the young Indian Dominion.

Social reformers, comforted by the saintly teachings of Mahatma Gandhi, are already writing more stringent legislation.

The most direct blows have fallen on the sale of intoxicants. Traffic in women is proving hard to control.

Test tubes for social experiments are India's largest cities. Bombay and Calcutta. Two days are enforced each week in Bombay, including the pay-as-you-go system in the big textile industry. Calcutta goes drinkless on Saturdays.

It's only a small beginning.

"The British were not too concerned. They let things slide. Piles of white slavers are hoarded up by religious tradition as well as the enormous profits made from vice."

Hinduism accords a recognized position to the prostitute, who is depicted as a deity and catered to by pilgrims in backward states, although it is now generally forbidden to allow superstitious families to dedicate a daughter to the temple service.

In Southern India, where maternal systems flourish, it is common to find prostitutes whose female ancestors as far back as records exist, belonged to the "oldest profession."

Vice is big business in Bombay. The redlight district, which extends over several prominent thoroughfares is perhaps the most famous in the East. There are streets lined with houses in which "bachelors" and girls behind barred doors submit for 12 annas — 2 cents.

High banks (merchants) frequent a cluster of apartment houses further uptown with reliable procured servants and dancers, with golden bangles hanging from noses and ears, entertain nightly at private parties which may cost as much as \$100 or more. The girls are usually attended by maids who are their male relatives, including husbands.

The Bombay provincial government recently publicly confessed that the last anti-prostitution act passed 24 years ago, had "failed" as a result of its objectives. It is said a new decree which is something less than half a loaf is

determined leaders of a purity campaign here.

Under terms of the new act, prostitution is forbidden "within 150 yards of a place of public religious worship, educational institution, park, playground, cinema, railway station or tram line."

Ironically, race rioters, not reformers, have done the most harm so far to white slavery. Most brothels are in a mixed area of Moslems and Hindus. The hazards of assassination in the street have discouraged customers, frightened girls back to their native villages, and cut the income of overlords during the past six months.

## Ex-Bartender Finds Church

GLEN JEAN, W. Va. — Musical chimes heard by mountain folk for miles around sound the call to worship in a small church located here on the site of an old saloon—with a former bartender as its pastor.

The strange history of the little congregation in this southern West Virginia coal mining community largely parallels the life story of the Rev. Charles Ash.

For years he served up drinks in the Coney Island saloon on the same property on which his church now stands. He also had a similar job in nearby Winona, and found time for a few mining enterprises, and for managing a

grocery store.

In 1922 his wife died, and a short time later fire destroyed his home. Then, he related he saw the "error of his ways" and turned to the church.

He first conducted religious services for the 40 members of the Pentecostal Church of God congregation in the old Glen Jean school. Another fire scattered the membership in 1933.

A year later Ash accepted an offer to use as a church the old Coney Island saloon, which originally was owned by his father before he was killed in a political argument on a Glen Jean street in 1917.

First plans for the new and present building were formulated in the spring of 1946. The structure was completed and dedicated last summer, with the musical chimes being added a few months later.

Today, the church has a membership of 115 and an average

Sunday School attendance of 75. The minister's son-in-law is Sunday School superintendent, while his daughter heads the Pentecostal Young People's association. In all, Ash has 40 relatives who are members of his church.

#### Is Job of This Blinded Veteran

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—The big guy glared across the desk at smiling Chuck DeLong.

"Look, he demanded, "Look at this hand. Rheumatism. Got it in the Army. How do you think I can make a livin' with this? How can I?"

Suddenly, the distraught World War II vet stopped short. He realized DeLong wasn't looking at anything. He's blind.

Charles J. DeLong's affliction has a quieting effect on ex-servicemen who bring their complaints to the Veterans Administration where he's employed as a contact representative.

The 26-year-old Hammond, Ind., high school graduate says as far as he knows he's the only blind contact man in the VA.

His disability makes other ex-GI's stop and think, if they notice it. But many of them don't. DeLong makes it as inconspicuous as possible.

He doesn't tell them, either, that there's hardly a place on his body as big as your hand that's not torn by shrapnel. His job is to hear their complaints and help them if he can.

The handsome former Air Force man has ways of concealing his blindness. Little things like keeping every object on his desk where he can reach it at an instant.

A sharply trained memory and a wife who reads him the newest VA directives keep him posted on regulations about GI benefits.

Montgomery was just another southern city to DeLong when he joined the AAF in 1939 after graduating from Hammond High School. A native of Flat Rock, Ill., he had lived in Indiana with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel E. DeLong, since he was nine years old.

The Air Force brought him to train at Maxwell Field, and at Montgomery he met Laura Gal-

### Science Devises a Mind Reading Hat

OMAHA (AP)—The waves of electricity in the human brain can be read quicker and easier with a new hat developed at the University of Nebraska College of Medicine.

Everyone has these waves, and the science of recording their patterns and interpreting what they mean has developed rapidly in recent years. The waves form different patterns when you are asleep or awake, or when your eyes are open or closed.

They also often form typical patterns in certain diseases, like epilepsy. Changes in the waves sometimes can be used to mark out the area of the brain affected by a tumor.

The waves change with different emotions, and may prove useful in tracking down some personality disorders. They can be used to tell whether a person is really deaf, or pretending deafness, or actually cannot hear due to a kind of hysteria even though there is nothing wrong with his auditory nerves. His brain waves will change if loud sounds are carried by the nerves to the brain.

These readings usually are taken by pasting electrodes to various points on the scalp. The electrodes often have needle points that stick slightly into the scalp. Fixing them in place takes time, and often the hair is clipped.

The new hat or headgear avoids these difficulties. It was designed by Dr. A. R. McIntyre and A. L. Dunn of the college's department of physiology and pharmacology.

It consists of an oval band of fiber that goes around the head like a big hatband. On it are mounted two straps, shaped like half moons, that go over the head. These topstraps can be moved backward or forward.

The electrodes are mounted on the band and the straps. They have adjusting rods and springs so that they can be placed firmly against the skull. They can be changed quickly to different positions, and so no needle points are required. The electrodes are connected by wires to the usual type-brain waves on a moving piece of graph paper.

The advantages, Dr. McIntyre said, are that it takes less time and discomfort for the patient, is quicker for the operator, and gives greater flexibility for exploring specific areas of the brain. It doesn't however give quite as good contact and as smooth readings as when the needle electrodes enter the scalp. 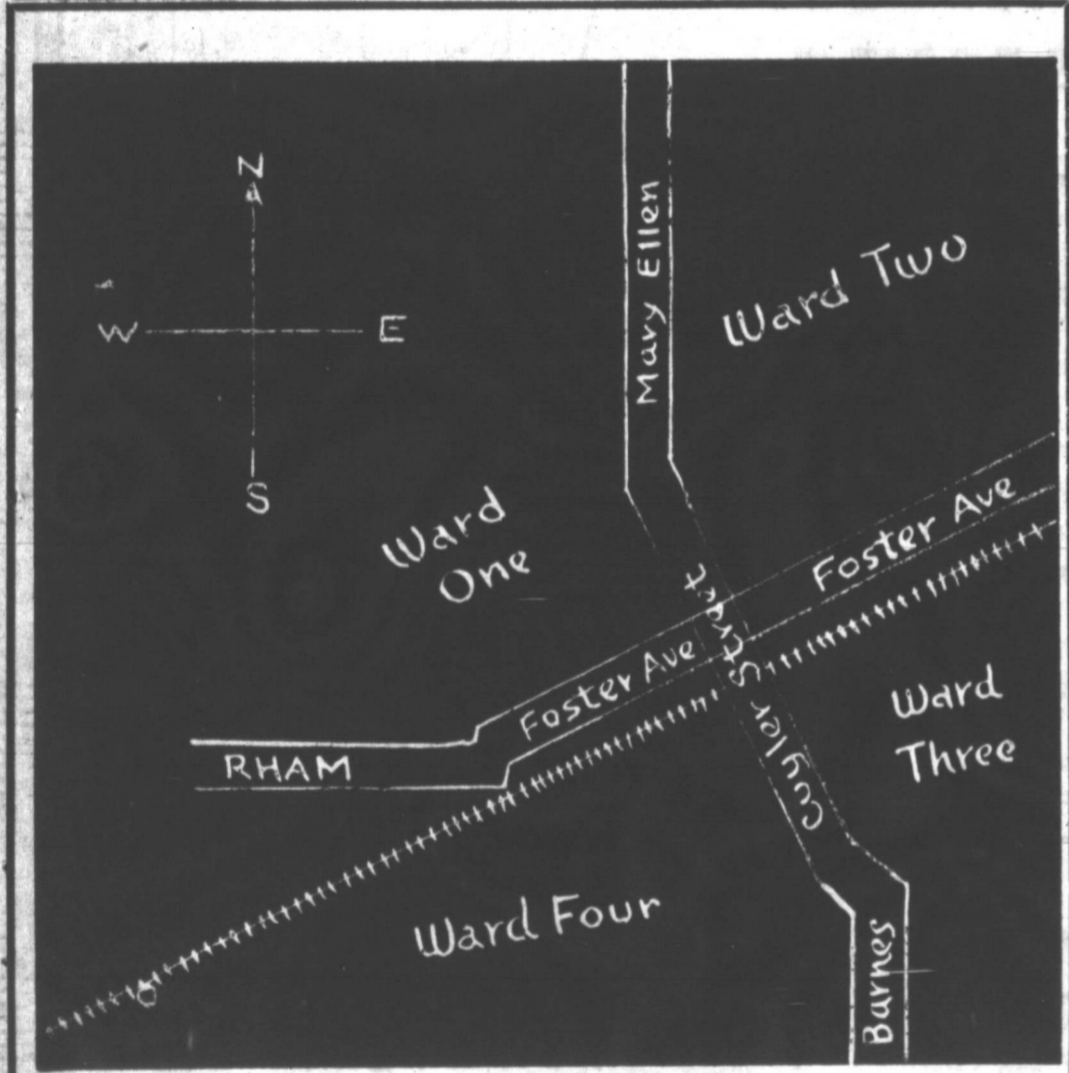

### Skelton Reviews Texas Oil News

By MAX B. SKELTON  
HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—The Big Three of crude oil production—Texas, California and Oklahoma—are receiving big assists from other states in the petroleum industry's supply and demand battle.

Such states as Louisiana, Kansas and Mississippi, with rapid advances in exploration and development, may hold the final answer to the tight struggle to meet unprecedented demands.

Louisiana, currently producing more oil than Oklahoma, last year led the nation in proved reserve discoveries.

The Kansas Conservation Division recently set daily potential rates for the state's eighteenth and nineteenth discovery wells of 1947.

The state's crude production last week jumped 13,500 barrels daily, the primary reason why the nation's production, as reported by the American Petroleum Institute, reached an all-time high of 5,390,650 barrels daily.

Mississippi's legislature has recognized the rapid growth of the industry there by establishing an

appointive administrative board to set allowable and establish other regulations.

Its production jumped 5,800 barrels daily for the week of April 17.

Texas, with 2,419,000 barrels daily, is producing at maximum efficiency rates in all fields, but its new developments have not been as rapid as the booming Louisiana Coastal Area.

The Louisiana State Mineral Board last week collected a record \$4,945,110 in bonuses when it leased mineral rights on 248,773 state owned acres.

Bidding was spirited on blocks in the Lake Raccourci Area of La Fourche and Terrebonne parishes and in the Offshore Ship Shoal Area, where 152,138 acres brought \$1,729,437 in royalties.

The American Gas Association placed last year's proved reserve discoveries of crude oil and natural gas liquids over the nation at 704,811,000 barrels.

Louisiana accounted for 182,625,000 barrels.

Oklahoma was second with 141,490,000 and Texas third with 102,634,000.

Colorado's discoveries totaled 87,377,000, followed by Mississippi with 38,882,000.

California, now the second largest crude oil producing state,

trilled with only 5,531,000 barrels.

API's record breaking daily production average of 5,390,650 barrels for the week ending April 17 represents an increase of 13,500 barrels and compares with 4,912,100 for the same period last year.

The Oil and Gas Journal listed the April 17 daily average at 5,414,360, an increase of 14,360 barrels daily.

The Bureau of Mines April demand estimate is 5,450,000 barrels daily.

William R. Boyd, Jr., president of API, predicts the industry's supply and demand problems will continue in "delicate balance" for the year that began April 1.

He said the industry estimates its total supply of petroleum available to meet domestic consumption for the next 12 months period will average 4,025,000 barrels daily, an increase of eight percent over current demands.

Gov. Beauford Jester has forwarded to Secretary of Interior Julius A. Krug a five-point suggested program on how to boost the flow of crude oil.

The points involve allocation of more steel to the oil industry, prompt settlement of the tidelands issue by affirming state ownership, drilling more wells in known fields rather than increasing allowable, utilization of requested new steel supplies to stop gas wastage, and halting conversion from coal to oil until crude production can catch up with demand.

The battle over the submerged tidelands was revived briefly early last week following a bill as congressmen studied proposals to give the respective states outright ownership.

A joint Navy-Interior Department announcement said salt dome geological formations, possibly oil-bearing, have been discovered from 20 to 75 miles off the Gulf Coast.

Defense Secretary James Forrestal, Attorney General Tom Clark, and a day later advised Congress the discoveries emphasize the urgency for appropriate legislation to provide for the development, exploration and conservation of resources in such areas.

They criticized such states as Texas and Louisiana for attempting to extend their boundaries in the submerged areas.

Texas Attorney General Price Daniel, one of the leaders in the state ownership group, retorted that the announcement of "discoveries and the letter to Congress from the three cabinet members were additional 'attempts to tell Congress what it should do about the tidelands issue.'

Daniel added that "Geologists have known of the salt dome formations for years and have announced their findings in published reports."

In the laboratory:

A British professor reports discovery of a new compound which will permit automobiles to run a lifetime with no change of oil.

Based on fluorine, the compound is said to eliminate hydrogen from oils and makes them nonflammable.

Chemists of the Esso Standard Oil Laboratories, Baton Rouge, La., report that a new catalyst, silica-magnesia, a combination of dried out milk of magnesia and common white sand, increase yield of gasoline by 25 percent.

### Cities Service Weekly Oil Report

The completion of 11 oil wells during the week for an average per-well initial potential production of 188 barrels daily was reported by Cities Service Oil Co. today.

One gas well, Nicko No. 1 in Hughes County, Oklahoma, was finished for an open flow of 5,500,000 cubic feet daily.

Of the total wells completed for an initial of 2,068 barrels daily, eight were located in Kansas with an initial of 1,769 barrels daily.

Largest oilers finished in the Sunflower state were Williams B No. 2 in Ellsworth County for an initial of 1,010 barrels daily, and Bullock No. 1 in Rooks County furnished one-half of the Kansas completions for an initial potential of 433 barrels daily.

Three Texas oil wells were completed during the week for an initial of 299 barrels. Included were Hoover No. 9 and Hoover No. 10 in Crockett County for initial potentials of 136 and 87 barrels respectively, and Scanlan No. 1 in Dawson County for 76 barrels daily.

Eight new locations were reported by Cities Service Oil Co. during the week, with four spotted in Kansas and two each in Texas and Oklahoma. One of the Texas locations, Proctor No. 1 in Gaines County, was a wildcat.

These active locations bring to almost 60 the total number of wells now being drilled by Cities Service Oil Co. Included are 29 in Kansas, 13 in Oklahoma, 11 in Texas and five in Mississippi, New Mexico and Michigan. Several of these wells are wildcats or tests and are being watched closely by the industry.

I don't know the ratio of spies assigned to Russia as compared with "bourgeois" states, but it wouldn't be surprising if Red Star were right.

In these dangerous days spies are swarming everywhere. Naturally governments don't advertise their secret agents, but every major nation has them.

They are with us always.

Of course, when the dogs of war begin to bay at the moon,

The prisons get a lot. I encountered some ex-spies eating their hearts out on notorious Devil's Island off the coast of French Guiana a few years ago.

I've encountered many other secret agents in one country or another. I knew one American agent abroad—a brilliant and charming woman. She got spotted while operating in a European country and all but lost her life. She escaped, but her usefulness was ended because her identity had been disclosed.

She was a reserved, mild-mannered little lady, as lovely and fragile as a primrose—a very deceptive appearance, for she coupled cleverness with the fighting heart of a tigress.

Sure, there are secret agents busy the world over these days.

## Hoffman Gets Set for Tough Job With U.S.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Paul G. Hoffman is a middle-aged, middle-sized, pleasant-looking man who goes in for double-breasted suits.

He looks like a successful businessman, and that's what he is. He was head of the Studebaker Corporation.

He also looks like a man who can keep his temper pretty well, and he'll probably have to before he's through with Washington.

He's now the head of ECA—the Economic Cooperation Administration—which will handle the Marshall Plan.

The meeting seemed pretty typical of ECA at this point: Brand new and trying to get started.

Hoffman came into the room with only two aides, D. A. Fitzgerald and Richard Bissell.

They're about his only two top assistants, except for W. Averell Harriman, who has been named "roving ambassador" for the program in Europe.

The ECA program is so vast—it calls for spending \$5,300,000,000 in Europe in one year on food, loans and goods—that Hoffman can't and probably never will know all the details.

When a question was asked about food, he had to turn to Fitzgerald for the answer.

Bissell chimed in with most of the answers on non-food things like the amount of steel and machinery that will be shipped to Europe.

ECA won't be able to start running in any smooth way until Hoffman can pick a deputy administrator and his other chief assistants.

As the program gets underway—if things go wrong—Hoffman will be on the receiving end of criticism.

That's one of the hazards of taking a big government job. And the way this program is carried out—since it's so huge—will be watched closely by Congress.

Some men get so much respect from Congress that they have a pretty mild time with congressmen.

But others get a raking when they go up to the Capitol.

## Americans Not Physically Fit People—Royall

HOUSTON—(AP)—Americans are not physically fit people, Secretary of Army Kenneth C. Royall has said.

"We must reluctantly face this fact which came into sharp focus by the appalling draft rejection figures of World War II," the secretary said.

Royall spoke at dedication ceremonies for the \$2,500,000 Roy and Lillie Cullen Building at the Baylor University College of Medicine.

Dr. W. R. White, president of Baylor University, delivered the formal dedicatory address.

Royall said the nation's condition of physical fitness "is dangerous in peace and even more serious in event of any all-out war that may come in the future."

Such institutions as Houston's \$100,000,000 Texas Medical Center, of which the Baylor Medical College is a unit, can maintain and improve the American standard of life and demonstrate to a troubled and perplexed world the practical efficacy of the American system of government, Royall stated.

"Public health and preventive medicine and the care and cure of the sick are essentials to a fuller scale of life," he continued.

He said the extent and value to national defense of cooperation between educational institutions and the military establishment has been demonstrated more nowhere than at Baylor's College of Medicine.

"Equipment and methods mean nothing without men who are able to use them," he continued.

Royall said Baylor has a special responsibility in the study of atomic medicine, one of many fields in which the Army is working closely with civilian schools and hospitals.

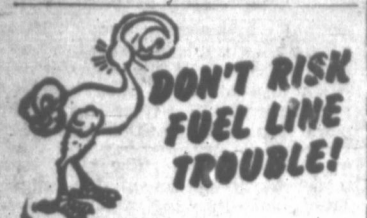

Texas Completes 10-Year Plan to Enlarge Athletics

AUSTIN — A ten-year plan for an enlarged, lighted intramural athletic plant to serve the University of Texas' 10,000 men students has been completed.
Intramural Director Berry Whitaker, who guided the big project from its inception, said that the completion of 20 hard-surface tennis courts winds up the program.
Included in the lay-out are the following:
A lighted field, 285 yards by 50 yards, that encompasses either three touch football fields, three soccer fields or three softball diamonds.
Knockdown-type bleachers to seat up to 600 spectators.
Six horseshoe courts.
20 tennis courts, suited for play in all kinds of weather.

The program was begun in 1938, under the campus sponsorship of the Inter-Fraternity Council. Belated by the war, the plans were taken anew in 1946, and the major portion of the work—the lighting facilities—was accomplished with the help of intercollegiate athletic department funds. With the flood of students after the war and resulting late-afternoon classes, the lights permitted a 100 per cent increase use of the intramural field.
Director Whitaker assures on participation bear out the usefulness and the need for the enlargement. For example, 96 teams with 1554 players were in the touch football program; 94 teams with 1500 players are in softball games, while soccer crew 53 teams and 877 players. Tennis doubles, with singles yet to be played, drew 270 teams.

anything since the liberation in 1944.  
The reason was clear. Italy's election had blighted Communist hopes in France, at least for the time being.  
The soft glove is on the Communist fist in France.  
From some quarters, especially in London, came indications that Italy might be invited soon to join the five-power European union of England, France, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg. It is both military and economic.  
But from unofficial sources in France, Holland and Belgium came a cautioning "not too fast."  
"They want to wait to see how Italy's new government gets along."  
The Communist parties of Britain, France, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg joined yesterday in asking their followers to organize against the Brussels pact.  
An inquiring message sent along the Associated Press wire system in Europe brought these comments on the Italian election:  
Berlin and Communist leaders believe the Communist defeat in Italy will greatly strengthen resistance to communism throughout Germany, even in the curbed Russian occupation zone.  
Germans in this four-power city, 125 miles behind the "Iron Curtain," consider the Italian elections the second greatest blow against communism in the post-war era. The first was delivered when the Communist-controlled Socialist Unity Party in Berlin won only 19.8 percent of the vote in municipal elections, finishing a poor third in a field of four.  
If Berliners have opportunity for another free election this fall, anti-Communist leaders claim, the Reds will get an even worse trouncing.  
London—Britain's political and diplomatic chiefs expect Italy's anti-Communist elections will strengthen the European union by adding soon a new partner, Italy, to the present five-nation alliance. Anti-Communist sentiment in Britain has been mounting ever since the Czech Coup. Prague—one American observer, long in Central Europe, feels that Moscow now is soft-pedaling because the Italian election indicated that the Communist high command had struck its neck out a little too far, especially in view of "stop Russia now" talk among the American people.  
Stockholm—Key members of the Swedish parliament said the election was "generally regarded with great relief as a stabilizing factor in the international field and consequently as a very welcome thing to Sweden." The country still appeared determined to avoid entangling alliances.  
Helsinki—Finnish Socialists felt that the success of the Independent Socialists in Italy demonstrated that the anti-Communist stand of Finland's Socialists was wise. Spokesmen for all parties doubted that the elections were the last round in the fight for Italy.  
Oslo—Norwegian observers feel that the Italian elections helped to prove that communism will not spread outside the shadow of the Red army.  
Rome—Prime Minister De Gasperi, aware that his victory was

**Spider Is Modern In War Methods**  
SYDNEY, Australia —(AP)— Australia has a flying spider which knows all about air attacks and is a past master at camouflage.  
Actually, naturalists say, the spider (Attus Volans) does not fly, but leaps and then glides to its destination when pouncing on victims. Skin flaps provide wings for the gliding operation.  
Camouflage is used when the spider contorts its body so that it looks like one of the Australian flies. When a fly alights, the spider leaps upon it and kills it for dinner.

**Australian Bees Have No Stings**  
SYDNEY, Australia —(AP)— Efforts of breeders to develop a stingless bee has called attention to the fact that Australia already has nine species of bees which have no stings.  
The Australian bees are much smaller than the more familiar types, about the size of a housefly. They can get into small flowers from which the larger bees cannot gather nectar.  
They produce a distinctive type of honey which is often sold at premium prices, but Australian beekeepers report that they cannot be kept near ordinary-type bees because they rob their neighbors instead of gathering honey for themselves.

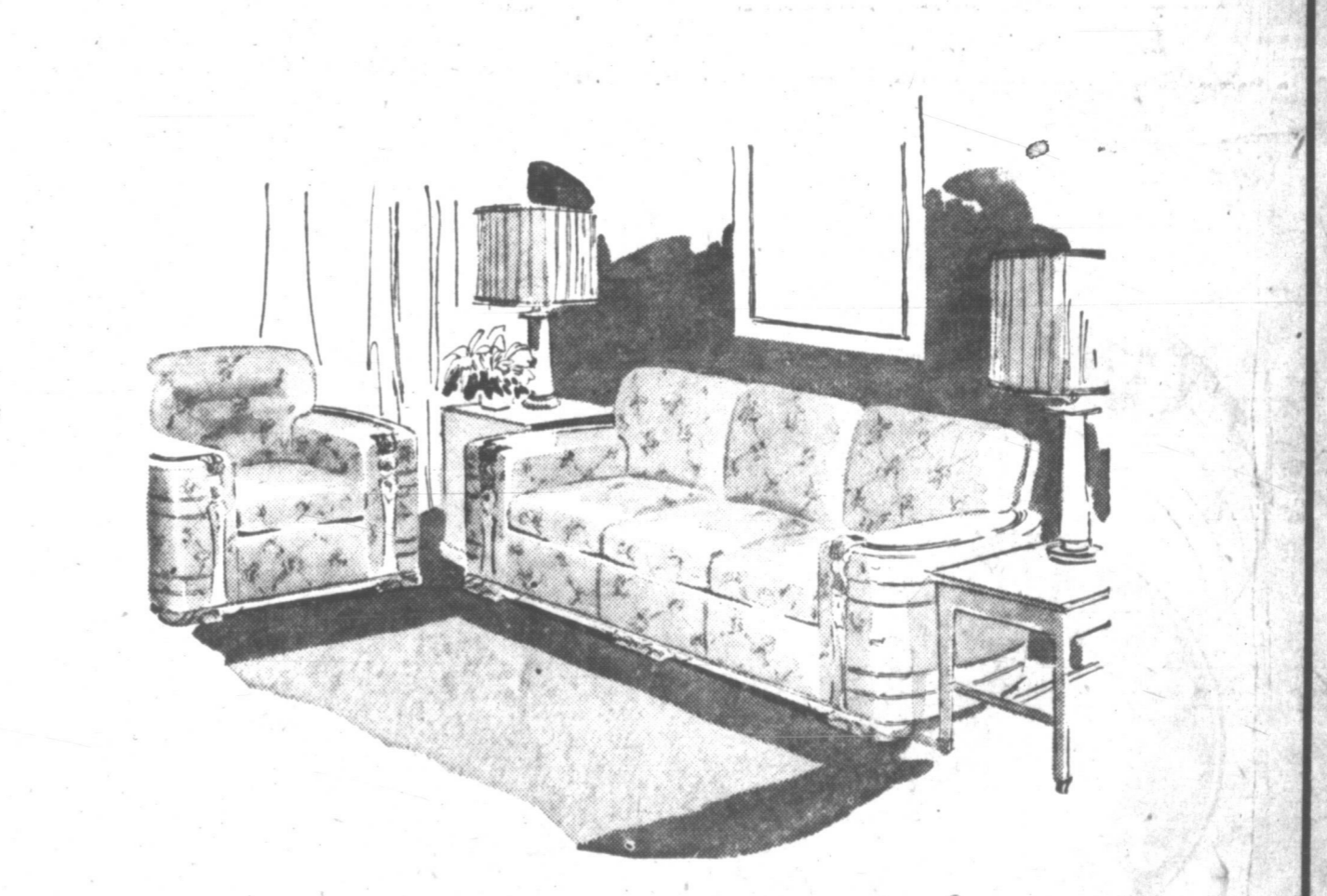

**Know Your STUFF**

About Velocipedes — Junior will enjoy his new tricycle more if, when you go shopping for it, you know your stuff about velocipedes.  
Care should be taken not to get too large or too heavy a velocipede which might overtax little muscles. Velocipede sizes are numbered 12, 16 and 20-inch, which is the measure of the diameter of the front wheel. The Toy Guidance Council recommends the 12-inch size for little cyclists who are two and three years old; the 16-inch size for the child up to five years of age; and the 20-inch for the youngster up to seven years of age. The weight of velocipedes varies from 14 pounds for the 12-inch size to 24 pounds for the 20-inch size.

A velocipede with full ball-bearing construction is apt to cost more than one with semi-ball-bearing construction or one with no ball-bearings. The full ball-bearing tricycle, however, is likely to be the easiest for a child to ride or push. Semi-ballroom tires also make for easy traction.

A chain tricycle—one with chain-driven wheels similar to a bicycle—takes more skill to handle and is heavier than an ordinary velocipede. For that reason a chain tricycle is usually

### Snow Survey May Aid India

CALCUTTA —(AP)—Dr. J. E. Church, president of the International Commission on Snow, says that India has great wealth stored in the snow fields of the Himalayas. Water from these snows would be an important factor in the development of the country if they were properly used, he says.

The 78-year-old American has completed a two-months survey of snows in Nepal and Sikkim for the Indian government. It marked the 50th year of such surveys for Dr. Church. He was a professor of classics at Nevada University when he made his first snow survey on Mount Rose.

Himalaya snows start at 10,000 feet rather than at about 6,000 feet as they do in much of the United States, he says, because the Himalayas are nearer the equator.

From India, Dr. Church is going to Argentina.

### Noted Polish Pianist Says That U. S. Women Drink Too Much

Maryla Jonas, the Polish pianist whose talent burst on the western musical world like a skyrocket in 1946, sat in her New York hotel living room talking of many things before she left on a United States tour that will take her from coast to coast.

She is a big woman with green eyes, fleshy white as milk and blonde hair swept to the crown of her head in smooth puffs. Her big figure, which she refuses to corset even for concerts ("because I have to feel what I play from my legs up") was dressed in a long, dark, loosely-cinched hostess gown. Her feet were sheathed in scarlet satin mules. On her white hand a big diamond flashed fire.

"In the majority of cases, I do not like American women," she says. "I would like to change American women. I would like to make less doll. Make read more and don't worry so much. I do not like to see American women drink so much."

"There'll be a decadence of American home if American woman doesn't stop this life of nightclub, relaxation, worry about figure all the time. She takes too much care of herself. She asks too much and she gives nothing."

She glanced out of her window overlooking Central Park, where chic New Yorkers paraded Pekinese in the sunshine, frowned and began again:

"Maybe it's not all women's fault. Maybe they haven't been taught right. But it's a big problem and danger. Danger for women themselves. In war American men met European women. They saw a big difference. They liked those European women. It's big danger for the country too. Especially today women must take care of men, of life, of children. It's a big job."

Mme. Jonas delivered all this with a brooding thoughtful air which robbed her words of critical sting.

Mme. Jonas' own career is a saga. She was born of a well-to-do Polish family, began to study the piano at seven, and two years later played with the Warsaw Philharmonic. There followed a season of study with Paderewski. At 19 Maryla Jonas married Jarze Krol, a Warsaw lawyer, but she continued her music and appeared in a series of successful European concerts. Then came the war and the invasion and bombing of Poland. Miss Jonas, her husband and the members of her family were separated and the pianist was placed in a concentration camp because she refused to play in Berlin. Finally she escaped, walked from Warsaw to Berlin and eventually made her way by plane and boat to Rio de Janeiro, where she learned her husband and most of her family had perished.

For months she refused to touch the piano. Then a musician friend persuaded her to try, and the old magic flowed back into her fingers. After successful South American tours she came, unheralded, to New York, and played her first Carnegie Hall concert in February, 1948, to a handful of audience and a few critics. However, those few heralded her performance with such enthusiasm that her American fame began and a subsequent New York concert established her.

### Expert Tips Aid Home Seamstress

The budget-minded girl, determined to beat the high cost of clothing with self-made wardrobe pretties will profit from these tips from sewing experts.

Stitch nylon fabrics with nylon thread. Cotton thread tends to shrink. Cotton-sewed nylon underwear may pucker at the seam after laundering. A clothes-conscious gal doesn't need to be told that puckering slip-seams may mar the sleek fit of her frock.

Sewing chintz? Or other stiff cloth? Stick needles or pins into tailor's chalk before basting with thread or pins. Coated with chalk, a pin or needle slides more easily through stiff cloth.

Putting a neat buttonhole into sheer or stretchy jersey fabric is no problem. Not if you'll machine-stitch fabric layers together through the markings where the buttonhole is to be made. This pre-stitching prevents fabric from slipping out of line when you ply the sewing machine buttonhole attachment around small areas.

As a final reminder, keep a small magnet at your elbow for corralling stray pins and needles. This draws scattered strays from the floor back to the pin cushion when your sewing session is over.

**Federal Debt at Artificially Low Rate of Interest**

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The government owes so much money about three-fifths of all that is owed in this country — that it has to pay \$5,200,000,000 a year in interest.

It would pay more than that if the 12 Federal Reserve banks weren't holding its interest costs down artificially by keeping the prices of its bonds artificially high.

These bonds are the ones bought and sold on markets in New York and elsewhere just as corporation stocks are.

They are not savings bonds, which are in a different class. The owners of these cannot sell them to other persons, and the prices at which they can be cashed in at the government are fixed and unvarying.

The reserve banks keep the market bond prices at par or better by buying the bonds themselves if no one else will buy them at the "support" price levels fixed by the banks.

To show what that has to do with interest rates, let's take the case of a \$100 face value bond on which the government pays \$2.50 a year in interest.

The yield on that bond is 2 1/2 percent. If the price of the bond went down to \$90 on the market the \$2.50 a year interest would boost the yield above 2 1/2 percent, for \$2.50 is a bigger percentage of \$90 than it is of \$100.

The government wouldn't feel any immediate difference on that bond when its price dropped from \$100 to \$90. It would have to keep on paying \$2.50 interest a year and pay \$100 for the bond when it fell due, because that was its promise when the bond was issued.

But when the bond fell due, things would be different. The government can't pay all \$117,000,000,000 worth of its marketable bonds off with cash on hand, because it doesn't have that much surplus cash.

It can, however, borrow the \$100 needed to pay off your bond by issuing another bond. But if old bonds paying \$2.50 interest were selling at \$90 the government would have to pay higher interest on its new bonds—about \$2.66—to sell them for \$100 each.

As long as the Federal Reserve banks buy the bonds for \$100 or slightly more, that doesn't happen. The interest rate stays at 2 1/2 percent and the government's interest costs stay down.

This is important for a lot of reasons. One is that keeping interest rates down on government bonds tends to keep interest rates low for corporations issuing bonds, and for other borrowers.

Some people think it is a mistake for the Federal Reserve banks to hold down government interest rates and thereby other interest rates. They say making it cheap to borrow promotes borrowing and therefore adds to inflation, re-

**One Detective Has Mighty Tender Feet**

OKLAHOMA CITY —(AP)—Burglary Detective Mark Bain's feet are neither hot, flat, nor cold today — but they are mighty tender.

Two burglars tried to break into his own home last night. Holding his pajamas up with one hand and clutching his pistol in the other, the barefoot officer chased them several blocks full speed in the dark.

"Then they turned into a gravel alley," he explained to brother officers who found him hobbling home alone.

He fled in high prices, which the government says it is combating in other ways.

They take the position that one of the best tried and true ways of stopping inflation is to cut down borrowing by letting it become more costly.

The Federal Reserve System and the administration, however, say that interest on the \$253,000,000,000 debt already accounts for 13 cents of each dollar the government spends, and that paying more would increase the tax burden.
