

Southwest Blackout Possible-Not Probable

Could a large area of Texas or the Southwest be suddenly blacked out as was the case last night in the northeastern part of the United States?

It is possible but not probable, according to Marvin Cooper, district line superintendent for Southwestern **Public Service Co.**

"What happened in the East last night," Cooper said, "is just one of those things that is not supposed to happen. Whether it could happen in a large part of our area poses a difficult question."

Cooper added that although the best equipment money can buy is installed and every known precaution taken, there is always the one chance that something can go wrong.

The Pampa utility superintendent spoke in the absence of other officials of SWPS who were attending a manager's meeting in Amarillo.

He stated the meeting was not an aftermath of the power failure in the northeast.

On SWPS representative stated in a television interview that generating plants are so situated and operated in Texas that tie-ins can be made quickly to restore power should any of the automatic overload switches be suddenly knocked out,

Massive Break Still An Incredible Puzzle

By MYRON FEINSILBER

NEW YORK (UPI) - History's largest electric power. failure demonstrated today how vunerable America is to a single mishap. It brought hardship to 30 million persons in eight states and Canada - and a hopeless snarl to New York City transportation.

Power was virtually restored throughout 80,000 square miles plunged into darkness at 5:28 p.m. EST Tuesday. But, with the lights back on, new troubles mounted.

Even with service restored, the cause of the massive power failure remained an incredible puzzle, one that could take days, perhaps weeks, to solve. The failure produced fright in darkened cities - and anger in Washington. The blackout;

UPI Executive 'Gets the Feel' of Viet Nam War

EDITORS NOTE: UPI Vice President Leroy Keller, on a tour of Asia, arrived in Saigon and wanted to see the country where Americans are fighting. He went on a tour, was shot at, and landed by helicopter in the middle of a Viet Cong sanctuary. Here is his personal report.

By LEROY KELLER SAIGON (UPI)-Take it from me, you get a strange feeling in your stomach when a Communist takes a shot at you. The countryside looks peaceful. But it isn't. You never know where the enemy is. He could be under a tree, hiding by one of the many canals, or lurking along an embankment separating the patchwork rice paddies of the land.

Several military men suggested I take a flight around the country to "get the feel" of the war.

Capt. Bert Smith, son of UPI White House Reporter Merriman Smith, is a pilot for the Army's 145th Aviation Battalion. He set up a flight for me and Bryce Miller, one of UPI's

staff correspondents. At the last minute, a Vietnamese news cameraman, Dang Van Minh, joined the flight.

Besides Smith, the crew of the helicopter, an HU1B with a pair of .30 caliber machine guns mounted on each side, was Capt. Kent Jones of Fillmore, Calif., co-pilot, spc. 4 Edward Dedge of Monticello, Fla., and Pfc. James Tinkler of Shelby, N.C. Tinkler and Dedge were the gunners. We swept out of Tan Son Nhut Airport toward the north-

east, flying contour, or only a few feet above the ground, until we crossed the Saigon River and then climbed to about 1,500 feet.

"That's Viet Cong country," one of the gunners said, talking loudly so I could hear above the scream of the helicopter's jet engine

I nodded. The jungles were thick. Both gunners kept the muzzles of their weapons depressed, watching closely for any hostile sign.

Then we were descending again. Just ahead, not more

than 15 miles northeast of Saigon, was a Vietnamese ranger outpost. The radio receiver on one of the frequencies was not working properly and Smith wanted to switch the frequencies.

Within a minute or two, we were back in the air again. We climbed quickly. We were between 1,100 and 1,208 feet when Dedge yelled: "Y-eee-ooo-ww" . . . and cut

us. "We didn't mean to get you shot at so quickly," Smith said after he had gained a safe altitude of about 3,000 feet. It's just one of those things . . . you never know where they are." I asked what the mountain

was. Smith replied that it was Nui Ba Den, a Viet Cong sanctuary.

"There is a special forces camp right on the top of it." Smith said.

"Can we land for a few minutes?" Miller asked. "Sure."

There was a supply helicopter already on the small helicopter pad. We circled for a moment, and the pilot below motioned hewas leaving. We landed.

'You are the first newspaper people to be here in six months," Sgt. Daniel Donbkowski of Dixon City, Pa., said in welcoming us.



Two Hurt in Early Obituaries Morning Accident
