National Window

Red China's attempt to shoot its way into the United Nations invites American citizens to searching examination of the prevailing concept in U.S. foreign policy that all nations—like all men—are created equal.

On that premise is based the whole logic of U.S. foreign policy. U.S. foreign policy is oriented to the belief that the United Nations is the last bulwark against World War III and the end of our civilization. If so, this last bulwark is pitifully weak.

The United Nations was set up 20 years ago in the mistaken hope the grand alliance which won the war against Germany and Japan would continue in being. That was the U.N. foundation stone, that the alliance of great powers would in their wisdom impose international law on the entire world.

That foundation crumbled in the first moments of the cold war. Soviet Union vetoes destroyed the effectiveness of the U.N. Security Council as a dependable defender of international law. The United States thereupon turned to the General Assembly, as provided in the U.N. charter. And for some little time the United States enjoyed an assembly leadership prestige which enabled the assembly to function as a peace keeping instrument.

When the United Nations was set up in 1945, the General Assembly consisted of representatives of just more than 50 member states. With only a couple of exceptions, the state represented in the first assembly were truly states, each with a background of some degree of modern civilization.

United Nations membership has more than doubled in 20 years. The newcomers include such unlikely entries as Mali, Chad, Trinidad, Tobago, Ivory Coast, Malawi, Niger, Malta. It is small comfort that the United States is the full equal of the least of these newcomers when the assembly votes are counted.

There are 117 U.N. members today. By careful selection among their assembly representatives it would be possible to obtain a two-thirds assembly majority vote from a group of so-called states representing 10 per cent of the total U.N. population and about 5 per cent of the cash contributions to U.N. expenses.

Such is the composition of the U.N. General Assembly upon which the United States is compelled to rely. The General Assembly defeated the United States this year in the controversy over dues payment by a dozen member states including France and the Soviet Union. The United States insisted that these debtor states be deprived of their assembly votes, as the charter provided after being two years behind in their payments. The United States could not find the assembly votes to impose the charter rule on the Soviet Union. So the Johnson administration surrendered.

So it is likely to be with Red China. If the Chinese Reds miss this year they are likely to hit next time. As the emerging so-called nations came to the surface in Asia and Africa they were welcomed into U.N. membership, thus diluting the assembly in all respects as a dependable base for American foreign policy. Like its one-man-one-vote parent, one-state-one-vote sounds better than it works.

The winds of change are blowing a gale in which the United Nations' kite flies highest of all with the United States an indistinguishable hitch hiker clinging precariously to the tail.

HONOLULU (UPI) — A jettiner carrying some of the nation's top scientific talent was speeding around the world today, attempting history's first pole-to-pole circular trip.

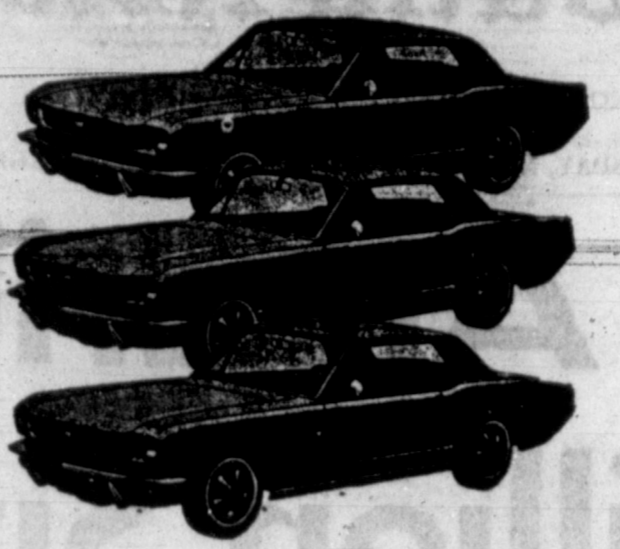
While the primary goal of the flight was scientific exploration, the flight crew hoped to circle the world in 52 hours. That would be a new speed record.

In my class I have a boy whose grandfather died in prison, and his father is serving a life sentence. Also, a pair of twin girls who have no father because he deserted, their mother before they were born. Those who are interested in becoming acquainted with their ancestors can initiate the investigation through a genealogist, and do with the findings whatever they please. But to embarrass eighth graders by asking them to dig up information which is, in some cases, better off buried, is in my judgment, unfair, unethical and unkind.

Churchill Oil Painting Sold As 'Bargain'

AUBURN, Maine (UPI)—A Maine supermarket owner Saturday proudly displayed a painting by Sir Winston Churchill bought for a "bargain" price of \$27,930.

"I got it cheap," Richard W. Sampson, 49, of Auburn, told newsmen before leaving London Friday. "I was prepared to pay as high as, let's say, \$84,320, for it."

Sampson returned home Friday night with the painting which his wife, Mary, said will hang "in the living room over the sofa."

Sampson is a former merchant marine radio operator who saved his pay and invested in grocery market which led to the building of a supermarket chain.

Sampson flew to London Wednesday and bought the painting, titled "Mimizam Landes," at the Christie auction.

Churchill did the painting in 1925 while vacationing at a chalet in southern France owned by the Duke of Westminster. The oil depicts a pine tree and water scene south of Bordeaux.

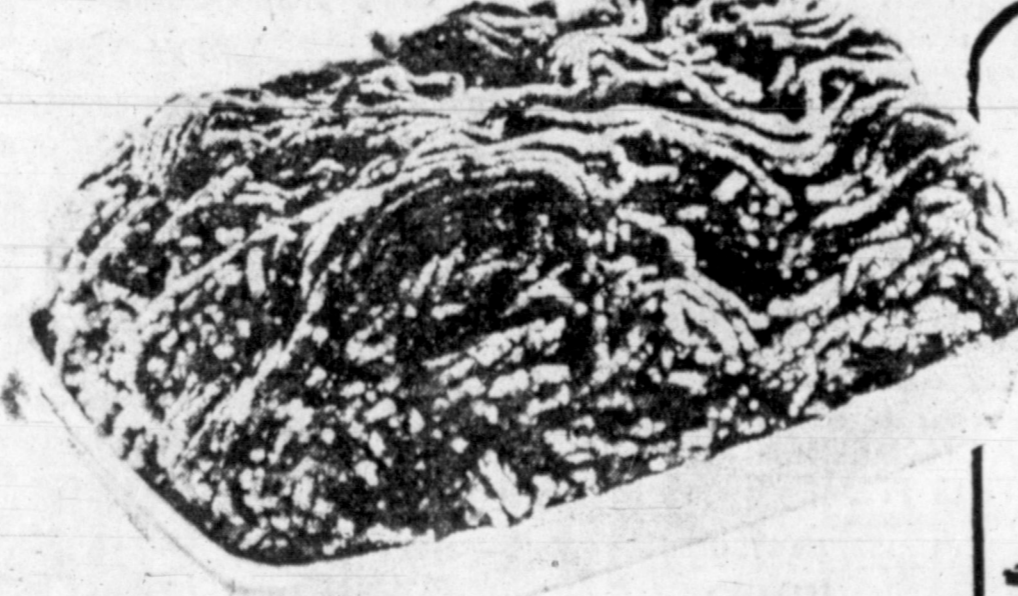

DINNER-DANCE IS HIGHLIGHT

White House Makes Plans For Royal Couple's Visit

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The White House today was preparing for the most glittering event of the Capital's social season—the visit of Princess Margaret and her husband, the Earl of Snowdon.

The highlight of the royal couple's three-day visit will be the dinner-dance to be held by President and Mrs. Johnson Wednesday night. The occasion will also mark the Johnsons' 31st wedding anniversary.

Mrs. Johnson, who returned with the President Sunday night from three weeks in Texas, planned to go over plans for the affair with her social secretary today.

The first lady limited the guest list to 140 for the dinner, but she has invited about 15 more couples—in Princess Margaret's own age group—to come in for dancing in the big East Ballroom afterward. The ballroom will be set up cabinet style.

The guest list was a well-kept White House secret. A spokesman declined to give out any names until the official list is announced, or to say whether former First Lady Mrs. John F. Kennedy has been invited.

The Princess and Lord Snowdon arrived from Tucson, Ariz., at Andrews Air Force Base, Md., just outside the Capital, late yesterday (at 5 p.m. EST). They will stay at the British Embassy during their stay as the guests of the Ambassador, Sir Patrick Dean, and his wife.

The first item on the royal couple's agenda was a mammoth reception given by the Women's National Press Club and the National Press Club.

Today, they visited Arlington National Cemetery to lay a wreath at the grave of President Kennedy, then journeyed down the Potomac for a tour of George Washington's home, Mt. Vernon. On their way back, they did some sight-seeing—the Jefferson Memorial, the Lincoln Memorial, the Washington Monument and the Capitol.

In the afternoon the Princess and her husband planned to visit, federal then attend a reception and her husband planned to visit Washington National Cathedral then attend a reception in their honor at the British Embassy.

Nation's Negro Leaders Plan Alabama Winter Campaign

GREENVILLE, Ala. (UPI)—Negro leaders said that demonstrations in a "winter campaign" against all-white justice in Alabama will be expanded today to three cities—Selma, Eutaw and Greenville.

The announcement of the stepup in the week-old campaign was made early today by Dr. Martin Luther King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference headquarters in Atlanta. A demonstration Sunday was turned back in Greenville.

The "winter campaign" was ordered by King after all-white juries in Alabama had acquitted two men—one a member of the Ku Klux Klan—in the deaths of two white civil rights workers.

In addition to the planned marches, a federal court hearing has been set up in Montgomery today on a class action complaint by Negroes seeking a restraining order barring Greenville city officials from halting demonstrations.

Greenville authorities Sunday stopped an attempted civil rights march of approximately 50 persons without incident.

The group was stopped at the same spot where police and demonstrators clashed Saturday in a brick and bottle throwing melee. Greenville attorney Elisha Peole ordered the demonstrators to disperse Sunday, saying they were an "unlawful assembly."

Apollo Test Firing Set Wednesday

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—The first ground test firing of the new Apollo moonship, delayed three times last week by minor "bugs," is now set for Wednesday.

The Apollo's propulsion unit, called the service module, will be fired for 15 seconds while anchored to a former Titan 2 rocket launch stand.

The test must be passed before the fully-equipped spacecraft can make its initial unmanned flight. The shot, now set for January, will be a sub-orbital hop to a south Atlantic recovery fleet.

Rescue Captain Describes Catastrophe

MIAMI (UPI)—The captain of the liner that rescued hundreds of persons from the flaming cruise ship Yarmouth Castle said today the doomed ship's bridge and control center collapsed in fiery rubble as the rescue vessel pulled alongside. Yarmouth Castle, but Coast Guard Capt. V.G. Niebergall said there were conflicting reports as to whether or not the cruise liner Bahama Star that was on the scene little more than an hour after the blaze started.

"I definitely think the fire Yarmouth Castle know where the fire started and who reported it."

Foreign Commentary

Pr. U.S. anti-Red: The victory of Senate President Ferdinand E. Marcos in the Philippine presidential elections will not mean any drastic change in Philippine foreign policy. Marcos served notice even before the election that should he win, the Philippines would remain staunchly anti-Communist and on the side of the Western camp. Although he was accused by his rival, incumbent President Diosdado Macapagal, of being lukewarm toward friendship with the U.S. and of dragging his feet on the proposed dispatch of Filipino troops to Viet Nam, Marcos has now stated publicly that this is not the case. He affirmed agreement with President Johnson's views that the free world should continue to use its military muscle in Viet Nam without rulling out a political solution there.

France vs. Morocco: French-Moroccan relations, excellent in recent years, could be seriously strained by the recent kidnaping and disappearance in France of former Moroccan leftist opposition leader Mehdi Ben Barka. The French are convinced that the whole was engineered by the Moroccan Interior Ministry to prevent a deal by which King Hassan II would permit Ben Barka to return from exile to Morocco. President De Gaulle is said to be boiling that the kidnaping took place on French territory.

Brush Eradication Field Day Planned

QUANAH — A nation-wide mesquite eradication program that will directly affect the economic future of the Southwest including Gray County will be launched December 8 when Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman pays a visit to the Panhandle area for a brush eradication field day near here, expected to attract some 5,000 persons from a three-state area.

This ambitious program, designed to impress state and federal authorities with the need of accelerated research for complete eradication of mesquite, is being put in orbit by a group of North Texas and Panhandle businessmen and stockmen who recently formed the Southwest-Mesquite and Brush Eradication Association.

The field day, which will call for demonstrations of every known method of mesquite control, will provide a graphic example of the inability of present methods to offer a permanent solution to the Southwest's most devastating agricultural problem — the loss of land to the creeping paralysis of mesquite and other brush infestation.

Secretary Freeman's visit will take place while he is in North Texas to attend an appreciation dinner in Wichita Falls for Congressman Graham Purcell Jr. He will be accompanied to Quanah by Congressman Purcell, chairman of the House agriculture committee, and Congressman Bob Poage of Waco, veteran member of the House's agriculture appropriation committee.

Joining them will be top state officials including Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White, along with a host of legislators, ASCS, Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service leaders and officials from other state and federal agencies — in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. Others to attend will be representatives of livestock associations, state and national farm organizations and agriculture editors of Texas and other Southwestern newspapers, magazines, radio and television stations.

The field day will take place on the J. A. Koch farm on the Hardeman, Childress, Cottle county lines some 14 miles southwest of Quanah in the rolling plains mesquite country at the edge of the Texas panhandle.

Visitors will get a first-hand look at every known method and technique of controlling mesquite and brush including shredding, root plowing, chaining and grubbing and application of chemicals by land machine and airplane.

One of the most impressive demonstrations will be by a mammoth "Billy Goat" machine produced by the R. G. Le Tourneau Company of Longview, Texas that cuts and shreds the brush.

Support for the program has already come from North Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico ranchers who are faced with tremendous economic losses because of mesquite and other brush infestation.

W. C. Howard of Quanah, chairman of the Association, said it is hoped this program will receive the same enthusiastic support from farmers and ranchers in the Southwest that has been received in recent years by the Texas screwworm program.

"We believe that a concentrated and accelerated mesquite eradication research program backed by state and federal funds and from the landowners themselves can be successful."

Lake Meredith Reports Big Catches of Bass

LAKE MEREDITH. Cooler fall weather has stirred Lake Meredith fish to activity with fishermen reporting excellent catches of bass stacked last spring.

Although the fish are small, they are hard biters and offer lots of fishing excitement until the really cold weather sets in. Fishermen interested in fishing the lake can launch their boats at Sanford-Fritch Recreation Area on the south side of the lake or at Blue-West Recreation Area on the north side. Excellent fishing can be had

from the many coves and shore inlets around the lake. Some of the best fishing is being done right off the end of the Fritch-Harbor Bay Road, recently completed to the water's edge. The road is graded for passenger car travel and will be completed with paving and cement gutters by early spring.

Fishermen are warned not to keep walleye pike which are being caught along with black bass at the new lake. The pike, which measures about 10 inches, are on the state game department's protected list of

fish and should be returned promptly to the water if caught. The lake is now holding about 7,500 surface acres of water which is deep and clear. The best time to use the lake is during mid-day when the wind is low and temperatures warm.

Jets, Tanks Train Together at Hood

FORT HOOD (UPI)—Jets and tanks will work together in the training exercises at Ft. Hood the rest of this month and in December.

Jets from Cannon Air Base in New Mexico and England Air Base in Louisiana with fly support missions for the 1st Bn., 67th Armor. The November exercises will be conducted without live ammunition. In December, the jets will use regular bombs, rockets and cannon. The armor battalion will attack simulated enemy objectives with live ammunition.
