
Nineveh was one of the most renowned cities of the ancient world. It was founded by Asshur about the year 2325 B.C. (Genesis 10:11), and was a part of the great realm of Nimrod. It was situated upon the eastern bank of the Tigris River, opposite the city of Mosul, perhaps on the very site of the present-day Nunia, where is located a great ruins and also the so-called tomb of Jonah (see Micah 5:6). How long it was the capital city of the Assrian Empire is not definitely known at this time, but perhaps for several hundred years. But it existed no doubt for more than fifteen hundred years before it became the capital city of Assyria. Nineveh was also a very great of three days' journey" (Jonah 3:3). That is to say, if one journeyed in a straight line across the city, as did prophet Jonah, it required three days' time to pass from one side of the city to the other. This means that the city, including its parks and fields, stretched out for many miles. It may have embraced Calah and Resen at that time. The immense size of the city, moreover, was also emphasized by the number of people (and cattle) within it. The Lord Jehovah, for example, speaks of the 120,000 persons there who "cannot discern between their right hand and their left hand; and also much cattle." But if there were 120,000 children under three years of age in Nineveh at that time, then there must have been between 750,000 and 1,200,000 total inhabitants in the city, besides great herds of cattle.

What is of special significance to us, however, is the fact that Nineveh as the capital city of the Assyrian Empire, swayed, if it did not control, the destiny of many nations in the days of Jeroboam II (825-784 B.C.) when Jonah was commanded to go and preach against its great wickedness. As an intelligent and patriotic, Jew, Jonah was keenly aware also that if God spared the great wicked Gentile city, it would come, someday, against Jerusalem and crush the city as one would crush an eggshell in one's hand.

History, moreover, substantiates this great fear which Jonah felt. For, in one or two generations, Nineveh forgot how she had humbled herself before the warning of the Hebrew prophet, and was again peunging deep in all sorts of sin. About 630. B.C., for example, the prophet Nahum warned Nineven that the anger of Jehovah was flaming against her. Again and again the prophet denounced the sins of this great city (Nahum 1:14; 3:12-17). But Nineveh by this time had grown still greater as a world power, and replied to God's warning by reaching out her hand to grasp and crush Jerusalem! Sennacherib, for example, carried a mighty army into Palestine in 701 B.C. to crush Jerusalem. But when 185,000 of his soldiers perished in one night through a special judgement of God, he withdrew

where, as was predicted by Zephaniah (chapter 2:13) he met other terrible judgements of God, being assassinated by two of his sons and succeeded by a third son. The city of Nineveh, however, remained a great death threat hanging over the life and destiny of Israel until 606 B.C., when it was taken and destroyed by Nabopolassar of Babylon and Cyaxares, king of the Medes. It is fitting, therefore, that we should pause and seek to understand the meaning of the great cities-those of ancient times and those of our own -times

I. THE PREEMINENT PLACE OF THE GREAT CITIES

1. Civilizations have arisen, flourished, and fallen with the great cities-Nineveh, Babylon, Jerusalem, Alexandria, Rome, Athens, Ephesus, Damascus, Tyre and Sidon, Sodom and Gomorrah.

2. The fate of the greatest nations also has from the beginning been bound up with the great cities.

3. Religion likewise has had its greatest foes and found its most wonderful friends in the great cities of the world.

4. The spread of Christianity, in the beginning and its progress today, was and is and will continue to be bound up with the great cities.

So that, as go the great cities of our day, so will go the fate of our nation and our civilization-and to a very large degree the progress of God's kingdom.

II. THE PERPLEXING PROBLEMS OF THE GREAT CITIES

1. We must give Jonah credit for being both intelligent and honest-even if he was out of line with God's program. And there can be no doubt that he was utterly perplexed with the staggering problem of this great wicked city. And so is every honest and intelligent prophet of God in our day who has come to grips with the wickedness of our cities, whether large or small. "I am deeply concerned about the city of Pampa, where I feel that I was sent here by the power of God's, Holy Spirit, 22, years ago."

2. All the great problems of our great cities, however, resolve themselves, after all, into one problem-"Their wickedness", says Jehovah, "has come up before me.'

3. Five factors, however, greatly complicate the problem of the big cities. of the South in our day:

1. The foreign-speaking people-these form 20% of the white population of our Southern cities.

2. The Negroes-these comprise 16% of all the people in our Southern cities today, and the percentage is increasing every year.

3. Churchianity-almost 50% of all the people in our Southern cities are members of some church, and alas, most of them know little of real Christianity!

4. Unreached masses-fully 54% of the people of gospel age (ten years old and up) in our great Southern cities, however, have never been given the gospel in any real sense.

5. Gripped by four wicked tendencies-all the great masses and millions in our Southern cities, moreover, are now in the grip of four sinister and dangerous tendencies: the tendency to industrialize, the tendency to sensualize, the tendency to mammonize, and the tendency to paganize every area of city life.

III. THE PRESSING NEEDS OF THE GREAT CITIES


The great needs of our modern cities are precisely those of the city of Nineveh in Jonah's day:


1. They need the conscious presence of a compassionate God who would save all.

2. They need the faithful warning of a man of God who is a real prophet and messenger of the most high God, full of the Holy Spirit, and knows that fact.


3. They need an old-time call to repentance which will bring an old-time revival and cure every ill of human society, in the cities and out of the cities. They need a revival from Heaven.
