### TV Testimony Slows Critics

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A broad sampling of congressional mail indicates that televised testimony by administration officials may have slowed but it did not halt the heavy flow of criticism of President Johnson's Viet Nam policies.

Last week's testimony of Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor apparently generated no avalanche of new administration support nor any greater increase in overall House-Senate mail than that produced by earlier witnesses before the foreign relations committee.

The spot check indicates, however, that backing for the administration's stand in Viet Nam is stronger in the Southwest and West than in other areas, although the Pacific Coast is spotty.

Another trend in the sampling was that administration support appeared stronger in smaller towns and rural areas. Opposition was concentrated mostly in what might be termed urban centers.

The UPI sampling covered more than three dozen senators and House members, representing both parties and 27 states from Hawaii to Maine. Those sampled ranged from some senators prominent in the televised hearings to members of both Houses who have no public identification with foreign policy.

The results were almost as varied as the people polled.

Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., of the foreign relations committee was deluged with more than 9,000 letters and telegrams only a few days after the last televised hearings. They were running about 17 to 1 in support of his criticisms of administration policies. But the mail from Arkansas was only about 5 to 1 in his favor. He pointed out,

### Boy Pleads Innocent To Plane Hijacking

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — A high school honor student Thursday pleaded innocent to charges he shot up a jetliner and shoved a loaded pistol in the face of a space program official in an attempt to hijack the plane and fly it to Castro Cuba to rescue political refugees.

Thomas Harvey Robinson, 16, of Brownsville, Tex., was charged as an adult under federal piracy laws. Maximum penalty on conviction is death, though this was highly doubtful in his case.

The college professor's son tried to take over a National Airlines DCB jetliner last Nov. 17 shortly after it took off from New Orleans for Melbourne, Fla. Gemini space program spokesman Paul Hanev helped overpower him.

After his arrest, Robinson told authorities he wanted to force the pilot to fly the plane to Castro Cuba so he could help political refugees.

He fired a number of shots from two pistols into the aircraft floor during a 20-minute tirade against Cuban Premier Fidel Castro. A passenger disarmed Robinson when the youth stopped to reload his weapons.

Robinson was charged with assaulting a stewardess with a revolver, intimidating an airline pilot and piracy.

He was being held in Orleans Parish county prison in lieu of \$50,000 bond. He was returned here from the federal reformatory at Ashland, Ky. (See HIJACKING, Page 3)

DENVER (UPI) — Julian Atencio blamed it all on his green thumb, but the judge said the 23-foot marijuana plants in his back yard were bushes of a different color.

"I like to grow things in the back yard—flowers, shrubbery, plants," the 29-year-old Atencio told Dist. Judge Michel Johns. "I heard marijuana could not grow in Colorado, so I decided to try it. The judge sentenced him to 2½ to 5 years on a charge of attempted possession of narcotics.

### Wheeler, Shamrock Businesses Looted

Four Lubbock men were arrested this morning in Childress as suspects in a whirlwind of burglaries and a safe-cracking in Wheeler and Shamrock Thursday night.

Ted Jerrie Valentine, Charles Riley McCafferty, Billy Joe Helms and Donnie McCullar, all of the Lubbock area, were facing burglary charges following their arrest in Childress.

Three Wheeler businesses, were burglarized and a safe at the Production Credit Association of Wheeler was cracked during the night.

The four suspects had more than \$1,000 in their possession at the time they were arrested by a cruising policeman in Childress this morning.

Police believe the suspects traveled from Wheeler to Shamrock where they entered the Strickland Grocery and took four pistols. Police alerted after the Shamrock break-in, apprehended the quartet at a Childress service station.

At present there is no estimate of the total taken in the string of break-ins and the safe-cracking.

The suspects were transferred to Shamrock this morning where the Wheeler County Attorney charged them with the string of thefts.

Pampa police said they could make no connection between local thefts and the four Lubbock men.

Alert police, notified about 3:50 a.m. after the Shamrock break-in, traced the suspects to Childress. They were arrested by a cruising officer at a Childress service station.

### Minimum Wage Fight Shapes Up On Capitol Hill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — It looks like war over the minimum wage between the AFL-CIO and the Johnson administration unless the man in the middle on Capitol Hill can come up with a compromise.

The AFL-CIO Executive Council came out Thursday for a 50-cent increase in the \$1.25 hourly minimum wage by 1968. Federation President George Meany backed that up by telling newsmen the administration plan to advance the wage floor to \$1.60 in two years was "too little and too late."

Even as Meany and his associates were making warlike noises in Miami Beach, a key congressional figure lined up with the President, Chairman Adam Clayton Powell, D-N.Y., of the House Education and Labor Committee endorsed the two-year, \$1.60 approach.

This appeared to give the President the edge at the beginning of the battle. But there were forces at work seeking peace.

Rep. John H. Dent, D-Pa., chairman of the labor subcommittee that will shape the minimum wage legislation, is trying to sell both sides on a compromise.

Dent's plan would not push the minimum wage beyond \$1.60, but it would make the jump from the present level in one year for the majority of employees covered by the wage-hour law.

### Weatherman Says Light Showers Due

Increasing cloudiness should dampen Pampa with showers tonight with considerable cloudiness and a good chance for more rain on Saturday. Pampa was expected to warm today to a high of 60 degrees after a low temperature of in the middle 30-degree range. Saturday will be cooler with a high in the low 50s. Westerly winds from 15 to 20 m.p.h. will push the rain showers over the Pampa area through Saturday.

### Future Juvenile Precedent Rests On Court Decision

BRYAN, Tex. (UPI) — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals will decide soon on the case of a Bryan youth that may set a precedent for handling of juvenile cases.

The case involves Charlie Lee Foster. He was sent to the Gatesville State (reform) School for Boys at Gatesville when he was 15 on a theft charge.

In committing theft, he killed Marion J. Tremont. Having reached 17, Foster was tried as an adult and sent to prison for life for murder.

Lawyers Elmer McVey and Bill Thornton appealed the case. They argued before the Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday. At issue is whether a person who commits a crime as a juvenile can be tried as an adult when he reaches 17 and punished as though he had been an adult when the crime was committed.

An amendment to the juvenile act which became effective last August has been interpreted two ways.

One group believes it means juveniles under 16 when they commit a crime cannot be tried for the offense when they reach 17. Another group holds they can.

### Two Opponents Of Wallace's Wife Name Candidates

MONTGOMERY (UPI) — Two political opponents of Alabama's Gov. George C. Wallace were expected to announce today their candidacies to oppose the bid of Wallace's wife, Lurleen, to run for governor.

Atty. Gen. Richmond Flowers and State Sen. Bob Gilchrist, both foes of Wallace, scheduled separate news conferences today in which they were expected to announce their candidacies for the governor's chair.

Wallace, under Alabama law cannot succeed himself when his four-year term ends in January. Thursday he held a news conference to announce that his wife will seek the post.

### Congressional Medal Of Honor Given to Sergeant

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson has awarded the second Medal of Honor of the war in Viet Nam to an Army sergeant who threw himself on a grenade to save his men.

Johnson presented the nation's highest honor bravery Thursday to the widow of Staff Sgt. Larry S. Pierce, 24, of Wasco, Calif.

The President promised Mrs. Pierce and her three children that "none of us shall falter in our purpose until we have secured the kind of world for which Sgt. Pierce gave his young and gallant life."

Pierce died Sept. 20, 1965, near Ben Cat, South Viet Nam, when a patrol he was leading was ambushed by the Viet Cong. The men of Pierce's platoon put the Communists to flight, but as they gave chase, the sergeant spotted a grenade on the road.

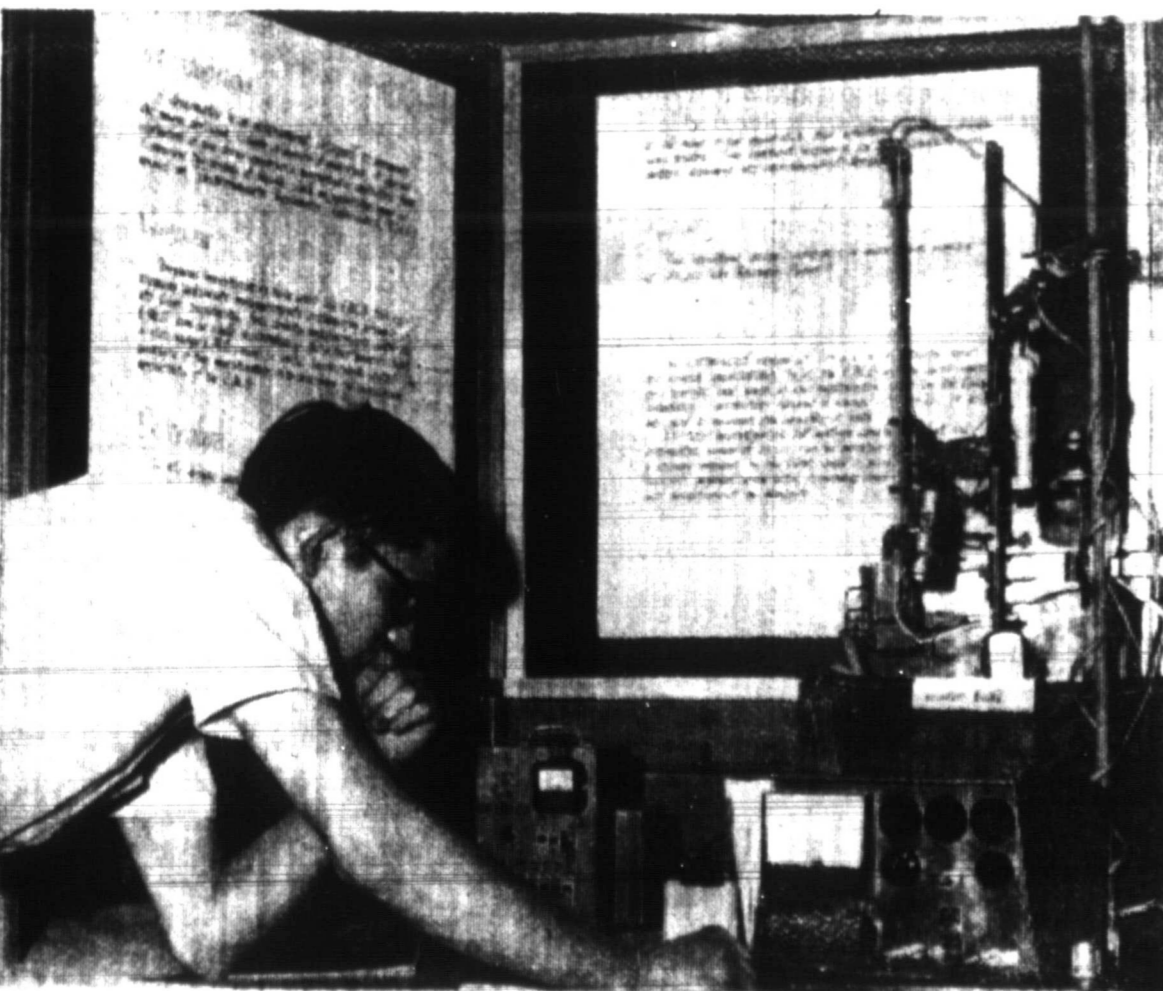
It was too late to throw the grenade aside or to warn the others in his squad. Pierce threw himself on it as it exploded. He was credited with saving the lives of his comrades.

Pierce became the 2,196th American serviceman to receive the award formerly known as the Congressional Medal of Honor. It was established 104 years ago to recognize military men who risk their lives "above and beyond the call of duty."

The first Medal of Honor to be awarded in the Viet Nam conflict went to Army Capt. Roger H. C. Donien, a member of the Army elite Special Forces counter-insurgency troops. He received it Dec. 8, 1964.

Judges at the Pampa High School Science Fair late this forenoon neared completion of their task of picking winners in the four-division exhibition.

The fair opened to the public at 12:30 p.m. and will remain open until 9 p.m. today. On Saturday, the exhibit's final day, the public is invited from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m.

The four divisions for the Science Fair are: primary, for grades 1 through 3; intermediate, for grades 4 through 6; junior, for grades 7 through 9; and senior, for grades 10 through 12.

Thirty judges from Pampa and over the Panhandle viewed projects in chemistry, biochemistry, zoology, botany, medicine and health, earth and space, math, physics and computers.

Seven of the winning projects in the high school divisions will be selected for entry at the Regional Science Fair in Amarillo. Five entries from each junior high school and four from the elementary grades in Pampa will also be selected for the Amarillo competition.

Avril Doucette, now a freshman at Texas U. and Kent Clark, a senior, were winners last year of the chance to attend the National Science Fair. Clark has another entry in this year's fair.

**NEW YORK** —General Electric and Eastman Kodak both reported sharply increased sales and earnings for 1965. GE, for the first time, consolidated reports of its foreign operations with domestic operation. The result indicated that GE has been losing money abroad.

**SEOUL (UPI)** —South Viet Nam formally asked South Korea Monday to increase its 20,000-man military contingent now fighting in Viet Nam.

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# Pampan Receives Second Highest Peacetime Medal

The second highest medal this nation awards in peacetime has been presented to Col. Albert M. Nash, a former Pampa resident.

Colonel Nash is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Nash, 721 N. West.

Known locally to his friends as "Boogie", Nash was presented the Legion of Merit at Continental Army Headquarters at Fort Monroe, Virginia.

Nash attended school in Pampa and entered the Army in 1940 as a private. Colonel Nash has just returned from Korea and Viet Nam. While in Korea he trained the Korean division now serving in South Vietnam. After leaving Korea he served with the Tiger Division in Vietnam and is now stationed at Headquarters, Continental Army, Ft. Monroe, Va.

In addition to the Legion of Merit Colonel Nash has received letters of appreciation from Generals Cho Moon Hwan, Chang Chang Kuk and Chae Myung Shin of the Republic of Korea.  er than they had been in a week.

The exception was parts of East Texas, where it was up to 10 degrees chillier than on Thursday.

Early morning temperatures ranged between the 20s in the Panhandle and the low 40s along the Gulf Coast.

A few showers were expected by nightfall in the Panhandle and a buildup of clouds everywhere except extreme Southwest Texas.

A general warmup was expected through Saturday.

It was a generally mild day across the state Thursday with temperatures ranging from 59 at Beaumont to 46 at Junction.

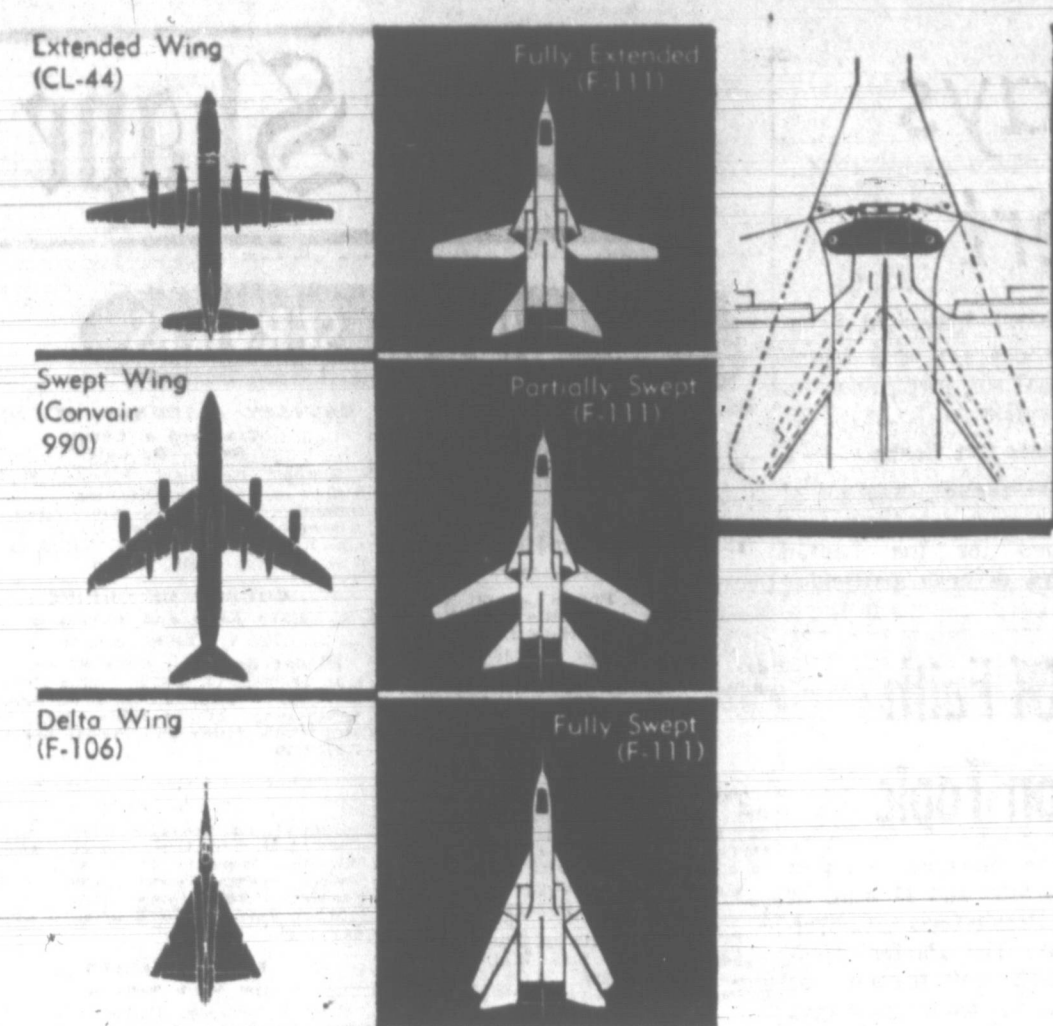
A heavy snow storm swept into New England today after dumping five to nine inches of snow along the eastern slope of the Appalachians from western North Carolina north through Pennsylvania.

Snow also whitened much of the high country of the West, with up to six inches of new snow reported in central Nevada. Snow flurries accompanied a new invasion of arctic air into the upper Midwest and northern Great Lakes region.

Mississippi River flood waters leveled off at 16.62 feet shortly before midnight Thursday in the Davenport, Iowa-Rock Island, Ill., areas; but the level was still more than a foot and a half over flood stage.

The weather bureau issued heavy snow warnings for accumulations of four inches or more this morning for New England, eastern Pennsylvania, and the inland sections of southeastern New York and New Jersey.

The weather bureau reported snow depths of 13 inches at Charlottesville, Va., 8 inches at Washington Dulles International Airport and also at Martinsburg, W. Va., Harrisburg and Allentown, Pa.



### SWINGING WING

Key to the versatility of the new F-111 fighter is the 14-foot steel yoke, diagramed above right, on which the wings pivot to achieve the basic wing configurations of conventional planes, compared with F-111 in drawings at left. Fully extended wings, top, permit short take-offs with heavy loads but limit flight speed. Partially swept wing, middle, gives less lift but more efficient flight at greater speeds. Fully swept delta wing, bottom, permits supersonic speeds. In F-111, combining all advantages in one plane, the yoke and 8 1/2-inch diameter pins linking it to wings support entire weight of plane in flight.

 where he was sent Nov. 30 for a mental examination.

Asst. U.S. Atty. Jack Ciolino said Robinson had been found mentally competent and able to assist in his own defense. Defense attorney Robert J. Ziblich said a private psychiatrist confirmed the opinion.

Federal Judge Herbert W. Christenberry told Robinson at his arraignment he could be sentenced to prison for any number of years on the first two counts of the indictment against him. However, the judge said he could, at his discretion, sentence Robinson under the youth corrections act to at least four years in prison.

### Heavy Maximum Penalty

The piracy charge carries a minimum penalty of 25 years imprisonment and a maximum penalty of death.

Robinson boarded the airplane at Houston, along with a group of key men from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Manned Spacecraft Center. Among them was Gemini mission director Christopher Kraft.

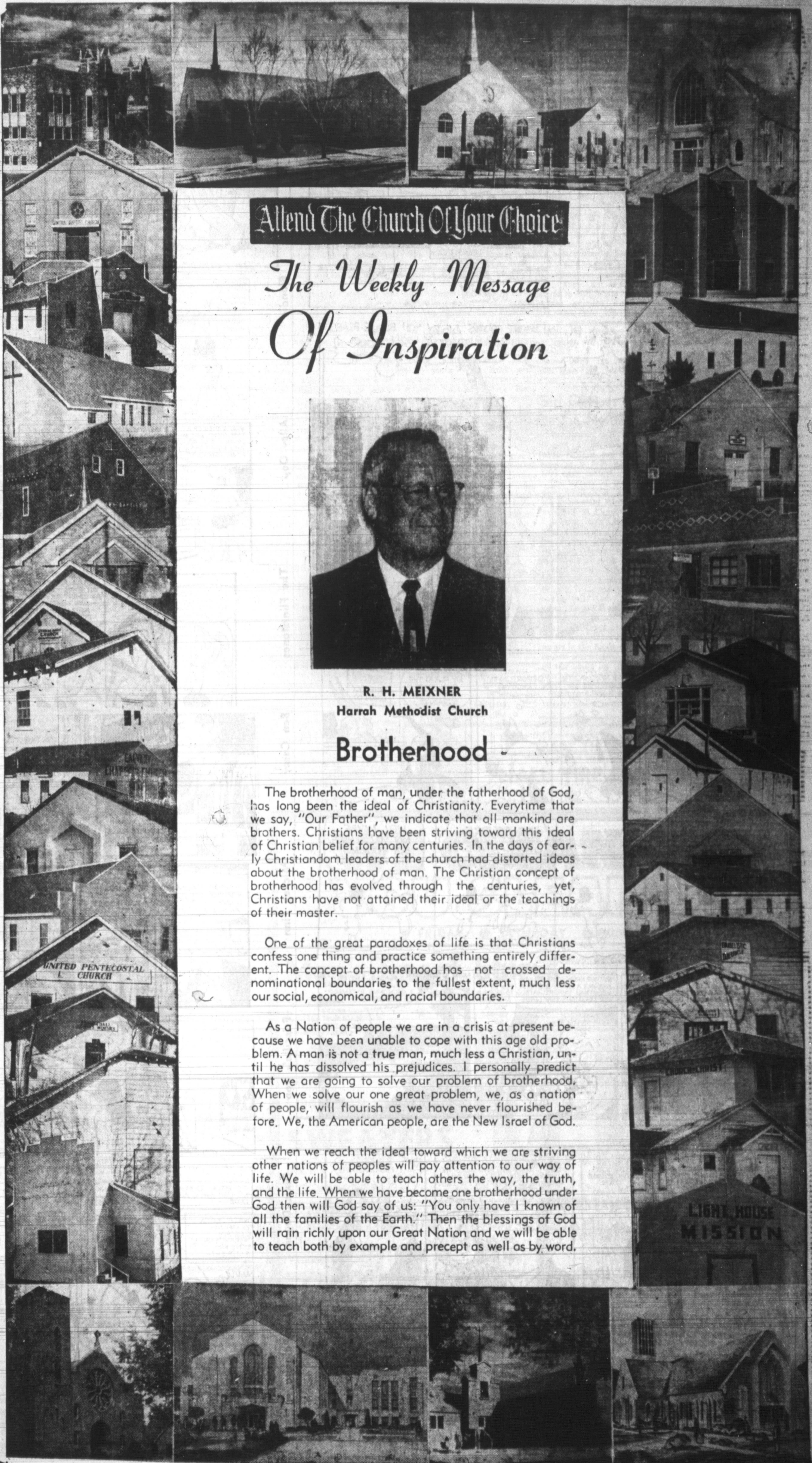
## Brotherhood
