WASHINGTON (UPI) --- Resumption of U.S. air attacks on North Viet Nam appeared imminent today.

The prospect of a presidential order to resume the attacks came after disclosure that the North Vietnamese have used the 34-day lull in the bombing to undertake an unprecedented buildup of rebel forces in the South.

The bombing pause was discussed at a 21/2 hour meeting Tuesday night between President Johnson and congressional leaders. Johnson gave the lawmakers a grim report on the failure of his peace offensive and the increasing danger to U.S. forces.


