Foreign Commentary

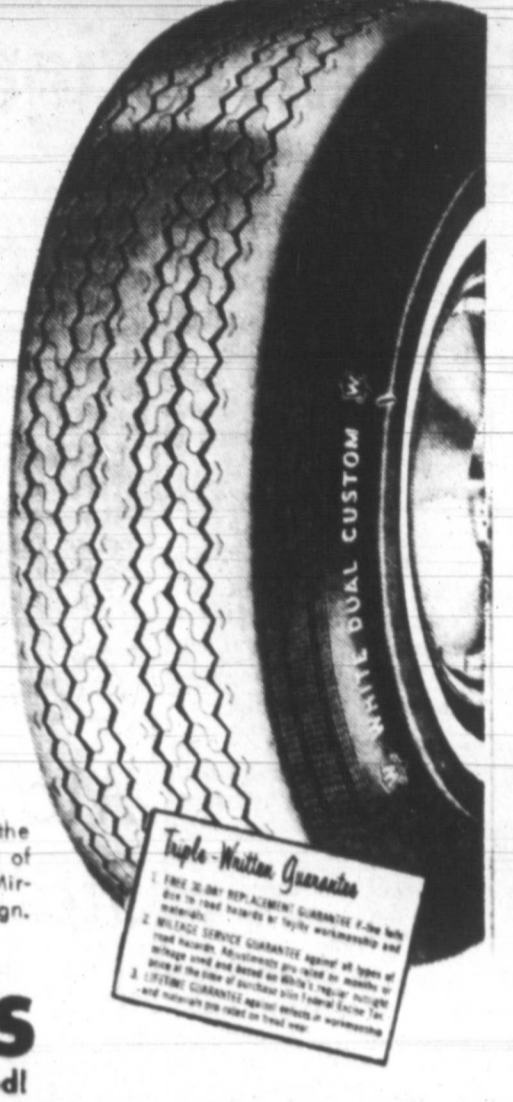

An American diplomat in Warsaw, remarking on the continuing high church attendance in Communist Poland, explained it by saying "The church is in the heart of Poles."
Since the end of World War II when by treachery the Russians established a Communist government in Warsaw, the Roman Catholic Church in Poland has been an anti-Communist rallying point and therefore an object both of oppression and suspicion.
And it was not entirely unsuspected that Polish church-state relations should plunge to a new low at the moment devoted Poles were preparing to celebrate the 1000th anniversary of Polish Christianity dated from the conversion of Prince Mieszko in 966.
The Polish government withdrew the diplomatic passport of Stefan Cardinal Wysynski almost on the eve of his departure for Rome to report to Pope Paul VI on the progress of plans for an unprecedented papal visit to Poland during the anniversary year.
Warsaw reports said the passport was withdrawn on charges that the cardinal engaged in activities harmful to the state during his last visit to Rome.
Presumably the allegation referred to a letter sent by Polish bishops from Rome to the bishops of West Germany inviting them to participate in the anniversary celebration and to work toward Polish-German reconciliation.
Government newspapers angrily accused the bishop of meddling in foreign policy.
Regarding Communist Poland, there generally has been a misconception.
Apparent Breakaway
The misconception arises from 1956 when Communist party leader Wladyslaw Gomulka, rehabilitated after imprisonment on charges of Titoism, defied Nikita Khrushchev, the then Soviet premier, and launched Poland on what appeared to be a course of liberalized and independent Communism based on nationalism.

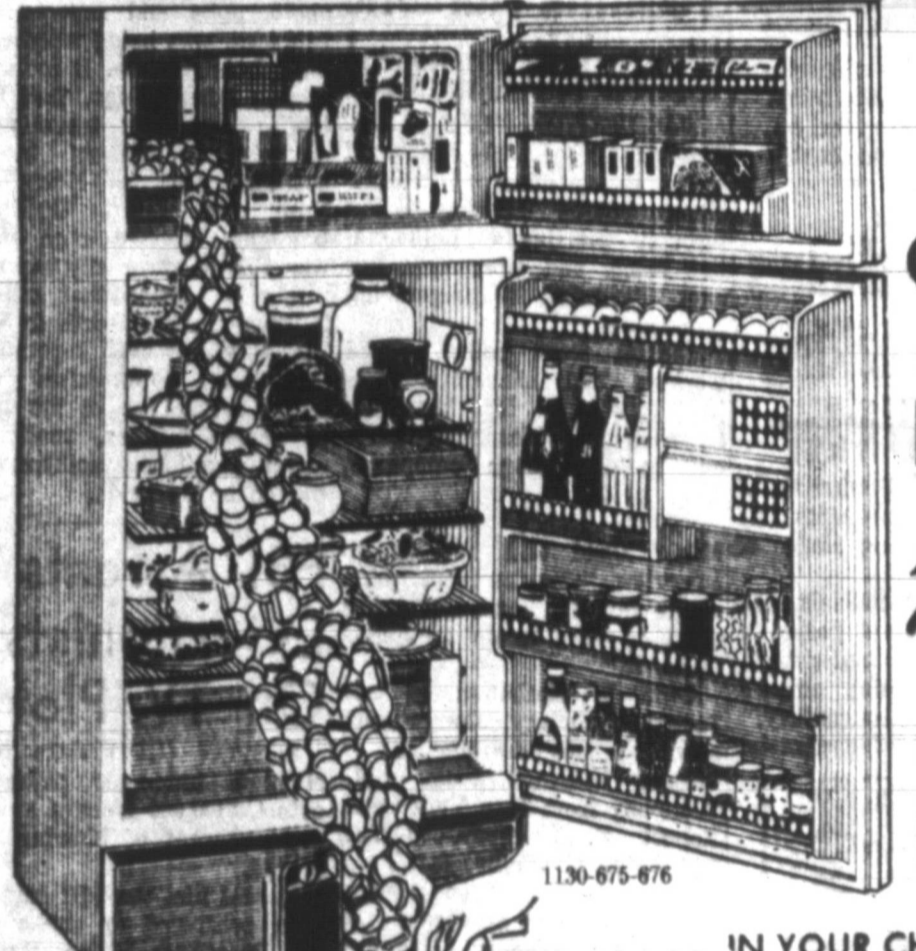

Narcotics Traffic Has Made State Bargain Basement

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A California official charged today the federal government has ignored Mexican narcotics traffic until his state has become a bargain basement for addicts and peddlers.
California Atty. Gen. Thomas C. Lynch made the charge in testimony prepared for the Senate narcotics subcommittee. Atty. Gen. Nicholas DeB. Katzenbach was also scheduled to appear before the session.
The group opened hearings today to consider proposals dealing with the rehabilitation of persons charged under federal narcotics laws. But Lynch had little praise for the current federal role in narcotics enforcement.
"We in California are very close to being embittered over this situation," Lynch said. Despite promises, he said there had been no effective effort to halt the flow of heroin, marijuana, barbiturates and other drugs across the 150 mile Mexico-California border.
"For seven years, California has begged for relief from this situation, which has placed heroin and marijuana and dangerous drugs on our streets at prices lower than any place in the United States," Lynch said.
He said California has thrown ten times the number of men the Federal Narcotics Bureau was using into the fight against the traffic. "But there is a limit even to our efforts. We are still waiting for the federal government to come into the fight."
BACK HOME AGAIN
SAN QUENTIN, Calif. (UPI) — San Quentin prison has its star artist back again.
He is Carl Pramborg, 38, who, during 11 years in San Quentin built a \$12,000 fortune from the sale of his paintings in the annual prison art show until he was released on parole 17 months ago.
Back in San Quentin for carrying a concealed gun, Pramborg explained that in the outside world "things sort of closed in on me... a lot of the time I just didn't feel I belonged out there."

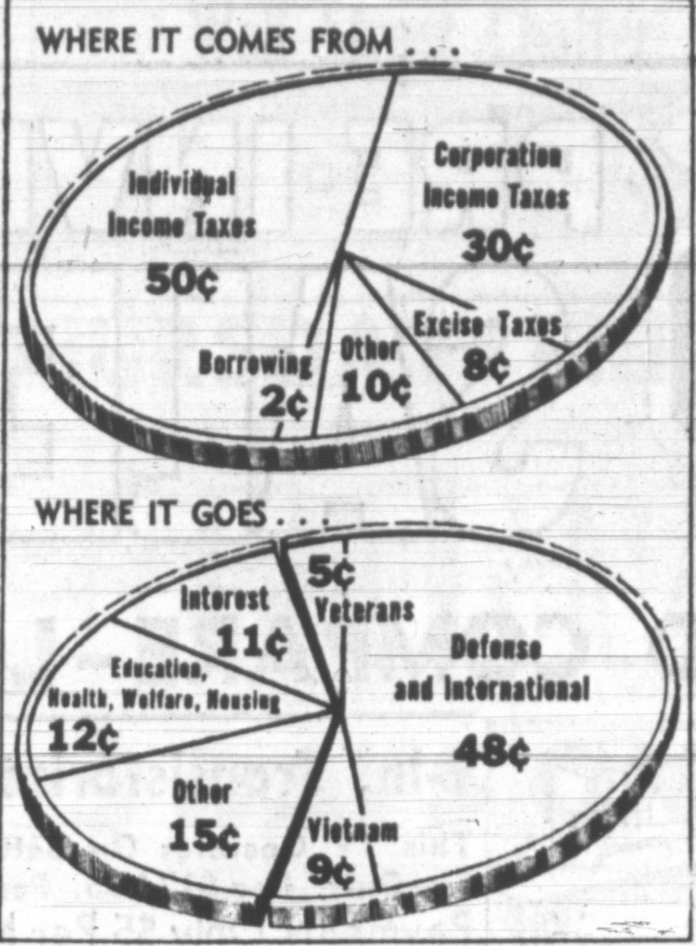

Jury Wrestles With Medical Controversy

By United Press International A federal district court jury today wrestled with a mountain of evidence in trying to reach a verdict in one of the strangest and most bitter controversies in modern American medicine.

The jury must decide, in effect, whether a once-venerated and aging physiologist, Dr. Andrew C. Ivy, and his associates opened new doors of hope for cancer sufferers or perpetrated a "gigantic confidence game" in their support of the drug Krebiozen.

The federal government, which contends the drug has no effect on cancer, charged Ivy and three other men with conspiracy, mail fraud, mislabeling and giving false information.

After nearly nine months of testimony, U.S. District Judge Julius J. Hoffman handed the case to the jurors at 4:46 p.m. CST Tuesday.

The jury deliberated for 5 hours and 14 minutes before retiring for the night. They resumed at 9 a.m. today.

Informed sources estimated it may take the jury three days to come to a decision.

For Ivy, the white-haired researcher who represented U.S. medicine at the Nuremberg trials and who staked his professional reputation on Krebiozen, his long battle on behalf of the mysterious drug neared another watershed.

"I'm willing to go to jail on the basis of my convictions," he once told a reporter. "I won't be the first scientist to be burned at the stake."

College Cheating Scandal Brewing

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (UPI) - University of Miami officials questioned students today hoping to learn how many freshmen cheated on exams which were stolen before test-time and sold for as much as \$40 a copy.

"If it is determined that cheating was widespread the tests will have to be re-given," Armin Gropp, the university's vice president for academic studies, said.

The school revealed Tuesday that copies of exams, one for a course attended by more than 2,000 students were stolen from a professor's desk. Two students have confessed to buying copies.

The cribbing incident was one of several being investigated at colleges which recently held winter exams. But none apparently were of the proportion of last year's winter cheating scandal which led to the resignation of 109 cadets from the Air Force Academy in Colorado.

At Rhode Island University, officials said students obtained copies or mimeograph stencils of two examinations by rummaging through trash barrels. But this became known before testing, and the exams were changed.

At the University of Maine, about 100 of 700 students taking an introductory psychology exam finished the two-hour test in 30 minutes, turning in perfect or near-perfect papers. But officials said students apparently memorized "crib files" based on previous tests.

An investigation underway at Monmouth College in New Jersey more closely paralleled that taking place here. Monmouth officials said they were checking reports that copies of final exams were stolen and sold to students.

The NRA-Backed Firearms Bill: What Kind of Job Will It Do?

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — It shouldn't be said that the National Rifle Assn. is against any form of gun control legislation.

Its leadership freely admits the need of a law and it officially backing a three-part proposal sponsored by Rep. Robert Casey, D-Tex. The proposal has been called "the toughest gun bill in Congress."

And, indeed, it is tough. Basically, the bill would make it a federal offense to use a gun in specified criminal acts, ranging from robbery and assault to kidnapping and rape. First-time offenders would face a mandatory 10-year prison term; repeat offenders, a mandatory 25 years.

Under the Casey bill, roughly 100,000 gun crimes handled last year by state and local police would require investigation and prosecution by federal law enforcement officers.

The bill reflects the NRA belief that the only justifiable firearms laws are those providing stronger penalties for the criminal use of guns and that preventive measures, such as a registration requirement, would neither stop criminals from getting guns nor reduce crime.

Sen. Thomas Dodd, D-Conn., who has his own bill in the congressional hopper, is not in favor of the NRA-backed bill, to put it mildly.

"I wonder," he muses, "whether the NRA, in supporting legislation it knows stands little chance of becoming law, is just supporting a gimmick to see that no new legislation is passed."

The senator continues: "Such a law, if strictly enforced and if upheld by the courts, would present staggering administrative problems."

A conservative guess is that the existing federal enforcement staff would have to be

tripled in size to cope with the Casey bill requirements. If only a third of last year's offenders were convicted under the bill, the existing federal prison system capacity would have to be expanded by 150 per cent.

Most congressional observers agree that the bill's chances of being passed are virtually nonexistent.

The second NRA proposal would make it a federal offense for a licensed dealer or manufacturer to ship a gun in contravention of a state law.

But only seven states now require a permit to purchase a pistol or revolver. There are no restrictions on the sales of rifles and shotguns. And the NRA proposal apparently gives a shipper of guns an easy out, since no conviction could be obtained if he made a "reasonable effort" to learn if a state law is being violated.

Such "reasonable effort" is now construed as simply requiring a signed statement by the purchaser to the effect that he is under no legal disability which would prohibit shipment.

The third NRA proposal would provide federal control of such military ordnance as bazookas, grenades, cannons and rockets. These weapons would be subject to a \$200 transfer tax and registration with the Treasury Department which enforces federal gun laws.

This proposal looks fine on the surface, but — under NRA specifications — such weapons as the .50-caliber machine gun and six antitank guns currently advertised in mail-order catalogs would be excluded, Senator Dodd says.

Hunting, target and trap shooting are big business in the United States today. Their devotees spend roughly \$250 million a year on guns, ammunition and accessories. The side

effects probably produce more than a billion dollars annually for the makers of cars, boats, fuel and clothes.

It is estimated that there are about 54 million guns of various kinds in private possession in the country today. Each year this number is increased by domestic manufacture and swollen by a flood of firearms from abroad — mostly the discarded military models of foreign governments imported to be sold cheaply by mail-order merchants.

Originally formed to promote proficiency in rifle shooting, the NRA over the years has become the chief defender of the citizen's right to "keep and bear arms."

This crusade is based on what reading of the second amendment to the Constitution — which constitutional experts say was intended to safeguard only the people's collective right to bear arms as members of a militia.

Despite modern armed forces, a National Guard and local police, the NRA argues that an armed citizenry is necessary to defend the country against enemies both within and without.

The NRA stands squarely on the premise that the ownership of firearms must not be denied Americans of good repute. To this end, the organization says it carefully screens its membership applicants.

Each must certify that he is over 18, has never been convicted of a crime of violence and is not a member of any organization which seeks to overthrow the government. Each applicant must also be endorsed by an NRA member, a public official or a military officer of the United States.

This reporter joined the NRA by filling out an application he clipped from a barbershop magazine and enclosing a check for \$5. Presumably he was carefully screened. His NRA membership card arrived in the mail less than a week later.

The endorsement? The reporter printed the name "William Miller," one common enough to fit one of the NRA specifications.

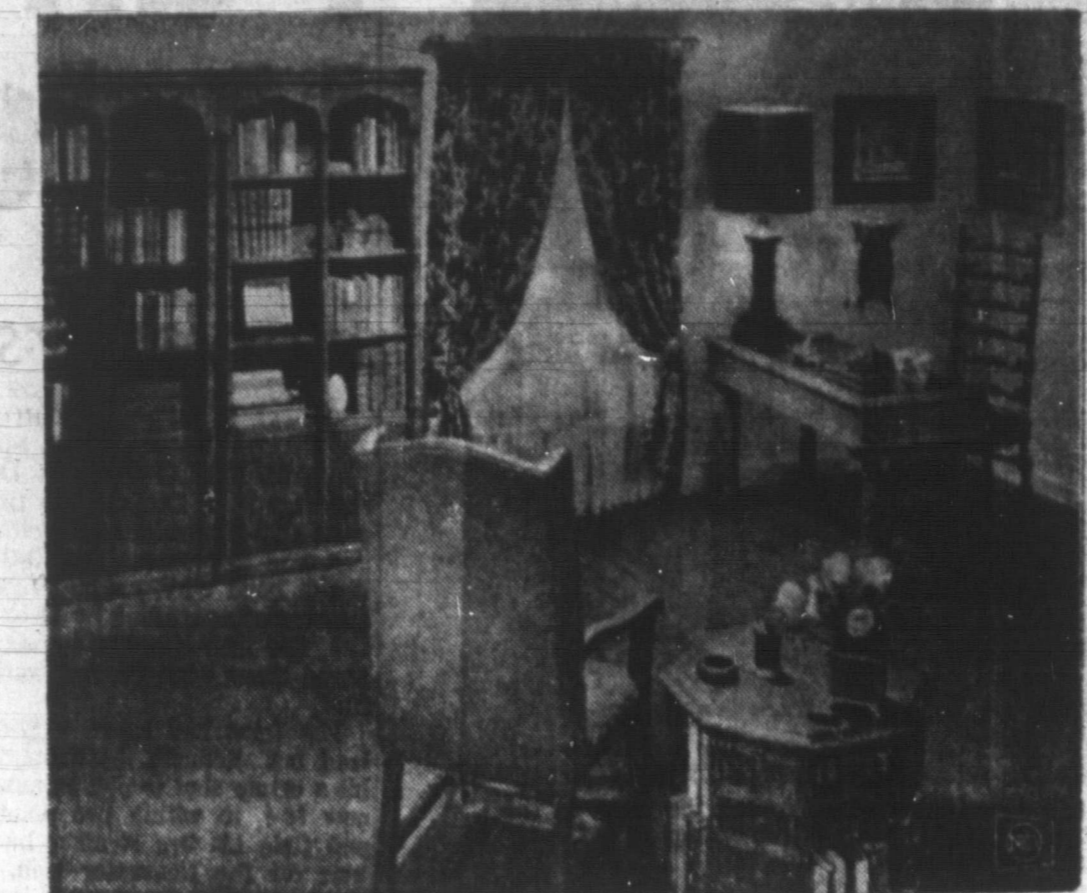
New Now Are Old, Classic Designs

"Classic" is the tipoff word for the look in new home furnishings which we will be seeing in retail stores later this winter.

Gardening News

This is the time of the year when any decorative addition to the landscape close by the house is more than welcome. The bleak stretches of wintry gold lawn and the chilly looking terrace are a far cry from midsummer's comfortable chairs and canvas-covered chaise and geranium pots. To remedy this situation round up some attractive large containers. Fill them with sand, dampened, and then plant a handsome armful of freshly cut evergreen branches in each pot. Place them on either side of the door and some on the terrace, and the scene shouldn't look quite so bleak. This idea was suggested by a writer in "House and Garden" magazine and sounds like a good one. It's worth a try. Water the sand regularly so the branches will stay fresh longer. Naturally the branches should be placed in an attractive way with the tall branches in the center or back of the container and the shorter lengths graduated on down with the short ones near the mouth of the container.

When snow is on the ground, the children may have to spend more time in the house; a delightful way to entertain, educate and entrance them is to let them keep a supply of food available to the birds, at a place so the child can watch them feed. As snow accumulates on the feeding station, it should be swept off before the feed is placed there.
