

## 2 Men Killed, 5 Hurt In Gainesville Fire

### Man Not Identified

#### Two Names Given: Hurts Not Serious

#### Auto Theft Suspects Held In Jail After Saturday Chase

Complete identification of a man who was shot and captured here Saturday night after driving a stolen automobile into the concrete landing platform of the Texas and Pacific railway, at the end of Security street, had not been made by Howard county officers at noon today.

The man, shot through the right forearm, and injured about the head and face, is in the Howard county jail. He was removed there Saturday night after his injuries and wounds were dressed.

According to local officers, the man has given two names. One of them was Francis Gray, the other Bob Page.

#### PRORATION AND TAX MEASURES APPEAR KILLED

AUSTIN, May 18 (UP)—Oil proration and tax legislation sponsored by the legislature and introduced in the House today as a result of a motion that the House consider only a bill on this subject for the rest of the session, scheduled to end Friday.

No action has been taken on the motion but, should it be adopted it would definitely end the careers of the proration bill and additional tax measures.

No bill on oil proration has been passed by the Senate and revenue and taxation measures must originate in the House.

#### Court Orders Three Bailed

#### Corsican Kidnap Suspects Gain Freedom By Appeal

AUSTIN, May 18 (UP)—The court of criminal appeals today ordered granting of bail to Currie Caldwell, Joseph and Doyle Nash, charged with kidnaping of Robert Chief, Corsican. The court held the case was a bailable one, since the death penalty could not be given since the alleged crime was committed last December prior to the legislature's enactment of a statute making kidnaping a capital offense.

#### First American Wounded In War Is Slain By Wife

NEW ORLEANS, May 18 (UP)—Eugene Bouffard, 45, photographer and the first American wounded in the world war, was shot and killed today by his wife at their apartment here. Mrs. Bouffard said she shot her husband as the climax to years of quarreling and threat upon her life.

#### Governor Signs Thirty-Five Bills

AUSTIN, May 18 (UP)—Governor Sterling today signed thirty-five bills, including a measure to give liquor law violators over 25 years of age benefit of the suspended sentence law. Violators under 20 already are entitled to suspended sentences.

#### Many Improvements Made In Ojinaga, Mex.

OHINAGA, Mexico, May 18 (UP)—This sister city to Pecos, Texas, has been making improvements recently. A new bridge has been built over the Rio de la Zapita which lies between Ojinaga and the railway. Under the administration of Norberto Acosta, mayor, new municipal buildings have been erected. Even a new judge has arrived from Chihuahua to handle the affairs of government.

The wheat crop on the banks of the Rio Choncho is good, and in addition there is growing corn, cotton as well as truck gardening.

#### FAMILIES LARGER

MEREPOND, Texas, May 18 (UP)—The theory that the size of the average American family is decreasing, based on figures in large cities which show fewer scholars between the ages of 6 and 11 than between 12 and 15, does not harmonize with figures in Dent Smith county.

The recent scholastic enumeration gives 273 children between 6 and 11, compared with 294 in the next division. There were more 6-year-olds than in any other age class.

Enumerators for the rural districts accounted for 667 scholars, compared with 691 a year ago.

#### Tentative Plan To Increase Use Of Cotton Formed

AUSTIN, May 18 (UP)—A tentative plan of organization including a "cotton council" of districts, has been drawn up by the committee on organization for the Texas division, Association for Increased Use of Cotton, J. E. McDonald, commissioner of agriculture and vice-president of the association, announced today.

The organization committee proposed that the board of directors include officials, representatives of at least thirty state organizations, all of which have a direct or indirect interest in the prosperity of the cotton farmer.

Organization of the Texas division will be completed at a meeting in Houston May 22.

Suggested as directors were officials of the following institutions or state-wide organizations:

Texas A. & M. College, the Experiment Station, Home Demonstration Agents Division, Extension Service; State Department of Agriculture; Bureau of Business Research; University of Texas; Cotton Cooperative Association; Cotton Seed Producers Association; Cotton Seed Crushers Association; Texas Managing Editors Association; Texas Press Association; Federation of Women's Clubs; Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs; Wholesale Grocers Association; Certified Cotton Seed Breeders Association; State Manufacturers Association; Cotton Sugarland Industries; Home Economics branch of the National Teacher Association; Cattle Raisers Association; Progressive Teachers; Inc.; State Federation of Labor; Retail Merchants Association; State Ginners' Association; and State Bankers Association.

In addition there would be a representative of mills manufacturing commercial goods, oil mills, fertilizer manufacturers and a representative cotton merchant.

The object of the association as set forth in the tentative by-laws, is "to encourage and promote the use of cotton in the wrapping of cotton bales; for packing fertilizer, flour, sugar, feedstuffs, cement and other products in cotton bales; to encourage the use of cotton in draperies, house furnishings, wearing apparel, paper, twine, rope, and all other ways in which cotton, or its by-products may be suitably used."

#### Brakeman Says "It Hailed Fish"

DE RIO, Texas, May 18 (QNS)—Believe it or not, but it hailed fish in the Longfellow and Sanderson district during a snow hail storm this week. Jimmy Snow, Southern Pacific brakeman, is authority.

"It isn't a fish story. They were thick on the ground and everybody in Sanderson went out to pick themselves a mess of frozen fish."

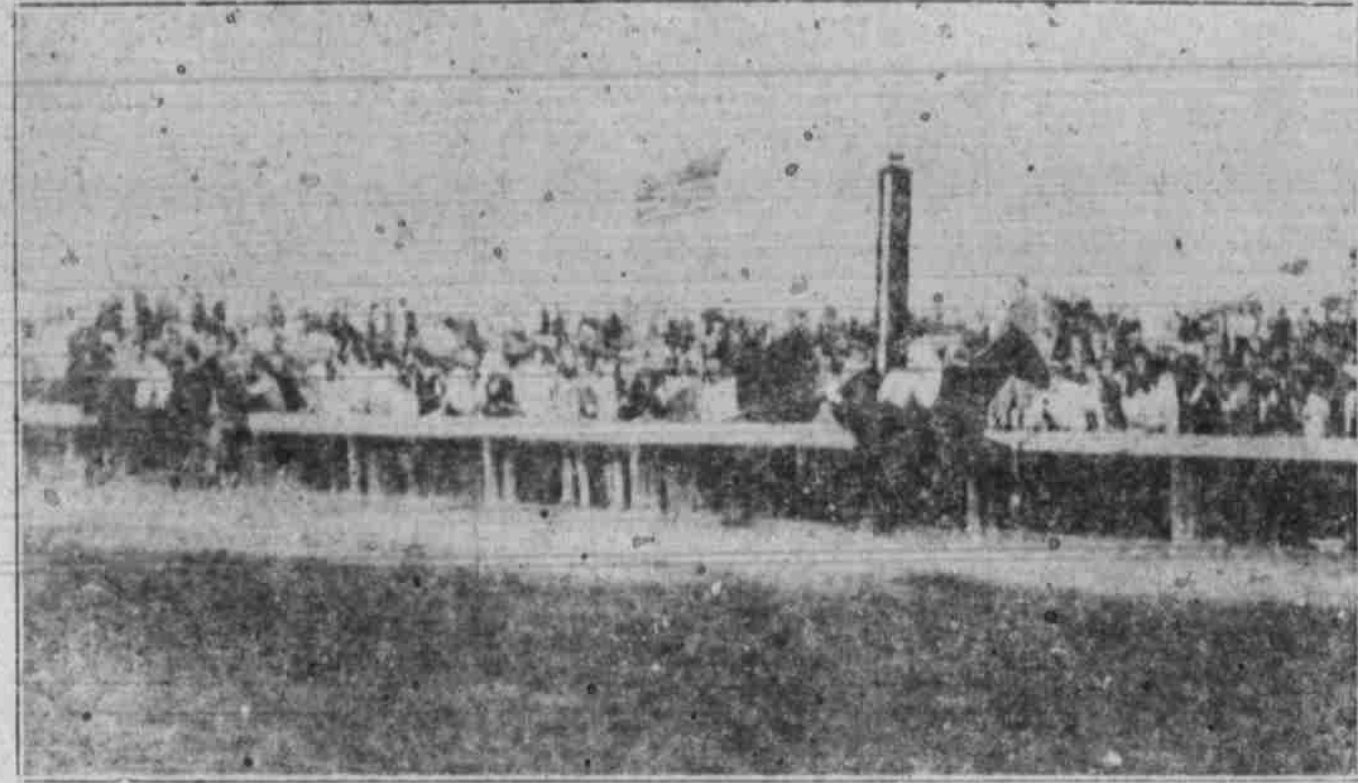

## Brownfield Banker Found Dead

### Morgan L. Copeland, President Of South Plains Bankers, Had Been In Failing Health, Gun Found By Body

BROWNFIELD, May 18 (UP)—Morgan L. Copeland, vice-president of the Brownfield State bank, was shot and killed here today.

A gun was found beside him. He had been in failing health several months.

Mr. Copeland, one of the most successful and highly respected bankers of this section of the state, was elected president of the South Plains Bankers Association at its convention held here last month. Although not in attendance at the convention, he was the only name entered for the presidency.

Local bankers said they had known of Mr. Copeland's failing health. He was about 35 years old and as executive in charge of operation of the Brownfield bank had been successful.

B. Reagan, president of the West Texas National Bank, Big Spring, as vice president, is the high-ranking officer following death of Mr. Copeland.

### Her Photo On Stamps

DALLAS, May 18 (UP)—The twenty-seventh regular and eighth annual meeting of the Southwest Shippers Advisory Board will be held in conjunction with the Panhandle Grain Dealers Association at Amarillo, Thursday and Friday, May 21 and 22. The shippers meeting will be presided over by General Chairman, Frank A. Leffingwell, secretary of the Southwestern Industrial Traffic League, Dallas. Chairman R. L. McClelland of Spearman, will preside over the grain dealers meeting.

There will be a special discussion of pertinent factors relating to the season's wheat crop, movement, storage and markets, led by Harry L. Keenan, grain executive of Amarillo. This subject has to do with the acreage and yield of the 1931 crop, early markets, mill demand, export demand, damp wheat, car shipment, proper cooperating and handling, inspection, campaigns and future storage. Railroads in the southwest will report on car supply, service equipment and improvements and will be present to get first hand information as to the part they are expected to play in the handling of this traffic.

L. M. Betts, manager of the closed car section, car service division, American Railway Association, will outline general railroad conditions in the entire country. R. W. Edwards, district manager of the rail carrier division, Dallas, will report for Southwestern territory. Joe Marshall, special representative of the freight claim division, American Railway Association, will present a paper on freight claim prevention.

### Comptroller Seeks System

AUSTIN, Texas, May 18 (INS)—George H. Sheppard, state comptroller, has served notice on all persons attempting to defraud his department in the handling of state warrants.

Following the arrest and return to Austin of Claude Ray, Upshur county district clerk, Sheppard issued a statement declaring it was his intention to bring to justice all of those who may be found guilty of violating the law in dealing with this department.

Upshur was the third case involving alleged forgery in connection with state warrants. Two men committed suicide and a third man under indictment on nine counts in the other two cases.

Ray was brought here by Ranger Robert G. Goss, accompanied by Comptroller Sheppard.

When I assumed the office of state comptroller, Sheppard said, "I did so with the belief that a real service could be rendered by this department."

"Immediately after taking office I began to make a general survey of conditions and found it was necessary to inaugurate the proper reorganization of the department and audits of accounts under the system in use in the manner in which they should be audited before payment of same was made."

"I did the best I could until the convening of the 42nd legislature, at which time I made a request to the legislature for an emergency appropriation to set up my reorganization and install a proper system which would prevent these forgeries."

### Sheppard Finds Numerous Lax Methods In Use By Department

HOUSTON, May 18 (UP)—The U. S. Coast Guard will arrive here May 20 to participate in the three-day Houston cotton festival. Rear Admiral T. P. Maczudon, stationed at New Orleans in charge of the eighth naval district, has advised local officials.

The Coast Guard carries a skeleton crew of five officers and about 50 men. It recently was attached to the naval reserve after service with the Pacific fleet.

### GUARD UNIT TRANSFERRED

AMARILLO, Texas, May 18 (UP)—The transfer of the second battalion of the Texas National Guard to this city from Claude, brought the number of Amarillo's guard units to six.

The band section of the 112nd Infantry, around which the famous "Old Gray Mule" band of Brownfield formerly was built, also has been transferred to Amarillo.

#### Front Wall Of Building Collapses

#### \$150,000 Damage Done: Motor And Hardware Firms Suffer

GAINESVILLE, May 18 (UP)—Two men were killed and five others injured today in a fire which destroyed the building housing the Trew Brothers Motor company and Keweenaw Hardware company. Loss was estimated at \$150,000.

The dead were H. C. Talley, foreman for the Texas Power Light company, and Wayne Williams, 28, railroad repair operator.

The injured were William Bloss, Eric Giles, Raymond Powell, Morris Finley, all of Gainesville, and Robert Young of Marysville. Several were in a serious condition.

The men were killed and injured when the front wall of the building collapsed. The fire was of unknown origin.

#### Final Week Of District Court Term Is Opened

This third and final week of the May term of district court opened this morning, with the grand jury back in session.

The body adjourned after returning eighteen indictments the first week. It was believed that the grand jury will finish up its work by Tuesday afternoon, if not before.

The morning session was spent in hearing oral arguments in a civil case, E. C. Oliver, whose trial Friday on a charge of possession, for sale and transportation of intoxicating liquor, resulted in a hung jury, was scheduled again to stand trial this afternoon.

Criminal cases will be disposed of during the early part of the week, with the latter part being devoted to civil cases.

#### Dr. Barcus Goes To Fort Worth

Having disposed of his interest in the Byrnes and Barcus Hardware to his partner, Dr. Charles E. Byrnes, Dr. James R. Barcus planned leaving late Monday for Fort Worth where he will visit his mother and other relatives.

Dr. Barcus had practiced here three years and became one of the most active professional men in civic affairs. He was born in England, received his medical degree from the University of Texas at Austin, and has been in practice in Fort Worth.

#### Home Rule Voted Down

AUSTIN, May 18 (UP)—Pushed to a vote by the Senate today, the local home rule amendment failed to secure the necessary two-thirds majority for submission of proposed constitutional amendments. The vote was 19 to 9.

The resolution would allow consolidation of city and county governments in counties of 50,000 population or more.

#### Geologists Find Large Copper Still White "Hunting" Oil

NACOGDOCHES, May 18 (UP)—Recently while a geologist and one of two other citizens of this county were looking for oil structures just across the Attoyac river in Shelby county, using a very sensitive instrument for the purpose, the instrument suddenly, in a wild and isolated section began to act in a strange way.

On following its lead the men located a large copper still in full operation. The instrument used by the geologist is attracted to anything when in the vicinity of metal of any kind.

#### Hayden Griffith Home Is Damaged By Blaze

Intention of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hayden Griffith, 428, East Park, was damaged by fire at 11 p. m. Saturday.

They were away from home at the time of the blaze, being on a fishing trip.

The fire originated in the bathroom and was confined to that section of the house. The interior was damaged by smoke. The roof also was damaged by the fire.

### HOME TOWN TALK

The legislature is due to adjourn Friday. It might as well be here done very little in a session of more than three months.

Today's dispatches relate that bills affecting oil proration and additional tax measures appeared headed straight for the waste basket.

In spite of pretty good cooperation between members from West Texas, the alleged crime was committed last December prior to the legislature's enactment of a statute making kidnaping a capital offense.

The house committee held a public hearing on the pink bollworm remission bill. Avenite records had been kept by the state department of agriculture on the sum, farmers out here were required to spend because of the worm regulations. There was no worm work about it.

It was found \$200,000 was the amount needed to pay losses for all of the quarantine period excepting the first cotton season, which was forgotten after veto of a similar bill passed by the preceding legislature.

When the bill came up in the house the appropriation was cut to \$200,000. That was something, although not full payment of a just debt.

Attempts were made in the house to tack on an amendment providing additional appropriation for payment of alleged losses incurred in southeastern Texas through hog disease regulations.

Then the bill came up in the Senate. Senator Joe Moore of Greenville, who pretty nearly always will be found unfriendly to West Texas and who is liable to pop up most any time with some thing to prevent this section from getting a square deal, introduced two amendments. Both were adopted.

One called for \$200,000 for repaying losses due to tick eradication regulations in East Texas; something most everyone down there had forgotten. If indeed the losses had existed.

The other provided \$200,000 for repayment of farmers included in a bill which restricted district back in 1927-28. This brought the total to one million dollars—some pile for a special appropriation.

The ratio of 7 to 3, it is pointed out by the Rev. Angela Standard Times, is an example of East Texas idea of an even break.

Because of the unreasonable sum it is expected that Governor Sterling will not approve the bill.

And, of course if he does veto it, he will give those who have a complex of criticizing public officials and more especially those who voted against him, a nice opportunity of giving the governor.

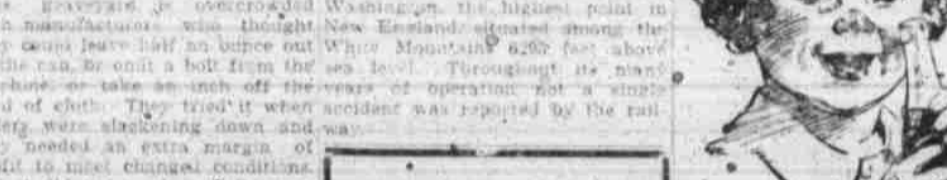
