# FHA Orders Increase In Home Mortgage Interest

## Typical Homeowner Will Pay Additional \$800 on House Loan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The administration has authorized interest increases in federally insured home mortgages which will add about \$800 to the cost of a typical home loan

The increase announced Monday raises from 51, per cent to 51 per cent the maximum interest rate on new Federal Housing Administration FHA loans.

The move was aimed at keeping pace with increasing interest rates for other types of lending in order to make sure leading institutions would continue to make funds available for home morigages.

But Rep. Wright Patman, D-Tex., chairman of the Senate Banking Committee, termed it "highly regrettable.

The man, who would give no name, address or phone number, is not connected with the Southwest Indian Organization, \$5,000 and said, "Well, think Mossler trailer, he "said he according to Chief Marlon Hays of Pampa.

Hays requested that anyone approached by the man should contact him or Sub-Chief J. B. Bowers as soon as possible. If possible, get the tag number of his car, Hays advised.

Hays explained that, "It's impossible for this man to obtain the Indian lands. This must be done through the Federal Bureau of Indian Affairs."

He added, "The Southwest Indian Organization assists area Indians in establishing their claims for government land under the Act of 1887. We have access to the Indian Role Books which help to determine an Indian's ancestry and eligibility for land.

"There is no charge for the assistance of the Southwest Indian Organization. After the certificates of eligibility for land are filled out, they must be filed with the Bureau of Indian Affairs," he said.

Under the act of 1887, Indians, and descendants up to one-thirty second Indian blood are entitled to 160 acres of govern-



Informed sources in Saigon say that Hanoi used the U.S. bombing lull over the north to start elements of another North Vietnamese regiment down the Ho Chi Minh supply route to the south. The same sources revealed the immense scope of Red infiltration of supplies and ammunition and weapons down the trail. They say it now has reached 300 tons per day during the dry season, coming down by truck part of the way and then being carried on the backs of a coolie army that numbers thousands. The sources deny any connection between the bombing lull and the simultaneous lull in Communist ground offensives. It is believed that many North Vietnamese troops were pulled across the Cambodian border last month but only to build up their strength and supplies.

Soviet Prosperity:

Moscow observers expect that the Soviet Union's new five ye r plan will continue to place the accent on prosperity, including a promise of more. consumer goods. The new plan will be formally announced at the 23rd party congress beginning March 29. However, sufficient details will be published in advance to permit some public discussion and possibly permit some minor alternations.

The plan replaces the seven year plan that expired Dec. 31. Recently published results of the old plan indicated that at least some of former Premier Nikita Khrushchev's promises had been kept, notably in an increase of refrigerators and washing machines. While much will be made in new planned increases in consumer goods. stepped up defense spending also will be the order of the day as indicated by a five per budget.

Italian Politics:

Out of the hodge podge of Italian politics, something like a two-party system may be emerging. Two of the parties in the recently fallen coalition government of Premier Aldo Moro plan to merge. They are the Socialists and the Social Democrats which have been split since shortly after World War II. Together they would post a real challenge to both Moro's Christian Democrats and the opposition Communists. The prospect already is frightening the Christian Democrats who fear that their 21-year position as Italy's largest political force may be threatened. Actually, a new election probably would find the Christian Democrats still the country's largest single party, with the Communists second and the Socialists a strong third. In any event, the Socialists seem certain to increase their voice in government

French Satellite: The French plan to launch their second space satellite at Hammaguir in the Sahara Feb. 11. The first was launched from there Nov. 26. In contrast to the extreme secrecy surrounding the first launching, newsmen will be flown to the site by the French air force to cover the second firing.

Preservation of remaining untamed rivers, much as forests and grasslands are maintained in their natural states by the present federal park and forests systems, continues to be a major conservationist goal of the Johnson administration.
"Wild rivers" legislation introduced in the last session of Congress appeared again in the current one, where it was the first item passed by the Senate although shelved in House committee. As proposed by the administration, the measure would immediately place parts of five rivers under federal protection: Clearwater (2) and Salmon (3) in Idaho;

Rogue (5) in Oregon; Rio Grande (14) in New Mexico, and the Eleven Point (16) in Missouri, Thirteen additional rivers would be studied for possible inclusion in the wild rivers system: Skaigut (1) in Washington; Missouri (4) in Mon-tana; Green (6) in Wyoming; Wolf (7) in Wisconsin; Little Miami and Little Beaver (9) in Ohio; Hudson (10) in New York; Youghiogheny (11) in Maryland and Pennsylvania; Susquehanna (12) in New York and Pennsylvania; Capacon (13) in West Virginia; Niobrara (15) in Nebraska; Suwannee (17) in Georgia and Florida; Buffalo (18) in Tennessee.

### What a stock broker can and can't do for a new investor.

If you think investing might help your family enjoy a better life, you may want to know more about stock brokers.

O. What does a stock broker do? A. Basically, he executes your orders to buy or sell securities. He can also explain how the market functions, give you facts he may have about companies that interest you, and suggest investments you may not be familiar with.

Q. Will a broker give you advice? A. All you have to do is ask. He may not always be right, but he can often suggest opportunities you may wish to examine more closely.

Q. Are all brokers connected with the New York Stock Exchange? A. No. Only those with member firms. Each registered representative had to satisfy Exchange requirements for knowledge of the securities business at the time he was

Q. How much does a broker charge? A. A member firm broker's commission is among the lowest charged for the transfer of any type of property. Example: If 100 shares are purchased for \$3,000, according to the schedule now used by member firms, the charge would be \$34, or about 1.1%. (When odd lots, usually less than 100 shares, are traded, the cost per share is slightly higher.)

Q. How do I find a member firm broker? A. Check your telephone directory's Yellow Pages. Or, look for an office that displays the sign "Member Firm New York Stock Exchange." There are some 3,500 member firm offices, probably one near you. . . .

#### How a broker can help you start your investment program.

1. He can discuss with you how much you might invest. Remember: don't use money needed for regular living expenses or emergencies. All investments carry a certain risk.

2. He can help you choose a specific goal: Perhaps dividends for more income now. If your concern is safety of capital, you might consider bonds. Or maybe you're looking for a longrange increase in the value of your investment.

3. He can help you get information about a particular company so that you can make a more informed judgment as to its prospects.

4. He can suggest various investment possibilities among stocks listed on the New York Stock Exchange. There are some 1,200-among them some of the most respected names in American business.

## **National** Window

United Press International Two clouded aspects of the war in Viet Nam and its likely effect on the United States deserve discussion in depth when Congress comes finally to full-dress debate of Johnson administration policy in Southeast Asia.

Urgently needing exploration are these two vital questions: Does impressive evidence suggest that limited use of air power (as in Viet Nam) is self

defeating?

-What is known of the longrange, global objectives of Communist China?

#### Press For Answer

These questions press for answer. In response to the first question, the most compelling evidence seems to suggest that limited use of air power as in Viet Nam is self defeating. The evidence was accumulated in World War II. United States military observers reported from London in 1940 that Germany misunderstood air power and misapplied air power in the terror blitz of London and other British cities. The net effect of the German air blitz was to boost British morale, to increase the British will to fight and to crystallize British determination to win.

The Germans did not deliberately limit their air attack on destroy the British fighting structure.

#### Missed the Point

The German air blitz would have been more effective if their raiders had ignored the cathedrals and the mass populations in cities to concentrate on, for example, bridges and harbor facilities. That might have deprived the British of their ability to fight.

Directors of the U.S. Strategic Air Force did not make over Germany the mistakes the Germans made in British skies. U.S. bombers hit the bridges and hit 'em again. They hit the oil refineries and returned time after time as each refinery was repaired and restored to production. As a Hamburg refinery manager remarked to this correspondent in June of 1945: 'They (U.S. bombers) came again and again. It was most discouraging.

The U.S. bombers destroyed both the German ability to fight and the will to fight. Cities were not overlooked. Barring ancient Heidelberg and a very few others, the Anglo-American bombers levelled the cities. large and small.

What the Allied bombers did not hit from the west, Russian artillery hit from the east. On the foregoing valid evidence, limited air warfare such as President Johnson has resumed in Viet Nam is likely to be self defeating. All-out air war would

be likely to win. Less Precise Question The second question is less precise. What is known of Communist China's long range. global objectives? The question, however, invites re-examination of the Oct. 4, 1965, weekly report of the prestigious American Security Council. This report over the signature of Adm. Arthur W. Radford, USN (Ret.) cites the evidence that China expects to dominate the entire world in the next 5 years by virtue of population and strength. China appears to

be planning a global people's war. There would be simultaneous people's wars in many different parts of the world. In any given country the strategy would be (as in Viet Nam) to encircle and finally to capture the cities from power bases established in the countryside. In global terms, North America and Western Europe would be encircled for Communist takeover from bases in Asia, Africa and Latin America.

Like Hitler before him, the Chinese minister of national defense, One Lin Piao, wrote and published a blunt blueprint of Chinese global strategy. This appeared Sept. 2, 1965. Radford's report was a simple, unadorned analysis of Lin Piao's plan.
