## ROGERS IS TARGET

### GOP Candidate Price Takes Political Aim

Bob Price, Republican candidate for congress from the 18th district, took several political potshots at incumbent Democratic congressman Walter Rogers in a speech before the Gray County Young Republican Club here last night.

Price charged that Rogers "is flooding newspapers, radio and TV with news releases and accolades about himself" and that "releases have been paid for and mailed at the taxpayers' expense."

The Pampa rancher, who seeks to unseat Rogers next November, stated further that "these articles are flooding the news media because he has an opponent and he wants to try and brain wash the people of this district during the next eight months with articles written by professional writers who try to make us think he is racing around Washington busily trying to represent us."

Price continued his blistering attack by claiming that the news articles constitute a "political duping of the public for self-perpetuation in office" and that "it will go on until after the election."

### Last of State's Witnesses Testifies in Mossler Trial

MIAMI (UPI)—A bartender testified today at the Mossler murder trial that co-defendant Melvin Lane Powers was in a lounge at the entrance to the causeway to Key Biscayne about an hour before the slaying of Jacques Mossler on that residential island.

The witness was the 52nd in the state's attempt to send the strapping, dark Powers, 29, and Mrs. Candace Mossler, his 45-year-old aunt and Mossler's widow, to the electric chair.

With this testimony in the 23rd trial day, the state took the alleged weapon-wielder, Powers, near the scene of the murder shortly before it took place.

The witness was Badar Shehan, of Miami, a short, wiry, dark bartender who said he had worked at the Stuffed Shirt Lounge for three and a half years. Mossler, the 69-year-old financial wizard who was Candy's husband, was slain about 1:45 a.m. June 30, 1964. Shehan said that Powers came into the

lounge, which is located just across the street from the entrance to the causeway that crosses Biscayne Bay to the island, between 12:30 and 1 a.m. the morning of the 30th.

"He ordered a double scotch, and I served him," the bartender said.

"Then what did he do?" assistant prosecutor Arthur E. Huttoe asked. "Drank it and left," Shehan said. Earlier in the evening, between 6:30 and 7, Shehan said, Powers came in and ordered a drink.

"He asked me for an empty Coke bottle and I set it on the bar."

The state contends the soft drink bottle could have been used as one of the murder weapons. Mossler was stabbed 39 times and bludgeoned on the head.

Shehan pointed out the rangy Powers in court, as the man "right over there" at the defense counsel table.

### Johnson Raises Bond Interest

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson today raised the interest on U.S. savings bonds from 3.75 per cent to 4.15 per cent.

He did so to make savings bonds more competitive with bank savings accounts and other forms of saving.

The 4.15 rate will apply to all outstanding bonds purchased since Dec. 1, 1965. Interest also will be increased on other outstanding bonds, at lower rates determined by the date of purchase. The public now holds \$49 billion worth of the E and H bonds.

### Review Board Due NY Police

NEW YORK (UPI)—The controversial concept of a civilian board to review police performance is headed for its ultimate test in New York's 27,000-man police force, the nation's largest.

Creation of a review board here became a certainty Tuesday when Mayor John V. Lindsay named Philadelphia Police Commissioner Howard R. Leary to head New York's police department. Lindsay had made a campaign promise to the city's more than 15 million Negroes and Puerto Ricans to establish a civilian-dominated board to review complaints of police brutality and other practices.

Leary, who in Philadelphia commanded a department which has had a civilian review board since 1957, said he could live with one in New York, although he does not personally favor a board or consider it necessary. He will replace Vincent L. Broderick, an outspoken opponent of a review board. In Broderick's emotional farewell statement Tuesday, he said the issue is not simply a review board, but the question of who runs the police department—the mayor or the commissioner.

"Is this department run as a professional police department or as an offshoot of city hall with all of its political asked. Some police feared a review implications?" Broderick asked. Some police feared a review board would hamstring police operations and open the way to political meddling in the department.

## Rogers Blasts FCC Cable TV Take-Over Move

Pampa Congressman Walter Rogers charged today that the Federal Communication Commission's action yesterday in assuming full jurisdiction over virtually all Community Television (CATV) systems is "one of the most revolutionary steps ever taken in Washington bureaucracy."

The FCC, in its announcement, stated it was assuming jurisdiction and had adopted rules and regulations governing CATV's relay of television programs.

Rogers made this comment on the FCC announcement. "The FCC, in effect, is taking over jurisdiction which it does not have. The primary function of the FCC when it was created was in broadcasting only. Now it is moving into an area where it is assuming jurisdiction over reception."

"There is no justification for such a move into the field of what people can receive on their television sets. The FCC should be concerned only with the broadcasting of programs—not with regulation of program reception."

Rogers, who is chairman of the Sub-Committee on Communications and Power, stated before the FCC went into its CATV

session Feb. 10 that when the FCC hearing was concluded and its decisions on regulations announced, the committee would study the findings and determine whether Congress should intervene.

His disapproval of the FCC moving into jurisdiction over broadcast reception would indicate that the matter will be studied by his sub-committee with the aim of having Congress take a look at this latest indication (See CABLE, Page 3)

### Father Says Hair Is A Personal Thing

CARROLLTON, Tex. (UPI)—C. L. Medlin said today he is getting a lawyer to determine if the school board can legally suspend his son for wearing his hair Beatle-length. His son believes hair is "a personal thing."

Duane Medlin, 14, and five classmates were suspended from R. L. Turner High School. They maintain they need long hair because they play in a musical combo. "Hair is part of the costume of a performer," young Medlin said. "Maybe a teenager doesn't have as many rights as a grownup," he said. "But he has some rights. Hair is a personal thing."

## 91 Americans Killed In Year's Highest US Casualty Toll

SAIGON (UPI)—American pilots stepped up the air war on both sides of the 17th parallel today and heavy fighting was reported on four fronts in the south. U.S. Army troops added to the massive toll of Communist dead in the An Lao Valley sector.

Viet Cong guerrillas briefly overran a government outpost only 10 miles south of the major U.S. Marine base at Da Nang, but were driven off by reinforcements.

It was disclosed meanwhile that 91 Americans were killed and 423 wounded in action last week, another record casualty toll for 1966. The previous high this year was 89 U.S. servicemen killed in the week ended Feb. 5.

The latest report was the highest since Nov. 24, 1965, when 240 Americans were killed in the Ia Drang Valley and Chu Pong mountain campaign.

Allied forces killed 684 Communists in the week ending Feb. 12, a U.S. spokesman said. Vietnamese losses were 249 killed and 104 missing in action.

U.S. Air Force, Navy and Marine pilots flew 323 sorties over Communist targets in South Viet Nam, including a strike by Strategic Air Command (SAC) B52 bombers against a Viet Cong control point and headquarters along the Cambodian border 100 miles northwest of Saigon.

Navy and Air Force planes again ranged over Communist North Viet Nam, striking roads, bridges, storage areas and a radar site.

Among the 35 missions reported was an attack on the Dien Bien Phu military barracks and airfield 145 miles west of Hanoi. Other planes hit the Vinh region along the coast 70 miles south of the North Vietnamese capital.

The heaviest ground fighting involving American units during the past 24 hours occurred in operation White Wing-Masher in the Bong Son-An Lao Valley region 300 miles north-northeast of Saigon.

## Congress To Move Into CATV Dispute

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress today was edging its way into the long and hotly contested dispute over federal regulation of the Community Television Antenna CATV industry.

A decision by lawmakers to look into the subject came Tuesday following a long-awaited decision by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to extend its regulatory powers to cover the mushrooming industry, which now serves 6 million viewers.

The FCC appealed to Congress for help in establishing a nationwide policy for control of the industry, prompting Rep. Harley O. Staggers, D-W. Va., chairman of the House Commerce Committee to announce his group would look into the matter.

### Drew Guarded Prase

The FCC decision drew guarded praise from the two main antagonists in the CATV dispute, the National Association of Broadcasters NAB and the National Community Television Association NCTA.

CATV is a multi-million-dollar business that provides for a fee—usually about \$5 a month—transmission of television programs via cable to viewers who are too far away from regular stations to get good television reception.

## Compromise Bills For Registration Due From Session

AUSTIN (UPI)—Sponsors of a new voter registration plan said today they would offer a compromise bill in both houses of the legislature which would give Texas voters the choice to decide which plan they want.

The new version contains both an annual registration and a biennial registration system with voters automatically re-registering by voting at least once every two years.

This plan is sponsored in the House by Reps. Travis Peeler of Corpus Christi and Dick Cherry of Waco, and in the Senate by Sens. Franklin Spears of San Antonio and Don Kennard of Fort Worth.

Spears said the bill provides that if voters approve a constitutional amendment this November, the annual system would go into effect. But if the voters rejected the amendment, which includes provisions for the annual system, the alternate plan would become law.

## CAREER CLINIC SPEAKER SAYS 'More Opportunity Now Than Ever Before'

The Congress has passed — without a dissenting vote — the so-called "Cold War GI Bill of Rights." The legislation provides educational and other benefits to men and women who received, or will receive, discharges from the armed services after Jan. 31, 1953. It is similar to the World War II and Korean War "GI Bills."

The bill insures that the country will have the highest skills and abilities of veterans who take advantage of it. As pointed out by Congressman Olin Teague of College Station, my Texas Delegation colleague who is chairman of the Veterans Affairs Committee of the House, the United States faces a new low in the ratio of our total population of young men available to fill essential technical and professional posts.

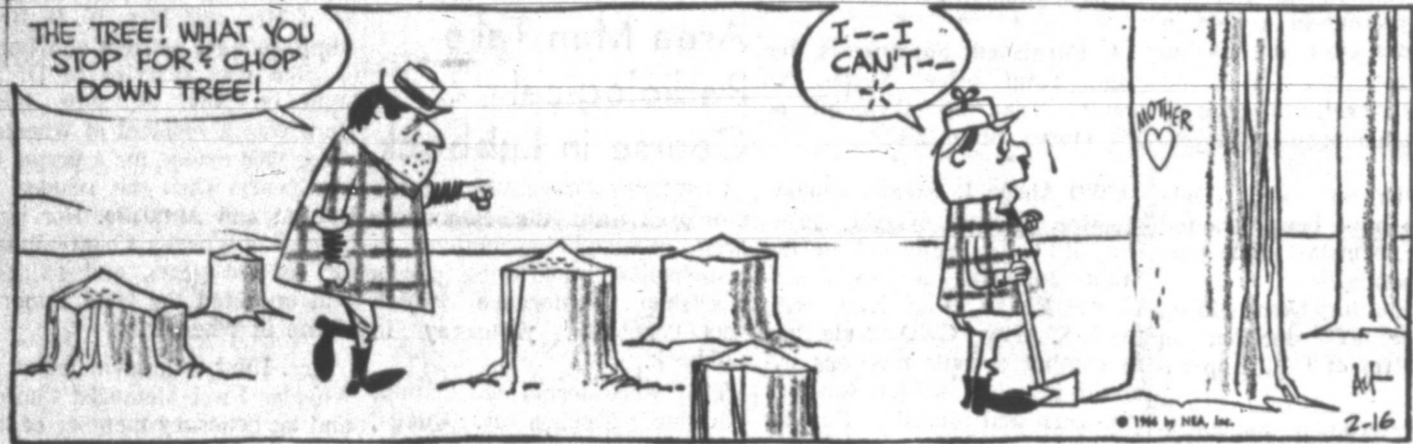

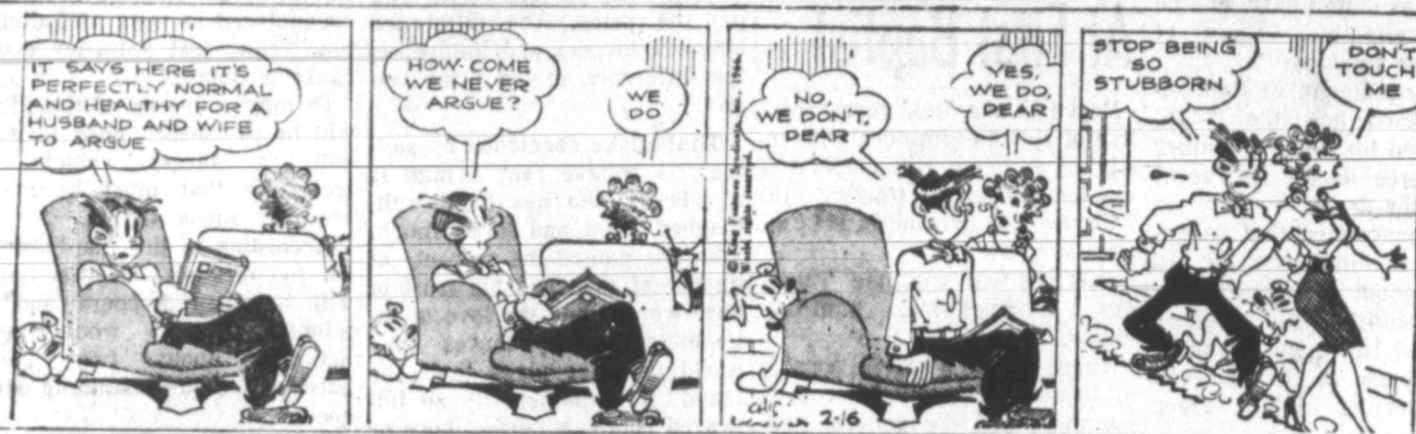

**Gardening News**  
By THELMA BRAY

Observations while walking through the garden on a beautiful sunny day: the hyacinths, daffodils and scillas are already up; the larkspurs, poppies and feverfew are up also; the monkey-grass is still green and makes an attractive winter edging plant; the Thorny Eleagnus and Nandina are very pretty as neighbors in the winter months; the Variegated Vinca is a beautiful ground cover in cold weather as well as summer; the trunk of the Golden Chain Tree is pretty summer-green in color; the Flowering Quince blooms have already come and gone.

Also observed the birds enjoying the warm sunshine as well as the food and water provided. A good container to provide water for birds is the large shallow clay saucers which are used with clay pots for drainage.

Maybelle Carlton says some of her crocus are already blooming.

Other observations in the garden which can't seem to be ignored are of how much work was not finished earlier before winter moved in, such as removing the dead tops of some of the chrysanthemums and other grooming chores.

A most attractive hedge is growing at the Flaudie Gallman home, 615 N. Nelson; its branches are graceful sprays loaded with clusters of dark red berries, similar in shape to the snowberry. The name of the shrub is Bird's Eye Bush. A curiosity is the fact that with that name the birds have not eaten the berries. Mrs. Gallman says the shrub is most beautiful in the fall.

Reading about all the new varieties of plants which will be available for gardens this year makes a person anxious for spring to get here. The January issue of Park's Floral Magazine lists some of the winners in the All-America Selections for this year. The first and only hybrid pansy winner is a giant in size and vigorous in growth named "Majestic White with Blootch". A new marigold "Span Yellow" is twelve inches tall, very floriferous and early blooming. To plant as an edging for these marigolds Park's recommends the new mid-blue verberna "Amethyst", compact, dwarf six inch plants; sound like a perfect combination.

One of the most unusual of the new varieties available is the snapdragon "Bright Butterflies"; it is no longer like the traditional snapping dragon but is an open-faced flower. According to Glenn Goldsmith, hybridizer "this is only the start of an exciting series of new flower forms, both single and double, that will be coming from seedmen in the next few years".

Other new varieties available this year include: marigold Orange Peony which is early blooming and 16 inches tall; Marigold Yellow Nugget flowers 30 days after seeding and continues until frost with its 12 inch plants attaining a spread of as much as 3 feet; Aster Snow White is the first in a series of low asters covered with large blooms and designed for border or edging uses.

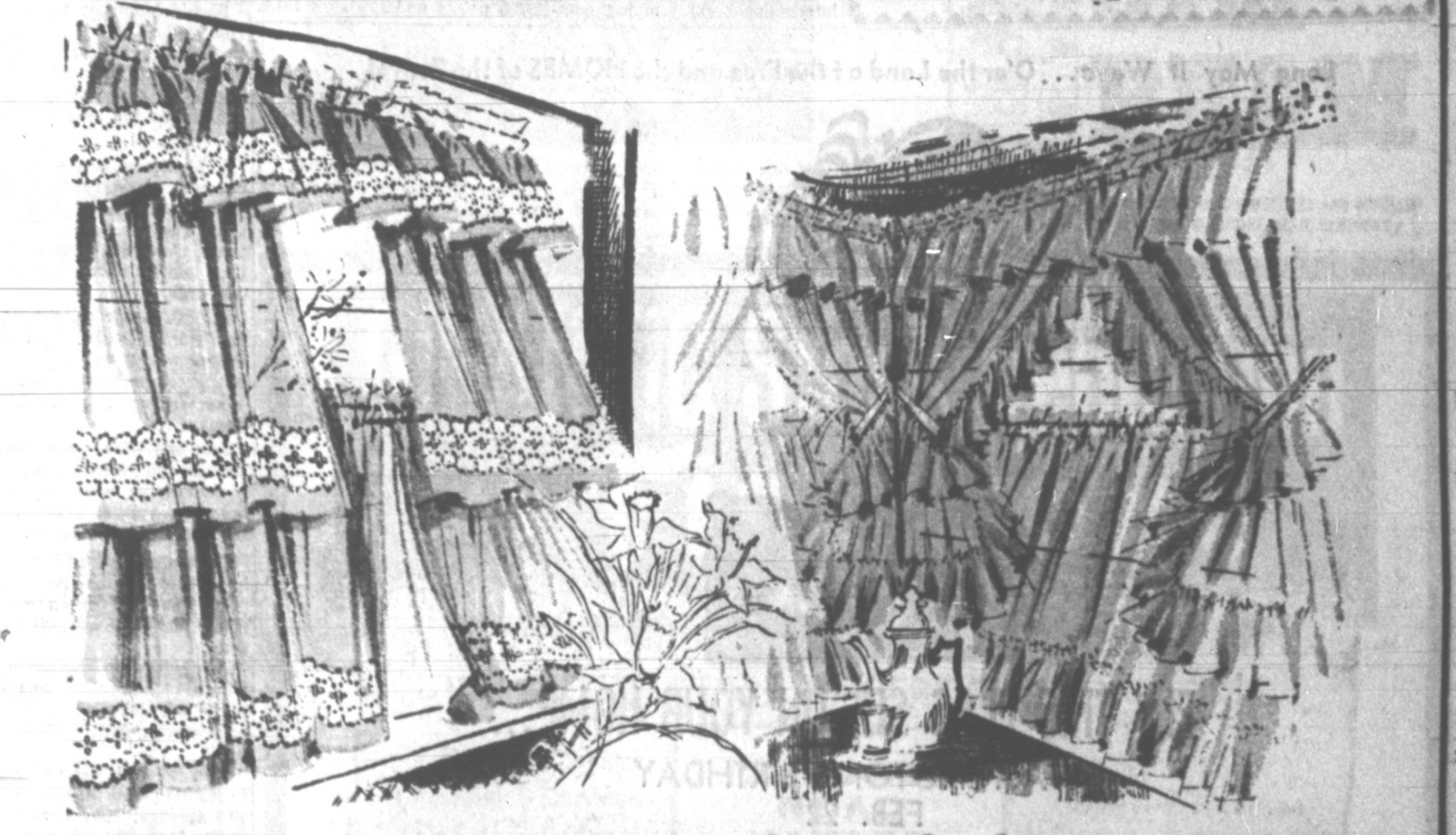
The list goes on and on including vegetables such as tomato Kabob developed for use on barbecue skewers, and the colbata which resulted from crossing Chinese celery cabbage with rutabaga at the University of New Hampshire. It can be used raw in salads or cooked and used in stews or mashed.

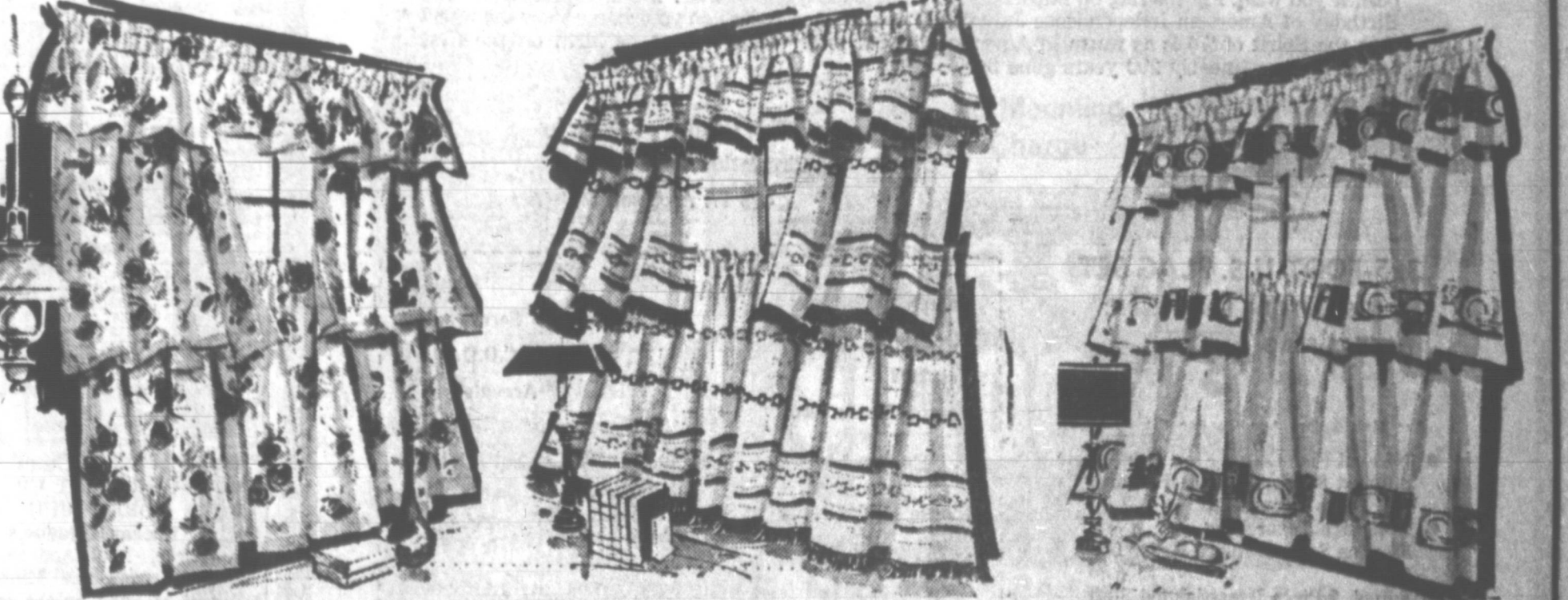

The Lighter Side

By DICK WEST United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI) —Fixing ethical and morality standards for government employees is a delicate business, mainly because opinions vary widely as to what is unethical or immoral.

Conduct that one person may view as improper may be viewed by another person as merely, ah, imprudent. It is difficult to draw a definite line between the two.

As a result, ethical guidelines tend to be rather vague and flexible. But every once in a while somebody gets pinned down. As in the celebrated case of the 12-pound ham.

It concerned a federal official who had been given a ham at Christmas time by an alleged "influence peddler."

The official insisted there was nothing improper about accepting the gift. But under questioning by Senate investigators he conceded it might have been improper if the ham had been larger.

Defined the Difference Demands for clarification finally forced him to define the difference between a big ham and a little ham.

After weighing the matter carefully, he fixed 12 pounds as the top size that bureaucrats could accept with propriety. Obviously that figure is now obsolete. The price of ham has risen so sharply since then that any civil servant accepting more than a 6-pound ham would now be automatically guilty of corruption. A more up-to-date example of line-drawing in the ethical-morality field can be found in a volume of testimony recently released by the Senate internal security subcommittee.

First Juror Chosen in Krueger Trial BRENHAM, Tex. (UPI)—The first juror was finally chosen Tuesday for the trial of Paul Eric Krueger, the son of a California industrialist accused of slaying three fishermen last April 12. Harold Kramer, a restaurant operator, was the first juror selected and it took a day and a half to pick him. Krueger is on trial accused of shooting to death J. David Fox, 35; David Carson, 59 and Noel Little, 51. Their bodies were found floating in the Intracoastal Canal near Corpus Christi. A dozen prospective jurors were questioned before the first juror was chosen. Panel members were dismissed for a variety of reasons ranging from illiteracy to being a fireman. Several were excused because they were against the death penalty. The prosecution has asked the death penalty for Krueger. Krueger, 18, is the son of a prominent San Clemente, Calif. industrialist and civic leader. The trial was moved from Kingsville, Tex. to Brenham. As result there has been little local interest in the trial. Only 20 persons sat in the courtroom Tuesday.
