The smartest officer is the one who knows how to enforce the law without jacking up the gun. How to use one is hard to learn but it takes a lot more wisdom to learn when to use one.

We would be the last one to criticize an officer for doing his sworn duty. The way he does it is what counts.

Again we note with pleasure improvement in the efficiency of the police department. May it continue.

While trade reports are treacherous, it is evident that where retailers are able to make an appeal to buyers upon the basis of a good quality of merchandise at low prices, they are moving a very large volume of goods across their counters. Sales of 255 chains were off only 2 percent—except from the monthly survey of economic conditions issued by the National City Bank, New York.

Man Who Fatally Shot Wife Here Arrested In Bonham For Burglary After Attending Mate's Funeral

Les A. Williamson who shot and fatally wounded his wife here Tuesday night during a fight with L. R. Harris at the Harris home, 2000 1/2th Street, here, was arrested by Bonham county officers, it was reported here today by Sheriff Jess Slaughter.

According to information received by Sheriff Slaughter from Sheriff Bud Hughes of Bonham, Williamson is charged there with burglary and theft of over \$300. Four felony warrants are lodged against him there, according to a telegram received by Sheriff Slaughter.

Williamson was arrested following funeral services of his wife. She was buried at Fort Worth, Texas.

Williamson was released here last Wednesday under bond of \$2000. He is charged with murder in connection with the death of his wife.

The tragedy was the aftermath of a party at which three couples attended.

Withdrawal Of Oil Down During Week

Runs To Refineries In Basin Show Decrease In Weekly Report

Daily average production in the Permian Basin, including Lea county, New Mexico, increased 207 barrels to 27,954 barrels during the week ending May 29 but this lacked 24,322 barrels daily of meeting the demand, this amount of oil being withdrawn from storage. During the preceding week daily average production increased 204 barrels to 27,287 barrels but daily average distribution was 21,327 barrels, a daily average of 6,960 barrels was withdrawn from storage.

The decrease in the amount of oil withdrawn from storage last week was due to a decline in daily average runs to refineries within the district of 12,279 to 28,655 barrels and a drop in daily average pipe line runs of 18,737 barrels to 16,991 barrels. Daily average tank car shipments increased 9,931 barrels to 11,098 barrels, reducing the decrease in distribution to a daily average of 36,142 barrels.

West Texas added three producers during the week and a total of 281 wells produced a daily average of 29,407 barrels, 3,292 barrels daily in excess of the preceding week. Daily average production in Lea county, New Mexico, fell 91 barrels to 41,081 barrels.

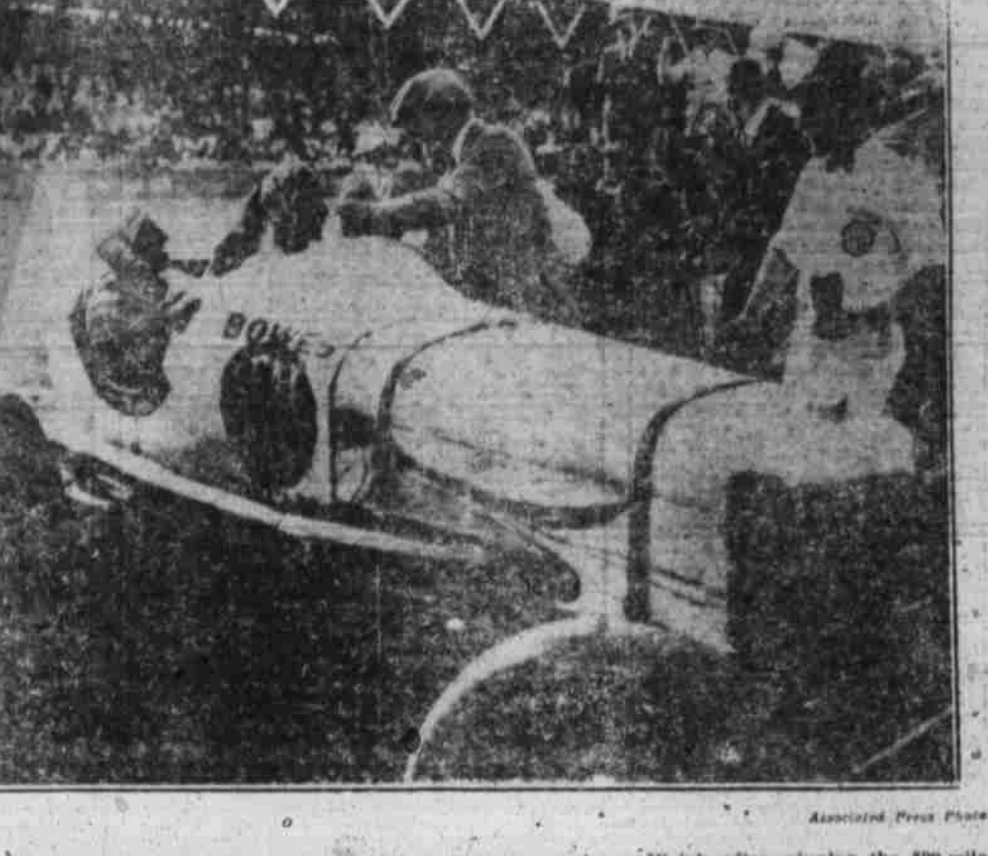

Stanton Crowd Is Addressed By James T. Brooks

STANTON, June 1 (AP)—Several hundred persons attended Memorial services held in the high school auditorium Sunday morning, when Judge James T. Brooks of Big Spring delivered the address.

Members of the Stanton post of the American Legion led by Post Commander Sam Stamps, decorated graves of war veterans just before the services. These included veterans of the world war, both the northern and southern armies in the civil war, and one grave of a Spanish-American veteran.

Judge Brooks was introduced by Robert W. Hamilton, president of the Stanton Chamber of Commerce.

The assembly sang "America" as the legionnaires, led by the colors, entered the auditorium and took reserved seats at the front.

Prayer was offered by Rev. Sailer.

"That duties of citizenship in peacetime are of far greater importance than preparations for and participation in war, was the thought stressed by Judge Brooks, who organized a company here and led it through action in France during the war."

The speaker declared numbers of deaths and other casualties would have been far greater had the war extended through the winter of 1918.

"I wish to tell people say we should have gone ahead and fought the war, until the German cities had been leveled."

"If we had done so hundreds of thousands of our boys who are now being wounded have been killed."

"The speaker declared that he was proud to be a citizen of this country and that he would do his best to see that the responsibilities of useful citizenship and law with force were maintained in every way."

Four Burned Seriously In New Oil Field

A. C. Bradford, driller; Ben Robinson, part owner; and J. H. McKenney, Oklahoma City, were burned and injured. They are expected to live.

Two explosions were reported heard before the well burst into flames.

B.R.T. Action To Place 11,000 Men On Job In Month

HOUSTON, Tex., June 1 (AP)—Approximately 11,000 idle trainmen in the United States and Canada will be given work within the next month by the action of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen in limiting the number of working hours per month. It was estimated today.

The brotherhood adopted a resolution late Friday limiting working hours of men in yard, freight and passenger service.

President A. F. Whitney said the resolution will place 10,850 jobs in employment. There are 41,300 men on the brotherhood's roll of 12,500 members who are with out jobs.

Under the terms of the resolution men in yard service will be limited to 2,300 miles of the equivalent in hours each month. This employment in passenger service will be restricted to 5,500 miles per month or the equivalent in hours.

The resolution provides that extra hours will be given to the fullest.

President Whitney said that full fulfillment of the resolution will be well under way within the next 20 days.

Injuries Of Girl Critical; Tourist Hurt

West Virginia Woman Has Both Legs Broken At Ankle

Automobile accidents near Big Spring Sunday sent two women to a local hospital suffering with severe injuries.

Miss Lillian Taylor, 21, daughter of W. J. Taylor, 619 Abram Street, was critically injured when the car in which she was riding overturned on the Lamesa-Big Spring highway, twelve miles north of here.

She was riding in a coupe driven by John Doyle Gaskin of Knox. Miss Marie Threat also was a passenger.

The car overturned when a rear tire blew out. Miss Taylor was thrown through the windshield of the machine. She was reported by hospital attendants as in a serious condition. Four ribs were broken, her skull was fractured, and her spine badly lacerated and her clavicle and Miss Threat's scapula injured.

The woman was brought to the Big Spring hospital by a tourist. The accident occurred about 12 o'clock Sunday. They were enroute to Lamesa at the time of the crash.

Miss Chappelle Teltzbaum, 25, said to be an instructor in a university at Keyser, West Virginia, had both legs broken at the ankles when the car in which she was riding crashed into a tree, two miles west of Stanton.

According to information received here, the woman, with Mr. and Mrs. Davison, also of Keyser, were enroute to Los Angeles at the time of the accident.

The crash occurred when another automobile turned from the highway. The woman was hospitalized by the Big Spring hospital in a hospital ambulance from Big Spring.

Industrial Progress Continues In State

AUSTIN, June 1 (AP)—Texas is continuing to make industrial progress despite the general economic depression, according to R. R. Gregg, state labor commissioner, who issued a bulletin today in which he stated new enterprises were being established and old plants improved to care for expanding business.

Gregg listed the Hamilton Dam in the Colorado river near Three and the proposed establishment of a plant at Corpus Christi by the Southern Alkali Corporation as two of the major projects being undertaken.

The Hamilton Dam will require the labor of 500 men to start and employment expected to reach 1,000 in the later stages of the project. The total cost of the dam was estimated at between \$3,000,000 and \$5,000,000.

The alkali corporation purchased a 25-acre plant site and was reported to have embarked on a program that would cost the company about \$1,000,000. The plant construction will give several months employment to building workers and permanent employment to hundreds of others when the plant is placed in operation.

Gregg said he believed steps would be taken in the near future to develop the asbestos deposits found recently by geologists in the vicinity of Kerrville. Several tons of asbestos have been discovered, with the Gulf and Western railroad prepared to include this territory in its route if paying quantities are found.

Results from Fort Worth showed that new industries had located in that city since the first of the year.

A report has been received from Houston indicating the Southwest Bell Telephone Company will invest \$2,000,000 in improving its system.

A new packing plant has been proposed for San Juan to cost \$50,000. The Southwest Dairy Products Company will open a new plant at Pecos. A wholesale cannery will be established at Grand Prairie.

Gregg reported new refineries were springing up in the new oil fields, but while this was encouraging in an industrial way, it was regrettable that the exploitation of such a natural resource went on at such a rapid pace while great supplies of other natural resources lacked promotion capital for development.

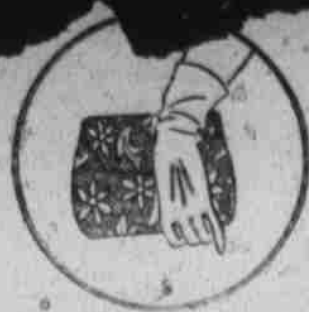
The case involved a contract between city and county officials in 1928 whereby the county should help bear expenses of widening a portion of the street at a cost of \$22,000.

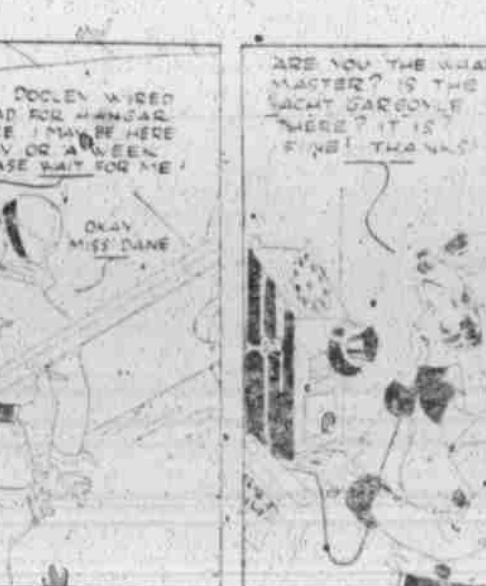

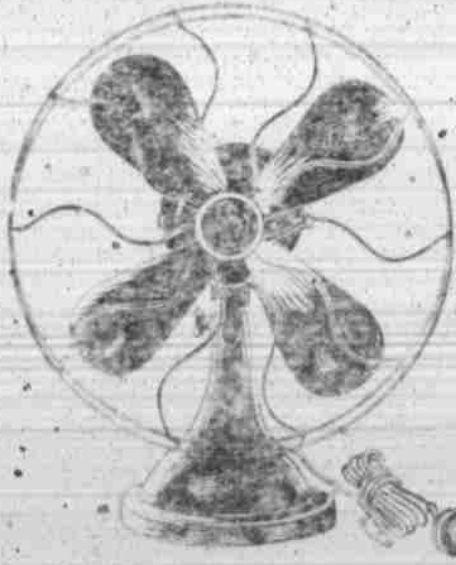

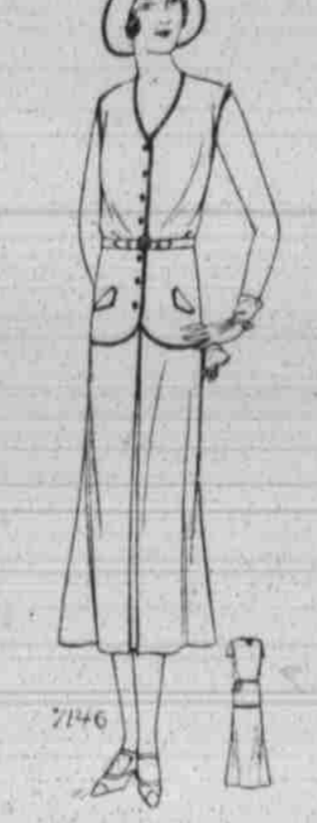

The Town's Only Maguey Plant About To Bloom

The maguey, or big cactus, growing in Mrs. Florence Everly's yard at 405 Runels St. is about to burst forth into bloom. The flower stalk is ten feet high and will shoot up twice as high before it blooms, says Mrs. H. F. Willis. This is, so far as is known, the only maguey plant in Big Spring. It was brought here twelve years ago, by Mrs. F. N. Brown, now of El Paso. She probably brought it from Old Mexico, or the Big Bend country, since it is a plant which thrives only in a very arid section. Mrs. Jones brought two plants to Big Spring and put the other on the court house lawn. It was not taken care of and has long ago disappeared. This maguey is the cactus from which the Mexicans make their famous "Pulque" liquor. It is popular and well-cultivated in Old Mexico. When it has bloomed it will die. Several small plants then grow up around the root—Mrs. Willis, who has grown some of these in the Guadalupe Mountains, says that the plants vary from 3 to 15 years and more, in the length of the time they attain blooming age.

CRIMINAL WHO TRIED TO BE GOOD THEMSELVES OF STUDY

CHICAGO, (INS)—That society is responsible for criminals is the belief of Dr. E. W. Burgess, director of the Chicago Behavior Research Fund.

Answering the perplexing problem of how to meet our increasing criminality, he says, "Crime is a community responsibility and must be met by the intelligent cooperation of all the citizens who are vitally concerned with the problem of human welfare."

The story of the "making" of a criminal who is prominent in the Chicago press, is presented in a volume of case studies published by the program of sociological research of the Institute for Juvenile Research and the Behavior Research Fund.

Prof. Clifford Shaw, head of the department of research at the institute and co-author with Maurice E. Moore of the book, stated: "To understand all is to forgive all, the regionist says, and the matter of this particular criminal case can say scientifically, so understand all is to treat or prevent all."

The young criminal who tells his own story in the book was reared in the slum districts of the city. At seven he was first brought into court. He was sentenced to a penal institution before seventeen for a series of crimes.

Although he tested superior intelligence, he was regarded as a moron due to his lack of proper social and cultural contacts. The attitudes and dispositions, which led to his crimes, were built up
