

A tragic indicator of escalation of the war in Viet Nam is the jump in U.S. combat deaths. With the rapid American build-up during 1965, from 23,000 men at the start of the year to more than 180,000, the number killed in action also soured, to nine times the 1964 figure. Two-thirds of the 1965 combat deaths were Army men.


The Africans' solution of the Rhodesian problem is simple enough. Since they are in a majority, they therefore want "one man, one vote" now. By reason of their numbers they claim the right to rule the country.

But what will be the fate of the whites who have transformed Rhodesia from an undeveloped desert with few inhabitants into a prosperous farming and industrial nation?

"I could not care less," a young African diplomat told me. "For the whites in Rhodesia there is only one solution. Let them leave the country-the sooner the better-or perish." No wonder Rhodesia's European inhabitants foresee a long struggle that is certain to entail (See TRAGEDY, Page 3)


Two views of Rhodesia by NEA's Bill Crawford.

Try Giralda Rice

By GAYNOR MADDOX Newspaper Enterprise Assn. The United States is Spain's best olive customer. Americans spent about \$89 million on Spanish olives in 1964. So, with a few

other editors, we flew to Seville, center of the world's supply of green - cured olives, to take an on - location bite. Senor Luis de Soto Ybarra was

our host, representing the olive growers co-operative.


To refresh our inquiring spirits, Senor de Stot and his fellow growers entertained us at their small private club as warm night rain fell on the flower-lined terrace outside. There were fiery young flamenco dancers and singers, sherry wine and nibbling of olives and almonds and finally great shallow iron pans of Giralda rice, marvelously pungent and bracing to us travelers.

GIRALDA RICE (Makes 6 to 8 servings) 1 medium unpeeled eggplant, cut in 1/2-inch slices 1/2 cup olive or salad oil 1 teaspoon salt 4 large tomatoes 2 cloves garlic, minced 1 medium onion, chopped 11/2 cups raw rice 2 medium green peppers, 2 cups clam juice 1 cup chicken bouillon 1/2 cup sliced pimemto-stuffed olives 21/2 pounds raw shrimp shelled and cleaned 2 dozen shucked clams 1/4 teaspoon pepper 1/2 cup whole pimento-stuffed olives 3 ounces Gruyere cheese, grated In large skillet, saute eggplant in about 1 -3 - cup of the oil until tender, sprinkling with salt. Drain on paper towels. Peel the tomatoes. Chop 2 tomatoes and slice 2 remaining tomatoes. Combine remaining oil, the chopped tomatoes, garlic, onion and rice in skillet.

Cook, stirring constantly 2 minutes. Stir in green pepper, clam juice and bouillon. Cover and boil gently 12 minutes, or until rice is just tender. Mix in the sliced olives, shellfish and pepper. Simmer 5 minutes to cook fish. Turn into paella pan or 31/2 - quart oven - proof serving dish. Alternate eggplant and tomato slices around edges of dish. Place whole olives in center. Sprinkle cheese on top. Broil 6 inches from source of heat 4 to 6 minutes, or until cheese melts and browns light-

A change has been made for the Top O' Texas basketball tournament here next year.


It will now be an eight team tournament and run three nights instead of the usual two.






