Police Hold Tight Grip on Riot-Torn LA Watts District

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Police maintained a tight grip on Watts today to prevent a recurrence of wild disorder that wracked the area twice since last summer.

The Negro district of southwest Los Angeles was quiet Wednesday night but authorities were ready to roll in force should they detect indications of another outburst of violence like Tuesday's rioting. Other city agencies and residents of Watts worked quietly to calm tensions. But police remained concerned that an incident might inflame the trouble again.

In Tuesday's melee two men were fatally shot, 25 persons were injured, 53 were arrested, 12 buildings were put to the torch, and up to 600 Negroes looted a 36-block area of Watts for four hours before heavily armed police dispersed them.

Nation's Social Eyecore

Tuesday's disorder and the week-long rioting last August left in their wake a toll of 36 dead, more than 900 injured, 4,000 arrested and property damage amounting to \$45 million. Watts stood unchanged as the nation's social eyecore.

Sex Scandal No Longer A Debate Topic

OTTAWA (UPI) — They were talking about other things in the House of Commons today. Gerda Munsinger was nearly off the front pages and no longer a topic of parliamentary debate.

Out of sight, but by no means out of mind.

For Gerda may yet return. Or, if she doesn't, the judicial inquiry appointed to look into her affairs may go to Europe to ask some questions.

Justice Wishard F. Spence of the Canadian Supreme Court left open the possibility that he and his staff may travel to Europe to interview Mrs. Munsinger, the 36-year-old shapely blonde who was alleged to have been a friend of Conservatives in high offices. The justice minister, a liberal, alleged the improprieties in the former Tory government constituted a breach in national security.

Spence said as much as possible of the inquiry would be open to the public in view of the "considerable" public interest in the matter. "Considerable" was a considerable understatement.

Expert Sees War With China If US Defeats North Viet Nam

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An expert on Communist China sees a "great danger of confrontation" with the huge Asian nation if Allied forces begin to decisively defeat the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese.

"It would be quite erroneous to rule out the possibility," Benjamin I. Schwartz of Harvard University told a Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearing on China.

His statement was made in reply to a question of whether he thought the Chinese would move directly into the Vietnamese war to counterbalance Allied victories.

Schwartz was joined in his views by John H. Lindbeck, also a Harvard professor and staff member of the school's Institute for East Asian Research.

Lindbeck said that he did not think China's actions in India, Tibet and Korea demonstrated general aggressive intent in themselves but went on to warn: "I believe China is very prepared to use military force if they feel they could gain from it."

He added he believed, however, that domestic problems rather than the promotion of revolutions around the world "will continue to have first claim on the time and energies of China's rulers and on the resources of the country."

Police Intensify Area Manhunt For Burglars

MOBETTIE (Sp) — Panhandle law enforcement officers intensified their search Thursday morning for two men, part of a group of five, who attempted to break into the safe at the Mobettie State Bank Tuesday night.

Three men are in Wheeler County jail charged with the attempted burglary and fresh tracks, believed belonging to the two missing men were found in the river near Kellerville this morning.

Officials say the five men are part of a gang of one of the Southwest's largest bank burglary rings.

Bloodhounds were brought to Mobettie Wednesday from Granite Reformatory in Oklahoma and were put on the trail of the two men this morning.

Hedges was arrested after he was seen running in a field south of Mobettie. He was later seen in Magic City and hitched a ride in a pickup with two oil-field workers.

He was in the pickup when Ramsey made the arrest. Hedges offered no resistance.

Two other men, Jerry Ray James and Clifford H. Brown were arrested about 5:30 a.m. Wednesday by Texas Highway Patrolmen four miles east of Mobettie.

Mobettie nightwatchman C. B. Hooker had observed the men driving around Mobettie in a Cadillac. Four of the men then jumped from the car and entered the building through a back window and drilled through the top of the safe.

Helm said that another \$200 in cash in the safe was apparently missed by the looters. No checks were taken and left in the safe.

The cigarette machine was broken into and an undetermined amount of change taken.

Pampa police sergeant George Wallace was at the scene shortly after the burglary was reported by Fern Durling, an employee at the lodge.

Officers said that clues were few and the thieves knew their safe.

"They just peeled a hole about 10 inches wide and eight to 10 inches long in the top of the safe and got what they wanted," Wallace said.

Wallace said there probably wasn't any connection between Thursday's safe job and one at Harold Barrett Ford earlier this year.

There, several hundred dollars in checks that were later discovered along with a pickup were taken from inside the motor company.

Safe Burglars Get \$300-\$400 From Moose Hall

Between \$250 and \$300 was taken from a safe at the Moose Lodge, 401 E. Brown, between midnight last night and 10 a.m. today.

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Senate Approve \$13.1 Billion Viet Money Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Appropriations Committee Wednesday quickly approved the administration's \$12.1 billion supplemental appropriations bill for military and economic expenditures in Viet Nam.

The committee action cleared the measure for an expected floor consideration Monday. The House approved it earlier this week.

Included in the bill are some \$12.3 billion worth of military procurement and construction for the war in Viet Nam. Also included is \$415 million in economic aid for world trouble spots—\$275 million of which is destined for South Viet Nam.

anti-Communist camp. In Indonesia, Sukarno and his Communist allies are fighting for their political lives. Fidel Castro, always the opportunist, deserted Mao and is now back in the camp of Russia, China's other bitter rival.

Even more indicative of Mao's troubles is the growing opposition he is facing in North Viet Nam and North Korea. Both countries have long been regarded as Red China's satellites. Together with Albania they were Mao's strongest supporters in his ideological quarrel with Russia.

To be sure, there is no free press critical of the regimes in the Communist countries. There are no open congressional investigation committees. Yet despite their morbid addiction to secrecy the Red rulers, for internal political reasons, are frequently compelled to throw light on their malaise and reveal their quarrels.

Thus, there is for Western specialists on communism an impressive array of hard facts from which to draw these conclusions.

CHINA HAS PROBLEMS Reds Expect War With US Within A Year

NEW YORK (NEA) — Sen. J. W. Fulbright, ever the pessimist, is now convinced that Red China's leaders "expect to be at war with the United States within a year."

An armed conflict between the Free World and the Communist is, of course, always a calculated risk. It has been a grim possibility since Lenin and his Bolsheviks seized power in Russia nearly 50 years ago.

Nevertheless, before predicting doom, Senator Fulbright and President Johnson's other critics — those who genuinely want peace with honor in Viet Nam — not a victory of the Communist Viet Cong — would do well to take another look at Red China's declining political fortunes.

Only six months ago, it seemed as though Mao Tse-tung's revolutionary brinkmanship was the wave of the future in most undeveloped nations. The three pillars of his aggressive policies in Africa, Asia and Latin America were Ghana's President Nkrumah, Indonesia's President Su-

Shamrock Bulging With Irish Visitors

SHAMROCK — This Panhandle town of 3,500 persons was the Irish capital of the Southwest today as 25,000 visitors flocked to Shamrock for St. Patrick's Day.

And when St. Patrick's Day comes around, as it did today, here for Shamrock's 20th annual, St. Patrick's Day celebration.

Day-long festivities running far into tonight were highlighted by the St. Pat's parade that got under way at 11 a.m., a festival for visiting bands, old settlers' registration, beard judging contest, selection this afternoon of Miss Irish Rose from 26 contestants and a windup tonight with a St. Patrick's Day grand ball, reign over by Miss Irish Rose, in the National Guard Armory.

Pampa Junior High School's band, directed by J. R. Doughton, was due in this afternoon for a concert at 3:30 p.m. and a sight reading contest at Shamrock High School at 4:30 p.m.

Pampa's official entry in the parade was a Top O' Texas float that carried Miss Vicki Autry, the city's entry in the Miss Irish Rose contest. Judging in the contest was set for 3 p.m.

Pampa's Leather N Lace Riding Club, led by parade marshal Judy Morris, was among many riding clubs from Oklahoma and Texas in this forenoon's parade. Gov. John Connally of Texas appeared on the speakers' rostrum shortly before the parade started and threw shamrocks to the crowd.

A 30-mile wind blew through Shamrock streets and made the going a bit rough for some of the parade floats.

Shamrock got its name because George Nichols, an Irish sheepherder, settled there when there was little else in the area. Texans look to Shamrock for a touch of Eire.

The townsfolk, Irish or not — and most are not — decorated the town with shamrocks and (See SHAMROCK, Page 3)

Deadline Tonight For Free Voter Registration

All poll taxless Gray counties who want to vote in future elections, free, must have their voter registration applications postmarked by midnight tonight.

A Supreme Court decision has ruled the Texas poll tax unconstitutional and free vote registration is in progress in the state.

Applications are available at the Tax office in Pampa, Gibsons and in McLean and LeFors.

As of noon Thursday 546 persons had registered in Gray County. Some 8,661 counties had bought their poll tax before the free vote was decided.

John Fainter, a representative from the state Attorney General's office, was in Pampa Thursday making a routine check and to assist in the voter registration.

Bill Steger, tax clerk, said the registration in Gray County was running "about equal with the rest of the state."

Tax collector Jack Back said that his office would close at the normal time 5 p.m., but as long as voter applications were postmarked before midnight tonight they would be accepted.

Astronauts Okay After Near Disaster in Space

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — Gemini 8 astronauts Neil Armstrong and David Scott headed home aboard a destroyer today to help puzzled scientists learn why their magnificently flying space machine suddenly turned into a potential death trap.

Their space spectacular cut short by two days, Armstrong and Scott were pronounced in great shape after an emergency landing in the western Pacific. But they had some scary moments before they came down from 185 miles aloft.

A disappointed nation could only learn from the federal space agency that the cause of the wild bucking and pitching of the Gemini 8 craft and Agena target it had docked with remained a mystery.

Despite the danger and the strain, the astronauts brought the ship down to a bullseye landing, only three miles from a hovering rescue plane.

They came through the ordeal in smiling spirits and clambered up a rope ladder in their spacesuits to the deck of the destroyer that picked them up in the Pacific.

During their 10-hour, 42-minute flight they had:

—Linked up with an object in space for the first time to show it could be done on future moon flights.

—Demonstrated superb flying skill both on assigned tasks and in emergency.

—Became the first American astronauts to be forced down suddenly.

Official after official from Flight Director John Hodge to Space Center Director Robert Gilruth said they "had no idea" what caused the sudden heaving and pitching that rolled the spacecraft 32 degrees a second and left a main steering rocket jammed.

Flight Director Hodge gave only one comment from the pilots, despite pressure from newsmen to release tapes of the last conversations before Gemini 8 started to come down.

"They said it took off in rrrll and yaw (pitching)," Hodge said. He said that was the only pilot comment he wrote down.

Bucking and pitching began when the 18-foot Gemini was docked nose-to-nose with the 26-foot Agena which also has maneuvering jets aboard.

TV Interruption Brings Complaints

At 4:15 p.m., EST Wednesday, America learned through the familiar "we interrupt this program to bring you a special announcement" that the Gemini 8 astronauts were in trouble in space.

The stark report of the near disaster brought 70 million or more Americans to their television sets. Most watched, anxiously and eagerly, for any word on how the emergency landing in the Pacific was going. Other viewers, a small but agitated minority, griped because their favorite programs were interrupted or canceled.

Soon after the first bulletin, the switchboard at a Pittsburgh television station was swamped with complaints because the regular program — a series titled "Lost in Space" — was preempted by the real life spatial mishap.

The American Broadcasting Co. (ABC) in New York said more than 1,000 angry "Batfans" called to complain that the Batman television series was interrupted three times for bulletins on the progress of the space emergency.

"What are you trying to do?" asked a Detroit father. "I've got seven kids and they're all howling and screaming."

France Plans Upgrade of Red Relations

WASHINGTON (UPI) — French President Charles de Gaulle may be planning to raise the level of France's official relations with Communist North Viet Nam.

Coming on top of De Gaulle's challenge to NATO, such a move would further strain U.S.-French relations.

Since 1954, when Viet Nam was partitioned, France has been represented in Hanoi by a "delegation," which handles trade and other routine matters. The French described this mission as "quasi-diplomatic" — one notch below full diplomatic relations.

In January, France appointed a new head of the delegation, of higher rank than his predecessor. He is Charles Simon de Quirelle, who previously had been France's ambassador to Gabon. The appointment caused some speculation that De Gaulle intended it as a gesture toward increasing the status of the Hanoi mission.

Dirksen May Use Filibuster Again On Minimum Wage

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate GOP Leader Everett M. Dirksen, who led a filibuster that killed a bill to nullify laws banning the union shop, kept alive Monday the possibility he would use similar tactics against administration-backed minimum wage, jobless benefits and picketing measures.

Dirksen said a decision on whether to filibuster against the three House bills depends on whether some of the "rough corners" are taken off the legislation.

The Illinois Republican noted that the administration already had toned down organized labor's demand for a \$2 hourly minimum wage. The bill approved by a House committee called for an increase from the present \$1.25 to \$1.60 an hour by February, 1968.

"The White House... had to push them back on their haunches," Dirksen said.

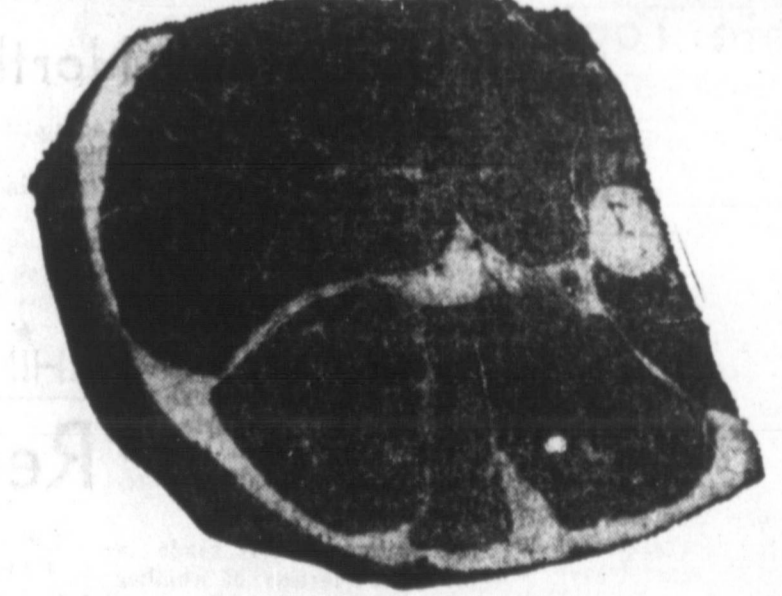

the images of leprechauns and splashes of green. Green bears sprouted. Green ties were dredged up from dresser drawers.
The annual celebration was kicked off last night at a St. Patrick's Eve banquet attended by approximately 800 persons in the National Guard Armory. Gov. John Connally was principal speaker at the banquet. Gov. Jack Campbell of New Mexico, also was a guest. Gov. Connally recalled the blending of many cultures in Texas — "as with the Irish celebration in this ranch - and farm - and - g oriented community.
"We rarely think of Texas as a melting pot of races, nationalities, and cultures, but in truth this is an essential part of our heritage," Connally said. "We celebrate St. Patrick's Day, in a town called Shamrock because of an Irish sheepherder, George Nichols, who lived in a dugout six miles north of here." History shows, Connally added, that of the 181 men who defended the Alamo, cradle of Texas independence, 20 per cent were born in foreign countries. Connally said a better understanding of the state's heritage is important to the development of Texas.

standing of the state's heritage is important to the development of Texas.
"Of all its cultural strengths Texas as a state has devoted little of its energies and resources to the enhancement of these attributes.
"As rich as Texas is in geography, in variety, in beauty, in recreation — it has no greater attraction than the attraction of itself.
"To people throughout the civilized world, the name Texas is a catalyst for wonderment and dreams, a place of heroes and legends," the governor said.

The Chinese Communists, by their aggressiveness and irreconcilability, especially in Vietnam, have repelled most, if not all, of their allies in Asia, Africa and Latin America.

The Russians, despite their harsh attacks on President Johnson, fear an escalation of the Vietnamese war and have successfully outmaneuvered and isolated their Chinese rival.

This was even conceded in the latest editorial of Red Flag, the theoretical mouthpiece of Peking's rulers.

Red Flag bluntly warned Hanoi's leaders against Russia's designs "to sow dissension between China and North Viet Nam." It called on them "to draw a clear line" between themselves and Russia's revisionists.

This warning to Hanoi against "collaboration" with Russia followed the publication in Peking press of an appeal to Ho Chi Minh to ignore the congress of the Russian Communist party scheduled to open in Moscow March 29.

"The telephone is all yours,

my dear," I said. "Feel free to use it as long as you please. I will forego my own calls in the interest of your welfare."
"What are you talking about?" she asked. "You haven't used the phone for six months."
In all honesty I have to admit she was right. The telephone itself makes me fearful and uneasy. I always assume when there is a panther on my roof, or something equally dire.

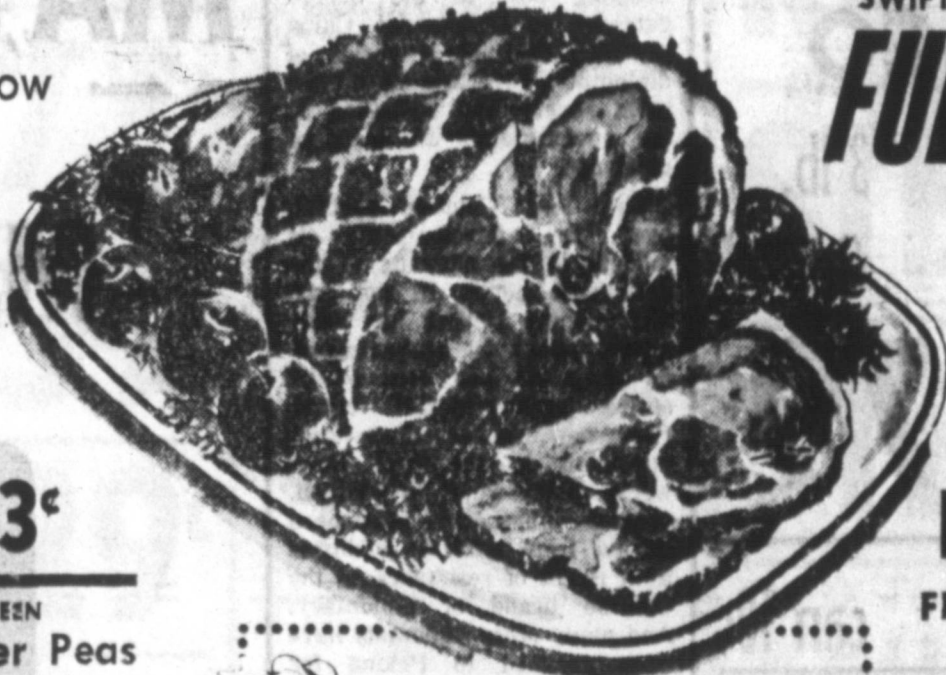

China Suffers Major Diplomatic Setback

(EDITOR'S NOTE: While the Western world regards Communist China with anxiety, the view of the world from Peking can only be bleak and dismal. In the last eight months the Red Chinese have suffered a series of diplomatic reversals costing them loss of prestige and a loss of momentum in their drive to spread the revolutionary movement. The following dispatch describes the setbacks that have led to a shakeup in Communist China's diplomatic corps.)

HONG KONG (UPI)—In Havana, Cuban Premier Fidel Castro denounced Communist China and calls Mao Tse-tung "feeble minded."

Half a world away in Indonesia the country's new rulers outlaw the Communist party and accuse Communist Chinese Premier Chou En-lai of plotting a purge of anti-Red forces in the Indonesian army and government.

In Ghana a revolutionary government orders Chinese

engineers and technicians out of the country that had been their most privileged sanctuary in all of Africa.

Soviet Communist party officials prepare for a decisive conference that could lead to the Red Chinese being read out of the world Communist movement.

Spin a compass, and in any direction the needle points toward trouble for Communist China.

One after another the salesmen of the Chinese brand of world revolution have run into unexpected customer resistance. In recent months they have reported "no sale" in Indonesia, Cuba, Ghana and a scattering of other African countries.

Influence Weakens

They suffered reversals in Outer Mongolia, deepened the split with the Soviet Union, backed down on an ultimatum to India, and heard themselves denounced by such a staunch former ally as Castro.

Although they are believed calling some of the shots in the Viet Nam war, recent signs have pointed to a lessening of Red Chinese influence even in North Viet Nam.

Their reaction at home has been to reshuffle the diplomatic corps and tell the people that temporary reverses must be expected on the march to victory against the imperialists.

"The problem placed before us is clear," said a recent editorial in the Canton Yang Chen Wan Pao. "We are charged with the great task of carrying our country's socialist revolution through to the end and rapidly building socialism. We are also entrusted with the heavy responsibility of supporting world revolution and striving to win victory for world revolution."

The problems are multiplying and the burden of responsibility becoming heavier.

Most Severe Trouble

Some Sinologists in this listening post at the barred gateway to Communist China consider the recent series of diplomatic reversals to be the most severe and sustained in the government's 16 years of existence.

The Red Chinese concern over the developments is evident in the handling of the diplomatic corps. In the past few months Peking has reassigned about 10 ambassadors, or about 25 per cent of its entire ambassadorial corps. Five new ambassadors were appointed in the first three weeks of this year. In addition, several ambassadors have been shifted from African countries as a result of resistance to the Chinese brand of diplomacy. And many other diplomats have been recalled to Peking for consultations.

The underpinning of Communist Chinese diplomacy began shifting last June after a coup in the host country of Algeria forced postponement of the long-planned second Afro-Asian Conference.

China's Premier Chou En-lai and Foreign Minister Chen Yi had expected to use the conference as a forum for denouncing the United States on Viet Nam, wooing fence-sitting neutral nations, and improving their position against the Russians whom they expected to bar from the meeting.

Kashmir Disgrace

With the postponement of the conference, they lost their propaganda forum and then

suffered a more obvious reversal because of their meddling in September's brief war between India and Pakistan. After issuing an ultimatum to India the Red Chinese obviously backed down and then suffered a dismal diplomatic defeat when the Soviet Union stepped in as a successful peace maker in Asia by bringing the Indian and Pakistani leaders together at Tashkent.

The most spectacular reversal was suffered in Indonesia when an October revolt, backed by the pro-Chinese Communists, was smashed. Thousands of Communists were put to death in the aftermath of the revolt and anti-Communist outbursts continued. The Indonesian Communist party later was banned entirely when Gen. Soeharto took over power from President Sukarno.

In Africa, Chou En-lai and Chen Yi tried to sell their brand of communism with little noticeable success. Then came the overthrow of perhaps their best friend in Africa, Kwame Nkrumah of Ghana. And to make the setback even more obvious, it came while he was visiting in Peking.

Castro Joins Chorus

The turn of events in Ghana was at least as embarrassing for the Red Chinese diplomats as the sudden attack last month on Peking policies by Fidel Castro who charged "economic aggression" in a dispute over a rice deal. The Chinese complained that Castro had joined "the chorus" of abuse being heaped on the Peking government.

In Hong Kong a number of experienced China watchers see signs that Red Chinese influence may be lessening in the North Viet Nam capital of Hanoi. These conclusions are based on Peking's increasing complaints and denunciations against Russian "meddling" in North Viet Nam.

The Sino-Soviet feuding could reach a new crescendo at the 23rd party congress set to start in Moscow March 29. China may boycott the meeting, but it is possible the developments there will bring a final break in Moscow-Peking relations—diplomatically as well as ideologically.

And not all of the trouble between Moscow and Peking has its roots in the dispute over whose brand of communism shall prevail throughout the world. There also is the question of the rambling central Asian border between the countries.

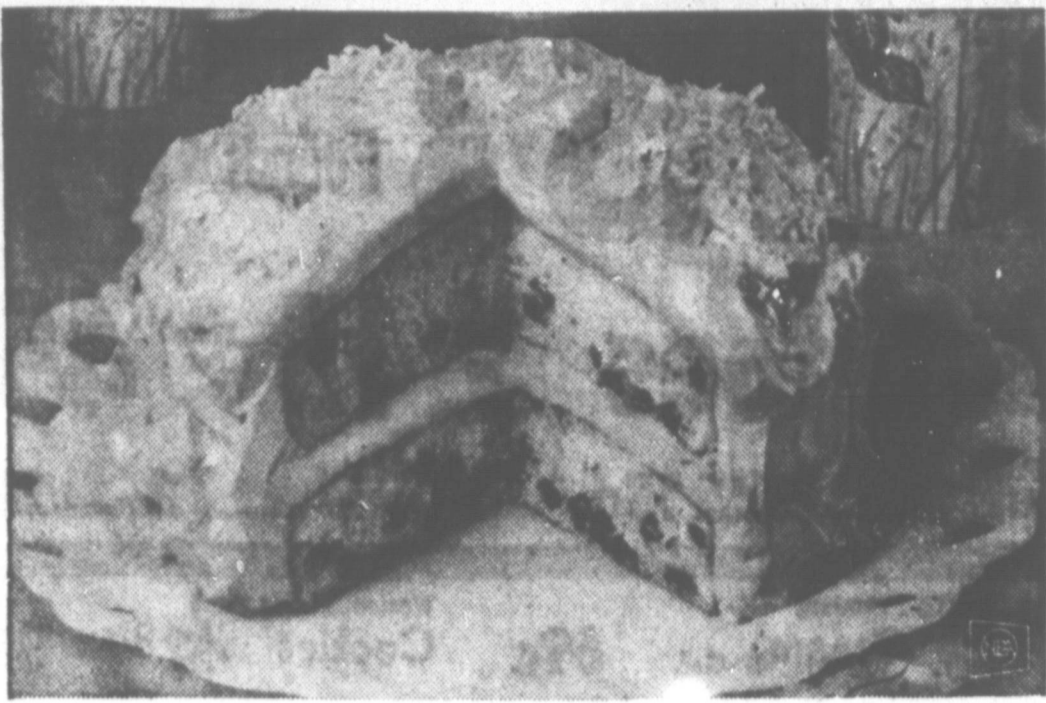

Squash Custard

Desserts with a slight Yankee accent are popular in all parts of our well-fed land. Traditionally, New England prides itself on squash and apples. Today these products are most often sold in convenience form, either canned or frozen. These examples give appetizing explanation.

- PILGRIMS' SQUASH CUSTARD**
- 1 cup granulated sugar
 - 1 package (12 ounces) frozen mashed squash, thawed
 - 1/4 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
 - 3 eggs, well beaten
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 2 teaspoons grated orange rind
 - 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 - 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
 - 1 1/2 cups light cream
 - Sweetened whipped cream
 - Blanched slivered almonds

In a skillet over very low heat, melt sugar without stirring until it is pale golden brown. Pour caramelized sugar into a slightly warmed 1-quart baking dish (not a tin-lined dish) and rotate dish until inside is coated. Mix squash, sugar, eggs, salt, orange rind and spices. Gradually stir in cream. Pour mixture into caramel-lined dish. Bake in a preheated slow oven (325 degrees) for 50 to 60 minutes, or until a silver knife inserted in center comes out clean. Cool and then chill. When ready to serve, run a sharp knife around edge to loosen and invert on a serving platter. Accompany with sweetened whipped cream and a sprinkling of slivered almonds. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

For Lent

Monk's skillet is an old California recipe for Lent. For 8 servings cook 4 (10-ounce) packages of frozen brussels sprouts as label directs. Drain. Heat 1-3 cup of olive oil in large skillet. Add 2 cloves of garlic, crushed, 2 tablespoons each of pine nuts and finely-chopped seedless raisins, 1 tablespoon of capers, 1/2 cup of pitted black olives, sliced, 1 (2-ounce) can of anchovy filets, drained and chopped, and cooked sprouts. Simmer 5 minutes.

Foods have less flavor when they are cold which is something to keep in mind when serving canned fruits. The fruit will seem more flavorful if the can is opened and the fruit is allowed to come to room temperature.

It's the heat, not the pressure, that gives good ironing results, say home economists.

Cake batter can be frozen for later use. Just remember to let it thaw only long enough to pour. Long thawing makes for a heavier cake.

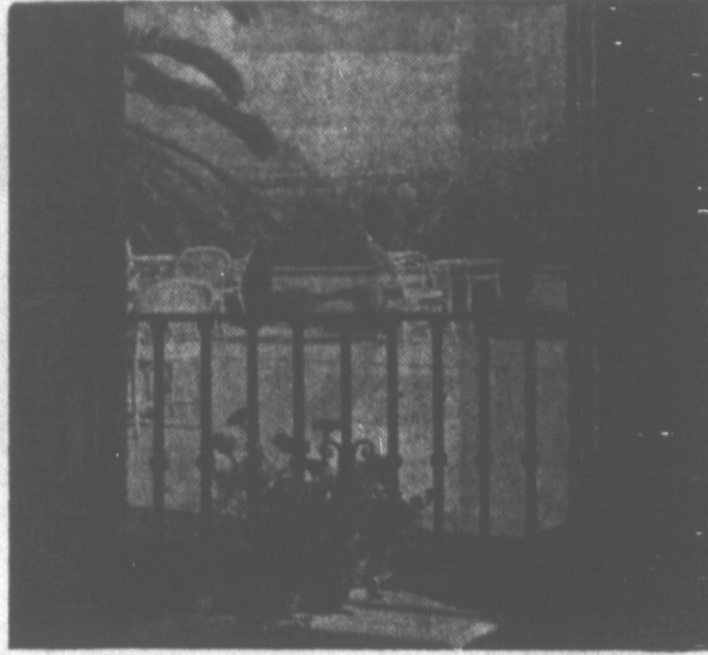
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Meat production remains on an even keel, according to the Agriculture Department's Consumer and Marketing Service.

In most areas beef is a good buy. Roasts, most steak cuts, and ground beef are slightly down in price. Pork also is showing attractive prices because of increased seasonal demand. Check for promotional displays of bacon, and roasts. Broiler-fryers and turkeys are the mainstays on the meat counter. They remain in good supply with good prices.

In the vegetable bin, Southwestern harvests are bringing in broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, endive, onions, green peppers, potatoes, sweet potatoes, and tomatoes in quantity and at attractive prices.

Pleasant fruits include apples, avocados, grapefruit, and oranges. All are in good supply at seasonally attractive prices. Nationally, canned red salmon, fish sticks and portions, and scallops are in abundant supply. Look for them at your neighborhood grocer's.

Pat Neal's Fight Back More Warming Than Movie Plots

GREAT MISSENDEN, England (UPI) — Patricia Neal finds it a triumph to be able to pick up a children's book and read.

The Academy Award-winning film actress, now living in a white farmhouse on the outskirts of this old English village, considers it a step toward regaining her health and returning to the movies—perhaps next year.

For a woman stricken dumb and blind and paralyzed by three massive strokes in February, 1965, her fight back is the final act of a drama more heart-warming than the plot of any of her films. Her Academy Award Oscar for best actress in 1964 was for the film "Hud." She deserves a matching Oscar for courage.

Miss Neal was 39 and at the height of her powers when she was felled in Hollywood by what doctors decided was a congenital defect in an artery. The battle to save her life was complicated by the fact she was pregnant.

Returned to England As soon as she was able to be moved by her husband, writer Ronald Dahl, 49, brought her back to their home, "Gypsy House," here. It is largely because of his patient care that Miss Neal's recovery has been so remarkable. Both he and his wife insisted on going through with the pregnancy and today beautiful six-month-old Lucy gurgled in the cradle as her mother cooked lunch.

Miss Neal still drags her right leg a bit and has trouble using her right arm. But her speech has only the slightest hesitancy and she has taught herself to read again. She also

can write but she laughingly described her writing as "like that of an idiot."

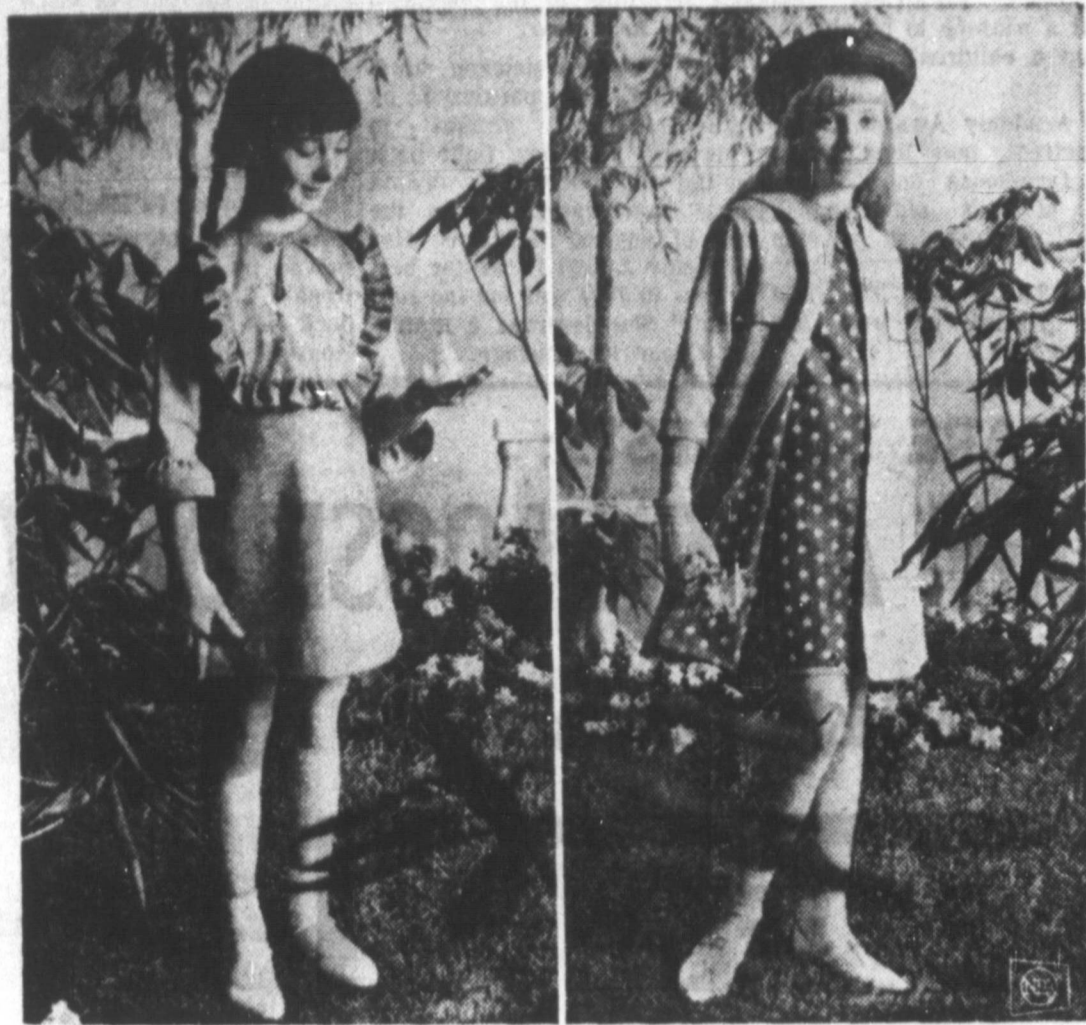

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

Bullets Gain On Idle Hawks

By United Press International The Baltimore Bullets have opened up a 1 1/2 game lead over the St. Louis Hawks in their battle for second place in the Western Division of the National Basketball Association. The Bullets gained on the idle Hawks Wednesday night when they scored a 118-113 victory over the New York Knicks. Don Ohl scored 39 points to pace the Bullets, who clinched the verdict on a late tap-in field goal by rookie guard Jerry Sloan. The Bullets and Hawks have lost 41 games each but the Bullets have 37 victories compared to the Hawks' 34. The Hawks play at San Francisco Thursday night while the Bullets are idle. The Bullets built an early 12-point lead and were in front 61-51 at halftime as Ohl scored 21 points in the first half. Howie Komives led the Knicks with 24.

Tough Test Due for Waller

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (UPI)—P. T. (Duddy) Waller, the new head basketball coach at the University of Arkansas, was named after former New York Giant first baseman Bill Terry, but he will have to hit better than 401 on the recruiting trail this spring to get Arkansas back in big time basketball. Terry was the last National League baseball player to hit more than .400, hitting .401 in 1930. Waller was born two years earlier in Emerson, Ark., near the Louisiana state line. His father, who had aspired to be a major leaguer, wanted to name him after Terry, but his mother wanted to name him Prentice; so it was Prentice Terry. It became Duddy because he looked like a friend of the family by that name. Any way he looks now, there is trouble. First, he succeeds Glen Rose, who was Mr. Basketball at Arkansas as a player and coach since he arrived on campus as a 6-foot-5 freshman in 1925. His record of 395-241 ranks ninth in the nation. And (2) Waller has only three reserves back from this year's 13-10 team.

Then (3) his ability to recruit will be tested to the fullest because the state has the best crop of high school cagers graduating this spring in modern history. Waller is no stranger to recruiting. He's handled most of it for Rose the last three years while serving as freshman coach. He was the state's premier young college coach when he came to the university as freshman coach in 1957 and since has waited in the wings while Rose coached into retirement. At 38, he faces a major rebuilding job, not only for next year, but for the future. The University has one of the most

successful football programs in the nation. It has lost only four university-caliber players from the state's high schools in six years. The basketball program has lost that many to Arkansas State College, which is trying to become the state's basketball power. Waller, football coach Frank Broyles and several wealthy alumni say the trend can be changed and already have started. Waller is banking on three factors to do the trick. They include a basketball coaches clinic held simultaneously with football coaches clinic this spring, and a summer camp for high school cagers.

The third factor is work. He has been recruiting so much recently that he has been home only two days (last Sunday and Monday) since Feb. 23. "I had to drive around before I could find my house," he said. And this week, he's at the National Junior College Tournament in Hutchinson, Kan., trying to find experienced players to go with his three returning lettermen. And the next week it's back on the road in Arkansas. His philosophy for a winning program is simple: "The No. 1 thing is get the boys and then work, work, work..."

SEMIFINALS TONIGHT

Brigham Young Is NIT Favorite

By JOE GERGEN NEW YORK (UPI)—One swan and three ugly ducklings are left in the National Invitation Tournament pond and by midnight tonight there will be only two afloat. The swan is top-seeded Brigham Young, a ranking national power, while the ducklings are Army, Villanova and New York University, none of which figured to get past the first round and all of which now find themselves in the semifinals of the nation's oldest pre-season basketball carnival. Brigham Young is a top-heavy 13-point favorite to reach Saturday's final but the Cougars face the rugged task of defeating Army's balloon tonight. Villanova, the last team selected to the 14-team field, is a three-point choice over NYU. Cinderella Team Bill Helkie, a 6-foot-3 center who wears contact lenses, has made the Cadets the Cinderella club of the tournament. He tallied 27 points as Army edged Manhattan 71-66 in the first round and tossed in 34 in a spectacular shooting exhibition against San Francisco as the Cadets stunned the heavily-favored Dons 80-63. As usual Army will be at a distinct height disadvantage against the Cougars. The Cadets, now 18-6, will rely on hustle, stamina, discipline and an aggressive, swarming defense to neutralize Brigham Young's rebounding edge.

The Cougars, runnerup to Utah in the Western Athletic Conference, boast two 6-foot-11 centers—Jim Eakins and Craig Raymond—and two rugged forwards in 6-foot-5 Steve Kramer and 6-foot-4 Gary Hill. Helkie is the tallest starter for West Point. The backcourt, however, is what makes Brigham Young go. Dick Nemelka, at 6 feet, and 6-foot-1 Jeff Congdon run well, shoot even better and fire amazingly accurate passes. They scored 49 points between them as the Cougars ousted Temple 80-68 in the quarter-finals. The nightcap figures to be closer although Villanova's Bill Melchioni has the ability to completely dominate any game. A wispy 6-foot-1 guard, Melchioni scored 33 as the Wildcats, who got into the NIT only because Connecticut refused a bid, upset defending champion St. John's 63-61 and added 30 as they topped Boston College 86-85. Villanova, which reached the finals last year but lost to St. John's when Melchioni came down with the flu and played but a few moments, defeated NYU in the semifinals last year 91-69. NYU's Violets, the only New York team remaining of the three that started the tournament, relies entirely on its first five of Mal Graham, senior Stan McKenzie, Bruce Kaplan, Richie Dyer and Charles Silen.

Walker Expects to Win Flag

FORT MYERS, Fla. (UPI)—Manager Harry Walker expects the Pittsburgh Pirates to win the 1966 National League pennant. "We proved last year we had what it takes," Walker insists. "All we have to do is to avoid injuries and illness and have our younger players continue to improve." The Pirates, after a dismal start, finished third last year, seven games behind the champion Los Angeles Dodgers. They won only nine of their first 33 games with second baseman Bill Mazaroski on the sidelines with a fractured bone in his right foot and outfielder Roberto Clemente below par because of an attack of malaria. Mazaroski returned to the lineup on May 19, sparked the club to a 12-game winning streak, and about that same time Clemente started to hit the way he usually does and the

Pirates went on to an 81-49 record for the final 130 games. Proof Positive "That proved to the players and to me that we can do it this season," Walker said. "At one time we were 15 games below .500 but you expect that when you lose outstanding players like Mazaroski and Clemente. Now they both are healthy and raring to go. "So I have to figure our chances are as good as anyone else. Our morale is high, our mental attitude couldn't be better and we have jelled as a team." With two exceptions the Pirates will go with the same players as last year. They obtained center fielder Matty Alou from the Giants for pitcher Joe Gibbon and relief pitcher Pete Mikkelsen from the Yankees for pitcher Bob Friend. Gibbon was 4-9, Friend 8-12. She could find plenty of competition, however, and the stiffest might come from defending champion Kathy Whitworth who stepped in and took over as the 1965 LPGA tour's top moneymaker when Mickey took up the books. Miss Wright turned the winning trick here in 1961 and 1963. Nobody ever has put victories back-to-back in the 13 year history of the tournament. Ken Harrelson and Ossie Chavarris each hit a two-run homer as the Kansas City Athletics belted the Pittsburgh Pirates 12-5. Rookie catcher Glen Clark, inserted into the lineup when Gene Oliver was hurt, drove in three runs to lead the Atlanta Braves to a 6-2 victory over the Washington Senators. George Smith and Tony Horton had three hits apiece as the Boston Red Sox topped the Philadelphia Phillies 5-3. Center fielder Ken Berry, who was hitless in his first 17 at bats, drove in three runs with a double and a triple as the Chicago White Sox ripped the Cincinnati Reds 10-4.

Braves Trial Nearing End

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—After practically insulting the intelligence of baseball field managers to think off the field, the defense in the Braves' antitrust trial did enter into agreement that most of today should be a holiday in honor of St. Patrick. Circuit Judge Elmer Roller said he expected the state to formally rest its case after opposing counsels, working this morning in the privacy of chambers on the privileged secret financial records of National League teams, convinced him on whether to make them part of the trial. Roller said the trial then would be suspended until Friday morning, when the defense will take over. Leo (The Lip) Durocher almost certainly wouldn't like it and soft-spoken Walter Aiston might even find it appalling to learn that one of baseball's legal minds believes managers should, in effect, be seen and not heard off the field. This verdict was put into the record by Earl Jinkinson, an attorney for the Braves, in discussing Wednesday whether manager Bobby Bragan had a right to have an opinion about major league expansion. 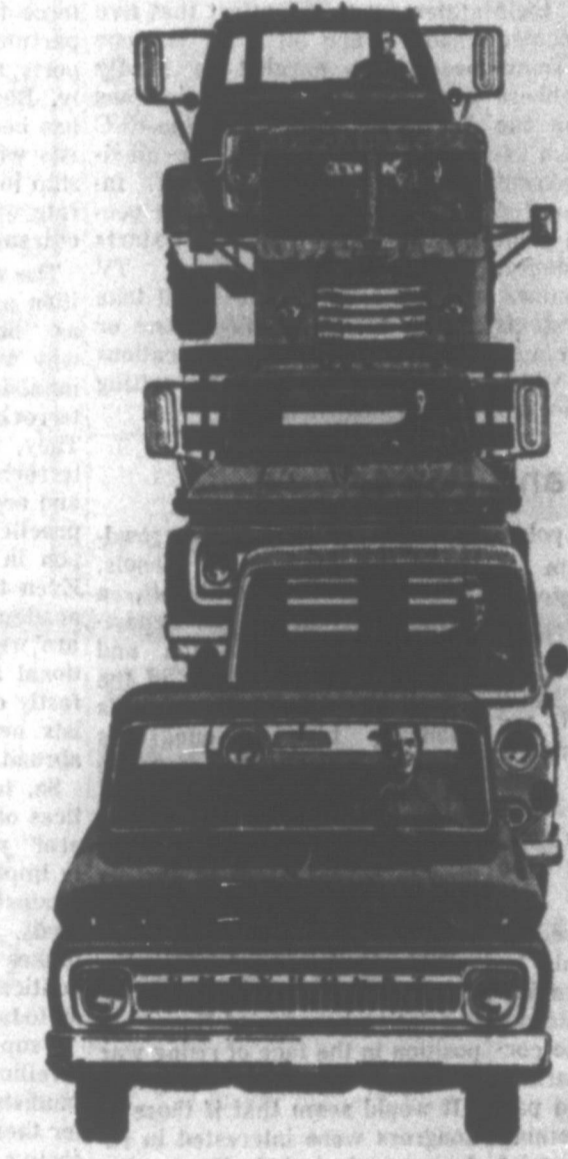
