



Broader opportunities need to be developed in every corner of America, in small towns and large, in rural areas as in urban. Business leaders and men in public life at all levels recognize this, and policies public and private are being developed to encourage more diversified growth. Several bills are before the 89th Congress aimed at promoting rural development. Among them is the proposal entitled the "Community Development District Act of 1966." Deliberations have not yet begun on this measure by the Agriculture Committees of the House and Senate but are expected to begin shortly. The measure would provide for "Community Development Districts" to be established to plan and coordinate area-wide devel opment of facilities and services. Whether this legislation will be generally supported in Congress and the country remains to be seen, but it points up the fact that thought is being given to the future.

We in the Panhandle have a story to tell about area development - and the pattern we can show could well be studied and imitated elsewhere. Blessed with abundant resources and excellent soils and climate, the people of the Panhandle have been able to put together in a relatively short period of time a unified economic base offering a broad range of opportunities in agriculture and industry. As further strides are made in developing the Panhandle's agricultural potential as well as its mineral resources, we are going to witness a steady upward curve in population in our towns and on the land and on increasingly larger choice of vocations to attract Panhandle young people who wish, after graduation from high school or college, to make their permanent homes in their native area.



Lemons also told that Randy Matson became known as Herman Munster at the All-College tournament in Oklahoma City.

"He just has so much strength and desire he never realizes he's fouling. He just starts going and can't stop," Lemons allowed.


