Rusk Reiterates US Desire to Talk Peace

Claims Chinese Reds Batman's Driving Will Not Negotiate

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Secretary of State Dean Rusk says the United States is prepared at any time for discussions with Red China on peace in Viet Nam "but the other side keeps hanging up the phone.

Rusk said the United States has held 129 meetings with Chinese Communist representatives in Warsaw, "We have been in touch with them on more serious subjects and more persistently than perhaps any government that has diplomatic relations with Peking except perhaps . . . the Soviet Union," ie said.
