

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## **Television** in Review

By RICK DU BROW HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — "The differences in the atmospheres surrounding the changes were also unquestionably obvious: the more dramatic and sometimes violent adjustments of the 16th century, as opposed to the more moderate and open armed alterations of tolinking it to today's news.



Technically, the contrast of then-and-now was aided by using modern footage of the sites of some of the earlier historic events, and also employing art works and other proper devices to reconstruct the past.

This was the fourth and final program of NBC-TV's "Of Men and Freedom" series of specials, and, quite frankly, although the past shows had their ups and downs, it really wasn't too clear until Sunday evening exactly what the hours were trying to do.
