Any resident can bring in specimens of diseased shrubs, grasses or trees for identification of the problem. Recommendations will be made on how to correct the problem.

From 3 until 5 p.m. a limited number of home visits can be made. However, it is suggested where specimen can be brought to the County Extension office, this procedure should be followed. The greater number of people could benefit in this manner.

Resilient Tile Is More Economical Than Carpeting

Resilient tile flooring is substantially more economical than carpeting for initial installation. maintenance and repairs, it has been proven by a thorough study conducted by a research team of the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce, University of Pennsylvania.

Cost data were obtained by interview surveys and time and motion studies. The group made studies of installed costs. service life, maintenance costs and costs of expendable equipment and supplies. The researchers took into account, among other things, the volume of traffic, desired appearance

and types of areas. The study team found no in stance where the total cost for carpet was less than for resilient flooring. Instead it found that the annual use cost of carpet ranged from 123 percent to 270 percent more than the an-

nual cost of resilient floors. The study also made comparisons of the cost of repairing resilient and carpeted floors. It was found that the average annual repair costs for carpeting were about 31/4 times that for resilient flooring.
