FIGHTING FAMINE

The free world's most populous nation is facing a food crisis. Poor harvests are expected to leave India short by some 12 million tons of food grains necessary to feed her more than 450 million people. The United States, which has been supplying India with some six million tons a year under current aid programs, is stepping into the breach to avert threatened famine. President Johnson has ordered immediate shipment of 1.5 million tons of wheat, and much more to come. The Agriculture Department says the U.S. should be able to get some 15 million tons of grain to India by next fall and, if necessary to meet the emergency, U.S. wheat output could be doubled within a year. A major problem is in handling shipments. India's port facilities, as at Bombay, right, are inadequate for the increased volume and ways of getting around the bottleneck are being sought, possibly through use of the ports of Pakistan.



India's population growth has outstripped grain production, with the result that a five-year decline in grain available per capita is accelerating.
