WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)-Declaring Japan intends to close the door of China to America, "even if war is necessary to ac-complish it," Chairman Pittman (D., Nev.) of the senate foreign relations committee today advo-cated naval and air forces "suffi-cient to protect" United States "rights."

Hurling criticism at Japanese policy in a speech on the senate floor prominent administration man spoke of treaties "openly and ruthlessly violated." He referred to what he called Japanese "threats," "propaganda," and "arrogance."

"China is still an independent sovereign government, at peace with the world, and desirous of trading with us," he said, "and there is nothing in the circumstances that can legally, or long physically, interfere with such trade.





WASHINGTON .- Higher income taxes on the well-todo, federal inheritance taxes on the wealthy, and retroactive excess profits taxes on processors who have been recovering AAA taxes through the courts will be Roosevelt's answer to recent jolts to the budget.

Proposed new tax legislation, if administration plans are not revised, will call for a billion dollars or more of levies to meet costs of the new farm program, the bonus, and the return or withholding of processing taxes under the old AAA program.

Most sensational aspects of the plan are its "soak the rich" phases and its objective of insuring lower prices for consumers by re-enacting of processing taxes at sub-

Simultaneously, Roosevelt plans a belligerent counterblow at backers of the American Liberty League and other wealthy groups which oppose him, an attractive alternative for the congressional inflationists and a gesture for millions of city consumers who have resented higher food prices.

The administration wants to raise about \$500,000,000 to pay for its farm relief-soil conservation program for the FRECKLES AND HIS FRIENDS next fiscal year.

It seeks nearly \$300,000,000 with which to pay off moral obligations and liquidating expenses under the old AAA contract system.

It wants \$250,000,000 to apply against extra bonus payment expenses, of which \$90,000,000 would be for this fiscal year and \$160,000,000 for next year.

The latter figure would be an annual expense, due to immediate bonus payment, spread through until 1945, the date originally stipulated for maturity of bonus certifi-

Roughly, in round numbers and subject to revision, the administration plan for raising the money is about as fol-

1. An additional tax, perhaps as high as 10 per cent, on all individual unearned income above \$10,000. This might bring in about \$325,000,000 to the treasury

2. Inheritance taxes at graduated rates on all inheritances of more than \$40,000. The yield presumably would be somewhere near \$300,000,000.

3. Processing taxes designed to raise about \$350,000,-000 instead of more than \$500,000,000 as under the old **AAA** schedules. This is where the consumer theoretically would get a better break than under the former program. Tentatively, it has been proposed to cut the tax on hogs from \$2.25 to 75 cents a hundredweight; the wheat tax from 30 to 20 cents; the cotton tax from 4.2 cents a pound, to 2.8 cents and the rye tax from 30 to 15 cents.

4. A special retroative excess profits tax of 90 per cent or more, through which the treasury would seek to recapture perhaps \$200,000,000 from processers who have had their impounded taxes refunded under the Supreme Court decision or who simply refused to pay.

You can see that the administration is determined that big packers, millers, and other processors who passed the tax on to consumers while "little fellows" were paying their AAA taxes must not be given those bonanzas at the expense of the taxpayers who already have paid as con-





MEXICO CITY, Feb. 10. (AP) The Mexican government ordered out federal troops at Tampico today to prevent any recurrence there of the labor clashes in which five persons were killed yesterday and

President Lazaro Cardenas, who was in Monterrey attempting to solve a labor dispute in that industrial center, directed Gen. Juan Andrew Almazan. commander of the Nuevo Leon military zone, to take control of Tampico and to investigate the conflict.

General Almazan ordered the troops to guard headquarters of union stevedores and their rival workers.

Tampico dispatches said a large group of workers, supporting municipal officials who were removed from office last week, held a mass demonstration late yesterday and attacked the longshoremen's headquarters, the maritime workers returned the fire.

Three stevedores were killed, and five wounded; two of their rivals wounded fatally, and 13 injured. All port operations were suspend-

No arrests were made, however, police reporting they were unable to find those responsible for the shooting

Although federal troops dispersed the fighters, Tampico dispatches said, feeling ran high in the northeastern seaport, and the maritime workers planned a mass demonstration later today in protest against what they called "out-

At Monterrey, President Cardenas told 13,000 demonstrators that he would settle a strike in the 'Vidriera" glass factory in accordance with law.

Appealing to both workers and employers to maintain a calm attitude, the president insisted he was convinced that "communism does not exist in Mexico.'

EX-SENATOR DECLARES **IDAHOAN HAS NEW** DEAL LEANINGS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. (P)—The tilt between Senator Borah (R-Ida) and Simeon D. Fess, former republican senator for Ohio, continued today, affording democratic leaders no small measure of delight.

The latest development was statement, published today, in which Fess again implied that Borah had new deal leanings. The man chosen for the republican nomination must be one, he said, who had supported "More republican measures than democratic measures."

Borah, hearing that Fess had threatened to "take a walk" if the Idahoan won the presidential nomination, had challenged Fess to what candidate he stood for and whether he favored the "old deal."

Democratic leaders maintained silence on the feud, but it was no secret that they were happy over it. Since Alfred E. Smith threatened to "take a walk" if the new deal were endorsed by the democratic convention they have been hoping for similar signs of schism in the republican ranks.

The Borah-Fess argument was generally considered symbolic of Borah's differences with what he calls the "old guard." Republican leaders in Ohio had planned to send an unpledged or "favorite son" delegation to the national convention but observers believed Borah's decision to enter that state in quest of delegates would spell abandonment of these plans.

Many believed the state central committee would endorse some leading presidential possibility, and they figured Borah would have less chance of getting this endorsement

than some others. Borah, in a statement Saturday, attacked the "favorite son" or unpledged delegation plan and called for "open, candid" declarations by candidates for delegates as to their presidential choice. He said he un-derstood Fess was for Herbert Hoover and challenged him to say so.

Fess denied this, but said he could be for Hoover without "having to make an apology." Father Charles E. Coughlin, Detroit radio priest, devoted himself to the money question in his broad-

cast yesterday, declaring "sound money must be government money." Further repercussions of Alfred E. Smith's Liberty league speech came from Albany, N. Y., where the Knickerbocker Press quoted Senator Pope (D-Idaho) as saying the speech "most unfortunate." 

Solons Hope to Go Back Home by May 1

By DOUGLAS B. CORNELL Associated Press Staff Writer Seeking to quicken the legislative tempo, congress leaders pushed the new farm bill today in an effort to pass it through both houses before Saturday.

Then they hope for quick action on such remaining issues as taxes, with the idea of adjourning congress by May 1 at the latest. They already had jettisoned the proposed permanent neutrality legislation, thus freeing the legislative barque of one controversy that threatened to delay the journey toward adjournment.

Fighting the new farm bill were some democrats and republicans. The latest to attack it was Senator Walsh (D-Mass.) who said in a statement published today that it was a "dangerous" bill conferring "autocratic and blanket authority" on the secretary of agriculture. He said the measure was "neither valid in law nor valid in economics."

The bill was on the senate cal-endar for renewed debate today, while the house may start discussing it Thursday.

Designed as a substitute for the invalidated AAA, it authorizes the federal government to pay farmers who conserve soil by withdrawing acreage from production of commercial crops. Subsidies would be paid direct to individuals or through the medium of cooperating states. After two years, subsidies would be granted only in states agreeing to cooperate.)

"The conclusion seems to be inescapable that this is a measure dubious constitutionality, or indefinite grant of bureaucratic power and control over agriculture and incredible financial burden—all
