# Strength to Reach 305,000 by July; No Reserve Callup

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The United States is prepared, if necessary, to jump its troop strength in Viet Nam to 305,000 men by July 1.

That would be done by sending the equivalent of more than two additional combat divisions with supporting units, 100,000 men in all, into the war.

No reserve callup would be needed for this 42 per cent increase

The nation simultaneously could mobilize nine divisions of active and reserve forces, totaling 350,000 men, and have them ready for deployment within 90 days if conflicts threatened elsewhere in the world.

And the nation also has the Korean war and still avoid a capacity to push its forces in reserve callup. The Korean South Viet Nam to a higher peak was more than 350,000 peak than reached in the men.

# **Runaway River Barges Caught**

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)- A fleet of barges, running wild like stampeding steers, wreaked havoc at the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers riverfront base Wednesday before being lassoed and corralled just short of the main port area. A fleet of 21 tugs, fire boats and other craft waged a twohour flight on the swollen Mississippi river to intercept the runaways and push them to shore.

The barges, some of them manned by disconcerted workmen who later were rescued, slammed into the engineers base. They wrecked piling clusters, touched off a \$5,000 fire and set 15 more barges and three other large craft adrift. But there were no injuries. Joined by the new runaways, the barges hurtled down the river on a six - knot current, swept around a bend and bore down on the hastily assembling roundup fleet.

The Mississippi, fed by heavy rains and runoff from the was 14.7 feet above sea north. level. The high water level, strong current and wave action were blamed for the neardisaster. Lines mooring the barges to the bank were snapped like strings. Helicopters and airplanes helped the tugs intercept the

runaways. The last of the barges was rounded up about a half-mile upstream from the bustling main port area, where dozens of ships and facilities lay exposed and helpless on both sides of the swift-running river.

Questioned about this, Rhodes denied he had intended here to "coin a phrase" or deliberately to use a "Johnson's war" label. But he declined an opportunity to back away from the remark, which he made twice.

The targets of the GOP leadership were Democrats who criticized Johnson's policies during the Senate's drawn-out debate on the \$4.8 billion emergency military aid bill. which was passed by both houses Tuesday.

Calling on the President to disavow his Senate critics lest further damage be done, the Republicans said:

"In an effort to please the conflicting elements in the Democratic party, the administration has had to dodge and shift. Its policy and position on Viet Nam continues to be marred by indecision, sudden change and frequent reinterpretation.

"Under the circumstances it is little wonder that the enemy has been encouraged, our triends dismayed and the 'national unity that can do more to bring about peace negotiations than almost any other thing' has been delayed." They said the "national unity" phrase was quoted from Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey. They also quoted Humphrey in charging that Sen Robert F. Kennedy's peace plan for Viet Nam amounted to
