
\$500,000,000 farm bill by nightfall was the aim of house leaders to day as they rallied against amendments unacceptable to them.

Since leaders plan to pass the measure as an amendment to a very similar bill recently approved by the senate, further action by the latter chamber will be necessary before the legislation goes to the white house

Yesterday the house, following the senate's example, wrote into the bill a \$500,000,000 limit on the money which can be spent in any one eyar.

(The hill a substitute for the invalidated AAA, amends the 1935 soil conservation act by authorizing federal payments direct to farmers until December 31, 1937, for soil conservation and "economic" land. After Dec. 31, 1937, or earlier if states desired to cooperate, the federal payments would go to farm ers through state agencies. Pay ments then could be made stabilizing agricultural supplies and maintaining farmers' purchasing power, as well as the original purfarmers' purchasing poses)

Leaders indicated that an amend ment proposed by Rep. McCormack (D., Mass.), designed to protect consumers against skyrocketing prices, might be successful. The partments. amendment provides that in discouraging overproduction, the government should take as its standard the domestic needs of 1920-29, and not try to fit production to needs of less prosperous years. at both hours. neasure as an amendment to a very similar bill recently approved the senate, further action by the latter chamber will be necessary before the legislation goes to the white house.

Yesterday the house, following senate's example, wrote into the hill a \$500,000 000 limit on the money which can be spent in any one eyar.

(The bill, a substitute for the invalidated AAA amends the 1935 soil conservation act by authorizing federal payments direct to farmers until December 31, 1937, for soil conservation and "economic" use of and. After Dec. 31, 1937, or earlier if states desired to cooperate, the federal payments would go to farm ers through state agencies. Pav ments then could be made stabilizing agricultural supplies and maintaining farmers' purchasing power, as well as the original pur-
