


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
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





















South Suffers Setback, Star's Knee Injured

Radish roses Cucumber slices Lettuce Soften gelatin in the cold water. Add boiling water and stir until dissolved. Combine

with the cottage cheese that has been blended smooth in electric blender or mixer. horseradish, lemon juice, salt sugar and paprika. Mix well and pour into fancy 1-quart mold. Chill until firm.

Unmold on lettuce leaves and surround with the vegetables, arranging in a pretty pattern. If ring mold is used, fill center with vegetables.
