





SHAMROCK - A 30-year-old woman of Latin-American descent was arrested in Dallas yesterday on charges of kidnaping a 252-year-old boy from his grandfather's home in Shamrock.

Danny Ray' Wright, son of Mrs. L. C. Brown of Albuquerque, N.M., was found unharmed Sunday in a Dallas home, where they had been staying.

The woman, identified as Virginia Higgins Martin, claims, to be from San Antonio and Los Angeles.

Wheeler County sheriff's deputies said the boy was taken Sept. 3 from the home of Luther Tucker, who had been caring for the boy about a year.

Deputy John Topper said the boy was seen with a woman the day he was reported missing. The woman reportedly was seen getting into a cattle truck leaving town.

Police Cite Wheeler County officials issued a warrant for the woman's arrest last Monday.

J. Gordon Shanklin, special agent in charge of the Dallas Division, said there was no motive for the abduction.
