



The airlines operate under the 1934 Railway Labor Act which provides machinery for dealing with strikes likely to imperil the national health or safety The most recent congressional definition of presidential powers to prevent or to end such strikes was stated in 1940, the Taft-Hartley Act. T-H authorizes the President to seek federal court injunctions to prevent or to end a strike or lockout imperiling the national health or safety. That is no protection against regional strike disaster. A state probably could legislate and act against a strike or lockout imperiling state health or safety. There is solid precedent for state laws against strikes by state or municipal employes. The first basis of all government efforts to prevent disastrous labor trouble is to let the situation cool. Second there is punishment for unions, union leaders and, occasionally, indi-

vidual strikers. Government officials are reluctant, however, to penalize individual strikers, so reluctant that they refuse to enforce their own laws. Experience indicates that severe penalties for illegal strikes can be enforced only against labor leaders and against their unions, usually by heavy fines or imprisonment for contempt
