Guard Cools Cicero With Bayonet Jabs

CICERO, Ill. (UPI)—National Guard troops fired live ammunition over the heads of a frenzied mob and slashed at least six screaming whites with bayonets Sunday to protect 200 marchers who dared parade the streets of this all-white Chicago suburb under the banner of "black power."
"We had to do that, baby," declared Robert Lucas, the Congress of Racial Equality militant who stole the civil rights thunder from Dr. Martin Luther King by leading the tumultuous march.
Only the presence of 2,300 National Guardsmen—armed to the teeth and under orders to shoot to kill—prevented the two hour march from turning into a major and probably bloody riot.
Ended with Fight
As it was, the march ended with a pitched battle between Negro marchers and infuriated whites. State troopers were knocked to the ground, guardsmen screamed and jabbed their bayoneted rifles at the mob and bricks, bottles and rocks filled the air.
Maj. Gen. Francis P. Kane, who commanded the troops, said his men wounded at least six civilians with bayonet thrusts. Several other persons were injured, including a young Negro who marched with blood

Four U.S. Planes Downed During Raids In Viet Nam

Bombs Leave Depots Burning In Ruins

SAIGON (UPI)—U.S. military spokesmen today reported the loss of four Air Force planes over Communist North Viet Nam. Three were downed during devastating attacks Sunday on transportation routes and supply areas, linking Hanoi with Communist China.
Two one-man F105 Thunderchief fighter-bombers and a two-man F4C Phantom were lost Sunday and all four crewmen were listed as missing. Another F105 was shot down today, but its pilot was rescued off the coast near Dong Hoi.
The toll brought to 361 the number of U.S. planes lost in the air war against the North. U.S. officials also reported that a U.S. Army twin-engine CV2 Caribou transport plane crashed into a village Sunday just after takeoff 255 miles northeast of Saigon. Four Viet Namese civilians were killed and 20 to 25 injured. Three Americans—crewmen aboard the plane were injured, a spokesman said. Cause of the crash was under investigation.
Left In Ruins
Two oil depots and an anti-aircraft site near Hanoi were left in exploding ruins Sunday as U.S. Air Force and Navy pilots took advantage of clear weather to mount 134 missions north of the 17th parallel.
In the South, government infantrymen and rangers chased hundreds of Viet Cong troops from a jungle hideout into the sights of U.S. helicopter gunships. At least 291 of the Communist guerrillas were killed, including 85 in the crossfire in a Viet Cong stronghold 140 miles southwest of Saigon in the Mekong Delta.
Although dusk, smoke and flak prevented a full report on Sunday's bomb damage, a partial list showed the American fliers destroyed 17 bridges, 29 barges, 14 warehouses, two anti-aircraft sites, 16 trucks, a radar site and three railroad boxcars.
Pilots heard thunderous secondary explosions around the Nguyen Khe oil depot only 10 miles north of Hanoi. A surface-to-air (SAM) missile battery in the same region was raked with rocket and 20mm cannon fire and one rocket snaked across the ground out of control.
The Mikong Delta fighting began Friday in the U. Minh Forest, long a Viet Cong stronghold. The Allied forces killed 85 on Friday, 13 on Saturday.

Pampans Mark End of Summer On Labor Day

Many Pampans today were enjoying a Labor Day recess from the daily work routine. It afforded them a chance to mark an end to summer activities by going on picnics, boating, swimming and other warm weather outdoor sports.
There was no official observance of the day in Pampa City, county, state and federal offices were closed. Some stores and business places were open as usual. Others remained closed on the holiday. There were no school classes, and no residential mail deliveries.
Top attraction, locally, was the third and final day of the 29th annual Top O' Texas golf tournament out at the Pampa Country Club course. Excellent weather and the holiday period were expected to attract a large gallery.
Although the Labor Day traffic toll was mounting throughout the state, Pampa and Gray County had reported no traffic fatalities up until noon today.
The Old Settlers Reunion at Mobeetie was expected to attract a good crowd with the highlight of the day being dedication of a historical marker at Fort Elliott, near Mobeetie. The dedication ceremony was held at 11:30 a.m., followed by a noonday barbecue and speeches by several political candidates including Bob Price of Pampa and Dee Miller of Amarillo, both seeking Rep. Walter Rogers' 18th District seat in Congress. An oldtime fiddlers' contest was to highlight this afternoon's program.
Boaters and water skiers headed for Lake Meredith and Lake McClellan.
Still others just stayed at home and took advantage of the holiday of rest. And for many it was work as usual.

Lin Now Heads Militant Chinese

HONG KONG (UPI)—Roving bands of Communist Chinese Red Guard youths have begun terrorist house-to-house raids in Canton, the largest city in southern China, travelers arriving here said today.
They said the Red Guards uncovered a clandestine radio station and arms cache believed belonging to national Chinese agents in Canton. Others said the young zealots seized gold, jewelry and other valuables from terrified residents.
There were still other reports from travelers that worried residents in Canton had begun runs on banks to withdraw their deposits—sparked by Red Guard threats to cancel interest on deposits.
Almost all travelers returning from South China said that Red Chinese border guards had bolstered their security forces to prevent any mass exodus by worried citizens.
The Red Guard militants are carrying out the house-to-house searches on an around the clock basis, the arrivals said.
But—the raids are—the most severe at night, they said.
Travelers said Canton, capital of Kwangtung Province, was like a "ghost town" at night. All shops are closed after 8 p.m. and only Red Guards are permitted on the streets.
There were other reports that some residents of Canton were being sent to the countryside to keep them out of contact with "foreign influence" of visitors from Hong Kong and Macao.
The upsurge of Red Guard activity in the south of China came as reports reaching here and Tokyo indicated that Defense Minister Lin Biao, the second-ranking figure in China, has assumed leadership of the Red Guard movement and its anti-Western campaign.
In a broadcast monitored here, Peking Radio Sunday quoted a teen-age Red Guard who said Lin had agreed to become leader of the Red Guards and accepted the "No. 1 Red Guard armband."
Leadership of the Red Guards would place Lin, widely (See CHINESE, Page 3)

DeGaulle Speaks On Mining In New Caledonia

NOUMEA, New Caledonia (UPI)—President Charles de Gaulle indicated today France would not allow any American or foreign mining companies to exploit mineral rich French islands in the Pacific.
He told the territorial assembly that "as much as possible," had to be extracted and that "French national interests came first."
It was the first time since his arrival here Friday on the fourth lap of a world tour that De Gaulle made a direct reference to nickel mining, the main resource of this French Pacific colony.
Observers said the remark ended hopes of local political and business circles who for years have been trying to get the French to lift their ban on the establishment here of the American-Canadian International Nickel Co. (INCO).
A French company, Le Nickel, has the monopoly on the mineral in this tropical island. Its annual production of 38,000 tons of finished metal ranks New Caledonia as the world's third largest producer.
Earlier in the day, De Gaulle called on Melanesian tribal leaders to see that full development was maintained on this tropical territory.
De Gaulle was then taken on a visit through Noumea's commercial and residential districts. He was warmly applauded by tourists.
Although one of three local inhabitants owns a car and earns an average of \$250 a month, many politicians and businessmen believe the monopoly enjoyed by Le Nickel has stifled New Caledonia's economic potential.
On Tuesday, De Gaulle flies on to the New Hebrides, a two-hour flight to the north, for a one-day tour of the French-British island condominium as part of his 27,000-mile world tour.

Rio Grande Marchers To Arrive On State Capitol Grounds Today

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—Marchers, who left Texas' lower Rio Grande Valley July 4 on a 380-mile trip on behalf of a \$1.25 hourly minimum wage for farm workers, hoped today for a crowd of 50,000 on the state capitol grounds.
The marchers, their ranks swollen from an average of 40 to nearly 200, walked into Austin from Slaughter Creek, Tex. Sunday in humid, 94-degree heat.
They were led by a burro with a big \$1.25 painted on its side.
They were strung out along the service road to Interstate 35 nearly a half mile. They carried

Holiday Toll Is 20 Percent Ahead of 1965

The Labor Day weekend traffic death toll was already past the 500 mark today and appeared headed for a record.
With a full day yet to go—and the long ride home still to come for millions of Americans out for a final taste of summer—the National Safety Council said the death toll on the nation's highways was running 20 per cent ahead of last year's record Labor Day pace.
A United Press International tabulation at 11 a.m. CST today showed at least 469 persons killed in traffic accidents since the long weekend started at 6 p.m. local time Friday.

Drownings 64
Planes 97
Miscellaneous 34
Total 618
California counted 40 dead in traffic to lead the nation. Ohio had 29 dead, Texas 28, New York 25, Pennsylvania 24 and Illinois and Iowa had 21 each.
The only states listing no traffic deaths were Alaska, Montana, New Hampshire and Rhode Island.
The safety council, in a pre-holiday estimate, said between 530 and 630 persons would die in highway accidents during the 78-hour holiday. A similar non-holiday period at this time of year would result in 450 deaths.
The record Labor Day traffic death toll was set last year when 575 persons died.

Speech Upsets Viet Minister

SAIGON (UPI)—South Vietnamese Foreign Minister Tran Van Do bitterly criticized French President Charles de Gaulle's call for a complete U.S. withdrawal from Viet Nam, it was disclosed today.
He said the French chief of state was "doubtlessly blinded by his anti-Americanism." The foreign minister also said he "deplored" that De Gaulle was so misinformed about the war in Viet Nam.
Tran Van Do's statement Friday was the first official South Vietnamese reaction to De Gaulle's speech of Thursday in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, in which he demanded an American troop withdrawal as the first step toward restoring peace to war-torn Southeast Asia.
He appeared particularly bitter about De Gaulle's remarks that "the war has revised in the shape of a national resistance."
"I deplore that Gen. De Gaulle could be so misinformed, and unfortunately, he is not the only one," Tran Van Do said. "Other personalities and some well known ones keep saying recently that the war we have been fighting the past six years against the aggression from North Viet Nam is an independence war."
"They should have been more impartial, or better informed being at their position. Do they not know that since a cessation of hostilities agreement was signed in 1954, South Viet Nam has been in possession of its complete independence?"

Soldier Charged With 4 Killings

EL PASO, Tex. (UPI)—Leopoldo Morales, 27, was jailed today, charged with the murder of one of four other tenants of a boarding house found shot and slashed to death in the blazing building.
Police said they had a witness to the slayings but declined to identify him, other than that he was a soldier staying with one of the slain couples.
Firemen arrived at the boarding house owned by Albert Mearse, 72, to find every room afire. They found Mearse's body in a hallway outside his bedroom. The body of his wife, 75, was in bed. Both had their throats slashed.
Pvt. Michael Artz, 23, stationed at Ft. Bliss, was found half out a door to his apartment. He had been shot in the chest. Mrs. Artz, 20, was shot in the head and her body was on the floor.
Covers on the Artz' bed were ablaze.
All the bodies were removed from the house before fire destroyed them.
Firemen found Morales in a driveway next to the burning house, unconscious from smoke inhalation. Three firemen revived him then subdued him when he became belligerent, police said.
Police said they had established no motive for the slayings.

UT Expects Enrollment To Increase by 1000 Students

AUSTIN — The University of Texas in September expects to enroll about 1,000 more students than it had last fall, says Byron Shipp, registrar and director of admissions.

That would give the UT campus a student body of 27,235, compared with the 1965 fall enrollment of 26,230.

The anticipated gain will not be as large as those the University has experienced in the previous two fall semesters, when enrollment went up more than 1,800 in 1964 and more than 2,200 in 1965.

The forecast for the fall substantiates a prediction made last year by Mr. Shipp when he ventured that "we should begin to experience a leveling off in enrollment after the 1965-66 academic year."

"Actually, there was little appreciable increase in the number of high school graduates this spring (1966)," he points out.

According to Mr. Shipp's estimate, there will be about 727 fewer freshmen enrolling at the University; while the number of transfer students (including graduate transfers) is expected to increase by 371. The freshman enrollment is expected to be 3,550; the transfer enrollment, 3,685.

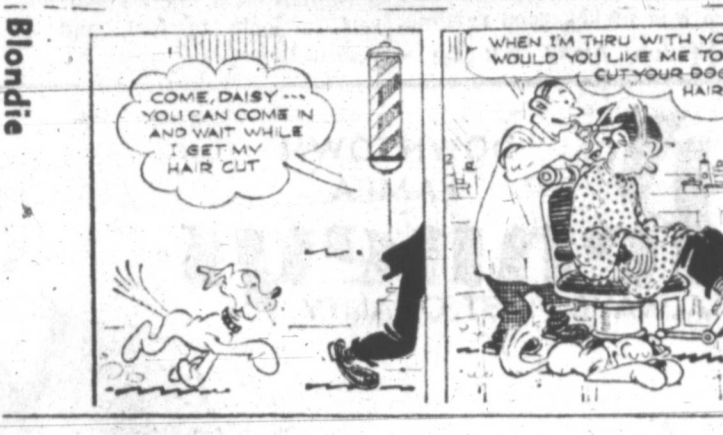

Cowan Becomes First Canadian To Win Amateur

ARDMORE, Pa. (UPI) — Canadian Gary Cowan, who sank a nine-foot pressure putt on the 18th hole to win the U.S. Amateur championship by one stroke in a playoff with two-time champion Deane Beman, was enroute home today with a "dream come true."

Cowan, the first foreign born player to win the U.S. Amateur since fellow Canadian Ross Somerville did it in 1932, said the putt he sank Sunday at the Merion Golf Club was the "biggest of my life."

Cowan, who has won a host of amateur championships in Canada, said he came here feeling he could "play as good" as the rest of the field and "wanted to prove it to himself."

Cowan, finished with a five-over par 75, while Beman, who blew a three stroke lead Saturday to necessitate the playoff, had a 76 over the 6,509-yard Merion course.

Both players were on the green on the 18th in regulation two and both were out 25 feet from the pin. Cowan, however, was off on the fringe in what he called a "terrible lie" while Beman was on the green, in a good line to the pin.

Cowan, using his putter from 21 fringe, hit first and "jumped" the ball to within nine feet of the pin. Beman, who said later he felt he could make his birdie putt, saw it roll about four feet past.

Beman, of Bethesda, Md., made the putt for a par and put the pressure on Cowan, a fellow insurance executive.

The handsome, 27-year old from Kitchener, Ontario then stroked the ball into the cup and leaped into the air for joy.

A dejected Beman said later "I gave the tournament away" Saturday and "kept giving it away."
