

# Secret's Out, Luci, Pat Honeymoon in Bahamas

NASSAU, Bahamas (UPI) — Their privacy insured by Secret Service agents stationed among thick bushes and palm trees, Luci and Pat Nugent today honeymooned at the secluded oceanfront villa of an American millionairess on this tropical Atlantic resort island.

President Johnson's 19-year-old daughter and her husband, 23, flew here secretly Sunday on a regularly scheduled Pan American World Airways "Honeymoon Special" flight from New York's Kennedy Airport. They were one of nine honeymooning couples aboard.

On the flight and at Kennedy Airport, the famous couple went virtually unrecognized. Even the newlywed couple across the aisle in the first-class section failed to immediately identify the Nugents who were with their Secret Service escorts.

"We were sitting right opposite them," said Margaret Buczkowski, whose husband, Lawrence is a Pittsburgh stockbroker. "We didn't speak to them, but we smiled and they smiled back."

"It wasn't until after the plane left that we recognized

them," Mrs. Buczkowski said. "What a tremendous thrill to be traveling with the President's daughter and her new husband."

The Nugents were on the passenger list as "Mr. and Mrs. Frisbee." During the jetliner flight, Pat drank a bloody Mary and Luci a Coke.

Both ate steaks. They arrived at 12:30 p.m. in 80-degree temperatures and sun that had just burst through clouds lingering from a Saturday night electrical storm. Scores of American tourists at the airport paid no heed as the honeymooners were whisked off in a compact white

convertible driven by Secret Servicemen to the oceanside villa in several acres of wooded grounds on Nassau's exclusive western shore.

Called "Capricorn," the honeymoon villa is owned by Rebekah Harkness, New York philanthropist and patroness of the arts.

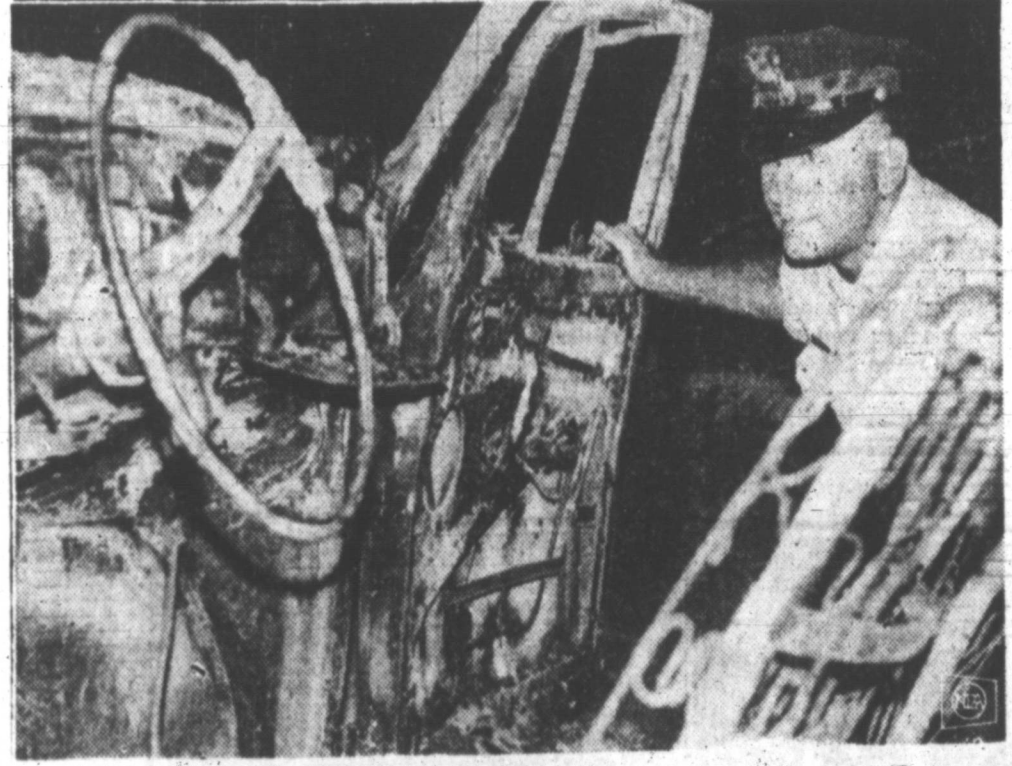

# Record Seven Planes Lost to Red Gunners

## Chinese Supplies Hit Hard

SAIGON (UPI) — North Vietnamese gunners shot down a record seven U.S. planes Sunday during 107 missions which dealt heavy blows to the Communist nation's supply routes from Red China, U.S. officials said today.

On ground, Communist guerrillas ambushed two U.S. companies today, but the Americans turned the tables, killing at least 70 of the enemy and possibly 170.

The American units suffered moderate casualties, a U.S. spokesman said.

The Communists fired at least 24 Surface-to-Air Missiles (SAM) at the U.S. aircraft north and northwest of Hanoi where six of the seven planes went down. But officials did not say for security reasons whether the rockets or conventional gunfire brought them down.

Two of the nine airmen aboard the planes were rescued. The others are missing.

The biggest ground fight came in the jungle highlands about 235 miles north of Saigon when a company of the 1st Cavalry Division was surrounded by a Viet Cong battalion — from 400 to 600 men.

The troopers fought them off and called in jet planes which pounded the enemy position with rockets, machineguns and napalm. Then the troopers moved through the battlefield, counting 65 bodies and capturing five of the enemy.

"The body count was based on initial report and could go higher," a spokesman said, adding that officers on the scene said the guerrillas could have dragged away as many as 100 more of their dead.

Ground action in the south was light today, the spokesman reported.

U.S. Air Force B52 bombers from Guam hit a suspected Viet Cong troop concentration in Phu Yen Province at midday in support of the joint U.S.-South Vietnamese Operation Patul Revere in the Central Highlands 260 miles north of Saigon.

U.S. Marines and South Vietnamese forces participating in Operation Colorado, 370 miles north of Saigon, reported no significant contact with Communist troops. The sweep (See RECORD, Page 3)

## IN CRAIG-CARUBBI CASE

# Long Wait Seen Before Decision Handed Down

AMARILLO (SpI) — It probably will be two or three weeks before the 7th District Court of Civil Appeals here hands down its decision in the election contest lawsuit over the Gray County judgeship.

Oral arguments on both sides were heard by the court this forenoon in the appeal of Pampa attorney A. J. Carubbi Jr. to have the Democratic nomination of incumbent Judge Bill Craig in the June 4 runoff voided.

The appeal was brought by Carubbi from a 31st District Court decision by Judge Lewis M. Goodrich on June 15 that the appellant's claim of voting irregularities was without foundation. Judge Goodrich ruled Craig the Democratic nominee in the June 4 election by 8 votes, 1,785 to 1,777, and dismissed the case.

Amarillo attorney Frank Baughman opened the arguments before the court, citing claims already set forth in Carubbi's brief, and stated:

"This case is of the utmost importance not only to our area but to our entire party system. It is a question of whether our opponents can control our party."

He stated that 71 Republicans voted in their own primary and then voted in the Democratic runoff primary. He cited the Texas Election Code provision which he claimed made the 71 votes illegal and for that reason they should be thrown out and a recount made of the remaining ballots.

Will C. Davis, chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee at Austin addressed the court next.

Davis said of Carubbi and Judge Craig:

"Both are fine men and would make fine judges. The interest of the State Committee in this case is not one of personalities, but the issue here is whether Texas is an open or closed primary state."

"Judge Goodrich's decision disturbed the committee and its members voted unanimously that their brief should be filed."

Davis told the court the State Committee agreed that each of the 71 Republican ballots cast

in the second Democratic primary in Gray County was an illegal ballot and an illegal vote. "An illegal vote," Davis said, "cannot be counted for any purpose."

Then the state chairman cited the Texas Election Code, stating the 1963 penal code was amended to make it illegal to vote in both primary elections and pro-

## Demo Chairmen Meet Tonight In Amarillo

Democratic county chairmen from the 18th Congressional District will meet at 7 p.m. today in the Holiday Inn West at Amarillo to pick a ballot replacement for U.S. Rep. Walter Rogers at the November general election.

Gray County chairman Jimmy Thompson was notified of the meeting last night along with the 29 other county chairmen in the district. The notification was made by telegram from Will C. Davis of Austin, State Democratic chairman.

Selection of a replacement candidate became necessary when Congressman Rogers withdrew from the race a week ago today.

The candidate picked tonight will face Republican congressional candidate Bob Price of Pampa at the Nov. 8 election.

Chairman Thompson of Gray County was among 26 counties in the district represented at a caucus Sunday afternoon in Tulsa.

No commitments were made at the meeting, but several possible candidates were in attendance. They included State Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress, attorney Dee Miller of Amarillo, State Rep. Walter Knapp of Amarillo, attorney James P. Linn of Spearman, State Rep. Ralph Wayne of Plainview and Dick Brown, Hartley County Democratic chairman.

The four counties not represented at yesterday's caucus in Tulsa were Hutchinson, Dallam, Carson and Armstrong.

Tonight's Amarillo meeting was called under provisions of the Texas Election Code. The code provides that the decision of the chairmen tonight will be final.

Only if there should be a tie vote, would the State Democratic Executive Committee enter into the nominating process.

Dist. Judge Max Boyer at Perryton, whose name has been

## Sheik Loses Oil Revenue, Home

KUWAIT (UPI) — A despotic sheik who was taking home — literally — about \$30.8 million in annual oil revenue since striking it rich in 1962 has been deposed by his younger brother as ruler of Abu Dhabi on the Persian Gulf.

British authorities said Sunday 61-year-old Sheik Shakhbut had been ousted by his brother, Zaid Bin Sultan Zaid, as head of the 26-square mile desert land.

Shakhbut, who once kept an oil fortune under his bed, was overthrown for refusing to part with any of Abu Dhabi's oil money. The state earned \$30.8 million last year and is expected to top \$67 million in 1966.

Shakhbut, a wiry, black-bearded feudalist, wanted all the cash himself and only recently was persuaded to remove it from a chest under his bed for deposit in a bank, the British officials said.

Despite the vast income of the land, most of Abu Dhabi's 20,000 inhabitants live in poverty. Shakhbut had been running a one-man fief since 1962.

## Protest Marches To Continue in Chicago

CHICAGO (UPI) — With civil rights marchers singing "O Lord Stand by Me" and angry whites waving signs reading "protect white womanhood," Chicago's open housing protests moved back into the all-white Belmont-Cragin neighborhood Sunday.

Riot police arrested 20 white persons on disorderly conduct charges.

Civil rights leaders planned to meet today to put the finishing touches on plans for another full week of protest marches into all-white neighborhoods.

The Gage Park community, where Dr. Martin Luther King was felled by a rock Friday evening during a tumultuous foray into the neighborhood was believed to be considered "off limits" by protest leaders for this week.

King, attending a Southern Christian Leadership Conference meeting in Mississippi, was not expected back in Chicago until Friday. The burden of leading marches against hostile whites fell to his chief aides here.

Crowds estimated at 4,000 lined the first few blocks of the three-mile protest march in Belmont-Cragin Sunday. The marchers were met by screams of "niggers go home" and "white power." Bottles and stones were thrown by the hecklers, but most missed their mark.

Keep Hecklers Hopping  
Police ran sorties down alleys and sidestreets to keep the hecklers off balance.

A light rain which fell during the march failed to deter the protesters or the white hecklers. But as the marchers moved into the residential

section with its tree-lined streets and neat brick homes, an eerie quiet descended on the marchers.

Whites stood on porches or pressed their faces to their picture windows, staring at the marchers. The street was blocked off by police officers, and the only sound was the falling rain and the scuffling of marching feet.

Dr. King in a respite from a seething Chicago campaign for open housing, and Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., open a Deep South convention of King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference here tonight.

King was to introduce Kennedy as speaker tonight for the opening "freedom banquet." Spokesmen said the conference will concentrate on Negro problems in northern ghettos.

He said it also will review the doctrine of non-violence and passive resistance, which King has maintained in the face of criticism from militant "black power" advocates.

The meeting marks an interlude for King and his top aides from violence-ridden marches of Negroes through white Chicago neighborhoods, where King was struck by a rock Saturday.

SCLC expected 1,000 persons to attend its first convention in Mississippi, where the group's civil rights efforts have been stepped up since the "Mississippi freedom march" begun by James Meredith earlier this summer. SCLC launched a march and civil rights campaign of its own at Grenada in northern Mississippi recently.

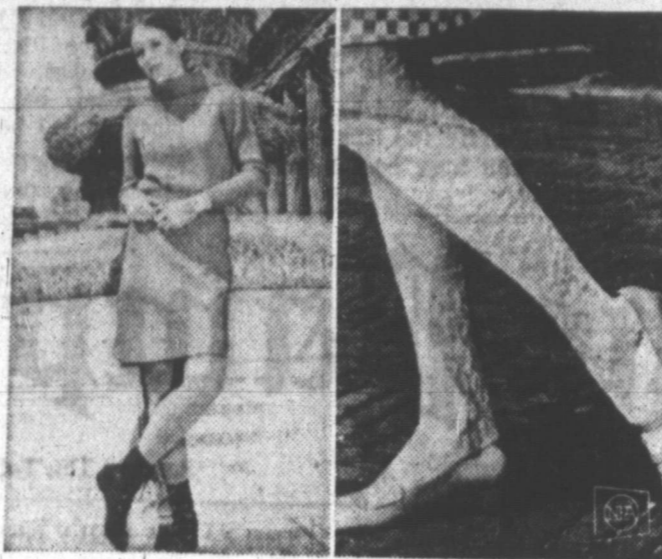
For the campus crowd there is a collection of colorful hosiery that translates ribbing, diamonds, crocket motifs and even the classic flat knit into smashing underpinnings.
