The tax credit, first installed during the Kennedy administration to stimulate the economy, provides that businessmen may deduct from their corporate taxes up to 7 per cent of the amount they invest in new plants and equipment. Many economists believe credit to be a princi inflationary factor economy, though there is doubt that its suspension at this stage would do much to combat such a condition.

British Voyagers Cross Atlantic

GALWAY, Ireland (UPI Two British paratroopers who rowed 3,000 miles across the Atlantic Ocean from Boston had one regret Monday, being towed the last tew hundred yards.

Capt. John Ridgeway, 27, and Sgt. Charles Blyth, 26, described their journey as "an interesting way of spending the summer." It took them 92 days to make the crossing in their 22-foot open boat.

Their historic voyage that started in Massachusetts, ended Saturday night when their rowboat was spotted by the three lighthouse keepers in the Aran Isles, off the Galway coast.

Since the lighthouse keepers had not heard of the trip and the boat was just off the treacherous rocks of Inishmore Island, they called out the Galway Bay life boat, which came out and towed the rowboat the last few hundred yards.

Ridgeway said the "rescue" was unnecessary.

"We could have made land without aid," he said. "Maybe they thought we were in trouble because one of us stood up in the boat. But I know we could have made it on our own." The boat, the English Rose III and bearing the inscription, "O God the Sea is so Great and My Boat is so Small," appeared to be in as good shape as the two men.

Once ashore they underwent medical checkups and were pronounced in good health. Then a round of celebrations began, topped off when the wives of the two seamen arrived Sunday.

The new soldiers arrived on three ships carrying 20,000 tons of equipment and munitions.

Crook said a lack of separate culture and different language has resulted in a lack of communication between the Latin and Anglo American community along the border "which fosters public apathy and indifference to the plight of this minority." He described visits to run-
