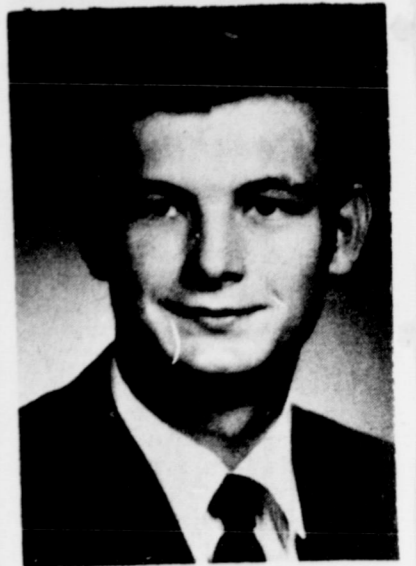

Bob Gilyard

Bob L. Gilyard, USN, son of Mrs. Doyle Collins of Route 2, Sudan, is serving aboard the USS Hornet, the primary recovery ship for the Apollo 12 moon mission.

The 44,000 ton aircraft carrier is positioned near the splash-down point 385 miles east of American Samoa. The crew of the Hornet is no stranger to the job of astronaut recovery. The Hornet was the primary recovery vessel for Apollo 8, 10, and 11.

Aboard the Hornet is Helicopter Anti-Submarine Squadron Four which will carry the astronauts to the recovery ship. Swimmers of Underwater Demolition Team 13 are also aboard the ship. The three-man team and special decontamination swimmer will be the first of the recovery forces to reach Apollo 12. They will attach a flotation collar to the capsule and assist the astronauts aboard the rescue helicopter.

Gaddy was a retired farmer, a veteran of the U.S. Army in World War I and was a member of the First Baptist Church.

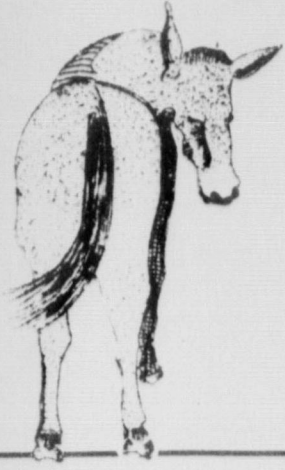

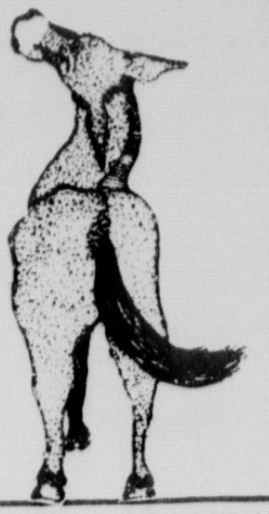

Reading Enhanced With Paperbacks

With the advent of inexpensive paper-bound books, the high school student is no longer bound to the literary selections in anthologies. Old favorites, modern novels, biography, poetry, and books of travel are all available to today's students. "Treasure Island", "Mutiny on the Bounty", "Call of the Wild," and "The Prince and the Pauper" are the classics to be read by the Freshman English classes.

In addition to these old time favorites the classes will read John Steinbeck's "Travels with Charlie." In 1960, when he was almost sixty years old, John Steinbeck set out to re-discover his native land. Accompanied by only a French poodle named Charlie, he traveled through forty states. He saw things which stirred his anger and things which made him swell with pride. This is a picture of America as seen through his eyes.

So far the favorite of the students has been a collection of short stories by modern writers. "Flowers for Algernon," one story in the collection, gives an account of a 37 year old man's mental progression from retardation to genius and back to retardation. It is a moving account which raises many thought-provoking questions. From the story the movie "Charlie" was made. "Our Hearts were Young and Gay," by Cornelia Otis Skinner and Emily Kimbrough is an account of two American girls, who, armed with a low budget and borrowed finery, traveled

across Europe in the mid 1920's leaving nothing but havoc in their wake.

"Anna and the King of Siam" by Margaret London is the true story of an English woman engaged by the King of Siam as a teacher for his many children. This story was the basis for the Rodgers and Hammerstein's musical play, "The King and I" and was later adapted for the movie.

Dickens' "Great Expectations", and a shortened version of Homer's "Odyssey" are found in the anthology used by Freshman.

The English curriculum also includes regular study of vocabulary, grammar, and communication skills.

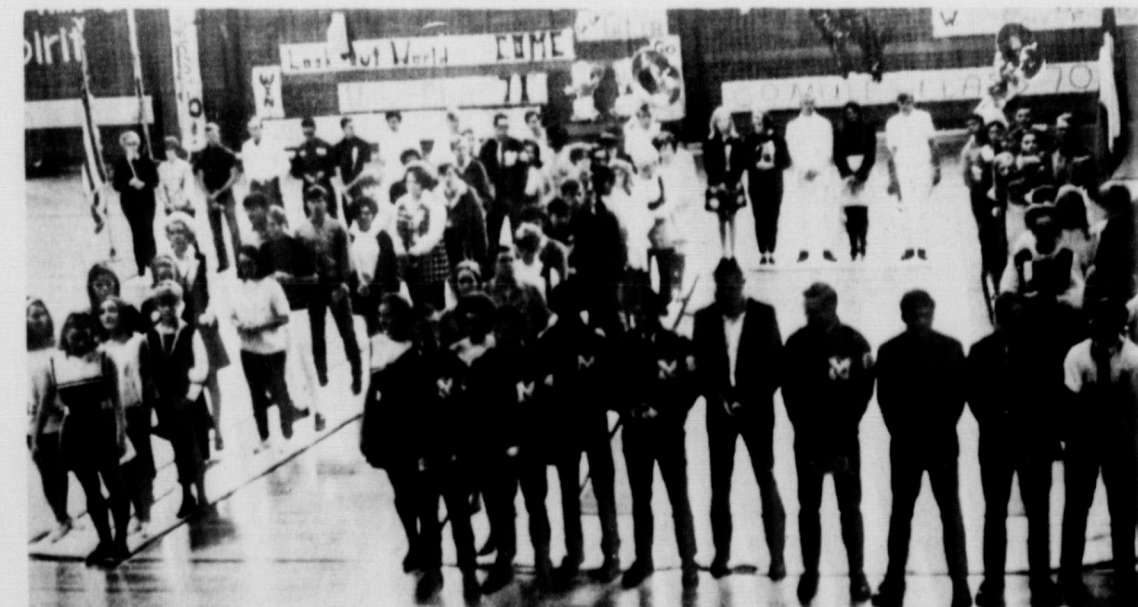
At the class meeting on Thursday, November 20, the

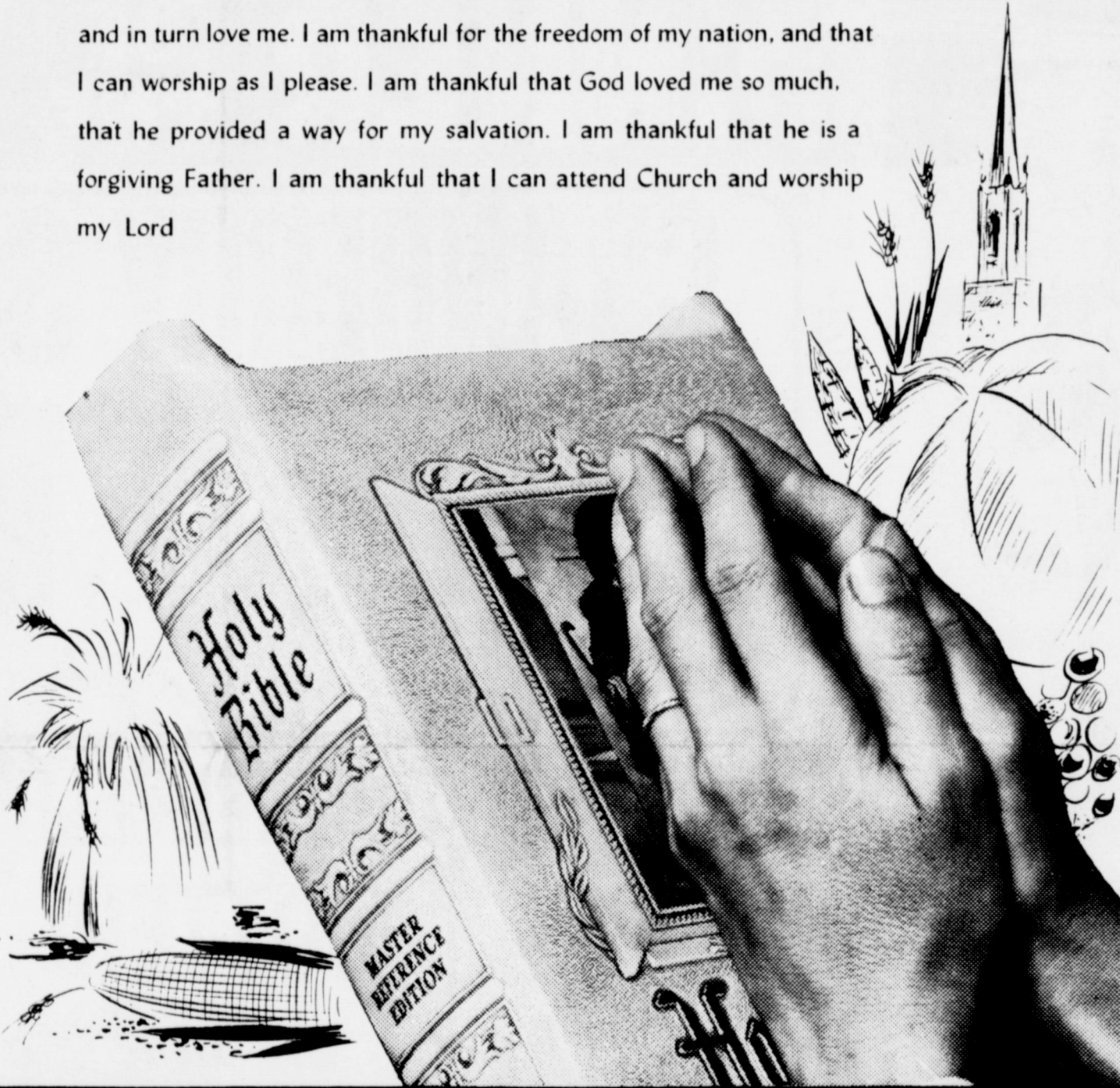

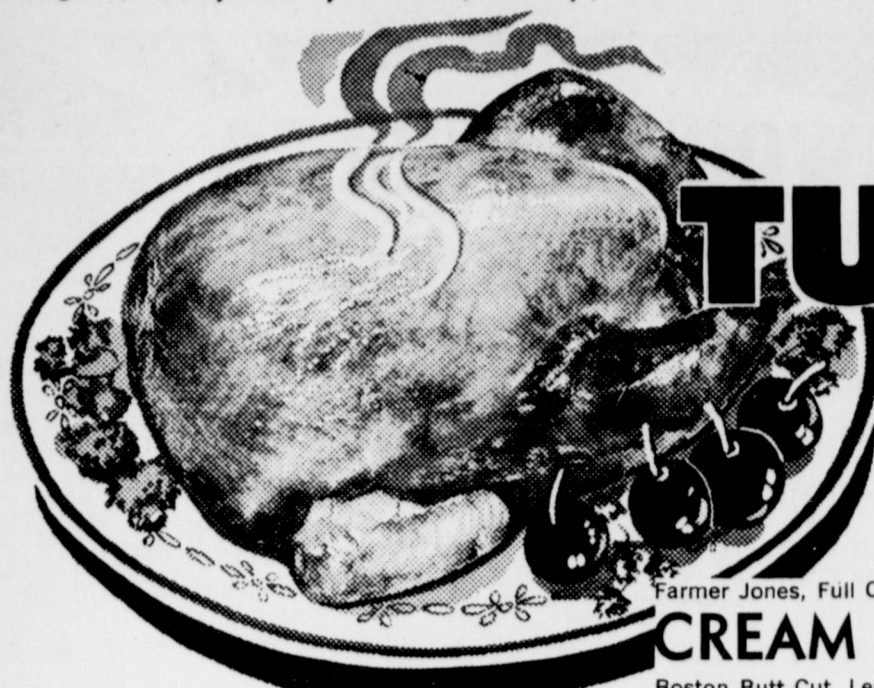

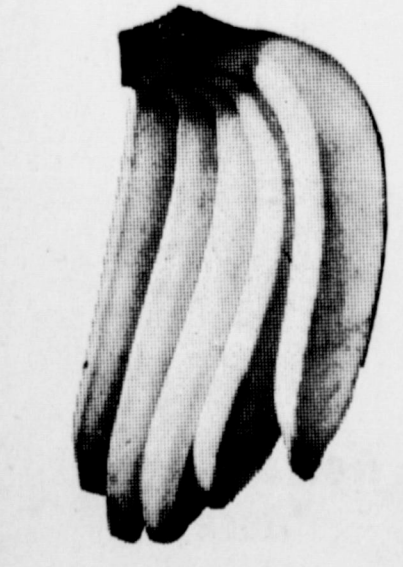
