

United Press International There he was! The President of the United States with his hand caught in the cookie jar! Embarrassing? Shocking? Not a bit. Citizens are accustomed to seeing their statesmen of all parties fingering the cookies. Cynicism is the most acutely destructive disease afflicting the American system. It is destructive because it is much too well warranted by the fact of political life in the United States.

The cookie jar device that entrapped LBJ was a deceitful little gimmick. It was designed to juggle treasury books to mislead the voters as to the size of the 1967 federal deficit. This gimmick was set up by the participation sales act of 1966 enacted last summer.

Alert editorial writers gently too gently -exposed the gimmick when LBJ proposed it. "Financial gimmickry" whis-

pered a New York Times' editorial writer.

"Sponsored by President Johnson to make his budget dook good!" soft-shoed a Scripps-Howard editorialist.

Plan To Sell

LBJ's plan was to sell to private investors \$4.2 billion of participation certificates this fiscal year. Of this total \$3.2 billion would be participation certificates in a pooled batch of treasury-insured home mortgages, college housing loans, small business loans and similar obligations held by the government in exchange for money advanced. The other \$1 billion would flow from exportimport bank sales.

To find a market for these participation certificates, the treasury -meaning the taxpayers -would be compelled to pay a higher interest rate than rate prevailing on the obligations before they were proled for sale. This participation certificate pickpocketry was enacted only last summer when high interest rates already had become a factor in serious economic disarrange-The administration's sponsorship of this high interest project therefore becomes a matter of astonishment if not of absolute despair.

"If the full \$4.2 billion worth "is sold," reported the slow-toanger Scripps-Howard editorialist, "government agencies will be able to use that \$4.2 billion without getting new appropriations from Congress." (That is, the administration would be able to spend the \$4.2 billion "thus acquired without reflecting the expenditure in the 1967

"This play." Scripps-Howard "will improve she noted. appearance of the federal budget although not its actual condition. Washington's biggest sleigh-of-hand stunt so far is called the participation sales act of 1966. Republicans in Congress say a better name would be the high interest act of 1966 or operation bucket shop. Their point is well taken.

If Misunderstood

Well taken perhaps, but feebly taken. If this financial gimmickry was undertaken to mislead the public as to the 1967 budget deficit, it cannot adequately be described in editorial euphemisms. Deceitful and dishonest would be more appropriate.

LBJ's hand was spotlighted in the cookie jar last week when the high interest crisis compelled the administration to order the participation sales act of 1966 thrown overboard. The administration thus acknowledged its policy error but not its ethical fault

This was an administration effort to make its conduct of public business look better than the facts warranted. The voters should, but will not, demand an accounting from politicians who would so mislead them. The voters have become accustomed to a low level of ethical conduct in their public men.



Not Resigning Rusk later told UPI that he did not care to elaborate on his finances. He made clear, however, that he has no intentin of resigning in the near future.



The other seven Cabinet officers are in the same boat with Rusk. They have to make do on what the government pays them. But not all of them find it a hardship.

Robert C. Weaver, secretary of housing and urban development, told UPI candidly that his Cabinet salary is the largest he's ever earned, and "I'm glad to have it." Weaver has spent his entire career as a college profssor and public servant.

Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman, aide said, is "notmaking any money in the job. but he's not having any particular difficulty making ends meet." Similar reports came from Labor Secretar W. Willard Wirtz and Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall.

Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien said he has had to dip into his not had to dip into his "modest" savings because "we tailor our living expenses to fit our income."

WEMBLEY, England (UPI) - Floyd Patterson, back in the big time following his fourth-Henry Cooper, looked today toward the heavyweight crown and Cassius Clay.

The 31-year-old former world champion, scaling 193 pounds dropped the 1913/4-pound Cooper twice before knocking him out at 2:20 of the fourth round with a left-right combination to head and body. Patterson said after the fight.

'I will keep fighting until I get another fight with Clay. I'll be glad to fight Germany's Karl Mildenberger, or whoever the promoters nominate, so long as it leads to another championship fight.'

Patterson, who has already fought 12 times for the sport's greatest prize, is expected to meet the German in either Frankfurt or Stockholm early in the new year.

Mildenberger's manager was with him at the ringside to see the demolition of Cooper before 9,000 Britons who were amazed at the ferocity of Patterson's punching.

Patterson called his knockout of Cooper "my hest performance since 1958 when stopped Roy Harris."

The former champion looked a bit rusty when the fight opened, but his combination punching always had Cooper in
