Russia Rejects U.S. Peace Package To End Viet War

McNamara Orders Production Of Aircraft Upped

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara has ordered a \$700 million increase in combat aircraft production for the Viet Nam War, much of which will benefit the Navy.

McNamara said Thursday that beginning next July 1, 12-month production will be increased by about 280 fighter and attack planes. Tactical aircraft are now produced at a rate of from 800 to 1,000 a year.

The Navy, whose operations are entirely over North Viet Nam, will get a "majority" of the new craft, McNamara said. Navy air losses have been somewhat higher than expected.

1968 Wages To Be Upped By New Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson today signed legislation increasing the \$1.25 federal minimum wage to \$1.60 in 1968 and extending record new coverage to 8.1 million workers.

The signing of the bill in White House ceremonies gave organized labor its only legislative victory of the year, and added to election-year stock of the Democratic party.

A two-year struggle in the 89th Congress produced the hourly wage boost which represented a six-fold increase in the minimum since it was first set in 1938.

APPROACH 'IN RIGHT DIRECTION'

Peace Proposals Change U.S. Goal

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Johnson administration's new "peace proposals" on the Viet Nam war represent a major effort to put U.S. policy in more positive terms and to rebut charges that total military victory is its only goal.

Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., the most persistent critic of U.S. policy, said he thought the approach was "in the right direction . . . this is in the spirit of compromise."

But the three points outlined by Ambassador to the United Nations Arthur J. Goldberg Thursday actually contained nothing that had not already been said by President Johnson and other officials.

They did serve to pull together the principal aspects of the U.S. position in a manner calculated to meet a rising tide of criticism at the United Nations and abroad. And they were a positive response to the recent peace appeals of Pope

House Sweetens Anti-Inflation Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson's anti-inflation measure, which industry considers a bitter pill to swallow, has acquired a sugar coating in the form of key modifications to ease its impact.

The House Ways & Means Committee sweetened the plan shortly before approving it on a voice vote Thursday. The panel gave the President just about everything he sought, but added some provisions he didn't want.

Johnston asked for 16-month suspensions of a special 7 percent tax credit businessmen get for investing in new plant and equipment and of an accelerated tax-write off for depreciation on commercial buildings.

The committee agreed to both, but decreed that they start Sept. 9, 1966, instead of the Sept. 1 date the President sought.

The House was expected to act on the measure next week. Senate approval should follow soon after, though sources said the Senate may sweeten up the measure even more.

Committee Checks Rep. Powell's Rein But Fails To Make Him Lose Any Face

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Adam Clayton Powell may get more than "pruned" by the next attempt to chop him down.

The flamboyant Harlem Democrat lost some of his powers as chairman of the House Education and Labor Committee Thursday when his colleagues voted 27-1 to put a check rein on his activities.

But he came out of the battle as jaunty as ever and with far less loss of face than his opponents had said was possible when they launched their "Adam-smasher" plan a year ago.

It would be wrong to dismiss the U.S. move as simply a psychological warfare gesture. It represents a sincere effort to clarify the conditions under which the United States is ready to work toward peace in Southeast Asia.

Goldberg's offer to end all bombing of North Viet Nam if the Communists promise to take steps promptly to lower the level of their military activity simply rephrased similar U.S. offers. These go back as far as the "14 points" Goldberg first set forth last February.

The expressed willingness of this country to undertake a phased withdrawal of its forces from Viet Nam as North Viet Nam takes similar steps—all this under international supervision—merely pulled together a position which had been stated in fragments before.

Statement Shatters Hope For Acceptance

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko today rejected the three-point Viet Nam peace offensive put before the General Assembly by the U.N. States.

Gromyko told the Assembly U.S. Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg's speech meant only that the United States was determined to defend Viet Nam and had no serious intention of settling the war.

"The aggressor has come to Viet Nam," he said. "The aggressor must leave." Gromyko said the four-point conditions for negotiations put forward by North Viet Nam were the proper basis for ending the war.

"The Soviet Union is on the side of the Vietnamese people," he said. "We have rendered aid and we will continue to render aid and all assistance to help the Vietnamese people fight aggression."

The points advocated by the Soviet diplomat for peace negotiations were: —Unconditional cessation of bombing of North Viet Nam.

Giant Bombers Strike Viet Cong

SAIGON (UPI) — Giant U.S. Air Force B52 bombers have struck targets in Communist North Viet Nam three times this week, U.S. military spokesmen disclosed today.

The disclosure came about the same time South Vietnamese Foreign Minister Tran Van Do declared that intensified bombing raids might be "the only way" to force the North Vietnamese to negotiate an end to the war.

Tran Van Do told UPI, "we can expect no favorable answer" from Hanoi to the latest U.S. peace proposals put forward at the United Nations Thursday by Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg.

Two U.S. Air Force "dragon ships," which are capable of firing 6,000 rounds a minute, teamed up today with South Vietnamese ground forces to maul some 1,200 Viet Cong

Surveyor Crashes On Lunar Surface

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — The \$65 million Surveyor 2 moon explorer crashed into the lunar surface at a speed of 5,800 miles per hour Thursday night, Jet Propulsion Laboratory scientists reported.

The crippled spacecraft, designed to softland on the moon and send back pictures of possible landing sites for astronauts, had been doomed since Tuesday night when one of its three steering engines failed to ignite during a critical midcourse maneuver.

A spokesman at JPL, which is operated by California Institute of Technology, said the television-equipped robot slammed into the moon about 9 CST.

Bayonet Found In Lake May Be Murder Weapon

CHICAGO (UPI) — An Army bayonet found within throwing distance of the home where Valerie Percy was beaten and stabbed to death may be the murder weapon.

The 14-inch bayonet, which according to technicians, could have caused the wounds that killed the 21-year-old daughter of Republican senatorial candidate Charles Percy was recovered from Lake Michigan by Coast Guard divers.

"As far as I am concerned at this point, it is still a possibility (as a murder weapon)," said Kenilworth Police Chief Robert M. Daley, the head of the murder investigation.

The knife was found about 40 yards from the Percy's private beach—about the distance a man can throw such an object. Microscopic examinations of the weapon were conducted but a crime lab spokesman said the examination showed no blood stains, fingerprints or other clues.

DENVER (UPI)—A veteran Colorado miner said through his attorney Wednesday he had stumbled across one of the richest platinum finds in the United States while coyote hunting in Northwest Colorado.

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You, Your Child and School

Schools have a definite responsibility in the area of civil defense. Any failure to take every possible precaution would have to be considered a dereliction of duty.

A number of individuals and groups voice objections to practice drills, and preparation for disasters. They often indicate that they do not want their children exposed to what they call the frightening effects of a drill. There is also a feeling that there is not protection against a nuclear attack except prevention through peace.

Individuals have a right to such attitudes, but a public agency does not. A number of factors must be considered.

Civil defense is designed for protection against many types of disaster, only one of which is a nuclear attack. These include fires, floods, hurricanes, tornadoes and earthquakes.

The schools of our nation are responsible for the physical safety of nearly 50 million children and more than 3 million employees. There must be a well planned program in the event of any form of emergency situation. This is a right to which each of these students and employees are entitled. A civil defense program will afford protection even against the effects of a nuclear attack. It is therefore the obligation of school officials to take steps to implement such a program.

What kinds of plans and protection are needed? Communication is needed. Schools should have plans for emergency communication such as portable radios and direct lines to civil defense headquarters. Consideration should be given

to emergency food rations and first aid equipment. Emergency lighting is valuable especially where young children are involved. Darkness often creates panic.

Many modern schools have extensive glass areas. Shattering glass is particularly harmful, but individuals can be protected from this danger.

Obviously, there are many steps which can be taken to protect students and employees from the effects of disaster conditions.

UNEMPLOYMENT UP

JERUSALEM (UPI)—The Labor Ministry said Thursday unemployment in Israel may reach 65,000 this year—double the jobless figure of 1965.

The highest jobless rate in Israeli history was in 1956 when an average of 46,000 persons were unemployed. The ministry also said there were 277 strikes and lockouts in 1965 involving 203,000 workers.

Pampa Milk Fund Provides Nutrition for the Needy

Thanks to the voluntary service of so many people and organizations the Pampa Milk Fund is the most unusual of all. Can you believe it? They operate on absolutely no overhead! Every dollar the Milk Fund receives is entirely spent for milk deliveries to hungry children.

Captain Robert J. Tritton of the Salvation Army, Libby Sholwell of the American Red Cross, Willie Holmes of the State Department of Public Welfare and Geraldine Shultz of the county welfare investigate needy cases and requests orders from the secretary, Mrs. Ruth McBride.

Loose Leopard Killed by Drug

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — Ivan, a snow leopard who had gained 26 hours of freedom because of "human error," died today — apparently as the result of a drug used in his capture.

Dr. Phil Ogilvie, zoo director, said Ivan died about three hours after he was captured and returned to Lincoln Park Zoo.

The graceful 100-pound cat had been shot with a tranquilizer dart and Ogilvie said that apparently caused his death.

Policemen Elzy Garrison and Kent Smith were aiding in the search for Ivan when they walked beside the Army reserve building and heard a noise. They looked up and saw Ivan perched on the edge of the roof a few feet above them.

The officers backed off and radioed for help. Meanwhile, Ivan climbed higher up the roof.

An hour later, assistant zoo director Jerry Lentz fired a seven-inch tranquilizer dart into the left hip of the leopard, who was about 20 feet away. Ivan jerked slightly but then calmly laid down.

Ivan was immediately returned to his cage at the zoo and given an antidote to counteract the tranquilizer, so he could be fed sooner.

Ivan, 5, slipped through an open gate and jumped about 13 feet to freedom Wednesday night.

Ogilvie blamed Ivan's escape on "human error," saying a night keeper had accidentally left open a gate to Ivan's cage.

concerned.

The Canadian diplomat said it appeared possible that the International Control Commission (ICC), which was set up by the 1954 Geneva conference to supervise the peace in the former Indo-China, "can produce a means of facilitating contacts between the two sides."

Canada, India and Poland are the ICC members.

Rusk and Gromyko met for three hours Thursday night in the secretary of state's Waldorf-Astoria suite.

"We dined and talked over some questions of mutual interest and we agreed to continue the talk," Gromyko said when he emerged. He declined further comment.

The dinner also was attended by U.S. Ambassador to the Soviet Union Foy D. Kohler, Goldberg and State Department Soviet affairs expert Llewellyn Thompson.

The Rusk-Gromyko talks are to resume Saturday, at the Soviet Foreign Minister's request: at a dinner hosted by the Russian U.N. delegation.

Gromyko was counted on for a lengthy review of virtually all aspects of the world situation.

Initial Communist reaction to the peace offensive pushed by Goldberg Thursday was frosty. Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko, Russia's permanent representative here, said Goldberg's speech was "a set of declarations and words—familiar and old sounds and tunes."

Goldberg formally proposed: —The United States, taking the initiative for the second time, would cease bombing North Viet Nam if the Hanoi government would then reduce or end its own military action against South Viet Nam.

—The United States would withdraw its forces from Viet Nam under U.N. or other international supervision if all other external forces, including those of North Viet Nam, were withdrawn.

—The United States would enter peace negotiations on the basis of the 1954 and 1962 Geneva Accords—which carved up the former French Indochina—in renewed Geneva talks, an Asian conference "or any other generally acceptable forum" and participation of the Communist Viet Cong "would not be an insurmountable problem."

Drugs Are Safely Used For Combating Depression Q - I have a low blood pressure (110 over 70) and am chronically depressed. My doctor prescribed Ritalin as an antidepressant. What treatment would you recommend?

Q - My mother is 53 years old. The doctor says she has Addison's disease. What causes the deep bronze color of her skin? Is there any cure for Addison's disease?

Q - What effect does Orinase have on the red blood cell count? What is the count for all types of blood cells in a healthy person?

Girl Attempts Flaming Suicide

HAIGON (UPI) — A girl thought to be about 13 years old tried to burn herself to death in front of a Buddhist pagoda but was stopped by monks, the Viet Nam Press Agency reported Thursday.

The semi-official agency said the suicide attempt occurred in daylight Wednesday at the An Quang pagoda where Buddhist leaders were meeting — apparently to discuss their future strategy against the government.

Eleven Buddhists, including eight women burned themselves to death during the anti-government struggle by Buddhists that began last spring only to fail when Premier Nguyen Cao Ky took a firm stand and ended the uprising. The last fiery suicide was in July.

There are times, however, when I think that Chairman L. Mendel Rivers, D-S.C., of the House Armed Services Committee expects too much of his colleagues.

Perhaps his frequent association with military personnel has caused him to develop a Spartan philosophy in the operation of his committee.

At any rate, he dispatched a special subcommittee to Paris last summer during the congressional Independence Day recess.

Required A Sacrifice
As Rivers himself noted in a recent press release, this required a sacrifice on the part of those who made the journey. "I wish to commend the subcommittee... for giving up their ten-day holiday to make an inspection trip of the American military installations and NATO bases in France," he wrote.

The full measure of their devotion can be realized when you consider that congressmen customarily return to their home districts during long recesses.

On this occasion, the lawgivers who went to Paris missed spending the Fourth of July in such places as San Angelo, Tex., Martinsville, Ind., Pueblo, Colo., Gilroy, Calif., and Utica, N.Y.

The subcommittee brought back a report deploring the demand by French President Charles de Gaulle that U.S. and other NATO troops be withdrawn from his country.

One Bright Spot
There is, however, one bright spot that the subcommittee unselfishly did not mention.

If the troops are withdrawn, members of Congress presumably will no longer be required to make periodic trips to Paris to inspect the bases.

Actually, the hardships involved in making those trips are mild compared to the sacrifices that Rivers is now asking some members of Congress to endure.

He wants those who have no official business there to refrain from "political junketing in Viet Nam."

He and Rep. William H. Bates, Mass., top Republican member of the committee, said such excursions "only clutter up our limited facilities and impose upon the time and patience of our hard pressed commanders."

Making a trip to France during a congressional recess is, of course, nowhere near as rough on a congressman as not making a trip to Viet Nam in an election year.

That Rivers is a hard man.

It's The Law In Texas

WINNING THE REWARD
Edwards flew into a rage when he found the hub caps missing from his car. Shaking his fist, he sputtered:
"Why, I'd give \$100 to know who stole those hub caps!"

The man next door, hearing these words, took them literally. He did a little quiet sheathing, and, sure enough, discovered the culprit. But when he claimed a \$100 reward, Edwards refused to pay off.

And in a court test, the judge sided with Edwards. His angry exclamation, said the judge, was obviously just a way of letting off steam, not a serious offer of a reward.

The legal obligation to pay a reward is based not on the ethics of gratitude but on the principles of contract law. There must be an offer, seriously meant. And there must also be a performance that fits the terms called for in the offer.

Thus, a reward offered for locating a robber "and" his loot is not earned by one who locates the robber—but not the loot.

Nevertheless, to encourage the catching of criminals, the law usually gives the claimant the benefit of the doubt.

For example:
An alert citizen led police to the hideout of a fugitive killer. But their effort to arrest him resulted in a gun fight in which the fugitive was slain. In these circumstances, was the citizen entitled to a reward offered for the man's "arrest"?

A court said he was indeed, because—for all practical purposes—he had done the job for which the reward was offered.

Is everyone eligible for a reward that is offered to the general public? No. As a matter of public policy, certain individuals may be disqualified even if the reward offer doesn't say so.

Packaging Bill Only Burdens Our Economy

"Caveat emptor" is a Latin phrase meaning "Let the buyer beware." "Skulduggery at the crossroads" is an old western phrase meaning "keep one hand on your pocketbook and your other hand on your gun." The people of this country should take definite heed to both of these expressions before they are led into a trap commonly referred to as the "Truth in Packaging Bill." It could be said that the "Truth in Packaging Bill" is a modern day expression meaning "the people are so stupid the government must protect them from trading among themselves." About the only "truth" associated with this measure is the use of the word in its popular name title. As soon as the people find out what is going on the title will become an unpopular name.

The bill has been widely and notoriously advertised as a bill to protect the consumer. This approach is supposed to have an emotional appeal that will cause the populace to accept the measure at face value without any investigation as to its real purpose. The real purpose of this bill is to give the Federal government further bureaucratic powers of life and death over a substantial portion of the business community of this country. It is designed to add many more employees to the public payroll and to force absolute conformity to Federal standards in the packaging and distribution of goods, wares, and merchandise.

In other words, the man who has built his business on the basis of honesty and integrity will be required to package his goods under the same standards as the crooks and mountebanks. The proponents of the bill seem to feel that they have been divinely appointed with great knowledge and understanding not enjoyed by the public generally. They seem to be confident that the average housewife is completely ignorant in the ways of the marketplace and totally unversed in reading, writing, and arithmetic. These self-appointed saviours are dead set on saving you from yourselves, even if it ruins the country. They fail to realize that this brandiose plan of theirs has been used in Russia for a number of years and has not been successful, even under the communist philosophy. Certainly, it could not be successful under the free enterprise system. About the only thing it can accomplish is: (1) it will put another burden and yoke on many small businesses which could very well bankrupt them; (2) it will definitely require many, many changes in packaging procedures of manufacturers and

processors that will require increases in the price of consumer goods; (3) it will definitely increase inflationary trends and add to the burdens of the old people and those on fixed incomes who are presently beset by inflation; (4) it will stifle incentive and innovation in the sale of goods to the American public and will jeopardize many businesses associated with the sale and distribution of goods, wares, and merchandise.

I remember quite well an experience I had in Russia in 1955. I was in Leningrad and desired to purchase a Russian doll for my young daughter. The only doll available was a cheap replica of dolls that had been produced in this country before 1920. The arms and legs were held in place by rubber bands. The doll could have been purchased in any store in this country for fifty cents. I was quoted a price in Russian rubles that was equivalent of \$9.00 in American money. I told the NVD that I would not pay that price. He asked what I intended to do. I told him I was going to Moscow and would shop around. He began to laugh. I inquired what was so funny. He said, "The quality and the price are the same all over Russia."

An American story along these lines: One of my sons was in a supermarket and had his slide rule with him. He began to use it to make quick calculations as to difference in price and content in different packages. He was in the toothpaste department when another customer tapped him on the shoulder and said, "Which tooth paste do you get the slide rule with?" I like America as it was intended to be with the least possible governmental interference in the daily lives of the people. I would say to all of the people that any time fancy legislation comes forth with a "tearjerk" title, you had better "caveat emptor" and put one hand on your pocketbook and the other hand on your gun.

German Shepherd Credited With Saving Lives of U.S. Soldiers

AN KHE, South Viet Nam (UPI) —A scout dog named "Tiger" is dead but there are a lot of Americans alive today in this U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division camp who would not be if the German shepherd had not sniffed out a Communist ambush force.

Officers of the 1st Cav credit the dog with alerting a 200-man American company to the presence of 300 North Vietnamese troops lying in ambush in the Central Highlands 250 miles north of Saigon.

It was during Operation Paul Revere and troops of "A" Company, 2nd Battalion, 12th Cavalry had moved about 1,000 yards into enemy territory on a search and destroy mission.

Tiger and his handler, SP4 Jerry L. Brown of McComb, platoon, SP4 Thomas J. McCarrren was about 25 yards away leading another platoon with his scout dog.

Witnesses said Tiger caught the scent of trouble ahead and pulled up short of what later

proved to be Communist positions only 75 to 100 yards away.

"Brown pushed a sergeant and another man out of the way of massive automatic weapons fire as a squad was coming up on line," McCarrren said. "He then got up to pull Tiger to safety and caught a slug in his right hip."

"But it was too late—seconds earlier Tiger had been killed instantly by the first of seven bullets found in him later, along with a lot of shrapnel."

The Americans called in rocket fire from helicopters along with artillery and napalm, inflicting heavy casualties on the North Vietnamese regulars.

"A captured North Vietnamese soldier said there were 100 of them waiting for us and 200 more in the area," said Capt. Bruce E. Wilson.

Lt. Teddy D. Hampton said Communist troops have been "instructed to fire at the scout dogs first, then his handler."
