Four Cities Alerted For Race Violence

Violence broke out on the streets of Benton Harbor, Mich., for the third straight night Tuesday but racial tensions in other strife-torn Midwest cities appeared to be easing. In Waukegan, Ill., a strict curfew in the town's Negro area was credited with putting a damper on any recurrence of the rioting which ripped the town during the weekend. Demonstrators at the Milwaukee suburb of Wauwatosa took their grievances to the conference room Tuesday night but announced Negro pickets would file back into the suburb tonight.

Red Guards Chase Nuns From China

HONG KONG (UPI) — Eight Roman Catholic nuns, thrown out of Communist China after rampaging Red Guard teenagers raided and shut down their school in Peking, arrived here today. One hobbled across the Communist border on crutches and another was carried on a stretcher. Even as they crossed into this British crown colony, a group of about 700 persons, apparently Red Guard toughs, demonstrated at the Chinese border town of Shumchun. The sisters, the last foreign religious delegation to leave the Communist mainland, said they had not slept in the past eight days, but had not been mistreated physically by the anti-Western youths. They were kicked out of China after being accused of running their Sacred Heart School as "a spying organization serving imperialism." The school was attended by children of foreign diplomats in Peking before it was ransacked last week by the Red Guard militants on their campaign to rid China of all foreign influences.

There was apprehension in Chicago with the announcement that several militant Negro groups had been granted a permit to march into all-white suburban Cicero Sunday. Despite the publicized efforts of "responsible adults" to keep the peace in Benton Harbor, a Negro youth was shot in the abdomen by an unidentified white youth while police were beating back an attempt by more than 100 young rock-throwing Negroes to "invade" the city. Police said the wounded youth was shot from a passing convertible which carried two white youths. He had been standing on the sidewalk in Benton Harbor's business district. Most of the violence there has occurred on the outskirts of town, where the Negroes live. Police fired shots over the crowd Tuesday night to disperse the youths. Monday night roaming gangs had smashed windows and damaged cars in the same area. Benton Harbor Mayor Wilbert Smith asked Gov. George Romney to send in National Guard troops to keep order tonight. Authorities in Waukegan, about 40 miles north of Chicago, placed another curfew on that town's Negro section Tuesday night and cordoned off the area which rocked with rioting youths for three nights during the weekend. The streets were quiet, however, and the curfew was lifted shortly before midnight. Police expected to have only normal patrols in the area tonight. In Wauwatosa, civil rights demonstrators planned to return tonight for the 12th time to picket the home of circuit Judge Robert C. Cannon, whom they are criticizing because of his membership in the all-white Fraternal Order of Eagles. The demonstrators won the moral support Tuesday night of the inter-denominational Greater Milwaukee Council of (See VIOLENCE, Page 3)

European Forces May Be Reduced

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Democratic leaders, after consultation with President Johnson, today proposed a "substantial reduction" of U.S. forces permanently stationed in Europe. Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., offered a new "sense of the Senate" resolution voicing sentiment the Senate Democratic Policy Committee hammered out at seven secret meetings since mid-July. In a statement for the Senate, Mansfield said "the time has come" in view of Western Europe's improved relations with Russia and its own capacity for self-support, to alter the Senate's 1951 advice to President Harry S. Truman that an additional four military divisions should back up the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) defense line. "Western Europe has long since rehabilitated itself after the devastation of World War II," Mansfield said. "It is now a thriving and dynamic region of greatly expanded economic and political and potential military capacity." In addition, he said, NATO allies in Europe have kept their own troop commitments "remote from the estimates which they originally accepted as necessary," strongly suggesting a changed view of Eastern Europe and relations which have "altered for the better." "There is an obviously lessening of tensions as compared with 1951," Mansfield said. Mansfield pointed out that this shift has caused France to insist on a withdrawal of forces from their country. Finally, the Democratic leader emphasized, it is "wholly unwarranted to sustain an unnecessary dollar exchange drain" on American resources when it is indicated American commitments are in excess of needs.

Viet Cong Continue Election Terrorism

SAIGON (UPI) — U.S. Navy jets for the second time this week shot up two North Vietnamese patrol boats in the Gulf of Tonkin today. In the South, the Viet Cong stepped up their pre-election campaign of terror, exploding a deadly Claymore mine in a village market place. The mine exploded in the village of Can Tho in the Mekong Delta, killing one man and injuring 11 other persons. It had been timed to go off later when the market place was crowded to take a heavier toll with its deadly spray of shrapnel.

The Viet Cong have hit repeatedly at Can Tho, the delta's chief town 75 miles southwest of Saigon. Only last month two Viet Cong women planted a bomb that killed the six-year-old son of the Can Tho police resources control chief. The guerrillas have attacked throughout South Viet Nam in an effort to disrupt the Sept. 11 elections for a constituent assembly. Raiders struck Tuesday night only four miles from Saigon. They also poured 200 rounds of mortar fire into the village of Ngoc Hoa near Can Tho to terrorize the population.

Official American sources said Tuesday the Viet Cong had formed assassination teams to kill both American and Vietnamese civilian and military officials and put a price on their heads. As a result, guards have been doubled and in some cases tripled around the officials. Guards also were increased at American billets. The Navy reported the loss of one of its jets in the same area where the patrol boats were sunk or damaged but the pilot was saved. Hanoi radio reported another plane shot down over the south panhandle of North Viet Nam.

The attacks on the Communist vessels took place about 52 and 44 miles east-southeast of the key port of Haiphong and were carried out by A4 Skyhawks and A5 Intruders flying through heavy anti-aircraft fire. An RF4H Crusader jet went down about eight miles east-southeast of Haiphong. The pilot waited only 22 minutes before a CH3C Air Force "Jolly Green Giant" helicopter crew, dropping down dangerously close to shore, plucked him to safety. Air Force spokesmen disclosed that a flight of F105 Thunderchiefs Tuesday knocked out a surface-to-air (SAM) missile site 40 miles northwest of coastal Vinh. There were no further details.

In South Viet Nam, American troops continued to move through rice paddies, jungles and vast plains of elephant grass hunting for Viet Cong troops, but no major clashes were reported. Prime Minister Nguyen Cao Ky disclosed today that South Vietnamese airmen will soon be flying swift F5 Freedom fighter jets in place of the propeller-driven Skyraiders they now use. He said the changeover would be made "in the near future" but did not indicate how many of the planes would be added to the Vietnamese air force.

Draft Category Can Be Altered

Male college students who perform satisfactorily and who make certain that local Selective Service Board No. 52, with headquarters in Pampa, has the required information, need not worry about the draft, even though some classification changes were made this month. Mrs. Lloyd Zmotony, secretary of the Gray County board, reported that 235 students just recently had their classification changed from 2-S (student deferment) to 1-A (available for military service).

Prior to the change 519 students had been classified as 2-S. Many of these, Mrs. Zmotony said, would probably receive a 2-S classification when the board receives the necessary information for placing students in the deferred category. Students had their classification changed if the board had no information in their files that the student ranked in the correct portion of his class or if he had no score on the Selective Service College Qualification Test.

Some had the required information but either failed to rank high enough in their respective classes or did not have a satisfactory score on the test. It is the responsibility of the student, Mrs. Zmotony said, to insure that the college provides the board with the necessary information in order to qualify for a deferment. The law provides that for a student to qualify for deferment he must rank in the upper one-half of his class based on first-year work; in the upper two-thirds in the second year and in the upper three-fourths in the following years. Classification for the academic year usually runs from November to November.

If he wishes, the student may use the selective service test score as an alternate, if he makes a score of 70 or above. Mrs. Zmotony pointed out, however, that a college student does not need to meet both requirements — either one of the two (rank or qualification test) would suffice, if satisfactory. Class rank is determined by the full-time number of male students at a school, eliminating competition with female students. The draft board strongly recommends that the registrant use both his rank and his (See DRAFT, Page 3)

LONDON (UPI) — The United States and Soviet Union are moving toward a "strategic stalemate" which will make the risk of nuclear war minimal, an authoritative study showed today. It said the nuclear standoff should be of "indefinite duration."

The study was published today in the current issue of "The World Today," organ of the influential Royal Institute of International Affairs, which is under official auspices. It was compiled by Neville Brown, a lecturer on international relations.

It is quite possible, the report said, that the U.S.S.R. has become able to ride out any kind of attack on its strategic installations and still reply with an attack of its own. In any case, the U.S.S.R. will become able to do so in the near future, it said. The Soviet Union at present has only about 325 intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBMs) compared with 1,500 located in the United States or aboard U.S. Polaris submarines, the institute said. This could be significant in certain types of limited strategic conflicts but would not be decisive in the event of total war, the report said.

But the study declared the U.S.-Soviet ICBM deadlock is now becoming established "and will never be broken by any developments that will take place in military science. While modernization of ICBMs will continue and their numbers adjusted, all such adjustments will amount to little more than esoteric variations upon a simple theme — stability," the Royal Institute asserted. It described the anti-missile missile as a "dubious antidote." It said even if the United States or Russia advanced such a defense system it would merely "disturb" but not destroy the ICBM deadlock. The study argued that "we are entering a phase in which the risk of nuclear war is small."

Whether the phase proves to be brief or extended will not depend on the United States (See STALEMATE, Page 3)

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G.O.P. Uncovers Fourth Special 'Demo' Treatment

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Republicans contend they have uncovered another case — the fourth — in which heavy contributors to the Democratic "President's Club" won special treatment from the Johnson administration.

Rep. Charles E. Goodell, N.Y., chairman of the House GOP Research and Planning Committee, told the House Tuesday the latest case involved "a web of political intrigue and influence-peddling which has been partially uncovered in California and may extend throughout the country."

Goodell, GOP Leader Gerald P. Ford, Mich., and Rep. Donald Rumsfeld, R-Ill., scheduled a joint news conference today to elaborate on the case, which involves two architectural and engineering firms in California and one in Texas.

Membership in the President's Club, a fund-raising organization, is limited to those who have contributed at least \$1,000 to the Democratic party. According to Goodell, the administration awarded contracts worth at least \$1,450,000 to the three firms whose officials and their families have contributed at least \$30,500 to the club since 1964.

The New York congressman identified the firms as Albert C. Martin & Associates of Los Angeles, Charles Luckman Associates of Los Angeles and New York, and Matt E. Howard Jr. & Associates of Houston.

He said the three firms would share in a \$750,000 architectural and engineering contract for construction of a \$20 million Veterans Administration hospital at San Diego, Calif. The contract award has not yet been announced.

DeGaulle Meets With Cong Head

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (UPI) — French President Charles de Gaulle today met with an envoy from Communist North Viet Nam to seek "direct information" on the Southeast Asian conflict. De Gaulle's official spokesman, Gilbert Perol, called the 30-minute session "more important than any other previous meeting France has had on Viet Nam."

The meeting took place at the Royal Palace. The 75-year-old French leader conferred with Nguyen Truong, who recently was appointed by North Vietnamese President Ho Chi Minh as Hanoi's "representative" in Cambodia.

Perol said the "tete a tete" between De Gaulle and Truong was more important than a mission to Hanoi undertaken last month by special French envoy Jean Sainteny. The latter gave Ho a message from De Gaulle and it was hoped that Truong would have a reply for the French president, who is making an around-the-world tour.

Both De Gaulle and his host in this former French possession in Indochina, Prince Norodom Sihanouk, are outspoken critics of U.S. policy in Viet Nam. Sihanouk broke diplomatic relations with Washington in May, 1965.

De Gaulle, who received a triumphant welcome in "neutral" Cambodia on his arrival from Africa Tuesday, will deliver a major speech on Viet Nam Thursday in the 80,000-seat Phnom Penh city stadium. He was expected to present new proposals on bringing an end to the Viet Nam war.



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TOWER SUICIDE
PARIS (UPI)—An unidentified man scaled newly installed safety barricades Monday night and then jumped to his death from the 327-foot level of the Eiffel Tower.

He was the 349th tower suicide since the landmark was built in 1889.

MONEY UNCLAIMED
LE HAVRE, France (UPI)—Police today said no one has come forward to claim \$13,800 in U.S. currency found in a sack floating in Le Havre harbor Monday. The money has not been reported missing.

TIME IS LATE
JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI)—Last week's edition of Time Magazine, featuring a cover story on South African Premier Hendrik Verwoerd, finally appeared on newsstands here Monday. It was promptly sold out.

Distribution of the magazine had been upheld until the Verwoerd article was studied by the nation's publications control board, which handles censorship.

Rodeo Cloning Serious for Boys In Ranch Rodeo

Cloning-around is serious business at a Boys Ranch rodeo, if you happen to be one of the four boys who will play the biggest part in making the 22nd annual Labor Day rodeo safe for the young participants.

Nearly 100 boys will be riding professional rodeo livestock, Brahma bulls and broncs, and the clowns will be in the arena to protect them from injury.

Several boys try out for the clown positions each year, just as with the other competitive events. The Ranchers who are chosen have thoroughly demonstrated their skill, agility and speed in practice sessions which are now being held.

One of the most difficult things for a Boys Ranch clown to learn is not to run instinctively to the fallen rider and help him to his feet. Their job is to run between an angry bull or bronc and the boy; divert the animal and hold his attention until the rider is safely clear.

Besides their important functions for safety, the clowns will be riding at different times themselves.

Between acts and during the special "stick-horse" race for the four to six-year-old Ranchers, the clowns will unveil their dual personalities and perform light-hearted antics to add to the entertainment.

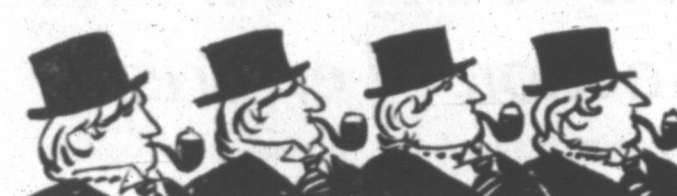

Rocket Plane Hits 3,614

EDWARDS AFB, Calif. (UPI)—On its 170th flight, the X15 rocket plane hit a top speed of 3,614 miles an hour Tuesday and a maximum altitude of 102,000 feet during a series of heat tests.

Air Force Maj. William Knight piloted the black craft at 5.3 times the speed of sound to test an ablative material on its central tail design to reduce the amount of heat reaching the surface of the X15.

On later high speed flights of the X15—which holds the world's speed record of more than 4,000 miles an hour for winged aircraft—the entire surface of the rocket ship will be coated with the ablative material.

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First Day Enrollment Figure Down

Pampa's first day public school enrollment was down from the first day of school last year, according to John Dameron, school superintendent. Yesterday's enrollment figure tallied 5,793 students reporting for the 1966-67 school year. Last year's first day enrollment was 5,902 students.

The initial enrollment figure is always below the expected enrollment, Dameron said. With new families moving to town on Sept. 1 and families stretching vacations past Labor Day, the total enrollment figure is always increased when regular classes begin.

Pampa's school population is expected to be over 6,000 pupils when the school year gets underway.

Nuclear proliferation, it said, threatens all the hazards of accidental wars or surprise attacks. It also could lead to decisive technical breakthroughs by powers bent on nuclear aggression, the study said.

Some registrants may qualify for a 1-SC classification. This classification is given to a student ordered to report for induction and found to be a full-time student, Mrs. Zmotony explained.

Under the law, such a student having a full-time course of instruction at a college may have his induction postponed until the end of the academic year. Such a deferment, though, may be available only one time to each student.

If placed in the 1-SC classification, the student would have the opportunity to bring his grades up to the necessary level. He would then be eligible for the 2-S classification given to a regularly deferred student.

The board will classify a student 1-A if information is not had or if it is not satisfactory, if he is otherwise qualified for 1-A, Mrs. Zmotony said.

The local board, which serves Gray, Donley, Wheeler and Roberts counties, has a call for 45 men for pre-induction physicals on Sept. 12. Thirty men under orders as of now, are due to report for induction on Oct. 12.

Television in Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Tuesday night's one-hour NBC-TV musical special, "Up With People," which had freedom as its theme and Pat Boone as its host, was controversial, in case you didn't know it.

The network, which usually sends out multi-page press releases for anything remotely resembling a special broadcast, had announced the broadcast Aug. 22 in a very brief four-paragraph notice.

And so far as I know, there were no followup features elaborating on the considerable details of the program. At least, I never received any from NBC-TV.

A while back, the Shick Safety Razor Co. tried to place the show on the five television stations owned by CBS, but that broadcasting organization decided against presenting it.

About 30 cities did carry the program on a syndicated basis, sponsored by Shick.

The program has been presented in 40 countries. The cast included 170 high school and college-age youths from the United States and 17 other nations. They are members of moral rearmament. NBC-TV didn't mention this in its press release. Apparently the network considered this less titillating than one of its own series in which the host pretends to be boozed up on camera.

When CBS turned down "Up With People," it said its policy banned commercial entertainment programs with an editorial or ideological point of view.

For those with eyebrows immediately raised, CBS-TV could point out that, in similar grounds, it did reject the recent drama specials on the United Nations which ABC-TV showed after they were put together by a foundation formed especially to promote the U.N.

On the other hand, one might well ask precisely what CBS-TV's "The Defenders" and "East Side-West Side" were, if not commercial entertainment programs with an editorial and ideological point of view.

It would, in fact, be rather difficult to find many major dramatic productions without these very qualities.

"NCC — National Coordinating Committee to End the War in Viet Nam, 341 W. Mifflin St., Madison, Wisconsin, U.S.A.

"SDS — Students for a Democratic Society, 119 Fifth Avenue, New York N.Y., U.S.A.

A statement on the leaflets said they were "published by the Bureau of information of the South Viet Nam liberation (Viet Cong) armed forces."

The leaflets told U.S. soldiers to "oppose the warlike Johnson (Secretary of Defense Robert S.) McNamara clique...oppose fascist orders. Oppose orders to set off on raids...demand to be given a decent job; not the people-killing job."

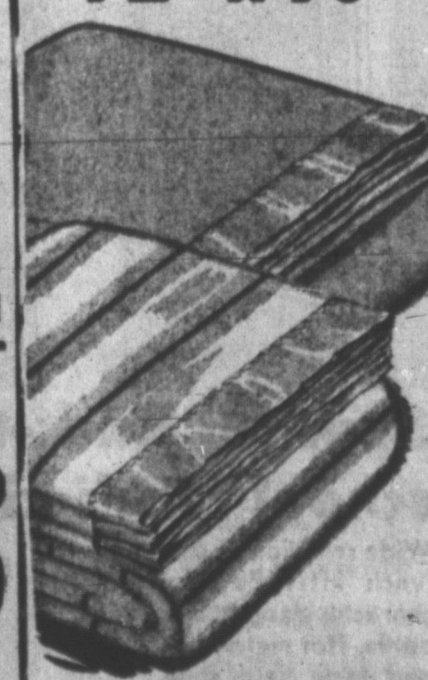

The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI) — To the naked eye, there is little to distinguish H.R. 28 from the scores of other minor bills introduced in Congress each year.

It would authorize the U.S. government to turn over to the State of Florida a 20-acre plot of land near the Cape Kennedy space center for use as an educational facility.

There is nothing very strange or startling about that. Such things happen all the time.

However, someone told me that if I obtained a copy of congressional hearing on the bill I would be intrigued by it. I did and I was.

The story behind H.R. 28 was outlined to a House armed services subcommittee as follows:

A few years ago, Air Force and civilian officials persuaded, or at least encouraged, the University of Florida to build a graduate engineering and research center at Cape Kennedy.

A 20-acre site on the base was selected and in 1964 the state leased the property for 50 years at a nominal rate of \$100 a year.

It then proceeded to erect a \$650,000 graduate school on the land. So far, so good. Except for one small detail.

The subcommittee was informed last September that state funds could not be used to operate the school unless the state itself owned the land.

"This indicates an oversight on someone's part," commented Rep. Otis G. Pike, D-N.Y., who is prone to understatement.

"I think that is probably the answer," admitted Rep. Edward J. Gurney, R-Fla., sponsor of the bill to solve the problem by giving the state title to the land.

Unfortunately, however, another hitch developed. The Air Force insisted that the measure include a proviso, that was unacceptable to the state. The subcommittee then put the bill aside for further study.

There the matter rested until last February when the state agreed to accept the disputed provision. But before the subcommittee got around to acting on the bill, still another difficulty arose.

The Navy reported last month that the graduate school may be too close to its missile loading pier. If such proves to be the case, the Navy said, the \$650,000 edifice will have to be moved.

And that, I presume, would make H.R. 28 academic.

Should Fluoride Get the Credit?

Fluoride gets a lot of credit for preventing tooth decay that should go to magnesium, a University of Colorado dental researcher said Thursday.

Dr. Lewis Barnett has been doing research into tooth decay since 1950 and for many years was an oral surgeon and orthopedist in Hereford. The U. S. Public Health Service as early as 1940 said residents of Deaf Smith County (Hereford) had better bone structure and teeth than any civilized area in the world.

The Public Health Service said the lack of decay was because of the high fluoride content of the water.

But Barnett said magnesium also strengthens teeth and bone.

"It is just as feasible for communities to add magnesium to their water supplies," he said.

Given a choice between fluoride and magnesium, Barnett said he would choose magnesium.

"The stain on teeth commonly associated with fluorides can be blamed on bromine and iodine," he said.

"The role of fluorine should not be minimized," Dr. Barnett said, "but at the same time, we should realize that magnesium plays a more definite role in bone strength and healing than does fluorine."

Dr. Barnett has been visiting in Hereford.

Barnett said capsules containing magnesium were used in treating bone fractures and it was discovered they healed much faster.

Foreign News Commentary

PARIS (UPI)—French President Charles de Gaulle is squaring away for a possible new pitch at playing peacemaker in Viet Nam.

French officials emphasize he will do nothing unless and until he feels the moment is ripe.

But he is known to share the fears of United Nations Secretary General Thant that the Viet Nam conflict could well explode into a general world war.

French officials say De Gaulle is watching closely for any chance to intervene in the role of possible peacemaker.

This is said to be one of the main purposes of his round-the-world grand tour starting last Thursday which will take him, among other places on a state visit to Cambodia, only a few hundred miles from the Viet Nam war.

Rumors that he might take the opportunity to meet secretly or even openly with North Viet Nam President Ho Chi Minh have been denied firmly in both Paris and Hanoi.

Meeting Appears Unlikely

It now seems most unlikely any such meeting will take place.

But De Gaulle will take the opportunity to size up the Viet Nam situation at close hand in talks with Cambodia's maverick chief of state Prince Norodom Sihanouk and other leaders of the little Southeast Asian kingdom bordering on Viet Nam.

He also will make what has been billed as a major speech on the Viet Nam situation during his three-day visit to Phnom Penh.

French officials do not expect any startlingly new proposals. They say De Gaulle will reiterate earlier statements that the Viet Nam conflict can only be settled at the peace table and not on the battlefield. He is likely they say, also to reiterate earlier calls for reconvening of the 1954 Geneva Far Eastern peace conference.

French officials predict De Gaulle also will insist that any peace settlement must involve withdrawal of United States and all other foreign troops and ultimate neutralization of all Southeast Asia.

Ask Air Halt

They say he also may appeal against halting of air attacks against North Viet Nam.

However, French officials do not believe De Gaulle will lay down as a condition for convening a peace conference nor do they believe he will demand withdrawal of foreign forces except as part of a peace settlement.

French officials concede that De Gaulle has said all this before—in fact, he has been saying it for the past two years and more.

But the fact that he will be saying it within a few hundred miles of the fighting will, they believe, give it far greater weight than ever before.

By doing so, it is felt here, De Gaulle will once again have staked out a role for himself as a possible peacemaker, if and when he believes the time is ripe.

French officials say he recognizes the time for mediation has not arrived yet. But De Gaulle wants to be ready to act, they say, when he thinks there is the slightest chance of success.

TULIA, Tex. (UPI)—A philanthropist who with her late husband gave millions away, Leeta Flores, died Saturday at the age of 91. She had suffered a lengthy illness.

Mrs. Flores was the widow of S. F. Flores, a man who in his 88 years built a fortune in oil, gas, land and ranching and then gave much of it away. The two donated \$2 million of oil and gas property to Wayland Baptist College, then gave a bible building to the school. They gave hundreds of thousands of dollars to First Baptist Church and to Swisher Memorial Hospital.

DENISON, Tex. (UPI)—A man stabbed a woman during an argument in a cafe early Saturday and she died. The victim was Jessie Johnson, 38, of Sherman. The stabbing occurred in an eatery in Sherman a few hours later in a hospital.

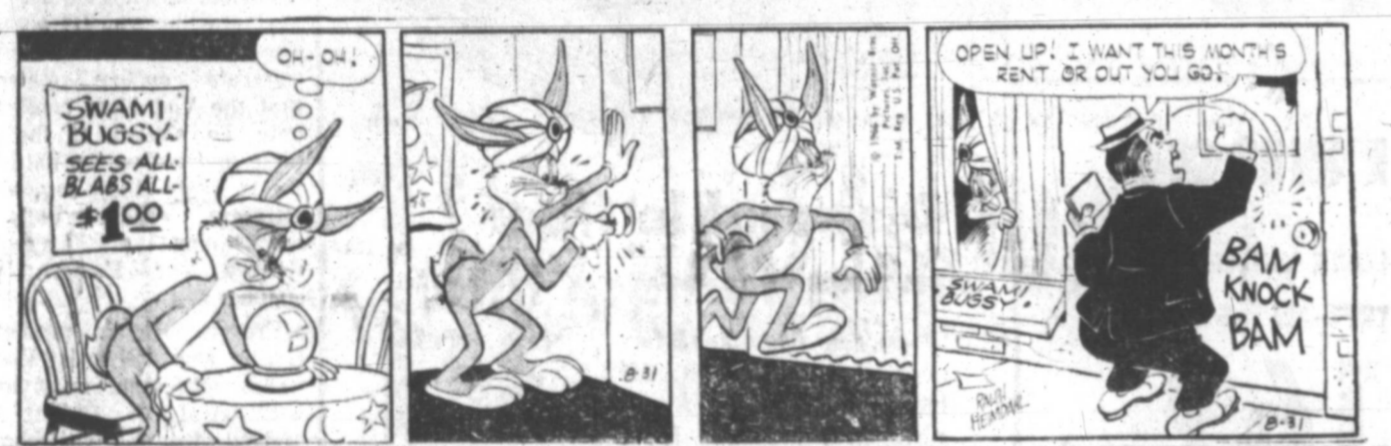

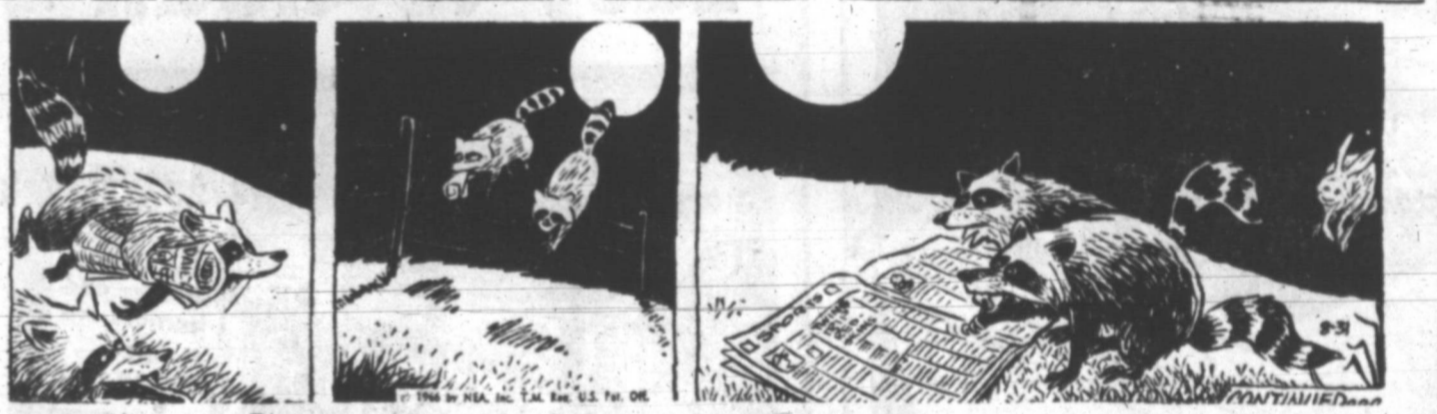

Gardening News

By THELMA BRAY

The July issue of "Park's Floral Magazine" has an excellent article entitled "How to Quench a Garden's Big Thirst." The writer, Betty Brinhardt, says, "Water conservation is vital to good gardening. There are many reasons for trapping rain water other than just having enough moisture in the soil for good plant growth.

"As a physical proof, have you ever noticed how refreshing your plants look immediately after a summer shower? They certainly don't perk up that much after a sprinkling from the hose. Why not? Simply because rains feed your plants for you. Every time raindrops fall through the air, they bring along with them quantities of free nitrogen which they extract from the air as they pass through. If your soil is loose, and covered with an organic mulch, it will readily absorb rainfall, and with it the free nitrogen that does so much for plant growth. If rain

water runs off a hard surface caused by poor soil management, valuable nitrogen is lost. In regions of wet springs, but dry summers, the garden soil must be kept porous with humus, and organic mulches, so that it will be able to absorb quantities of water when it is most plentiful. The soil will then store this excess water within its subsoil from which it may be brought up for summer plant growth through capillary attraction.

"You can cause your soil to become a mammoth sponge by turning in quantities of organic matter in fall, such as compost, or plowing under a green cover crop. Organic fibers create billions of air spaces within the soil structure. These absorb and hold, rain water. They also prevent water from becoming locked in silt loams, where plants can wilt even though the moisture content is high.

"Bury organic refuse in trenches in plots after harvest. Or shred all organic materials, then plow, rototill, or spade them into the topsoil. Shredded leaves are especially valuable in creating water - preserving humus within your garden soil."

Start geranium cuttings now for late fall and winter blooming. Geraniums bloom best the first year from cuttings. Take two to four inch cuttings of firm, healthy current - season growth. Trim leaves off lower inch to inch and half of stem and dust base of stem with rooting hormone powder. Treated cuttings are then placed in pots or flats in a light but shady place, with the lower inch of cutting in clean, moist sand. Keep sand moist but not wet. Cuttings should be rooted and ready for potting in about three weeks. Potting soil should be one that drains well but still has good moisture-holding capacity.

Casper Tees Off In Carling Golf

BIRKDALE, England (UPI) — Billy Casper, the U.S. Open champion and leading money winner on the Professional Golfers Association tour this year, challenged the claim that he's "the world's best putter" today before teeing off the 4-1 favorite in the \$200,000 Carling World Golf Championship.

Casper, who hacked his way to an eight-over-par 81 during Tuesday's practice round, was disappointed with his performance over the par-73, 7,037-yard Royal Birkdale Course and criticized his putting as one of his major drawbacks.

"I just don't understand how I got the reputation of being the world's best putter," Casper said. "I wish I had a dollar for every putt I've missed under three feet. It would have added \$20,000 to \$30,000 to my winnings."

Casper, who once weighed 200 pounds but has slimmed down to a comfortable 165, said his putting touch has deserted him during the past few years.

"The U.S. Open was my only good spell with a putter this season," he said. "I haven't it's almost always two solid been three putting much—but putts on every green. My taps just don't seem to go where I want them to any more."

While Casper struggled during Tuesday's practice, an unheralded Britisher named Tony Jacklin added his qualifications to the list of favorites by turning in a brilliant 10-under-par 63 which included an eagle, nine birdies and one bogey. The sizzling round was five shots better than the competitive course record set by the late Tony Lema when he won the British Open in 1964.

Jacklin's sudden emergence from nowhere has given local fans a bit more interest in the tournament. The Carling carries a first place prize of \$35,000, the world's richest, but the absence of Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer from the list of entries had caused interest to diminish somewhat.

Nevertheless, there were still enough big names in evidence to satisfy most fans. Doug Sanders, Phil Rodgers, Doug Ford and Gay Brewer were among the long list of American entries while five-time British Open champion Peter Thomson of Australia and colorful Chi Chi Rodriguez of Puerto Rico were listed among the 164 contestants from other nations.

With the defending champion and runner-up and a tough field of amateurs in back of 'em, the 29th annual Top O' Texas golf tournament will get underway Friday with a practice round over beautiful Pampa Country Club course.

Host pro Hart Warren is still taking entries and feels sure 206 golfers will be ready to tee off Saturday.

John Farquhar of Amarillo, winner in 1965 with a 270 will be on hand to defend his title and Bobby Greenwood of Cookeville, Tenn., the 1965 runner-up will be back again to try and gain a victory.

Also on hand will be Buster Carter, who has knocked on the door several times, and a coming youngster, Richard Ellis, who has just won the Pamel tournament and Don Prigmore of Lubbock and Pampa, who won in 1958, turned pro and has just gotten, back his amateur status.

Prigmore holds the tournament record, set in '58 when he shot a 267.

Max Hickey, Don Lacky, Malcolm Douglas, runner-up in 1952, '55 and 61 and C. F. McGinnis the winner in 1945 will play also.

Golf teams from Oklahoma State University, North Texas State and Texas Tech, have entered along with James Grant, Bobby Sanders, Miles Childress, Jim Chew and Steve LaCrone.

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Casper Becoming Leader

NEW YORK (SEA) — Ever since Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player swallowed up professional golf and became the biggest merchandising unit (as the Big Three) since Disneyland, the "out" golfers have been looking for a leader.

They have found one in Billy Casper, a man who should need little identification — but strangely, does.

Essentially, Billy is a colorful, solid citizen who gives one-tenth of his earnings to the church, is devoted to his wife Shirley and three children and approaches a golf course with all the outward enthusiasm of an accountant taking the 7:27 train from New Rochelle.

But there is a Casper who's salable in today's market, where hitting a golf ball straight is almost as revered as the first solo plane crossing of the Atlantic (the name was Lindbergh, if you need to be reminded).

"He's the only heavyweight champion," says Fred Corcoran, the entrepreneur who first made pro golf big business, "who trimmed down and became the lightweight champion."

The allusion is to Casper's plummeting loss of weight by adhering to such delicacies as buffalo steak and bear meat.

He weighed 235 when he won the U. S. Open at Uringel Foot in 1959," notes Corcoran, "and he was 185 this year for the Open victory at Olympic."

Casper's a natural for novelty food stores that want to peddle whale meat, another of the edibles he favors. I mean, who else savors swordfish and tomatoes for breakfast, when he isn't dipping into morsels of avocado?

The odd result is that this exotic diet, dictated by a most un-

usual appetite, William Earl Casper Jr. generally comes out looking like a self-conscious weekend golfer.

Billy seems consigned to drabness as a personality because he's so businesslike in his approach to the game, a tight-lipped perfectionist who has studied the odds and figured out what it takes to win.

His feat in overcoming a deficit of seven strokes on the back nine to win the Open this year should be recorded as one of the great finishes of the history of golf.

"It's a shame," says Ken-

hole," recalls Billy, "when my putt (a 20-footer for a birdie) stayed in and Arnie's stayed out (for a bogey 4). Until then I'd been playing for second place. If I were going to make up shots, it should have been on the 11th and 12th holes. But now for the first time Arnie realized he could lose the tournament, and I never heard any screams for Billy until we were walking up to the 16th hole."

It was unique and stirring for deadpan Billy. The rest is in the record. He's the only golfer with four tournament victories this year (San Diego, U.S. Open, Western Open and Indianapolis).

The other golfers talk about him. Phil Rodgers, a quaint one, sat around the clubhouse one afternoon and mused, "It's not Casper's day. He needs an eight-mile-an-hour wind before he can go out and play." To blow the allergies away.

Well, maybe that's what it takes to be a memorable golfer. One of the gripping publicity releases of all time came out of the recent PGA in Akron. It detailed a moment of crisis for young Jack Nicklaus:

"The faintness and pain... apparently came when he drank some juices too quickly. He belched several times after standing up and the pain disappeared."

Casper comes closest to being emotional when he details his Open win, probably the most important of his career since it emphasized that golf wasn't really being dominated by Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, and that Casper himself was the second leading money winner of all time.

"It was decided on the 15th

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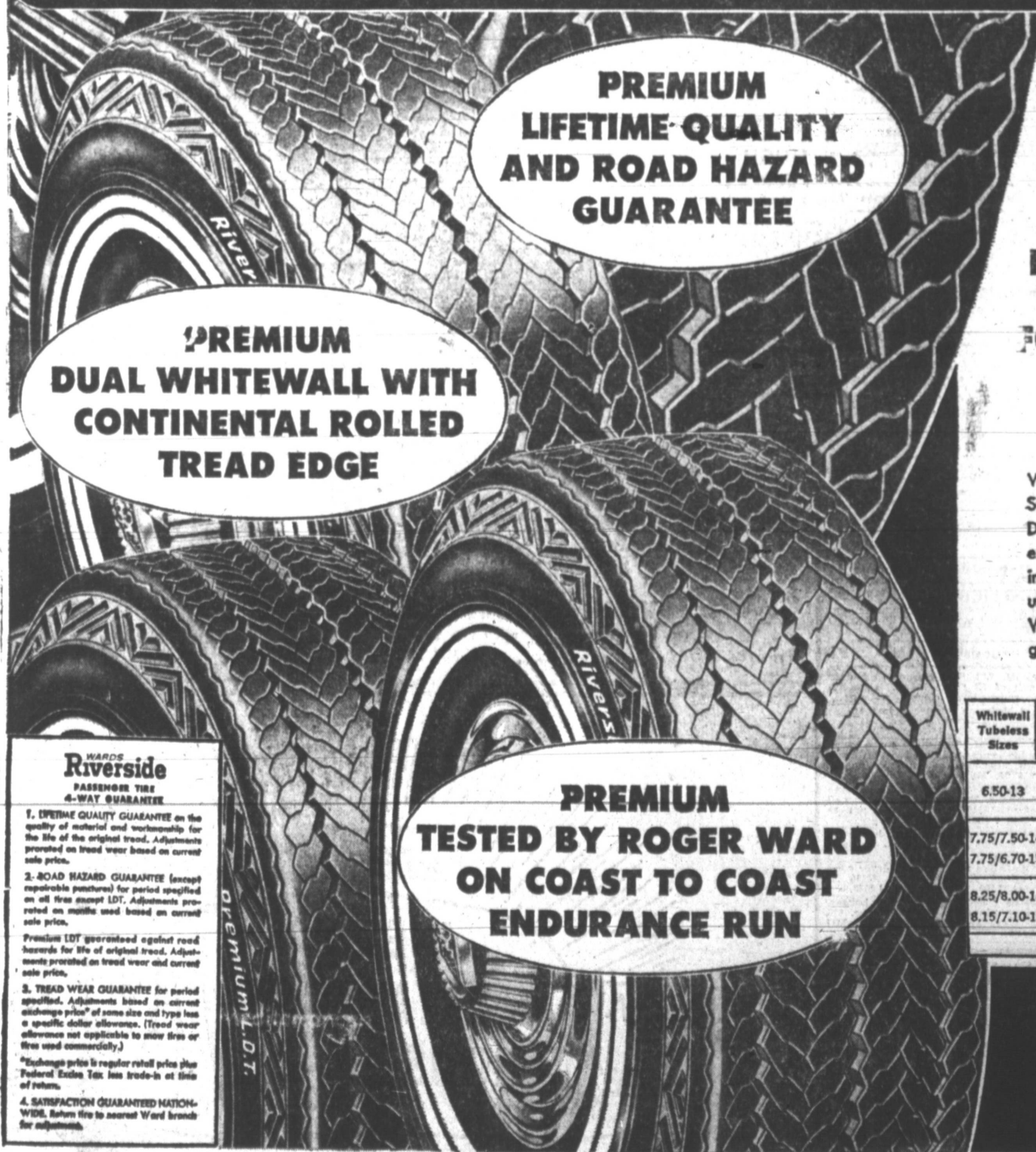
