The mob then swirled through the streets on an orgy of destruction. They set fire to a number of automobiles.


The shooting broke out at the

radio station where polce lines were breached and some of the rioters entered the radio station's offices and set them afire before they were ousted. Even as the outbreaks erupted, Premier Mrs. Indira Gandhi was accusing opposition parties of making a persistent effort to organize violence and bring about the breakdown of the machinery for law and order.

This time the task of barring United Nations action fell on Nikolai Trofimovich Fedorenko. At stake was a piece of paper known as Security Council Document No. S-7575. It spelled

out the concern of the overwhelming majority of the members of the Security Council over the "deplorable" border incidents between Israel and Syria.

As an Arab ally, the Soviet Union felt the resolution unduly chastised Syria-and refused to Cannel 10go along with the document that urged both sides "to refrain from any action that might increase tension in the area."

A majority of diplomats here. however, recognized that despite the Soviet veto, Israel and Syria have been duly warned not to tamper with the always delicate peace in the Middle

Thus barring any dangerous flareup in the area, the Mid-East issue is not expected to be brought before the Security Council again, soon for any prompt action.


