Guardsmen Patroling Tense Neighborhood

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - National Guardsmen and police patroled two tense neighborhoods in a "show of force" oday to prevent any renewal of the worst outburst of Negro racial strife in the city's history.

Even though the two Negro districts were quiet, police officials declined to say the violence-touched off Tuesday by the police killing of a suspected car thief-was finally over.

The most political President in recent United States history is stymied and stifled by three political problems beyond his control.

More accurately, these problems are beyond Lyndon B. Johnson's control at this moment

Johnson is haunted, in order of importance, by: -A bloody, costly, unpopular

war in Viet Nam -White voter resentment against Negro demands and Negro violence.

-The politically deadly increase in the cost of living.

These in combination could wreck a presidential reputation. LBJ's frantic efforts to get these monkeys off his back create new problems for the President. He has discovered the Russians, like the Red Chinese and North Vietnamese, scorn his peace feelers. They demand that the United States cut and-run from Southeast Asia in repudiation of all Johnson has said about the necessity for staying there and fighting, whatever the risks,

War spending has zoomed this year by more than \$1 billion a month at a minimum. Some say \$2 billion. The administration has been compelled to abandon the pretense that this is a cheap little war to be paid for with loose pocket change. Rising costs inflate living costs. But Johnson has not dared to cut welfare state spending to compensate for war costs.

These and other developments have aroused the left wing pressure groups to rebellion against the Johnson administration. These left wingers were recruited by FDR in 1933-36. These left wingers have come to be the dominant element in the Democratic party. They put John F. Kennedy in office. LBJ must keep them to win in 1968.

Big labor's high command has been chilled by Johnson's failure to make good on basic campaign promises. Negro leaders are breaking out of the Great Society corral. They believe that the Johnson administration failed them when the civil rights bill reached the Senate. LBJ cannot sleep free of nightmares when longr love and trust him. Negroes and labor leaders no longer love and trust him.

Negroes also are unhappy because the Johnson administration has failed to win home rule for Washington, D.C., where Negroes have a clear majority. LBJ's home rule plan would include a help-yourself invitation to Washington municipal authorities to dip at will into the federal treasury regardless of the constitutional prerogatives of the Congress.

Administration enthusiasm for other civil rights legislation appears to have been weakened by white voter resentment outside the South against increasing Negro demands and flaming Negro violence in the streets.

Johnson watchers are fascinated as the President again begins to manupulate his fouron-the-floor political gear shift. This safety device usually has won elections by permitting quick adjustment of LBJ's political principles to political needs.

Cohnson variously has been a New Dealer, a Texas conservative, for and against labor legislation, against civil rights. for civil rights; for filibusters, against filibusters. Although this agility often wins elections it does not always win the voters' lasting affection and tursting confidence.


'The hard core of Johnson's welfare state political machine is being fragmented by doubt and disappointment. These fragments are disgruntled. distrustful or even revengeful. Our most political modern President must shift gears now faster than ever at constant risks of stripping all.

Open To Challenge

See last paragraph* Before stating our belief in a universal single standard of right we want to make it clear that we invite questions on this belief. And, if we cannot answer without evasion or contradictions, we are not worthy of your confidence and will admit our error and change our belief.

Want Information

We believe that most of our political trouble comes from putting confidence in persons who continue to advocate government economic planning even though they can neither rationally answer questions about what they advocate, nor find

We know of no better way to learn and develop, and thus be able to be useful, than have our convictions questioned either privately or publicly.

The Pampa Daily News believes in a system of universal natural law.

It is our belief that every fact of existence-if it is a fact-is immutable, irrevocable and eternal.

That is — we believe that moral facts are no less concrete and timeless than physical facts. The law of gravity does not change with seasons; atomic behavior is not subject to the good intentions of man. For physical facts are not capable of change; else they would not be facts.

And so we believe it is with moral facts, which stem from the same source as physical laws.

Let's take two facts, one physical and

1. Water seeks its level.

2. Stealing is wrong.

It is commonly accepted that the first fact is not subject to amendment. A change in political administration, a vote of the people, a petition of the Society of Learned Mathematicians of the World cannot change it. It exists as a fact.

The second law, we believe, is no more subject to amendment than the first. The majority might wink at it, try to reconcile it with some base or unsound conviction. But that does not affect the law -only the people who must live by it. Jumping out of a five-story building to flout the law of gravity will hardly bring about a suspension of that law. Neither will disregarding moral law bring about

Guide To Morality

Now, we have outlined our convictions in fundamental moral law, or fact.

Next, it is incumbent upon us to state a single universal law or fact as we believe it:

Persons, groups and governments ought not threaten to initiate force or use it to attain their ends. This would certainly mean, Thou shalt not steal individually or collectively. If no person or group stole, there would be no murder, no false witness, no-adultery.

To express the belief positively, all individuals or groups should get what they get in a manner that would be profitable to all. Then all would respect the private property of others 100%. That would be true liberty and voluntaryism.

That is our interpretation of the Declaration of Independence. This is the universal single standard of right we use as our measuring device of morality a yardstick of ethics.

Thus we believe:

1. That every man is born with equal unalienable rights to take moral action to make more secure his property which includes first his life, then his liberty and all he produces.

2. That these rights are the endowment of the Creator and not the gift of any government.

Since we believe these facts are expressed in this guide of human conduct, we do not believe any man has the moral right to curtail the rights of his brother. That is, no man has the right to initiate force against his brother. Every man, to be sure, has the right to resist the initiation of force, but should not in-

In all of recorded history, men have banded together for certain reasons to hunt, to play, to trade, to build. In a voluntary association, such as the one that publishes this newspaper, each man exercises his rights through the group. BUT, simply because each man is the member of a group, he cannot morally assume rights he did not possess as an individual. And, neither does the group possess rights which the individuals in that group do not possess as individuals.

An example—John Doe is a shoe salesman. He does not have a right to sell shoes at gunpoint, Even, if 10,000 John Does in the shoe business form an organization, that organization does not have the right to sell shoes at gunpoint.

Rights and morality are individual matters. These moral laws do not make exceptions for groups. They do not say, Thou shalt not steal except at the desire of the majority." They say, "Thou shalt not steal" Period. And a man's association with a group does not relieve him of the burden of these laws.

We believe, therefore, in a single standard of conduct. Thomas Jefferson stated the matter. He wrote: "I know of but one code of morality, whether it be for men or for nations.

Immanuel Kant, another great student of morals, in his "Metaphysics of Morals" wrote: ". . . I ask myself only: Can I will that my maxim become a universal

Single Standard of Conduct

Our belief in a single standard of conduct, and in the existence of individual rights, and in the fact of universal natural law, brings us to oppose all things in which an individual or group seeks to initiate force - that is, curtail the rights of any other individual or group.

We must oppose each brand of socialism, whether it is called Communism, Fascism, Fabian Socialism, New Dealism or New Frontierism...

We oppose socialism in factories, schools, churches and in the market

We do not believe there is any such animal as "good political socialism," either on a local, national or international scale. We do not believe in initiating force for any reason, even though the cause is a "good" one.

We believe it is violating the rights of the individual to force him to support a school, church, industry, business or profession if he does not choose to do so.

Two men out of a hundred have no moral right to force the 98 to support a school or church. Neither do the 98 have the moral right to force the remaining two men to support that school or church.

If that belief is contrary to the above standards we want to be convinced. Repeatedly we have offered as much as \$1,000 to prominent persons who advocate using collective initiated force to examine publicly the morality of using such force where each person would agree to answer questions as he would before a court. We earnestly seek to be shown any errors in our reasoning.

If six, 26 or 6,000,000 individuals voluntarily get together to establish a church, school, business or club-and if those people do not curtail the rights of anyone inside or outside their own group - we have no argument with them.

The majority cannot write moral law. Neither can the minority. But, neither does the majority enjoy any moral advantages denied the minority, or the individual.

We believe, therefore, in a voluntary supported government. The state, at best, exercises those powers which the individuals in that state voluntarily have turned over to the state for administration. An example: We prefer a private police force because we'd rather support a police force than wear a gun. But if some do not want to support a police force, they should not be forced to do so. Nor should they receive its services. The police force should have no powers denied any individual, and neither should the existence of a police force abridge the right of any citizen to defend himself.

We do not believe the state has any rights simply because it is a state.

Governments should exist only to try to protect the rights of EVERY individ-ual — not to redistribute the property, manipulate the economy or establish the pattern of a society.

These are the basic elements in our belief and of our editorial convictions.

*Regrettably, we do not always follow this principle. We fall into error. Our humility perhaps, is not sufficient to the effort. But it is our belief to the degree a universal single standard of right is followed you will have a deeper understand-ing of your religion, greater freedom and security and more happiness and a high-er standard of living. This belief will also benefit every person in the corumunity, the state, the nation and the world. That is the reason it is our belief.

Rarely do all the athlete's dreams come true. He starts with his grade school or neighborhood team, and progresses through high school and college, and perhaps even to the pros. With each step up, he dares to dream a little bigger, but secretly he strongly doubts that it ever will happen that way.

No amount of success can erase all the doubts. He knows competition becomes tougher with each step up the fcotball ladder. He knows, too, that it takes a little bit of luck along the way - freedom from injury, the right coach to build his confidence, the right timing, the right circumstances.

it all came true for two young men last Saturday when Notre Dame defeated Purdue. Even their most spectacular dreams were fulfilled. If they dream on, and if the dreams keep coming true, it is difficult even to imagine how far they - and Notre Dame - may go in the next three years.

It is an old - and well-verified - story that thousands of youngsters from coast to coast dream of playing major college football, and many of them dream of playing for Notre Dame. Terrance Hugh Hanratty of Butler, Pa., and James Patrick Seymour of Berkley, Mich., must have dreamed those dreams.

They had reason to. Hanratty was a prep All-American. Seymour won a record 11 letters in high school. Last spring, as freshmen, quarterback Hanratty was named the squad's outstanding back and offensive and Seymour the outstanding lineman.

Saturday, they made their varsity debut by leading the Irish to victory over Purdue. Hanratty hit 16 of 24 passes. Seymour set school records by catching 13 for 276 yards. He also scored three touchdowns.

They Came True

All the elements for having dreams come true were there. The game was nationally televised and was a sellout at home. Hanratty and Seymour came on the Notre Dame scene in an era that demands good passers and good receivers, and at a time when Notre Dame sorely needed both. Purdue upset Notre Dame last season, and this added extra interest.

And, before the game, Notre Dame's fine coach, Ara Paraseghian, told me. "Those two young men can be great. All they need is confidence in themselves. I just hope I've built that confidence to the right degree.'

Obviously, he did. Possibly only a coach can appreciate the difficulty of instilling confidence without producing cockiness. Ara seems to have done it superbly.

It has been my rare privilege in my years in football to know young men from every walk of life, from every economic level, from every size of town, who have dared to dream and who have made the dream come true. I think of names too numerous to list, but their stories are basically the same.

There was Jimmy Harris of Terrell, Texas, not a highly sought high school player, who said he always had wanted to play for Oklahoma. He was our quarterback for three years, and we never lost a game. There was Jack Ging, a thin 150-pounder out of Alva, Okla., who introduced himself to me one day and said he was going to play for us. Nobody was more surprised than I was when he did just that,

There were more - many more. They were, in a real sense, like Sam Levenson, the educator-humorist who was born and rasied in a New York slum. He said that to escape the slum you had to dream and you had to be lucky.

He added: "Of course, you soon discover that the more you hustle the luckier you seem to get, and the more dreams seem to come true."

There's a message there for athletes, and for every young man. Keep dreaming, keep studying, keep hustling. You may be amazed at how lucky you get ...





A Turning Point The defeat of the Johnson administration's civil rights bill in the U. S. Senate properly may be regarded as a turning point in the political life of the United States. Since the 1950s. advocates of "civil rights" have only had to demand new legislation opening up privileges for a minority and the Congress has jumped to obey. Only two years ago, former Sen Barry Goldwater said he believed that the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was unconstitutional. He found himself in a political position of great loneliness. His candid, courageous stand on this question unquestionably contributed to his defeat in the presidential

Glaucoma-a treacherous eve disease which occurs most often in people 35 years of age and over - usually is a gradual, painless loss of side vision, of which you may be totally un-

Early detection of this disease, from which some one million persons are now suffering. unrecognized, is of vital importance. Once vision is lost from glaucoma, it can never be restored. However, if detected and treated in time, medical science can check the Progress of the disease with simple surgery or medication.

Symptoms which may suggest the presence of glaucoma are: frequent changes of glasses, none of which is satisfactory; loss of side vision; blurred or foggy vision; rainbow-colored rings around lights; inability to adjust eyes to darkened rooms. Having these symptoms does not necessarily mean a person has glaucoma - on the other hand, these symptoms might not even be present and a person still could have early glau-






