brary and the school library have distinctive, and complementary functions, one serving the child in his school life and the other in his community. For complete library service, there should be continuous joint planning between the two agencies, based on realistic recognition of the functions of each and the neds of the individual student.' "The school library furnishes the student's basic needs," Mrs. Cockrell continued, "text books, basic reference and course-related materials. The public library, by comparison, must furnish a wide variety of materials written on many different subjects in order to satisfy the needs of the entire community it serves."

Both schools and public lipraries are bound together by a common purpose in teaching young people how to use the resources of a library in order that they may be prepared to meet a world that demands continuous reading," Mrs. Cockrell explained.
