



Eost Of Living index Increases

WASHINGTON (UPI) -The rost of living index jumped 0.4 per cent in July, raising average consumer price incent in July, raising creases during the past year to nearly 3 per cent, the Food prices remained relamely stable from June. The of Labor Statistics lamed the latest increase primarily on the higher cost of services.

A decline in the real earning power of the nation's factory workers continued in July. The July index was 113.3 This meant it cost \$11.33 to buy the same goods and services that \$10 would buy in the base period of 1957-59.

Arnold Chase, assistant bueau commissioner, said relattivaly few items were reconsible for the July increase. The boost in food prices month was 0.4 per cent. nearly a full percentage point below the normal July increase,



Lighter Side

I first noticed this last month when I was visiting my native

"Did you enjoy the game?" I asked.

"What game?"

"I understood you to say you had been to Houston to see a baseball game."

"Don't be siny. I wouldn't go across the street to see a basebill game. I said I had been to see the Astrodome."

It turned out that he had driven to Houston, taken a tour of the empty stadium and then driven home again.

My first thought was that the poor soul had lost her marbles. But when I made a few discreet inquiries among other riembers of the family, I learned that her behavior was

I was told that thousands of Texans had visited the Astrodome when no game was being played. Apparently they felt that baseball would detract from their enjoyment of the stadium.

A man who had actually seen a game in the Astrodome said it also was a bit unusual. He goid many spectators spent more time watching the electronic scoreboard than what was happening on the field.

The New Breed After I returned to Washington, I began to mull this over. Travelling long distances to see baseball games is no novelty, but driving 400 miles not to see a game is something else

I concluded that the Astrodome was creating a new breed of fans-or rather, non fans.

A few days later, when the Washington Senators were playing away from home, I drove out to D.C. Stadium and spent a few minutes sitting in the empty stands.

There were no guided tours, as at the Astrodome, but it was nevertheless a pleasant experience. In some ways it was better than watching the Senators play.

It then occurred to me that baseball owners probably would pick up a lot of extra cash by catering to non-fans.

Merely keeping the gates open likely would not attract much of a crowd, except in Texas, but if they offered a regular schedule of non-games, it could be a big drawing card.

NEW 'CRK - Summer accidents wait claim over 27,-000 lives in the United States this year, predict life insurance by the end of August more than 15 million people will be injured seriously enough to need medical attention or to restrict their activity for a day or longer.

That's the conservative estimate based on accident statistics compiled for 1962-64, the latest years for which data are available. Preliminary information for 1965 indicates that the 1962-64 figures will be topped by a considerable margin.

June-July - August accidents will be due mainly to the summertime spurt in motoring, water sports, use of outdoor machines, maintenance of electrical lines.

Drowning, not involving boats, took an average of 2,808 lives in 1962-64. Together with 561 water transportation accidents, they accounted for an eighth of the total number of accidental deaths in the summer as compared with a twentieth in the rest of the year.

According to the Division of Accident Prevention of the U.S. Public Health Service, of the 484 known drownings in swimming pools in the U.S. in 1965, 230 occurred in private home protable or permanent pools, 52 in apartment houses, and 53 in motels and hotels (mostly motels). More than two fifths of the pool drownings were among children under five, many because of a lack of supervision.

The statisticians also reported that at least 86 Americans drowned while skin or scuba diving in 1965. Skin diving with snorkels accounted for 26 deaths while diving with tanks and underwater equipment kill-
