# Harvester Roundballers Smother Quanah, 80-44

QUANAH — Pampa's titanic Harvesters and Schockers closed out a successful two-day road trip here Saturday night by racking up their third victories in three games with the Harvesters blasting Quanah off the court 80-44 and the Shockers winning the same way 86-59.

Senior Rick Foster and juniors George Bailey and Bo Lang provided the Saturday night fireworks with 18, 18 and 20 points respectively. This marked the first time in three games that

Bailey was not the leading scor-

Quanah gave the Harvesters a short scare leading by 2-0, 4-2, and at one point enjoyed a 7-3 lead early in the first period. But for Foster's 20 foot jump shot from the corner tied the count for the third time at 9-9 and Lang's free toss put Pampa into a 10-9 lead and from then on Quanah was in nothing but trou-

With 1:25 left in the period, the Harvesters held a 16-11 advantage and when the period came to a close it was 18-11 with Foster's field goals and Lang's free throw shooting providing the margin.

The Harvesters upped their lead to 32-13 with 5:20 left in the half and led at halftime 40-18 with Bailey tapping in four baskets and Lang scoring eight points.

In the third quarter, the Harvesters really began to move with everybody getting in the scoring game and held an impossible 63-27 lead with 1:45 left in the third period.

Senior Robert Carr hit the 69th and 70th points for Pampa with 4:15 showing on the clock and that gave Pampa a 70-30 lead which had been upped to 76-32 with 1:10 to go.

The Harvesters hit 48 percent from the floor on 33-69 and 14-23 from the charity line. Quanah, like Wichita Falls, found the Pampa defense murderous and managed only 15-63 from

The Shockers rang up their third in a row behind Jim Hollis' 23-point outburst that broke a 32-32 halftime tie. Beau Bond had his best night ever with 19 points, Mike Subblett hit 13 and Sugar Mathis contributed 11.

Friday night against Wichita Falls, the Shockers led 37-19 at the half and won going away 69-35. Hollis was again the big gun with 17 points and Subblett hit 15.



The difference has been the reward factor, the project team emphasized.

"If a student does well," eays Dr. Girardeau, who adopted the system after working with retarded children, "he is given points which can be used to buy candy, toys or food at one of our stores."

The project, geared to pre school and elementary youngsters has been heavily subsidized by the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) and the National Institute of Child Health and Human Develop-

"The OEO wants an immediate return," said Ross Kopeland associate director of the Child Research Bureau at the University of Kansas in Lawrence. "But we are interested in more than that. We want something for those kids now so they can help hundreds of children in the future."

The way to accomplish this is through research and long range planning, Kopeland and his colleagues emphasize.

"Our project is not to remain in this community forever," Dr. Girardeau says. "In five to ten years the people (See LADDER, Page 16)

By DR. WAYNE BRANDSTADT Baby's Breath-Holding May Not Be a Gimmick

A worried mother asks what she can do for her baby when he holds his breath. Breathholding has long been considered a trick spoiled babies use as emotional blackmail against their mothers. Baby holds his breath; mother panics and gives baby what he wants; baby is happy until the next crisis; crises may occur 12 or 14 times a day.

A British doctor has now reported that it isn't all that simple. In many cases, he says, breath-holding is a sign of early rickets. The matter is easily put to a test. Give the baby one calciferol tablet containing 50,000 units of viamin D-2 and observe him closely for the next two weeks. 




