

Curious Story Told by Russian 'Mr. X' to Warren Commission

WASHINGTON — One of the most curious pieces of information uncovered by the Warren Commission during its investigation of President Kennedy's assassination was an extraordinary statement volunteered by a Russian.

This "Mr. X" seemingly nervous and uneasy, appeared unexpectedly at the U.S. embassy in Moscow some six months after the Dallas murder. To embassy officials he claimed to have known Lee Harvey Oswald and his wife Marina when they lived in the Soviet.

In penciled notes the Russian left at the embassy, now among the more than 20,000 "working papers" given the National Archives by the Warren Commission, Oswald is linked to Jack Ruby, his slayer, and the KGB, Soviet secret police.

These remarkable notes and covering correspondence, and an analysis by embassy officials, were extensively censored by the State Department with the Warren Commission's approval.

Name of the mysterious Russian, described in the State Department correspondence as "a relatively pleasant looking man" was deleted as well as that of the embassy official who talked to him.

Also omitted was the date of the interview. The only reference to time is a notation in the State Department's "memorandum of conversation" that it took place in the "summer of 1964."

The Warren Commission attempted to get at the bottom of the Russian's strange story. Both the FBI and CIA dug into the matter, but with no success. The probes were unable to either confirm or disprove this perplexing information.

Arab Commander Demands Jordan Attend Meeting

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Egyptian Gen. Aly Aly Amer, chief of the United Arab Command, today demanded that Jordan attend Wednesday's joint Arab Defense Council meeting on rising war tensions with Israel.

Amer said in the Cairo newspaper Al Ahram that the 13-nation Arab League had informed Jordan that its presence at the council meeting was compulsory under league statutes. Jordan has refused to say it will attend the council meeting.

Jordanian King Hussein, however, had charged that the command failed to aid Jordan in repelling the heavy Israeli raid of Nov. 13. He said earlier that he might not attend Wednesday's meeting and was known to prefer a meeting somewhere other than Cairo.

LBJ to Spend Third Week in Texas

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — President Johnson goes into his third week in Texas today with the expectation that he will return to Washington late next weekend.

The Chief Executive, who arrived at the LBJ Ranch Nov. 19 for recuperation from throat and abdominal hernia surgery, has shed some weight and is getting back in top form.

British Give Rhodesia Extension of Deadline

Cabinet Expects A Rebel Reply Today

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (UPI) — Britain today granted rebel Rhodesia a brief extension of its deadline for acceptance of final terms for settling the 15-month-old independence crisis.

Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith made an urgent request for more time through the British mission after a four-hour meeting with his cabinet failed to reach agreement on Britain's take-it-or-leave-it settlement.

In London, the Foreign Office sent Smith a reply reminding him that pressure made it imperative that an answer be received within "an hour or so." The message was sent shortly after noon London time — two hours after the original deadline.

Smith and Wilson hammered out a "working document" on independence conditions during a two-day sea-going summit meeting aboard the British cruiser HMS Tiger off Gibraltar.

Price To Appeal Air Base Closing

Congressman-elect Bob Price of Pampa said Sunday night there is a slight chance that the closing of Amarillo Air Force Base will be delayed because of the Viet Nam War.

"It is my understanding that there will be a need for 3,750 new aircraft mechanics to back up the additional 375 pilots the Secretary of Defense announced last week will be trained this year," Price stated.

"I have talked with Air Force officials in Washington by telephone and they indicated no decision has been made as to where the additional ground crewmen will be trained," Price said at the Air Force Association banquet at the Bank of the Southwest.

The new 18th District representative said he will go to Washington next week to confer with Department of Defense officials.

Jet Downed By Bombers

SAIGON (UPI) — American bombers slashed through flights of Communist MIG fighters, shooting down one and possibly two, in their first strike against Hanoi's great Yen Viet railroad yard, U.S. spokesmen said today.

Despite heavy ground fire around the petroleum complex 14 1/2 miles north of Hanoi and the rail yard six miles to the northeast, there was no reported damage to any of the Thunderchiefs, the spokesmen said.

Red Power Struggle Includes Mrs. Mao

HONG KONG (UPI) — China watchers today weighed striking new evidence of the leading role that the former movie actress wife of Mao Tse-tung has assumed in the continuing struggle for power in Communist China.

In the two separate developments over the weekend, Mme. Mao — depicted as wielding increased power in the "cultural revolution" or purge, sweeping China.

Peking Radio Sunday reported she had demanded all opponents of her husband "be wiped out once and for all."

The broadcast said she had been appointed "consultant" to the general political department of the Chinese army, which is in charge of all military commissars.

The Soviet news agency Tass said Mme. Mao had been named "adviser for cultural work in the army."

Pampa Civil Air Unit Chartered With 19 Pilots

A Pampa Civil Air Patrol squadron was chartered at the annual meeting of the Texas CAP Wing at the Air Force Officers Club in Amarillo Saturday night.

Nineteen certified pilots from Pampa were approved to fly a recently purchased Beechcraft T-34 Mentor now stationed at Perry Lefors Airfield here. The plane was acquired for Pampa by members of the local squadron and was one of two that had been in Civil Air Patrol use at the Amarillo Air Force Base.

At Saturday night's meeting, Lt. Col. Pat Mendin, commander of Group I, awarded the Pampa squadron with a trophy for attendance. Ralph Prock, commander of the Pampa squadron, accepted the charter for the local group.

Westerly Winds To Flirt With Mild Temperatures

Reconvened Supreme Court Turns Attention to Georgia's Governor

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nine justices of the Supreme Court turned their attention today to the legal feud over who is going to be Georgia's next governor.

Their decision could have an eventual impact not only on Georgia but on other states as well, particularly Vermont and Mississippi, which also require that the governor be elected by a majority of the vote cast.

Georgia's problem arose when neither Republican Rep. Howard H. (Bo) Callaway nor Democrat Lester G. Maddox received a majority in the Nov. 8 balloting for governor owing to the 5 per cent write-in vote for former Gov. Ellis G. Arnall.

The state's 142-year-old constitution requires that the governor be elected by a majority of votes cast, not a mere plurality.

These three arguments have been advanced for the court's consideration: —Georgia Atty. Gen. Arthur K. Bolton wants the state legislature to choose between Maddox and Callaway when it meets Jan. 9.

—The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) urges a special election with no restriction as to candidates.

On Nov. 18, a special three-judge federal court panel in Atlanta, acting on complaints filed by the ACLU and citizens groups, ruled out Bolton's solution. But before the panel was ready to suggest an alternative, Georgia took the case to the Supreme Court.

Expert Says Moon is '68 Possibility

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Expert Werner Von Braun said today "there is a distinct possibility that, if everything really clicks and we don't have any major snags," the first American astronaut will land on the moon in 1968.

"Our confidence that we will do it before the decade is over is very high," said Von Braun in a copyrighted interview in U.S. News & World Report.

Von Braun, director of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Marshall Space Flight Center at Huntsville, Ala., said of the first moon flight:

"The objective of the very first mission will be essentially to demonstrate that it can be done. The stay time on the moon will be about 18 hours on the first flight.

BOSTON, Mass. (UPI)—John J. Fritsch, Jr., 1807 Dogwood, Pampa technical manager at the Celanese Chemical Co. plant will be graduated Dec. 16 from the 12th session of the Program for Management Development conducted by the Harvard University Graduate School of Business Administration. New Policy Puts Pool of Rejects On Draft Lists

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Defense Department has set up a pool of nearly 350,000 men from which it can draft 40,000 former 'rejectees' by Sept. 30 under a new policy of accepting lower mental standards.

Department officials said Saturday the group included 233,181 whites and 121,676 Negroes declared physically fit to serve in the armed services within the last four years but previously ejected because of low scores on the Armed Forces Qualification Test (AFQT).

The men all scored above the minimum standards fixed by law for military service, but under former regulations they were rejected because of "limited trainability."

Most of the pool apparently came from among the 2.4 million men in the Selective Service System 1-Y classification, considered available only in a national emergency. But officials said the pool was formed on the basis of AFQT scores rather than draft classification.

All the men achieved scores of at least 10 on the AFQT. That corresponds roughly to a fifth grade education or better.

Under reduced test standards announced Tuesday, an undetermined number of men will be qualified automatically because they are high school graduates. Officials said regardless of test results, most high school graduates usually perform above expectations once they are in uniform.

Another group, with AFQT scores between 16 and 30, will qualify to them for the draft because they now have to show an aptitude in only one specialty compared to two under the old regulations. Two aptitude specialties still required of non-high school graduates with scores on the test between 10 and 16.

In addition to the pool some men can be taken who have physical defects, such as hernias, that can be corrected in six weeks.

Defense officials expect about 30 per cent of the total accepted from the pool will be Negroes, with a large percentage choosing to enlist rather than be drafted.

Grand Jury to Hear Witness In Dr. Sheppard Investigation

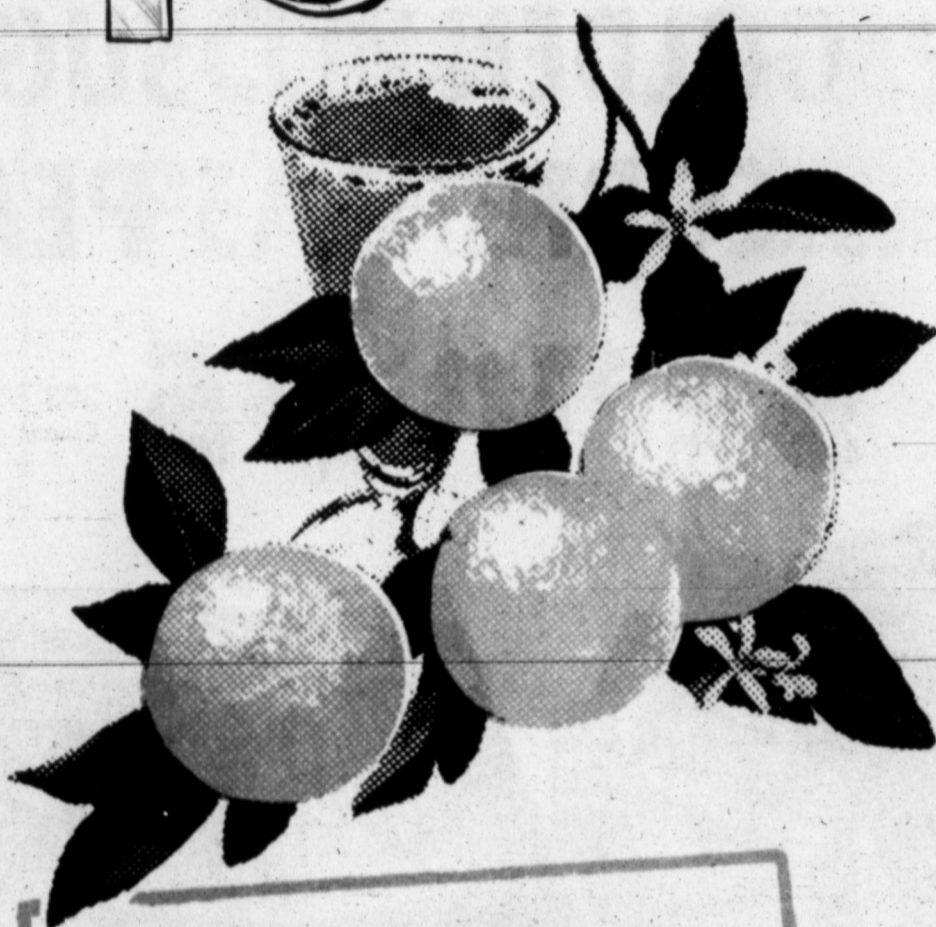

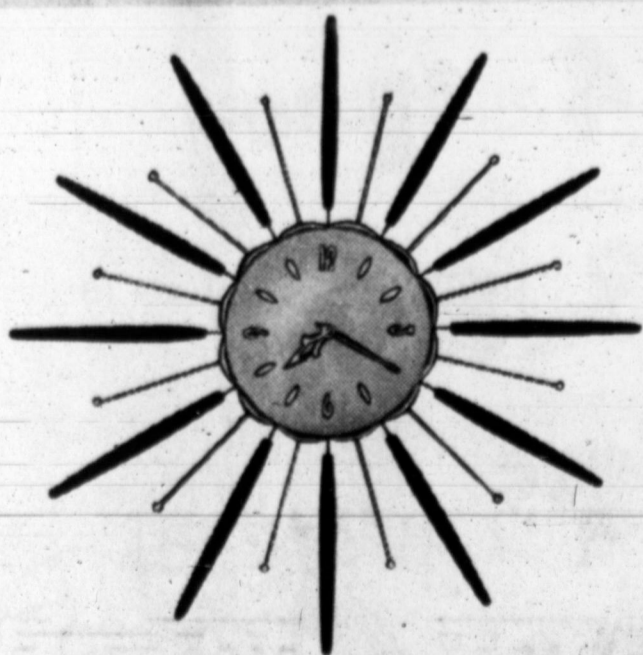
